

### FIGHTING WEEDS IN CANADA.

The Manitoba Agricultural College has trackers the work of helping the farmers to cradicate noxious weeds from their forms in that province. Many of these weeds were unfamiliar to the farmers in the first place and gained such foothold as to require heroic measures as might prove mere dangerous in the end than leipful, especially efforts to clean them out by fire.

Last year in June the Manitoba Agricultural College issued, a call-to municipalities and farmers for what is called as "Short Course for Weed Study." An unusual amount of interest was taken and many municipalities sent representatives to Winnipes, while many farmers came to attend the course of their own accord. The provincial weed inspector takes part in these courses with a view to giving interpretation of the "moxims weeds act." passed by the government, some time ago. 



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

### NO LABOR GANDIDATES IN FEDERAL ELECTIONS

Trades and Labor Council After Warm Debate Decides to Stick to Civic Affairs.

No labor candidates will contest Toronto seats in the coming Dominion elections. The District Trades and Labor Council came to this decision last night at a special meeting in the Labor Temple, when motions, amendments and countermotions were hurled at the chairman's head in such rapid succession that he almost gave up in despair. N. F. Williams was the presiding officer.

"I don't think a chairman ever had to deal with such technicafities as I have had to-night," said he at the close of the meeting. "I came down here to-night, a journey of four miles, expecting to see something accomplished, and I must say that I don't think you have done credit to the labor organizations."

The meeting was called to discuss the advisability of issuing to the local unions 20,000 copies of the legislative committee's manifesto, which was passed at the last meeting of the council. The discussion was proceeding towards this end when Delegate Bancroft moved a resolution to make the number of copies 500.

Then the fun began. Some of the delegates were in favor of Mr. Bancroft's motion on the ground that one copy would be sent to each local rather than to each individual member of the local. Delegate McCann, however, moved for the issuing of 5000 copies, and this was finally carried.

### Weather is More Favorable for Crops

WINNIPEG, Aug. 11.—The weather seems to have taken a turn for the better, judging from the weather map to-day, which showed that Edmonton was the only place where a large rainfall had taken place. At Battleford, too, there had been a heavy shower. Temperatures were decidedly higher, Kamsack being the celdest, with a mean temperature of 39. Other temperatures were about 47 and 48 for the low points, while the high was about 12 and 73. 

sent in the sun. One gram of radium frees enough heat in one hour to raise a grain of water from the temperature of ice to the temperature of boiling water. Hence the presence of this element assists in the preservation of the sun's heat.

The spectroscope reveals great quantities of helium in the sun; quantities great in proportion to the sun's other elements. The presence of helium is due to the disaggregation of radium. Two grams of radium per ton of the sun's elements would be enough for the entire regeneration of all the heat ever lost by the sun.



Later the trade had some positive bull news from various quarters and a stronger upturn was recorded. Much of early swing in wheat was due to messages from some of the crop experts in the morthwest telling of improved weather conditions. The decline here was easily brought about, because northwest markets showed some weakness, especially in the October price at Winnipeg. After the first hour the influences were mostly on the side of the buyers. Buyers of cash, wheat property found it more difficult to obtain too for some days. Baltimore configmed sixty boat loads exports in wheat since the middle of the week, fifteen of this to-day. The most important news of the day if half true is the claim of 64,000,000 bushels exportable surplus likely from Russian crop. 




