# Serbian Troops Route Bulgarians



#### BOYS' HEADWEAR.

Mr. Nelson States His Grievance.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—During the past few weeks members of the Police Force have on several occasions interviewed me suggesting that I was under suspicion of being a German spr. and quite recently a prominent gentleman om behalf of the Government told me that I was under suspicion, and suggested that I should leave the country. I asked him what was wrong. He said that there was a strong feeling against me, and gave as the reason for the strong feeling that I had joined the Newfoundland Industrial workers' Association, and had taken part in the strike in St. John's which some time ago had caused the tying-up of traffic in Newfoundland, and that I had been identified in the strike which resulted in the employees of the Reid Newfoundland Company receiving a considerable increase in wages some months ago.

That was the only charge which be surreced as hears.

That was the only charge which he suggested as being in existence. I asked him if he considered it wrong for me to join a labor organization if I chose to do so. He said, "Oh, no," but that I was a stranger and had no husiness to be interesting myself in

Newfoundland for about three and a half years, and I defy any person in Newfoundland or elsewhere to point to any act or word of mine which could leave the suggestion in the

to any act or word of mine which could leave the suggestion in the minds of any person that I was in any way unfriendly to the cause of Great Britain and her Allies in the war.

I am an American citizen and on several occasions produced my identification papers and credentials, and when asked to do so produced my American passport which the Police had in their possession and returned to measury. As a citizen of the United States I have registered myself at the

States I have registered myself at the American Consulate for service in the American Army in accordance with United States Selective Draft Law.

I am not aware that British subjects in the United States who have com-

plied with British Law with respect to Military service are being treated in the manner in which Newfoundland authorities are treating me here.

I am quite in accord with any supervision which the Police authorities may desire to exert over me and my movements, but their action in pursuing me up to the present is merely ruining my business interests, and that is not fair treatment, unless there

that is not fair treatment, unless there is some reason for suspicion that I am disloyal to my own nation, which is so vigorously fighting by the side of England for the cause of democracy. I cannot think that the cause of democracy is being furthered by deportation being threatened against me because I joined a lobor organization which so far as I am aware is composed of loyal Newfoundlanders, 95 per cent of whom are of Newfoundlard blood, many of whom have given their best blood and effort in the country's cause, and all of whom, I believe, are loyal to the core.

If the Police or anybody else has the faintest suggestion to make as to my loyalty to the United States of America, of which I am a citizen, and my desire as the subject of an Ally of Great Britain to assist Great Britain and her cause in every manner in my power, then I would be happy if that wildere would be furnished the America.




