Referred to the Secretary for the Colonies.

This morning the Daily News gave publicity to this statement: "With reference to the reply of the Hon. Donald Morison, Minister of Justice, to the memorial presented by Mr. Coaker to the Governor, we understand that it has long since been furnished to His Excellency, and that Mr. Morison has asked permission to make it public; but that the Governor deems it inexpedient to permit anything which might give rise to premature controversy on a matter which has been referred to the Governor and the Secretary of State for the Colonies."

It is somewhat singular that this statement was not published long since, as the Daily News states that Mr. Morison's defence "has long since been furnished to His Excellency." The expectation that Mr. Morison's defence would be published immediately arose from the letter published by Mr. Morison himself over his own signature; and in view of the unreasonable delay in furnishing an explanation for its non-publication, everybody has been exceedingly considerate and most forbearing.

The outstanding feature of the statement in the Daily News, is that His Excellency the Governor has decided to refer the matter to the Secretary of State for the Colonies. 39 Years' Service Head Constable Dawe to-day celebrates the anniversary of his entrance into the police force in April 25th, 1873, and is just 39 years in the constabulary. The head joined as a recruit when 18 years of age and the pay was then £51, currency. He worked well and faithfully, was 6 years in the mounted force, 6 years a sergeant, and is now 15 years a Head Constable. The Head well deserves the promotions he received.

For Hospital. Mr. Murray of Mr. Main, to have a cancerous growth removed from his mouth, and Leo Wall, aged 16, who has lost the use of his limbs, arrived for hospital by to-day's train. Jas. "At Once—A cripple to supplant in wealthy districts. One preferred who has lost his right hand." Person applying must have references and give bond for good faith." The newspaper also offers to supply lists of centres where begging may be pursued most profitably, with names of persons who may be approached. Facilities for obtaining costumes suitable for cold weather beggary are hinted at. Also the beggar well recommended and able to pay may obtain at the bureau of information of the paper a list of important wedding, funerals, burials, and gifts of social functions, together with servants who may be "worked," arrivals of distinguished people, and so on.

STRIKE ON OLYMPIC. Special to Evening Telegram. SOUTHAMPTON, This Afternoon. When the White Star liner Olympic, sister of the Titanic, was ready to sail from here yesterday to New York, 300 firemen of the engine room workers quit work, declaring the collapse of the boats on the Olympic were unseaworthy. The Olympic is lying off Ryde Isle with 1,400 passengers on board. There is no possibility of sailing before noon to-day, even if then. There were reports that some passengers had refused to sail, but for the present they all remain on board the steamer. It is also reported that soon after the strike was inaugurated the company succeeded in getting men to take the strikers' places; but this proved to be incorrect. As a matter of fact the difficulty is extended, as the crew now declines to sail with "black leg" firemen, who were brought aboard yesterday. The British Seafarers' Union is supporting the men in this decision. Pickets are patrolling the docks to prevent recruiting of "black legs." There is an endeavor on the part of the company to work. Commander Clarke, Chief Emigration Officer, Southampton, offered to demonstrate on "Combs Roads" that the boats on Olympic were absolutely safe. The men refused to listen to this proposal, but later, it is learned, they declared that they would have agreed to sail if the company agreed to demonstrate the seaworthiness of the boats in this port. This in turn the company declined to do.

SHIPPING CONFERENCE. Special to Evening Telegram. BERLIN, To-day. A conference of Government officials, representatives of shipping companies and marine societies in order to study problems of insuring safety to steamers and obtain material on which international regulations on the question can be based has been convened here at the personal instance of the German Emperor. The session was opened this afternoon by the Minister of the Interior. The most important points in the programme of the conference are an increase in the number of lifeboats and regulations in wireless telegraphy and water-tight compartments.

MORE LIFEBOATS. Special to Evening Telegram: BELFAST, To-day. Harland and Wolff have despatched 32 lifeboats, each with a capacity of 65 persons, to Liverpool. It is reported they are for the Olympic, which is to proceed to the Mersey to receive them.

205 BODIES RECOVERED. Special Evening Telegram. HALIFAX, This Afternoon. The Mackay-Bennett is bringing to Halifax 205 bodies of victims of the Titanic disaster. The identification of the bodies is being completed by the Minister of a Millionaire Widener is confirmed.

Captured the "V." Yesterday while a fisherman was being paid some money at the office of James Baird, Ltd., he unknowingly dropped a \$5 bill on the floor, and returning later could not find it. Suspicion fell on a young man who was in the office at the time, and who later was seen driving in a cab and generally "blowing himself." He was arrested by the police and admitted having the money, but arranged to day to pay it back and thus saved himself from prosecution.

The S. S. Euphrates sailed at noon to-day for Cape St. Francis and Conception Bay with a full cargo and deck load and took several passengers. Mrs. Sedgman wife of Capt. Sedgman of the Othar went in her to reside in Portugal Cove.

The "Mary Duff" sails this evening for Pernambuco with 4,784 packages fish shipped by Bishop & Sons.

Train Notes. The shore train arrived here at 12.45 to-day with several passengers. An express is due this evening from Millertown Junction.

A freight train arrived at 1 p.m. to-day from Bishop's Falls.

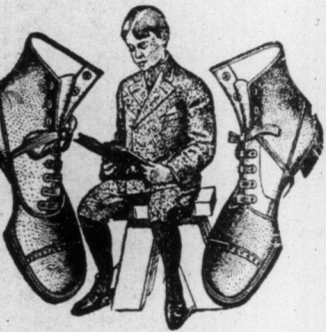

Chinese Behead 150 in Nanking

Shanghai, April 12.—The summary executions of the ringleaders have absolutely cowed the mutineers at Nanking, and to-day the loyal troops are in supreme control.
The slaughter there was very great. Whole companies of rebellious soldiery were shot down by the loyal forces, and after they had been put to flight, 150 of the more notorious mutineers and bandits were lined up in an open square.
While the populace watched, four headmen, armed with double-handed swords, looped off the heads of 150 as fast as they could swing their weapons.
The sight was ghastly and horrifying but seemed to please the spectators, many of whom had been victims of the wholesale plundering that had been in progress of several days.
To prevent a recurrence of the rioting the officials have decided to relieve all troops in the local garrison. Replacing them with soldiers from other provinces.
The city of Tung Chow has been looted by mutinous soldiers. This latest outbreak has alarmed the foreign interests.

# SWORE at ISMAY And Ordered Him NOT TO INTERFERE.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
WASHINGTON, To-Day.

Bruce Ismay, chief officer of the steamship line which owned the ill-fated Titanic, was ordered away from one of the ship's lifeboats while being lowered, because in his excitement he was interfering with the ship's officers. Language too objectionable to be repeated aloud in the Senate enquiry of the Titanic disaster was used by Harold G. Lowe, 5th officer of the ship. Lowe reacted to the Senate investigation Committee how, not knowing that he was talking to the head of the company which employed him, he had told Ismay to "get to hell out of here so that I can work," while Lowe and other sailors were trying to lower the first lifeboat on the starboard side of the Titanic. Lowe declared Ismay was not trying to get into the boat but was very much excited and was interfering with the proper lowering of the boat. This man Ismay, said Lowe, was greatly excited and was hollering "Lower away, lower away," and I swore at him and ordered him back. Lowe said Ismay went back and made no reply to him. Lowe testified he never would have known the man was Ismay if he, Lowe, had not met a steward on board the Carpathia who told him what he had done and asked him why he swore at Ismay.

LONDON, This Morning.

Renewed interest in the United States Senate enquiry into the loss of the Titanic was evidenced by several members of the House of Commons yesterday, asking questions of Francis Dyke Ackland, Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs. Mr. Ackland replied on behalf of the Foreign Office

and said he was not aware of the precise grounds on which the Senate enquiry was being held to place the loss of the vessel on the proper shoulders. As far as he was aware there never had been a foreign enquiry into the loss of a British vessel on the high seas. Ronald Monroe Ferguson, Scottish member, expressed fears that witnesses necessary for the British inquiry into the Titanic disaster might be detained. Mr. Ackland disented. Arthur Lee, member for Hampshire, suggested instructions be sent to the British Ambassador at Washington to protect British subjects summoned by the Senate Committee who apparently have no one to defend their rights at present. Ackland did not doubt if protection was desired by British witnesses that instructions would be sent, but he hoped the case would not arise. Alex MacCallum Scott, another Scottish member, asked if the Senate Committee is not a political committee, conducted by people who are not experts in the matter, to which Ackland replied: "I do not think it is our place to investigate that. It appears the committee has power to summon witnesses and administer oaths, and we have not thought that we were entitled to go further in that matter." MacCallum Scott then asked: "Are you aware these persons called before the Senate Committee are not receiving fair and honourable treatment? Will you take steps to secure fair and honourable treatment for British subjects?" Ackland replied that "no such complaint had been received by us. Surely in this matter we can trust, and I think we are right in doing so, the good sense of the American people, and we do not wish to interfere without absolute necessity."

LONDON, April 24.

The Australian mail brings details from Hobart, Tasmania, of the news brought there on March 12th by the s.s. Aurora, which took Dr. Mawson's Antarctic expedition to Adelle Land. Among other things the expedition had proved that Clarke Land, which was reported to have been discovered by Durville in 1838, did not exist. Dr. Mawson sent back a letter by the Aurora, which describes the Southern Magnetic Pole as a force centre, which, like the will-o-the-wisp, is dancing around daily within a circular area, the diameter of which is variable and uncertain, and may be a few miles, or more than thirty. The whole area travelled was 240 miles 69 yards.

PROPOSED NEW CHURCH.—We understand that Rev. Fr. Goff, the esteemed Parish Priest of Portugal Cove, projects the erection of a new church in that place, the present church being old and too small for the congregation. Charity is a form of benevolence which unites man in one common brotherhood and softens the sting of poverty with soft coal and channel ice. There are several kinds of charity. One kind begins at home and leaves off in the morning, while others cross the ocean and deposit money in Korea that ought to be matched against the laundry bill. Some charity workers steal out at night, laden with kind deeds and pure food products, which they place on the doorstep of an ailing brother and then vanish with such rapidity that their legs twinkle in the gloaming like the farwile salute of a pinwheel. Then there is the kind which dispenses charity with the aid of a cornet band and a megaphone, thereby making it easy for the left hand to know what the right hand is up to. As it is usually up to the elbows in coupon bonds and 20 per cent dividends, this kind of charity seldom makes a hit with the receiving angel. Charity also consists in refusing to believe the worst about your neighbour when the best doesn't hang any medals on him. One of the finest forms of charity is the kind which begins to talk about papering the front hall when somebody is about to be subjected to a microscopic examination and declared guilty before the evidence is all in. Charity doesn't pass any premature judgments or condemn a man for showing courtesy to a woman whom it is perfectly safe to gossip about because she hasn't any two-fisted relatives in the immediate vicinity. The man who is devoid of charity is about as useful to society as a one-armed carpenter at a barn raising. The charity which endows hospitals and builds libraries is all right, but the kind which stands by a man or woman falsely accused makes it look as cheap as a Waterbury watch in a chamois-skin envelope. What this country needs is not more free clinics but less free speech about people who are not present.


