1. The port and harbor of St. John's shall be closed entirely to the entry of shipping at night from nightfall on the 15th June instant until further

3. Measures shall be taken so that the glare or upward reflection from street or other outdoor lights in the City of St. John's shall be reduced to twenty-five per cent. of the normal.

Side lights on motor cars, motor cycles, or vehicles of any description must be obscured, and shall not be of greater strength than five candle power.

7. It will be the duty of the members of the Constabulary to see that these Regulations are strictly en-forced, and all orders isued by them for their better observance shall be forthwith carried out.

8. It shall be the duty of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to see that these Regulations are observed on all shipping in the Harbor of St. John's, and all orders by him for their better observance shall be forthwith carried out.

9. Every person convicted of a violation of these Rules and Regulations before a Stipendiary Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding \$100, or in default of payment, to imprisonment not exceeding Three Months.
