Survivors of Rojstvensky's Ill-fated Fleet Relate Incredible Stories of Incompetency and Lack of Forethought on the Part of Commander-in-Chief—Thousands of Unknown and Unhonored Heroes.

Vladivostok, June 12.—A series of interviews with the correspondents of the Associated Press who survived the disaster of the Russian fleet, has developed a most sensational story of the complete demoralization which followed the sinking of the flagship, the Novoye Vremya.

Some ships developed deplorable structural defects. The Galatya, a 10,000-ton battleship, was so damaged that she was unable to leave the harbor.

The lack of homogeneity among the ships made it impossible to maneuver in harmony. The Vladimir Monomakh, a 10,000-ton battleship, was so damaged that she was unable to leave the harbor.

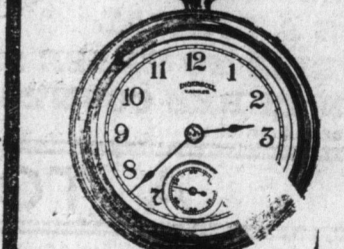

Railway Men Are Flurried

Action of Dominion Police to Enforce Alien Labor Law Will Affect Many.

If United States Retailers There May Be Wholesale Exchange of Railway Employees.

The action taken by Colonel Sherwood, chief of the Dominion police, to deport citizens of the United States who are working in Canada, under the Canadian alien labor law, has caused quite a furor among representatives of the United States railway men in Canada from Victoria to Halifax.

Local interest in the outcome of the cases now being tried in the habeas corpus proceedings taken at Toronto incident to the arrest of two train employees at Peterborough, is considerable, as every American railroad entering Seattle has representatives across the border who have sworn their citizenship in the United States, and an enforcement of the Canadian statute would mean that many familiar faces would be seen on the trains and boats coming to Seattle from British Columbia.

On the theory that retaliatory measures must be adopted making the United States statute apply in the same manner, it would be a number of trucks and trailers packed out to a Canadian delivery point, would call for a Canadian delivery agent.

At several of the Seattle offices of the United States consular officials, the matter was discussed yesterday, and the effort to enforce the Canadian statute received considerable consideration.

Charles Wurtel, who was at Toronto, Vancouver, as a Canadian agent, but the agents are Americans, and the United States consular officials have been sent to the United States to represent the company under the contract.

Mr. W. J. Leary, secretary of the Fraser River Fishermen's Association, has been notified by the Ottawa authorities that the license cost \$10 apiece, and it is absolutely unfair to make a man pay twice

for the same privilege. Many men who fish on the Skeena river and at Rivers inlet early in the summer follow the sockeye season down to the Fraser. In the north they take out a license to fish in British Columbia waters, and Mr. Burdick contends they should not be required to take out another when they reach the Fraser river.

In his communication to the authorities, Mr. Burdick points out that there are many mining districts in this province but that a miner's license is valid in any one of them irrespective of its place of issue. Mr. Burdick does not believe that the department fully considered the question in all its bearings before issuing the new regulation which has come into effect without warning.

He does not think the department at Ottawa wilfully intends to hamper fishing operations on this coast, and at the same time work an injustice to the fishermen who work both in the north and in the south. It is thought the order will be revoked.

In past years licenses have been valid all over the British Columbia coast, and the records of the canneries on the Fraser river show that dozens which have been operated under the north order in the season have been used later on the Fraser river.

The reason for the alteration in the regulations is that the British Columbia coast was recently divided into two inspection areas, and presumably the order was promulgated for the supposed convenience of the inspectors.

It is reported from New Westminster that the Ottawa white fishermen have decided to request the Fraser River Fishermen's Association to meet a delegation from the union on Thursday next, for the purpose of discussing further the question of sockeye prices.

GOSSIP OF THE ROYAL CITY

Interesting Budget of News from Fraser River Metropolis.

From Our Correspondent. New Westminster, B. C., June 12. The Fraser River Fishermen's Association, has returned from an extended trip through the Skeena and Similkameen valleys, and he was accompanied by Mr. W. J. Leary, president of the Skeena Fishermen's Association, R. M. Palmer, freight vice-commissioner, and Maxwell Smith, inspector of Fruit Marks. Meetings were held in all important centers. Mr. Bradfield reports that indications point to the same privilege.

The construction of the new sawmill on Dock square, in the West End, is to be proceeded with at once, according to information given the Colonist by a well known millhand. For some reason the construction was stopped several weeks ago, but next week will see the resumption of operations and work will now be pushed to get the mill ready for active work.

The annual excursion and picnic of the New Westminster employees of the B. C. Electric railway will be held at Chilliwack on June 20th, and great preparations are being made for the event.

In preparation for traffic on its new line to Steveston and for heavy traffic on the interurban line this fall, the B. C. E. Ry. Co. has nine large new cars under construction at its shops here. Three large passenger and two baggage cars are for the Steveston line, and several cars of the Detroit and open patterns are for the interurban line.

Mr. Lester David has purchased from the city for the old MacLaren-Ross mill now owned by the Fraser River Sawmills Ltd., a portion of the machinery in the city's old electric lighting plant, and it will be removed at once to Millside. The machinery sold includes the large dynamo, Corliss engine, fan draft, two boilers, pump, main shaft and some belting.

Mr. David has agreed with the city that he will have the mill running in sixty days and that they will employ not less than 100 white men. The new company expects to have vessels loading here for San Francisco and other places by the time of the Dominion Exhibition.
