



LONDON, March 3. Replying to a question as to the leath of Mr. Benton, Sir Edward Grey said in part: "All efforts that have been made hitherto, have failed o secure an investigation into the facts respecting the death of Benton. The persistent difficulties in the way of such investigation, create the strongest presumption, desire and intention to conceal the truth, on the part of those responsible for what has happened. Communications with Washington are still proceeding, but I would repeat what I said last week, these communications do not imply that the United States Government have any responsibility for what has taken place, by which I mean, of course, the death of Benton. While we shall welcome any action that the States may be prepared to take to secure justice, we have no title to demand as a right that the States should itself, resort to force. One can demand that another government should go to all lengths to secure reparation 5 Cents to all, for a crime, only when one holds that that government is, in some way, responsible for its commission. So far the States has shown, at least, as much interest in the death in Mexico of a British subject, as it has in the case of an outrage on American citi-






