



This upping-block, some three feet and a half high, is of an unusual kind. It was, in fact, intended, not so much for horsemen, as for the use of coachpassengers. The old stage and mail coaches passed this way, and some of them not only halted, but changed horses here as well. The stone is of a height convenient for the coach-passenger to step up and find a place on the coach-roof.

"E. B." who provided this stone. can hardly be identified with the "E. B." who set up the upping-block along the Great North Road in 1708, for the difference of fifty-eight years renders that improbable. Besides, they are in far-removed parts of the country.

His Latin inscription, "Adsu placere gratia E. B.." means "Be pleased to mount, by grace of E. B."

When the old coaching days came to an end the inn here fell upon evil days, and, instead of being the resort of folk of good repute, it became the meeting place of the poachers and dy meetings there were usually several members so adorned, so the cffice of president was frequently chal-



SATISFYING THE PEOPLE'S PAS-SION FOR NEWS.

Without attempting to argue the question as to whether China issued a newspaper prior to the Roman diurnal, there is a good case in favor of the contention that the English idea of a newspaper was suggested by the Venetian gazettes.

These writings were displayed in the galleries and public places of Venice, a coin called gazetta being paid by anyone who desired to peruse the contents. Both "journal" and "gazette," frequently used as the second words in newspaper titles, are lineal descendants of the Roman and Venetian phototypes of our great daily newspapers.

In the opening years of the seven teenth century aristocrats, whenever they left town for their country seats, took care to be informed as to current happenings.

Their correspondents were mostly men about town-frequently retired officers-whose duty it was to send a news letter at regular intervals to their subscribers

San Francisco Plans to

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 6. (A.P.)-The water front of San Francisco will be extended 20 miles beyond its present limits for the development of a great industrial section if the United States government approves plans for dredging a deep-water ship canal south from Hunter's Point, in San Francisco, to Ravenswood in San Mateo county. The project is being pushed not only by San Francisco, but by every city and district for 50 miles down the peninsula to San Jose. Besides dredging a channel, it is planned to reclaim 20,000 acres of tidelands for industrial sites. land would be reclaimed through use of the dredged earth.

Government aid has been asked only or the channel. The reclamation and wharfage improvements are to be undertaken by private interests, together with the state and the countries involved. The entire project will involve many millions of dollars.

San Francisco has a water front that is owned and operated by the public. Title to the property is in the state of California and harbor affairs are administered by a board of three

narbor commissioners. The city at present has 15 miles of perthing space for vessels, with 5,000,-000 square feet for cargo area. The new facilities are intended to increase the harbor space to more than double and to provide a vast number of potential factory sites.
