### ROYAL WEDDING AT WESTMINSTER ABBEY.

LONDON, April 26.—The Duke of York and Lady Elizabeth Bowe-Lyon joined hands and were before the golden altar at Westminster Abbey to-day, while all the world pours out its blessing. The service was conducted with traditional precision of British rites. Only when the bride was called upon by the Archbishop of Canterbury to repeat the solemn vows did her manner betoken any nervousness. Her voice was audibly to the vast congregation. The bridegroom gave the bride a man at a happy expression and kept her own when the bright couple through the venerable Dowager Queen gave the royal ceremony touch by moving out of her and bestowing kisses upon the guests of the party as they came to the Chancel. The Prince of Wales appeared to be the calmest of the Abbey. The wedding began promptly at 11.30. The bride, in the simplest and most gown probably ever made in royal marriage, moved slowly the steps of the Altar on the arm of her father, the Earl of Strathmore, who carried the bridal bouquet, having deposited it on the tomb of the brave soldier. She was joined

soon by the bridegroom who presented a striking figure in the blue uniform of the Royal Air Force, with the blue riband of the Garter across his shoulder and a golden sword at his side. The six bridesmaids stood behind the couple as the Duke and bride joined hands. The sun which had not revealed itself for several days suddenly emerged from behind the mist and its light coming through the high vaulted windows of the Abbey cast an effluence upon the gallant Duke and his lovely bride, and brought into bold relief the touches of gold, crimson and silver in the costumes of the brilliant assemblage. The Duke stood fully a head taller than Lady Elizabeth, his erect, muscular frame and ruddy countenance contrasting with the delicate figure of the bride, whose robes of unrelieved white seemed to accentuate the paleness of her figure.

## Let Us Be Liberal!


Dear Sir—No redistribution of seats in the Assembly, on the basis of the census of 1921, has yet been made. That is one of the duties neglected by the Squires-Coaker Government. The census of 1921 gave \$0,831 as the number of Roman Catholics in the Island, and 157,741 as the number of Protestants, a total population of 238,572, and as there are 36 representatives in the Assembly, the unit for each is 6,630, so that the Roman Catholics are entitled to elect twelve members, and a fraction of about one-fifth. There are, in fact, thirteen Roman Catholic candidates now standing on each side—St. John's, 5; Harbor Main, 2; Ferryland, 2; Placentia, 3; St. George's, 1, so that strictly according to figures, they are seeking over representation to the extent of four-fifths of a man. This part of a man Mr. Brian Dunfield seeks to be!

When Mr. Dunfield alleges that there are 14,000 Protestants in St. John's East who have no direct representation by men of their own creed amongst the candidates of the two major parties, he is not telling the whole truth, for he fails to draw attention to the fact that the Roman Catholics of Brigus, Harbor Grace, Carbonear, Bay de Verde, Bonaville and Burin, especially, get no direct representation by men of their own creed. The Protestants of those districts are over represented, just as the Roman Catholics of St. John's are, and the discrepancy in one offset that in the other. As to the four-fifths of a man lost to the Protestants under present arrangement, the loss is due to the fact that the Roman Catholic population of the Island has not grown as rapidly as the Protestant, and in the selection of candidates, precedent has been followed rather than changing figures. It is so because it has been so!

But what difference does it make anyhow? Protestant rights are as safe in the Assembly with twenty-three Protestants as with twenty-three and four-fifths. Why not concede the four-fifths of a man to the Roman Catholic minority instead of taking a fifth of a man away from them. The majority can afford to be generous. Articles of Faith are not what the Assembly has to deal with. There is no sectarian issue in the Humber Deal. No dogmatical rights are wrapped up in the consideration of fishery regulations. So far as the Colony's trade and finances, and the rights and liberties of the people are concerned, which are the matters the Assembly has to deal with, we Protestants are as safe without as with the other four-fifths of a man.

How narrower we have grown, rather than broader, in this regard, than our fathers were. Time was when Ferryland elected a Protestant, Glen, and later, another, Goodridge, and when Harbor Grace was represented by a Roman Catholic (Shea). Placentia elected Bradshaw (C. of E.), St. John's West elected Tessier (C. of E.), and the Parsons (both father and son) were elected year after year in St. John's East, though both belonged to the Church of England. We hope to see the days of toleration returned, when men will be elected for their ability and character, and for the policy they stand for, without regard to their religious creeds. This will give a wider field of choice than now exists. I venture to suggest that when next it falls to the lot of leaders to arrange their candidates, they shall agree to include suitable Roman Catholics in their tickets for large Protestant districts, which include



**Then and Now!**

CONDITIONS FOUR YEARS AGO.

We ask our readers to recall conditions as they existed here four years ago and contrast them with those that exist to-day. In the spring of 1919 there was prosperity everywhere. The price of fish was up to fourteen and fifteen dollars a quintal; supplies were easily obtained; work was abundant in every direction, and the people both in the city and outports had all the employment they could wish for. Never in her history did her people enjoy such a promising outlook nor did they possess more money, more comforts, or more assurance of continued good times. But the Squires party promised still more wonderful conditions, if they were returned, and by means of these promises and less creditable tricks that were worked easily in the districts, they succeeded in inducing the electors to throw out the Government then in power, and return themselves to office. They have had three or four years in which to show what they could do for the country and its people, and we ask in all seriousness and sincerity what is their record to-day? What have they done in three years to better the condition of Newfoundland or those who dwell within it? How does the condition of the people compare to-day with what it was then and what is the outlook for the fishermen and other working classes amongst us? There is dire distress and poverty everywhere. In St. John's a couple of thousand men are finding employment in breaking stones or shovelling snow. In the outports whole settlements are being kept alive by doles of meal and molasses. The only people who are prosperous amongst us to-day are the members of the Government and their friends and supporters. The taxpayers are weighed down with the burden of unjust taxation. The merchants, or most of them, at any rate, have been ruined by the Fish Regulations, and great sections of the country have been impoverished by the same. The money made in good years by an industrious and hard working people had to be taken to keep them and their families from starvation in these bad times, and the fishing season is now at hand with nobody to furnish supplies or to help the men of the various districts to carry out their fishery for the coming summer. Not a single thing has been done during these three years to improve the lot of our people in any way to open up any new employment for them, to help them to return to the prosperity which they enjoyed in 1919. But, on the eve of the election, the Squires crowd profess a death bed repentance and say they have secured the Humber Deal which is going to transform this country into a land flowing with milk and honey, and they invite the people to forgive everything they have done, and to make the polls next month. They mere promise that if this is done everything will be all right for the country.

We don't think the people of the country are so foolish as to be deceived by this sort of talk at the last moment from those who have neglected the country and its needs for the past three years.—Trinity Enterprise, April 23rd.

## A Self-Made Man.

### Who Has Made Good--Hickman For Harbor Grace.

The Mail, the personal organ of Sir Richard Squires, made a very grossly abusive attack, yesterday, upon Mr. A. E. Hickman, candidate for Harbor Grace on the Bennett ticket. The burden of the attack was this: (1) that Mr. Hickman was not a resident of the district, but had been thrust upon it, and (2) that Mr. Hickman had been found guilty of bribery in the Bay-de-Verde election in 1919.

As to the first ground. Squires has candidates all over the Island who are not residents, many of them not even natives, of the districts they are standing for. Winter (Port-de-Grave), Cave (Bay-de-Verde), Hibbs (Trinity), Coaker (Bonavista), Grimes (Fogo), Barnes (Twillingate), Warren (Fortune), are neither residents nor natives of the districts they stand for, and not one of them was invited by the people to be a candidate. Neither residence nor nativity has been considered essential to candidacy, in the political history of the Colony.

As to the charge of bribery. It was proven in the Cave election trial, in 1920, that three electors had received allocations of public money for various public services from Mr. Hickman, while he was a candidate, and though he was a member of the Government at the time, the Election Judges (Horwood, C.J., and Johnson, J.) held that these allocations "were not bribes at common law," but the giving of them "were acts in breach of the Election Act." The Judges explained that the practice of giving such allocations was old and general, and not common law bribery, but that they had been rendered illegal by statute. In other words, Mr. Hickman had violated the law in precisely the same way as Whiteway, Bond, Woods, and a large number of others did in 1893, when all of them were unseated and disqualified.

It is a matter of common knowledge that all the Squires-Coaker candidates in this election are using public money and the promises of more to influence electors to vote for them. Control over immense sums has been promised to persons to become candidates, and those who have accepted have been busy in making allocations. They have been watched, and their doings marked down, and if need be, they will be brought to the judgment seat in due time. The Mail has justified such a course by its hypocritical attack upon Mr. Hickman for acts which compared with some recently performed by Government candidates are as daylight to dark. What a disgusting exhibition it is for the organ of Sir Richard Squires to roll up the whites of its eyes in professed horror at the conduct of Mr. Hickman. It would be better engaged if it were to explain why Squires took \$5,000 from the Reids under circumstances explained by Coaker, in the Assembly, when he called him "that Black Rascal Squires."

At the beginning of this campaign, desperate efforts were made to get Mr. Hickman as a Squires candidate for Bay-de-Verde. No consideration was thought too great; no office too high. Had he succumbed to temptation, he would have been lauded to the skies by the literary thugs who now assail him through the Mail. Mr. Hickman is a native of the Colony, a Self-made man, a Merchant who has made good. As representative for Harbor Grace, he will be of more value to the district than any it has had for many years. Perhaps he will be able to help restore to it a prosperity such as it worthily enjoyed in the old days. We cast no reflection upon other candidates anywhere, but speak only in view of obvious facts, when we say that the energy, the business ability, the vision of A. E. Hickman will be a great asset for any constituency which honors itself by electing him.

## Foretells Glorious Victory

Messages and letters arriving daily from every district announce that Bennett is winning all along the line. In the North, the Menace of Coakerism will be speedily removed, for supporters are being gathered daily to the Liberal-Labour-Progressive standard. Even in Coaker's stronghold, Bonavista, the influence of the F.P.U. is on the wane, and the election of the Bennett candidates seems a certainty. Conception Bay has given a wonderful reception to the Opposition Leader, who has enjoyed a triumphal progress through districts still ranking under Coaker's latest insult. The West Coast, still suffering from the effects of Coaker's discriminatory application of the Fish Regulations, will return four Bennett candidates. St. John's, too, is with Bennett in his fight for the renewal of the country's prosperity, lost during the three and one half years of Squires-Coaker-Campbell rule.



**CREW POSTED AS MISSING.**  
The sad intelligence was received in the city yesterday that all hope is now given up for the crew of the schooner Howard, which left an American port in December last for the Mediterranean, and that one of the crew named William Snow, of this city, is given up as lost. The vessel, no doubt, met with the full force of the gales as reported on the Atlantic in December last, and becoming unmanageable, soon sank, and the crew falling to get assistance, met a watery grave. ### Coal, Cull, and Dust.

Amazing revelations are coming from the coal regions of Pennsylvania where it is reported by the New York American, the great coal companies that monopolize the supplies of the nation during the bitter winter just passed shipped to market and made \$150,000,000 profits from the refuse—slag and slag and tons and dirt—of the great chimneys that have been accumulating waste matter of the mines for a hundred years. This un-

### The Burning Bush.

One of the most remarkable plants in the world is certainly the so-called Burning Bush, Dictamnus fraxinella. This species is native to Western Asia, though nowadays commonly to be found in the gardens in temperate regions. A great many people who grow the plant are quite unaware of its strange habits. As a matter of fact the Dictamnus secretes a fragrant essential oil in great abundance. This is produced in especial-

ly large quantities by the flower stems, in warm weather volatilizing so that the air surrounding the plant is impregnated. Further this vapor is highly inflammable and, if a naked flame is brought near to the plant, the flames at once take fire with a most singular result. The whole plant is surrounded with crackling shooting flames, reddish in color, and leaving a highly aromatic odor behind them. The Burning Bush is not injured in any way by the fire; for the flames do not actually come in contact with the plant, itself.

Several conditions are needed if the experiment with the Burning Bush is to be a success. Thus it is essential that the air should be very dry and warm, also that there should be practically no wind. The best effects are secured only just after the opening of the flowers. It will be realized that these conditions cannot always be relied upon. A plan has recently been devised by means of which the inflammable nature of the vapors given out by the Dictamnus may be shown with startling effect.

A strong plant of the Burning Bush is raised in a pot. At the time when the flowers are just reaching perfection the plant is placed in a glass jar or a shade. This is closely covered for some hours before the time of the experiment. On removing the jar or shade the plant is seen to plant when there is at once a tremendous outburst of flame. So great is the rush of fire that it is wise to keep one's face away from the top of the jar; a nasty burn is not by any means out of the question. After an interval of an hour or so with

the jar or case closed up the experiment may be repeated with similar results.

In connection with the Dictamnus it is rather remarkable that the species is common where the incident of Moses and the Burning Bush is said to have occurred.

A significant sign of the turn of the tide against the Government is the fact that the Chairman was the Secretary of the Squires Party here at the last election. Mr. Brocklehurst stated that he was so disgusted with the actions of the Government that he had decided to clear out, and put his whole energies into the cause of the party led by Mr. J. R. Bennett.

Mr. James Moore, the Opposition Candidate then continued his Nomination Day speech, which had been interrupted by a heavy downfall of rain, just as matters of local interest were being discussed by him. Several other subjects which affected the Carbonear District in an especial degree were referred to by him, and his policy connected therewith was outlined.

Mr. John Rorke, of Rorke & Sons, the next speaker, referred to the manner in which the trade had been crippled by the Fishery Regulations and by the intolerable burden of taxation.

Mr. Albert E. Penney, director of Saunders, Howell Company, made his maiden speech on a political platform, and he pointed out the great

discontent which was being practiced by the Government in this election. He warned the electors not to be deceived, but to vote for Moore and the Bennett Party, which would mean to them and the country the best of the deal, the most employment, and the most encouragement for the fishermen.

Mr. Robert Duff, whose father formerly represented Carbonear District briefly reviewed the sad conditions of the people of the country at present and during recent years and asked for the support of the Opposition party, through voting for Moore, its representative.

The Secretary, Mr. M. J. Hawker, closed with a review of the facts as stated and expressed his confidence that Carbonear District's decision on next Thursday would be for Bennett and Better Times, and would find its expression by voting in large numbers for James Moore.

This ended a most successful meeting. The National Anthem was sung, and cheers for Moore and the Bennett party followed. By actual count there were 300 voters present in the Hall.

If betting is any indication the following may be of interest. A number of young men here pooled \$750.00 on Nomination Day on Moore and the Opposition. The offer has not been accepted.

This district has suffered greatly. How greatly is shown by the exodus. There will be 300 fewer voters here than there were. Victoria has suffered in this respect in especial degree.

#### Meeting at Logy Bay.

ST. JOHN'S EAST SOLID FOR HIGGINS, FOX AND VINCOMBE.

To the chain of triumphs that the Fighting Trio of St. John's East have achieved another link was added last evening when Higgins, Fox and Vincombe were tendered a tremendous reception by the entire settlement of Logy Bay. During the past week similar receptions were given at Torbay, Outer Cove, Flatrock and Logy Bay. These places are voting 90 to 100 per cent. for the Bennett Candidates. Outer Cove last night went over the top and welcomed the Fighting Trio with volleys of musketry, bonfires and a display of bunting. Houses all along the way had their windows lighted with candles, while in several places strings of flags crossed the road. The meeting was held in the parish schoolhouse. Mr. McDonnell who was unanimously elected chairman and in a splendid speech extended a hearty welcome to the candidates. Mr. W. J. Higgins was the first speaker. In his usual

hearty style he showed up the misdeeds of the Government and the present attempt to get a new lease of power under the guise of the Hummer Deal. Mr. N. J. Vincombe was next called upon. More popular than ever Nix was given a great reception. Through his speech there was frequent applause. Mr. Fox in an eloquent speech that lasted for a full hour reviewed the scandals and maladministration of the present Government; and the prominent benefits offered to the country in Mr. Bennett's Manifesto. He summarized the Government's disastrous handling of such important subjects as fish, salt and sugar. Mr. Fox was cheered repeatedly and was given a tremendous ovation as he resumed his seat.

Mr. James Gould proposed a vote of thanks to the Chairman, which was enthusiastically carried. The singing of the National Anthem closed the most unanimous meeting ever held in Logy Bay.

## Nfld. Expects Every Man to Do His Duty.

### PERTINENT QUESTIONS OF THE MOMENT.

Editor Evening Telegram.  
Dear Sir,—May 3rd—less than one week away—the date that will be written down in history as just as eventful as the date of the Magna Charta, because it is the day on which the freeborn sons of Newfoundland will take effective steps to regenerate their fallen country. The poet has truly said:—  
"Breathes there a man with soul so dead,  
Who never to himself hath said  
This is my own, my native land."  
And here, gentlemen, electors of the whole island, a most pertinent question arises, and it is this: Is this island home of ours just as well off as it was four years ago, or as it might have been to-day. Is my home just as happy and my children just as comfortable? Have I, as a citizen or an elector just as much piece of mind? Am I just as prosperous; is my avocation in life just as secure; is my work just as remunerative? And gentlemen, these are not idle questions but ones that very seriously affect every reader of this letter. The answer must be an unqualified Yes or No. If the former, then vote for the men who have made it possible, but if the latter—and unfortunately, it is the latter for most of us—then we cannot before God and conscience vote even one single assent for any candidate of the party who is responsible for such calamitous times as now exist all over our once-prosperous island home.

May third—the day of rejuvenation—the day of national house-cleaning as it were—the resurrection day, from the grave of immorality of public life, of unconstitutional government, of the degradation of our people—the day when truly, as in the olden times "Newfoundland expects every man to do his duty," and that duty is as plain to every elector as it is possible to be. We must judge between two issues, two parties, two policies—one party of retrogressive measures, of impure public actions, of gross callousness to the needs of its constituents, of greed and gain and self, and the other party standing for progress, the rights of the people, the duties of the duly-elected representatives, the common right of existence. One policy of deathbed regrets at what might have been, vain promises that from past experience will be broken, of negligence that is criminal; of apathy, of indifference and of gross injustices to the many, while the other policy stands for clean administration of the country, a banding together for the common good of labor and capital, of North and South and East and West, of fishermen and merchant, a chance to live in our own homeland and for better times to come, indeed.

Electors, one and all, let each man ask and answer these questions, and then like true freeborn men, who value your rights as citizens, and home-makers, fathers and husbands, do your duty, fearlessly and without favor. This is no time for petty strife—this is no time for personal bitterness—this is not the time for self or friends or relatives. It is the time for a complete vindication of our privileges, for a decided effort to slip in the bud, to choke while yet there is time, any effort on the part of Newfoundland's enemies to wreck her affairs.

Men, voters, true red-blooded men—loyal and worthy descendants of our forefathers who fought and bled for the rights that are ours to-day! Once and for all, are you satisfied with existing conditions? Are they good enough for you? If not, cast the part of intelligent jurors who, having tried their case, as peers of your fellow men, must do your duty and render a verdict of Guilty, aye guilty with deliberate intent, and let the present administration who is now the prisoner at the bar, answer if there be any reason why a well-merited sentence should not be passed. May 3rd—Newfoundland expects every man to do his duty.



The voter will then fold the Ballot Paper, so as to show a portion of the back only, with the initials of the Deputy Returning Officer, and shall hand it so folded up to the Deputy Returning Officer, and the Deputy Returning Officer shall, without unfolding it, ascertain that it is the Ballot Paper which he furnished to the elector and then immediately place it in the Ballot Box. The voter shall forthwith leave the Polling Station. If a voter inadvertently spoils a Ballot Paper he may return it to the Deputy Returning Officer, who shall give him another. If a voter votes for more Candidates than he is entitled to vote for, or places any mark on the Ballot Paper by which he can afterwards be identified, his vote will be void and will not be counted.

If a voter takes a Ballot or Ballot Paper out of the Polling Station, or fraudulently puts any other into the Ballot Box than the Paper given him by the Deputy Returning Officer, he will be subject to be punished by a fine of Five Hundred Dollars, or by imprisonment for a time not exceeding Six Months with or without hard labor.

## On the Last Lap.

### Wednesday Night's Setback to Squires Shows Real Sentiment of City.

The result of the Squires meeting in the Majestic Theatre on Wednesday night was a knock out for the Government supporters. They are sick, sore, and sorry men every since. It was amusing yesterday to go about town and see their crestfallen aspect and to listen to their pitiful explanations of how it all happened. But one has only to reflect for a moment to understand clearly how and why it happened. It happened simply and solely because the people of St. John's realize that they have been hoaxed and hoodwinked by the Squires-Coaker crew and that they do not intend to be fooled again by these political desperadoes. The people look in vain for the prosperity that was promised them, for all the reforms and benefits that they were assured would follow from the election of the Squires-Coaker Party, and now they find that while Squires and Campbell and the rest of the outfit have enriched themselves, the masses of the people are worse off than ever they were before. Consequently the people frown out Squires and Campbell and the rest of the gang on Wednesday night and will do it even more emphatically next Thursday when they get a chance at the last lap of the race and the Opposition candidates lead clearly in the estimation of the public. All the failures of the Squires-Coaker crew have been responsible in part for the enormous feeling of sympathy towards the Bennett Party and against the Coaker control and the Squiresite acceptance of the same. All the bun-kum that Squires and Campbell and the pawns they have behind them have been talking the past month, has been exploded and the people are going to vote for the men on their merits and not according to the dictates of Coaker or the windy promises of Squires. The "Advocate" is perhaps the most

judicious paper that has ever struck our shores, for its big headlines and bluff articles and fake messages are the laughing stock of all intelligent men. The "Daily Mail" on the other hand is disregarded by everybody because of its long winded outpourings that nobody wants to read. These papers take themselves too seriously when they think the people can be led away again by the bluff and bluster which they practised three years ago and which they are trying to practise again now.

## The Humber Project of 1915.

### What the Newfoundland Products Corporation Proposed.

Yesterday's Mail reported Premier Squires as saying "It was Sir Edward Morris who originated the idea of a Humber Industry and invited Caribide Wilson to Newfoundland. True enough. Also he might have stated that this Company which bore the official title of the Newfoundland Products Corporation, had as its main object the development of the water power of the Humber and with the electrical energy establish such industries as making carbide, sulphide pulp, paper and nitrates. The capital of the Products Corporation was set at \$21,000,000, or three times the amount invested in Grand Falls. To develop the power immense concrete dams and canals had to be built and to get the power to where the mills were to be erected huge lattice steel towers had to be erected for carrying the transmission lines. Three thousand and sixty square miles of land were to be embraced in the enterprise. The initial electrical development was set at about 120,000 H.P. (at a cost of \$52,89 per H.P.) The town site, immense factories and paper mills were to be located at Corner Brook, Bay of Islands. To give an idea of what this place was to be like, the project called for storage room for 20,000 tons of pulp, besides equally as large warehouses for nitrates, carbide, etc. These buildings were to be at the shipping point which was to be created by the erection of an immense concrete breastwork, several thousand feet long. The town and plant alone was planned to cover an area of 1,200 acres. It was planned in the Humber Deal that the total cost of work, before a dollars worth of produce was shipped would be \$18,000,000. Six million dollars would be spent on the construction of power plant, etc. On the construction 4,000 men would be employed. The job, too, had to be completed and in working order within two years.

**SUBMITTED TO ASSEMBLY.** This plan for the development of the water power of the Humber was submitted to the House of Assembly by the Messrs. Reid in 1915 under the Morris Government. It is in many respects similar to the Humber Deal of to-day. Then the whole contract was laid on the table. There was no guarantee asked but quite a

lot of concessions were granted. These were opposed by Messrs. Coaker and the Union members as public rights were in danger of being sacrificed.

### THE POSITION TO-DAY.

Is the position any better to-day? The project was a great, if not greater, than that now proposed. Then why does not the Prime Minister out with the Contract? Or why did he not submit it to the Legislature last December after the Deal was finalized with the British Government? Would not that have been an honorable course? Then if the Legislature did not sanction the Deal he could appeal to the country.

### SIMILARITY OF PROPAGANDA.

There is such a similarity in the propaganda now used as in that used by Morris that it is worth quoting the following:—"If we export 10,000,000 from this industry and put down half for costs and interests we have \$5,000,000 per year for labor, at \$1,000 per man this will give labor to 5,000 men representing 5,000 families. These 5,000 men earning \$5,000,000 and paying say 30% in duties on the consumption measured by their earnings would represent \$1,500,000 increase in the revenue. The project is staggering and some may think it an election scheme." The Prime Minister is using almost identical words to-day. He says however, that he won't allow anyone to steal his brain. Why should anyone want to steal it? His brainstorm of the Humber can be all found in the House of Assembly Report for 1915. Sir Richard is bluffing. The truth is the Humber Industry is an effort of Messrs. Reid to develop their natural resources. They have succeeded through Messrs. Armstrong-Whitworth & Co. to get the British Government to guarantee the interest on half the capital. Newfoundland had to guarantee the other half. What other concessions Messrs. Reid & Co. want Premier Squires refuses to tell. Will the country sign an unknown contract on the word of Messrs. Coaker, Squires and Reid. Certainly not. Therefore vote for Bennett and his candidates. Their stake in the country requires that industries flourish, and they will see that the Humber Deal on the level is given the country.




