





"With the settlement at Cardiff the abour troubles arising in all the ports out of the seamen's strike are practically at an end," says the London Daily News. "They are worth the most careful study, for they mark a new period in the Labour movement A year ago everybody was saying that the strike as a weapon was become worthless owing to the superior organization of the employers. The strikes which have now ended were irected by unorganized labourers, or omparatively feeble organizations of workers against some of the strongest of employers's unions, and in every case the men have won signal cictories. That is a remarkable fact, and it is probably to be explained by a change of tactics. The men have struck without prolonged negotiation and notice; that is the first point. "The second point is the develo nent of the sympathetic strike in something very like a general strike.
