The contracts now provide that a rebate of 5 per cent. shall be paid at the end of a year, providing that the grocers increase their sales 10 per cent. during the year, and do not sell to other jobbers. As an example of the sentiment on the subject a leading grocer said yesterday that he would give \$1,000 if he could be one of two-thirds of the grocers to sign an agreement refusing to handle the goods of the Royal Baking work with alacrity and precision. WHEN CREDITORS LOSE NOTH-ING.

A novel plan to get ahead of other creditors and not lose anything by the failure of a customer, has been devised by some Canadian manufacturers. It has been in use for some time, but is not generally

The manufacturers sell goods subject to a discount of 50 to 60 per cent., with an extra 5 for cash. The goods are invoiced. however, at a gross or list price, and a memo attached saying that if the account is paid on July 1 a discount of 50 (or 60, as the case may be) and 5 per cent, will be allowed. If not paid before August 1 they will not get the extra 5 per cent. If not paid by October 1, no discount whatever will be allowed. If the buyer fails, the creditors at once make a claim for the full amount of the invoice, which is in reality 50 per cent, more than the actual market value of the article. That is, an article which usually sells at \$1 and is invoiced by everyone else at that price, is invoiced by these particular manufactur ers at \$2, less 50 per cent. if paid at the usual time. If the estate pays 50 cen : on the dollar, by this system these manufacturers get the full amount of their actual claim - and sometimes morewhile the others get only 50 per cent. or

The scheme is a clever one, but recently the inspectors, representing other creditors, when examining the affairs of the estate, have "got onto it," when there has been usually a "pretty row," after which the clever manufacturers must amend their claims. A number of estates, however, has been wound up without the inspectors discovering the trick. -Hardware.

TWO NEW FIBERS.

"Gelsoline" is a new texture produced in Italy from the fiber of mulberry tree bark. The fiber is obtained by chemical retting of the bark of young twigs, and is purified by treatment with soap and soda. It is said to have ten times the strength of American cotton, costs about one-tenth as much as Italian flax, and owing to its perfectly cylindrical shape, yields very close fabrics, requiring no filling. It absorbs liquids with facility, and is therefore, easily dyed. The new fabric is the invention of Guiseppe and Dr. Guisto Pasqualis, and has already gained some importance, as the works at Vittorio turn out annually some 45,000 yards of upholstery, fabrics, damask, gobelins, piques, etc.

ASSESSMENT INSURANCE.

In the New York Insurance department's report on the examination of the Mutual Reserve Fund Association occur the following passages:

"There was received during the year 1894, from those who joined the association prior to December 31st, 1888, (eliminating the English department), mortuary assessments of \$1,682,515. ly those who joined prior to Decem-English department), insurance of \$1,914,820.

"It thus appears that the beneficiaries of this class received during the past year \$232,305 in excess of the income received. From the English department for the period mentioned, the mortuary assessments about equalled the death payments."

It appears that in the opinion of the official examiners of the State of New York, the members of the Mutual Reserve Fund Life Association who joined prior to 1889 are an annual charge upon the members to the extent of over a quarter of a million dollars per annum.

The bard of arbitration will during 1895 6 be composed of the members of the Council with the exception of Messrs. Gray and Henderson.

The annual report presented by the returning officers gives a valuable and interesting summary of the trade and general development of the province.

The first full car of glass ever imported direct from Germany to this city was brought in last week by Messrs. Smith & Clerin, to be used in the sash and door factory. The consignment weighed about 40,000 lbs. - Vernon News.

A fine specimen of nickel ore was exhibited at Camp McKinney last week by one of our prospectors; it was in the form of a sulphide, and the ledge from which it was taken is said to be 3 feet wide. Further particulars of this find will doubtless be of interest to many. Advance.

A specimen of War Eigle ore gave an assay return of \$1,400 to the ton in gold. It was from a streak of ore about a foot wide which runs through the main ore body, and which, though it does not average \$1,400 or anything like it, is nevertheless much higher grade than the common run of the shipping ore. -Rossland Miner.




