Where Are They?
According to a message from Curling to the Daily News, the Gorton-Pew Fisheries Co. of Gloucester will open a branch establishment at Bay of Islands. The same firm has been making arrangements to open a branch at Lunenburg.
It is somewhat strange we hear nothing nowadays of the great enterprises that Messrs. Trefethen & Lord were to set going here early this summer. It will be remembered that they hardly had patience to wait for the contract with the Government to be sanctioned by the Legislature so anxious were they to commence operations. The Legislature opened, the Legislature sat. The Legislature sanctioned an amended contract. The Legislature closed. The Premier went to England. Other picketers took their tricks and turn at going away for a season. The summer came. The summer is passing. But where are the great fishery operations which were to be commenced last spring? Echo answers: Where?

Wanted: An Industrial Judge.
Sir Charles Macara, of Manchester, the famous cotton expert, in a letter to the Lord Mayor of Manchester, suggests that recent disputes have shown the need for an Industrial Judge.
Sir Charles proposes "that a special department should be created, with an advisory body, composed of a few well-known men with the widest experience, representing both capital and labour, to whom disputes might be referred before the stage of a lock-out or a strike is reached. There may be difficulties in the way of putting these suggestions into operation, but the inter-dependence of all industries must be recognised, and the dislocation of the largest commercial centre in the world shows the absolute necessity that my suggestion should be seriously considered and acted upon."
"There is nothing, in my opinion," he says, "of more vital importance to the national welfare than harmonious relationship between capital and labour. The want of it seriously imperils our position as a great commercial nation. A special department with an advisory body such as I have suggested, would provide that if a real grievance did exist, it would receive a fair hearing, exorbitant claims would meet with their just deserts, while resistance to reasonable demands would be equally condemned. I might also designate the president of the proposed advisory committee as an industrial judge. The appointment ought to be a permanent one and entirely independent of party politics. Its holder should be naturally a man of judicial mind, strict impartiality, and experienced in the settlement of labour troubles."
"It seems to me that the successful settlement of this and other labour disputes in various parts of the country in recent years clearly indicates that it is not impossible to find a man with the requisite qualifications, and, in my opinion, such an act of administration, and without the necessity of an Act of Parliament, the proposed industrial judge being sup-

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The Archbishop at St. Bride's

On Friday, 11th inst., His Grace the Archbishop, accompanied by Rev. Fr. Pippy, left town on his official visitation of the western portion of the Diocese. Arriving by train at Placentia they were received by Monsignor Boardman with his usual gracious hospitality. On Tuesday, at 8 a.m., His Grace, after having celebrated Mass in the Convent Oratory, started by road for "The Cape Shore," under the protection of Pat. Hartigan and his doughty steed "Bill."

The day was a most charming one, a bright clear sun shedding a light and a moderate heat tempered by a cooling ephyr, which wafted the sweet odours of the spruce and fir and juniper in grateful and bracing perfume to the olfactory nerve-centres. During the night a very welcome downpour of rain had deluged the parched earth and freshened the prolific forest growth and the rich and profuse underbrush, and now in the glinting rays of the morning sun every bough and branch glistened with its diamond globules.

The beauties of the South East Arm, rivalling the far-famed upper lakes of Killarney, soon spread out their charms to view, the placid waters undisturbed by even a ripple. The long journey with its innumerable hills and poorly metalled roads was somewhat fatiguing, but all sense of weariness or discomfort was put to flight by the extraordinary beauty and evening changing variety of the scenery. At 2 o'clock the party arrived at Patrick's Cove.

Here the whole population of this and the neighbouring coves turned out in their best array and brimming over with enthusiasm. Arches of evergreen, bedecked with natural flowers, wreted the bridge and the entrance to the Chapel yard, and flags waved from many staves on house and store. Here the Archbishop's party were met by Rev. Fr. Fyne, this being the boundary of his parish. The children who had been prepared by the zealous pastor were confirmed to the number of 40. The party were entertained at a plentiful lunch at the home of Mrs. P. B. McGrath. Arriving towards evening at St. Bride's.

A scene of general rejoicing was held. The neighboring hills were capped with numerous bonfires. A general illumination of the houses and of all the many arches of evergreens lared up at night time, and everything was done to testify the joy and enthusiasm of the people. The Archbishop and party first entered the church, and making a short visit to the Blessed Sacrament, His Grace addressed the people, who flocked into the sacred building. His Grace complimented the people on the beauty and elegance of their new church, which had been completed since his last visit some years since. He expressed his gladness on being with them again and gave them his blessing. He then went to the elegant new presbytery, where they were hospitably received by Father Fyne.

The Presbytery, erected by the late pastor, Rev. Fr. Renouf, is a perfect gem of architecture, built in modern American style, and is situated upon a most picturesque site, a knoll or rising ground surrounded by a curtain of evergreen, and upon the banks of a deep gorge through which plays a rocky brook. The architect is our townsman, Mr. Jonas Barter.

Sunday, 12th, a large congregation gathered from all the neighboring settlements: from Patrick's Cove, Gooseberry, Angle's Cove, and Costelloe on the one side, and Lear's Cove, Point Lance and Gull Cove on the other, attended at the church. Early Masses were celebrated by the Archbishop and Father Fyne. At 10 a.m. Miss Cantata was sung by Fr. Pippy. The choir sang the "Missa de Angelis" with great taste in the Gregorian Chant. Miss Lena Loneragan, a child of only 14 years old, presided in a most admirable manner at the organ. At 2 p.m. Confirmation was administered to 44 candidates. His Grace addressed the people in some fervent words of encouragement, and the children in words of instruction. The function closed with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

After the administration of the Sacrament of Confirmation, His Grace visited the rooms of the Holy Name Society. The old parochial residence has been converted into a hall and reading room and is furnished with billiard and bagatelle tables and other amusements. This is a great source of recreation to the young men and is very much appreciated and availed of. A reading room is attached where various periodicals and newspapers may be seen. The members of the Society had prepared a beautiful new flag which was blessed by the Archbishop. It was quite unique in design, consisting of the native colors, pink, white and green in the centre, surrounded by a border of the Papal colors, white and yellow. The flag was hung to the breeze amid rousing

General Railway Strike Probable.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, This Morning.

Meetings with a view of settling the controversy between the railway companies and their employees were held last night at the Board of Trade Office. When they adjourned late last night the situation remained as far from being solved as when they began. Railway managers declared they had been promised protection in running their trains and would not yield to their men. Representatives of the Railway Men's Union declared the strike would take place at the expiration of their ultimatum this morning. The Aldershot military authorities are taking every precaution to ensure the working of the railways in the event of a strike being called, every soldier in the Aldershot command being placed under orders for duty, all the soldiers armed with rifles and ball ammunition being stationed along the railway lines of North and South London. Cavalry will be placed at the stations and will also patrol the lines so as to be able to get quickly to any point of danger. Trains will be worked by flag signals. It is estimated that 25,000 men from Aldershot will be prepared to move in a few hours, and trains to accommodate that number will be assembled there. Similar precautions are being taken at all other military stations in England, Scotland and Wales, so that in case of need every available soldier will be on duty to ensure the continuing of the railway traffic. The Government yesterday made energetic attempts to avert the calamity of a general railway strike, but by the present indications one will materialize.

C.E.T.S. Outing.

The picnic held by the C.E.T.S. at Mr. Clarke's place, Allendale Road, yesterday afternoon, was largely attended. After cricket, football, and other field games had been indulged in, an excellent tea was served in the open air on the veranda of Mr. Clarke's cottage. THE NEW STRIKE.

"With the settlement at Cardiff the labor troubles arising in all the ports' out of the seamen's strike are practically at an end," says the London Daily News. "They are worth the most careful study, for they mark a new period in the Labour movement. A year ago everybody was saying that the strike as a weapon was becoming worthless owing to the superior organization of the employers. The strikes which have now ended were directed by unorganized labourers, or comparatively feeble organizations of workers against some of the strongest of employers' unions, and in every case the men have won signal victories. That is a remarkable fact, and it is probably to be explained by a change of tactics. The men have struck without prolonged negotiation and notice; that is the first point."

"The second point is the development of the sympathetic strike into something very like a general strike. When the seamen came out the dockers, the carriers, and numerous other bodies of men came out, and they came out not merely in sympathy but at once formulated demands of their

It is thought he held on too long, and only jumped when the train was fully under way, and probably 200 yards from the station. No person saw him jump, and the train passed as usual. Some men coming down Long Hill noticed the apparently lifeless body and had him conveyed to the home of the heart-broken parents. His left arm was broken in several places and crushed, his head was cut and bruised, and he was otherwise injured. Dr. Strapp and Dr. Parsons were quickly on the scene, as was also His Lordship Bishop March. The doctors after a consultation decided that the arm would have to be amputated but held out little hope of recovery. But death relieved the little sufferer at 12 o'clock. The case is one of the saddest we have heard of for a long time. The bright little boy left his home about 7:30 in the best of spirits and full of life. He had all arrangements made to go out to-morrow with a number of other members of the C. C. C. of this town to spend a few days in camp with the city C. C. C. The sympathy of the whole town goes out to Mr. and Mrs. Foley in this sad and sudden bereavement, and your correspondent joins in this. For one so young to be snatched from the home by such a sudden and such a sad manner is indeed hard.

The fighting at Liverpool last night, which resulted in the death of two strikers, who were shot by Hussars in defending five prison vans occupied by riot prisoners, whom the mob attempted unsuccessfully to release, has not tended to improve the situation. This morning the streets were quiet. Police and soldiers, however, are prepared for a renewal of hostilities when night falls. To-day, some are busy removing goods from the railway stations to business houses. They were unmolested. Along the docks work was at a standstill, and the men showed an ugly spirit. Railway men at various centres to-day notified superiors of their determination not to handle trains employed in carrying soldiers and police through strike areas. A report is current that the Government is likely to respond to this action of the men with a proclamation of martial law on all railways, replacing strikers with men from Royal Engineers and Army Service Corps.

Passengers for Manchester were impeded at booking offices that the railway companies were unable to guarantee transportation further than Crewe, 25 miles south of West Manchester.

The threat to tie up the railway lines in the Kingdom has caused more uneasiness than all other strike movements combined, for it is known that if the effort is successful it would completely cut off the food supply from the greater part of the country, and the Government has exerted every influence to avert such a calamity.

This forenoon, Buxton, President of the Board of Trade, conferred with the managers of railway lines, and met leaders of employees in the hope of bringing about a joint conference.

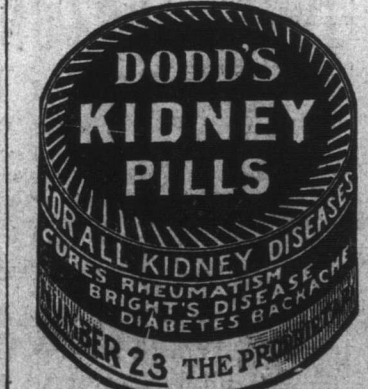
His Lordship's Reply.

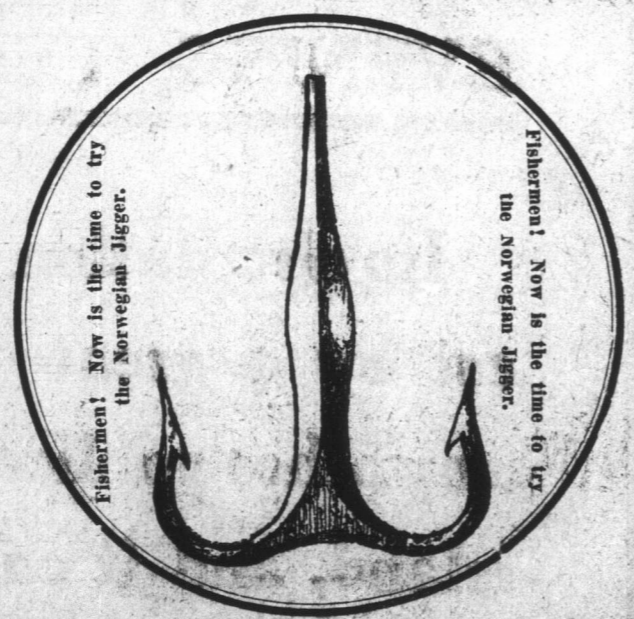

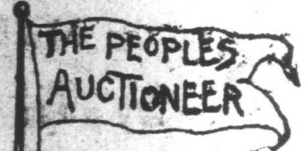
