





As to Standard Flour I have no obection to same personally. At first it sold fairly well but when the substitutes had to be added to it and orty-nine pounds to every barrel it then became quite different.

Probably Mr. Garland had the chance to get white flour as a great many did. Then it would be all right to add the full amount of substitutes, but I think if Mr. Garland had to use the Standard Flour with the full amount of substitutes he would tell different story.







Glut in Salmon in Canada.

Canneries to be Closed Until July 1. Ottawa, May 31.—Firm measures to ensure the consumption of first class Canadian food in Canada, which was in danger of being left unsold through needless importations from abroad, have been taken by making it imperative that individual licenses must now be obtained from the Canadian Trade Commission, Ottawa, to import either sardines or canned salmon into the Dominion. There are about three hundred thousand cases of 48 pounds each of salmon lying idle in Vancouver.

These are an excellent food in nutritive value as salmon from any part of the globe, but owing to light color and importations of pink fleshed varieties of lower nutritive value had commenced to be made, simply to satisfy the taste of the public for pink rather than white fish, which has Canadian Trade Commission will enbeen stimulated in the last few deavor to find a Canadian market for





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
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
