

ENGLAND'S MINE-RESCUE STA-

Three new mine-rescue stations are to be established in the English counties of Durham and Northumberland similar to the one already in existence near Nowcastle. This is in accordance with the mines rescue and aid act, passed by Parliament in 1910.

At each station there will be kept, ready for use, not less than fifteen sets of portable breathing apparatus, twenty electric hand lamps, four sets of oxygen reviving apparatus, an ambulance box or boxes provided by the Ambulance Association, or similar boxes, together with antiseptic solution and fresh drinking water; also cages of birds and mice for testing for carbon monoxide. The necessary motor vehicles and fire engine will likewise be provided.

The breathing trust to be used is, it is claimed, a considerable improvement upon the apparatus used earlier at the Newcastle station. By its aid a man may remain in a poisonous atmosphere for three hours, and may do

may remain in a poisonous atmosphere for three hours, and may do, without much inconvenience, whatever work is required underground for rescue or fire-extinguishing purposes during that time.

The apparatus weighs only twenty-six pounds. An atachment is provided whereby a rescuer may feed a partially "gassed" vic im with good air, thereby restoring him to full consciousness be-fore attempting his removal to the




