It is something, however, that ou Australian kindred are with us in this large enough to allow the matter. Their influence, along with our own, will tell for a good deal. And it would be welcome news in Canada that our high commissioner in London was working with Australian representatives towards the same end. In the meantime let the representatives of the Pacific province be assured that they have all Ontario at their back, a few cranks only excepted.

The Factory Bill.

The factory bill is dropped for this ses sion, but perhaps the measure is not such a pressing one after all. When factories are running short time the temptation to employ child labor is but small. In Germany where labor is abundant and wages low, laws against the employment of children are deemed unnecessary; the public do not call for them. If ever Canadian factories begin running overtime, then a factory bil will be wanted immediately. Just at present all the work there is is none to much.

COUNSEL REBUKED.

How Law was Practised Thirty Years Ago-Two Cases at the Assizes.

Chief Justice Hagarty on opening the non-jury list at the assizes yesterday rebuked counsel retained in cases for the loose way in which they conducted busi ness, and remarked that when he was a lawyer thirty years ago business was conducted in a very different manner.

Mulholland v. Harman-Thomas Mulholland sued to recover possession of 100 acres of land, being east half of lot 17, on the fourth concession of the county of York. Mulholland claimed a right to the property through a deed made by John McLean, who deeded away the whole of the land contested in 1853. The defence was that they had a prior right by reason of deeds delivered by one Beam as far back as 1831, and they claim that McLean had no right to deed away the lot in 1853. A multitude of witnesses were called on both sides, and his lordship reserved judg

Williams v. Williams was an actio brought by vendor to recover damages for non-acceptance by defendant of a boiler purchased by him for plaintiff. The de-fendant has a match factory on Dufferin Street, city, and purchased a second-hand boiler and engine to carry on his business. Afterwards for some reason he refused to take the boiler and engine, hence this ac-tion. The defendant alleged as his reason for not accepting the boiler and engine that he was induced to contract to buy them by misrepresentation as to time the boiler and engine had been in use.
