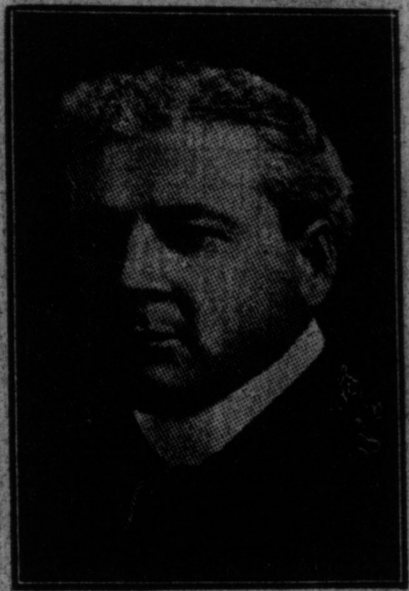

M'BRIDE DIDN'T "TALK POLITICS" HE MERELY CRITICIZED SENATE FOR KILLING BORDEN NAVY BILL

In Presence of the Duke of Connaught, Hon. R. L. Borden and Sir Wilfrid Laurier, at Canadian Club Luncheon in Ottawa, British Columbia's Premier Urged Immediate Naval Contribution.

Who broke the rules of the Ottawa Canadian Club yesterday by talking politics at the weekly luncheon.

OTTAWA, Oct. 27.—(Can. Press).—Sir Richard McBride, premier of British Columbia, who was the guest of the Canadian Club at luncheon today, created rather a furor when he launched into the naval question in his speech.

It is a cardinal rule of the club that nothing of a political or controversial nature shall be introduced in the speeches at the luncheons, but Sir Richard came out in no uncertain tone, or, to use his own words, with all the emphasis he might command, to deplore the failure to pass the \$35,000,000 as Canada's contribution to the British navy.

Not Controversial But—"I am not going to say anything controversial," said Sir Richard, in beginning his address, "but in a few modest words, not to give a message—that were a dangerous thing to attempt—but to tell of western feeling on a certain question which was closely associated with that section of the empire. First, I wish to speak of the navy and what Canada should do towards her share of empire responsibility. If my voice from British Columbia be of value to this assembly, I would like to say with all the emphasis I may command how deeply we regret and deplore the inability of Canada to do her share towards Canadian, towards imperial defence, in failing to vote the \$35,000,000, as was proposed a few months ago for the assistance of a program of the British admiralty.

RECOGNITION OF HUERTA ENDED?

Washington Divided Into Two Rival Camps of Guessers—Note to the Powers Predicted.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—(Can. Press).—Reports from the British Foreign Office that Great Britain would do nothing in the Mexican situation, now that the election has been held in the southern republic, without consultation with the United States aroused interest in official circles here today and added strength to the persistent intimations that the American Government plans a note to the powers which may result in a concerted Mexican policy for the future.

HOME RULE WITHIN HOME RULE ASQUITH'S POLICY AS TO ULSTER

LONDON, Oct. 27.—(Can. Press).—Sir Edward Grey, secretary of state for foreign affairs, in a speech at Berwick tonight explained that what the government was willing to concede to satisfy Ulster was a sort of home rule within home rule, giving Ulster control of her own education, police and matters of that kind.

NOT ROME RULE STATES PRIEST LEADER LARKIN GOES TO PRISON

An Irish Government Half Composed of Protestants Would Not Surprise Father Minehan.

DUBLIN, Oct. 27.—(Can. Press).—James Larkin, the leader of the striking Irish transport workers, was today found guilty on charges of sedition and inciting to riot and sentenced to seven months imprisonment.

LAW THREATENS GRAFT PROBER HENNESSY

Man Who Has Been Startling New York by Charges Against Tammany, May Be Sent to Trial—Letter to Judge McCall Bristles With Charges.

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—(Can. Press).—District Attorney Whitman this afternoon issued a subpoena summoning John A. Hennessy, former Governor Sulzer's graft investigator, to appear before him tomorrow morning relative to statements Hennessy is alleged to have made concerning Edward E. McCall, Democratic candidate for mayor.

HUERTA'S POWER MADE VOTING PERILOUS

Definite Result of Polling Will Not Be Known for Several Weeks, But Voters Were Evidently Timorous—Diaz Makes No Attempt to Ascertain Position.

The hope is held out that the "Ayuntamiento," a body resembling in some small degree a board of aldermen, will have prepared its report for the federal district by the end of the week.

CARDEN DID NOT DISCUSS POLICY

London Times Says British Minister to Mexico Made No Statement of Any Kind.

LONDON, Oct. 28.—The Times this morning says: "In reply to enquiries regarding the reported utterances of British Minister Carden, we learn that American journalists were received by him as a matter of courtesy; but in conversation he did not directly or indirectly discuss the American policy in Mexico, nor refer in any way to American interests in that country."

PLEA OF MARITIME PROVINCES MET WITH LITTLE RESPONSE

Resolution Urging That Old-Time Representation Be Restored and Made Irreducible, Understood to Have Failed to Get Support at Provincial Premiers Meeting.

OTTAWA, Oct. 27.—(Can. Press).—Representation from the maritime provinces in the federal house was discussed by the provincial premiers in conference here today behind closed doors. No conclusion was reached in regard to the arguments put forth by the delegations from Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.

BRANTFORD BANK VICTIMIZED.

BRANTFORD, Oct. 27.—(Can. Press).—A forger is again at work in Brantford, and this time the local branch of the Bank of Montreal was the victim. A man who signed a cheque as "Paul Farago" has disappeared, and the police are scouring the country in an endeavor to find him.

WILL DETHRONE MAD KING.

MUNICH, Oct. 27.—(Can. Press).—The senate today voted to support a measure providing for the dethronement of the mad King Otto of Bavaria and the enthronement of the regent, Prince Ludwig. The ministerial council afterwards met and decided to present such a measure to the diet.

Toronto Should Control Her Transportation

LONDON, Tuesday, Oct. 23.—(C. A. P.).—Postmaster Samuel arrived home last night after an absence of nine weeks. Giving a graphic account of his visit to "the Dominion," Samuel said the thing that impressed him most was the degree of development already attained by the new cities of the west.

OFFICES OF C. P. R. TO BE REOPENED

Feeling That Austrian Government Has Been Unjust, is Growing Among Public.

LONDON, Oct. 23.—(Tuesday).—(C. A. P.).—Diplomatic intervention on behalf of the Canadian Pacific Co. has proved effective, according to yesterday's reports, and it is believed the Austrian Government will shortly allow the reopening of the C. P. R. offices, which have been temporarily closed. Their immigration branch will, however, be suspended until the judicial enquiry is over.

SEVEN GUARDS ARE CAPTURED

Striking Miners Battle With Police and Take Prisoners, in Addition to Wounding Many.

TRINIDAD, Colo., Oct. 27.—(Can. Press).—Strikers captured seven guards today at Chicono Junction, eight miles north of Trinidad. It was also reported that they captured a Colorado & Southern engine. For half an hour today more than 125 strikers battled at a mile range with several steel carloads of mine guards who were traveling over the Colorado & Southern Railway tracks ostensibly on their way to the Hastings Mine. The strikers at the Ludlow camp had been led to believe that the guards were entraining to attack the tent colony and consequently set about to defend their temporary homes.

### APPOINTMENT OF PROF. WRIGHT

#### Vote Was Thirteen to Nine, After Prolonged and Personal Discussion—Yonge Street Widening to Be Decided Tomorrow—Two Plebiscites to Be Voted on New Year's Day.

At midnight the city council was in the turmoil of appointing a city architect. Ald. Wanless gave notice of motion for an official investigation under oath of the architect's department.

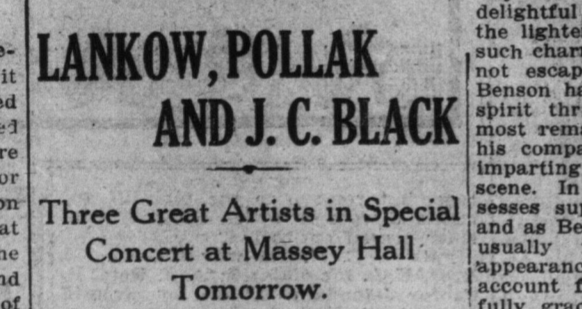

F. R. Benson opened what promises to be a record engagement at the Princess last night with his English company in 'Much Ado About Nothing.' The performance was in every way a brilliant success. The audience was an ultra-fashionable one and filled the house. The applause and enthusiasm were unbounded, culminating in a speech from Mr. Benson...

Thomas E. Shea opened at the Grand Opera House last evening in a drama in which dual personality predominates. It is called 'The Whirlpool' and was apparently a big success, judging by the manner in which the large audience received the talented actor and the play. In 'The Whirlpool' the leading role is that of Judge Rutherford, who, in public life is an upright and fearless judge, whose record has made him the inevitable choice of his party as candidate for governor. There is another side to his life, however, that arising from the compelling force of a manie springing from the fascination which diamonds hold for him. This obsession drives him to a career as a diamond thief, in which he seems to be actuated by a dual nature. The intellect which has made him a leading member of the bench is applied to the theft of the gems which he covets and a series of unexplained robberies have taken place, each of which has been marked by the audacious act of the criminal in leaving his card bearing the name of Jim Robinson. The second act gives a glance of the home life of Bessie Wilson, a young typist, who has met and fallen in love with Jim, who she believes is a race-track man, whose success on the turf enables him to buy the diamonds which he gives her. Robinson traces to her home, and in a scene in which the latest device of the modern detective, the dictagraph is used, the girl learns the true character of her lover and their conversation, overheard by the dictagraph, is sufficient to incriminate Robinson. A few moments later is devoted to a battle of wits between the thief and the detective, in which the former turns the tables on his captor and escapes. In the last act, a year has passed, during which the judge has conquered the obsession of his love for diamonds, but almost falls when the opportunity again presents itself. He again conquers, but decided that he must resign his judgeship and decline the nomination for governor. In a startling climax he severs his connection with his shady past, and is reunited to the girl whom he loved while a diamond thief.

Musical Toronto will be out in force tomorrow evening at Massey Hall when the great event of the concert season takes place. Robert Poliak, the noted Hungarian violinist, who made so great a hit in Montreal, is to make his first appearance locally, and Edward Lankow, the great basso of the Metropolitan Opera, who made a splendid impression recently, will be heard in some English songs and also in a duet in English with James Cuyler Black, the well-known tenor, who also will give several solos. Assisting these is Marcel Hansotte, pianist, accompanist from Vienna, and himself an artist of first rank, and Miss Grace Davis soprano. The program is most attractive and will please every shade of musical taste.

With LeRoy, Talma and Bosco, the European mystery workers, as headliners, the offering at Shea's Theatre for this week is one away above the average vaudeville, and warrants a capacity house at every performance. This company is in Canada for the first time, and that they are past-masters in the art of the enjoyable humorous sketch, as an enjoyable and utterly bewildering of the audience. Absolutely original and at times unexpected and startling. 'How Hubby Lost the Train,' as portrayed by 'Jim' McMahon and Elythe Chappelle, is an enjoyable humorous sketch. As a straight-faced droll comedian Tim McMahon has few equals. Dolly Connolly and Percy Weirich are some absolutely new songs which are well received, and they also sing over some old-time favorites. Walter Van Brunt, America's popular phonograph singer, sings equally well in pathetic or humorous vein, and has a splendid selection of both to offer.

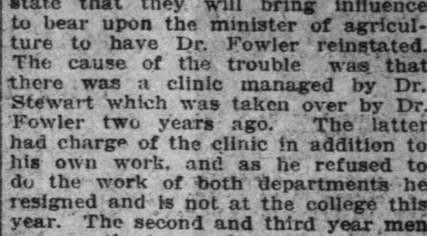
