ONLINE SENT TO THE ASSIZES

Will Have to Stand Trial for Shooting With Intent to Kill.

The Affair Was a Family Squabble, in Which the Son Defended the Mother—Assembly of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew—Efforts to Get John Clarke's License Held For Him—General News from Hamilton.

Hamilton, May 27.—(Special)—This morning George W. Cline of Wilton was arraigned before Magistrate Forbes at Grimsby on a charge of shooting his wife and son, Vance Cline, on May 16, with intent to kill. The prosecution was conducted by Crown Attorney Brennan, and B. A. Lancaster defended the prisoner.

The license was cut off because Clark is a Tory, it is said, and that it will be renewed if the protest against John Dickenson, the member-elect is withdrawn. ALLEN LABORERS' PROTEST AND TARTÉ AGAIN ROASTED

Mr. Foster Got After Him in Connection With a Contract. Concrete Was Substituted for Stone, and It Was Suggested That Mr. Lemoliné of Montreal Had a Good Deal of Influence With the Minister of Public Works—The Bridge Item Was Passed, However.

Ottawa, May 27.—(Special)—The House has spent the greater portion of today's session in the construction of the bridge over the Saskatchewan at Edmonton. The plea advanced by Mr. Tarte is that the stone first selected for the bridge was too porous and friable, and as no other quality of a suitable character could be found in the locality, it was decided to substitute concrete for the original contract price for stone, although builders say the concrete is much cheaper. It looks as if Mr. Tarte's protest would have been in vain.

The Premier gave fair warning to-day to all persons seeking incorporation from the Dominion Parliament that after this session no deviation would be permitted from the House rules regarding private bill legislation. Application must be made in simple time hereafter, so that the rules of the Commons may be complied with.

The Day in the House. Ottawa, May 27.—(Special)—The House began business this afternoon by postponing morning sittings until Tuesday, owing to the committee not having completed its report on the bill to amend the law relating to the Quebec harbor bill, which was introduced by Mr. Dobbell, on the second reading, explained that the Quebec harbor bill was not intended to amend the law relating to the harbor, but to improve the harbor, so as to accommodate ships of 10,000 tons burthen, the gross revenue of the harbor last year was \$70,000, and the net revenue \$35,000. By this bill interest on the amount borrowed would be a first lien on harbor revenues.

Mr. Bennett on Allen Laborers. Mr. Bennett pointed out the desirability of enforcing the law relating to the Allen Labor Act on the north shore of Georgian Bay. He had the best of reasons for so doing, and he was sure that the government were at present being employed there. He suggested the appointment of an officer at Parry Sound.

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Ontario Ladies' College. The students of the Ontario Ladies' College, who have been celebrating the Queen's Birthday by a series of athletic sports, nearly 400 competed in a tennis tournament. The match was a very interesting one, and the college was victorious.

Minor Matters. Roy Lyster of the Crescent Club was arrested while riding at the Bazaar track last night. George and Kate Welwood, man and wife, were sent to jail to-day for five days for disorderly conduct.

Private Bills. The first hour recess was taken up with the consideration of private bills. The Sons of England Incorporation Bill passed the second reading without opposition, but on motion for the third reading, Mr. Blair objected to another stage being given to the bill in the absence of Mr. Fielding. Accordingly the bill stands over until Monday.

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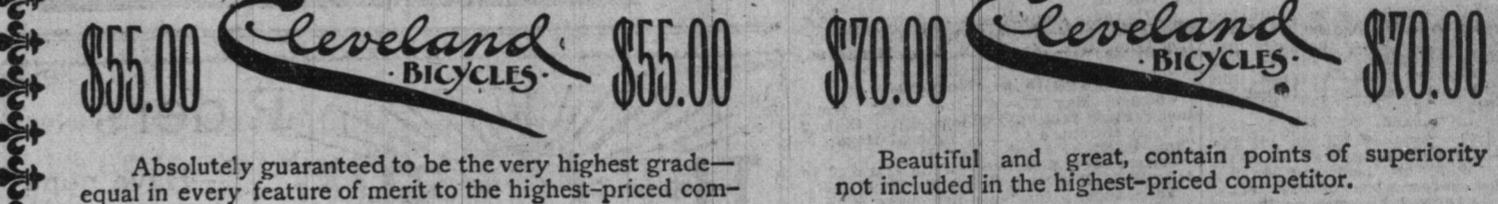

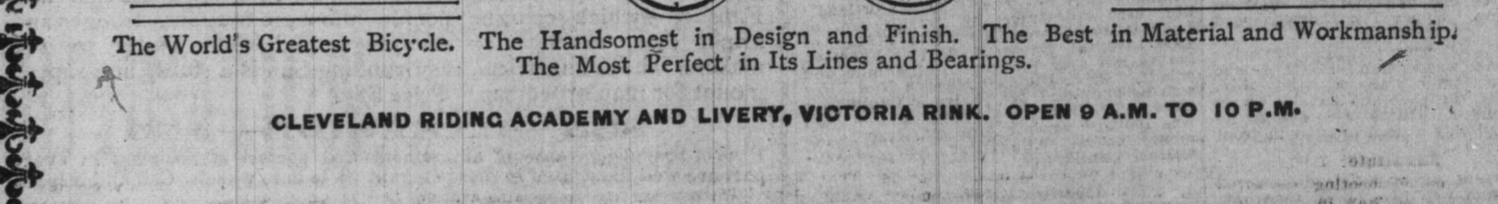

THE COMING CONFERENCE. Sir Louis Davies and Sir Julian Pauncefote have been conferring in Washington with Messrs. John W. Foster and John A. Kasson with a view to making preliminary arrangements for the conference which is soon to take place for the purpose of settling all the differences that exist between Canada and the United States.

The Behring Sea question has been a disturbing element for eleven years, and if the two countries can come to an amicable arrangement for the preservation of the seals, it will be a matter for gratification. The latest proposal for the Behring Sea seal matter, both countries prohibit the killing of seals for a year, but the Canadian Government would demand compensation for the suspension of their industry and that Parliament could not be induced to vote an amount sufficient to satisfy them.

The Atlantic fishery question is a much more important one to Canada than the Behring Sea seal matter. The Americans have wanted all the privileges of fishing in Canadian waters, buying bait and transshipping fish over Canadian railways without allowing Canadian fish to enter the United States free. Canadians have considered that in exchange for these privileges they should get free admission of fish to the American markets and something to boot, as the Canadian fisheries are the most valuable in the world. It ought to be an easy matter to arrange for common fishery regulations in the great lakes.

A most important matter which should be easily arranged is reciprocity in coasting privileges. The Americans have refused to allow Canadian vessels to run from one American port to another. This should not be so. Perhaps the Canadian commissioners, by impressing upon the Americans the importance of the St. Lawrence route and its probable growth in the future as well as the immense development of the wheat regions in the Canadian Northwest, that is certain to come in the near future, might be able to convince them that it would be to their advantage to make reciprocal arrangements for coasting.

Perhaps the most irritating question for consideration is the Alien Labor Law of the United States. An hour's talk should settle this. The law was primarily intended to shut out the pauper labor of Europe. Canadians are an intelligent, as well educated and as much accustomed to good living and equality as Americans. There is no reason why the law should apply to Canada, and the Americans in their present frame of mind ought to be able to see this.

As regards the trade question it is to be hoped that the Liberals have abandoned all idea of unrestricted reciprocity or anything like it, but the Canadian commissioners ought to be able to convince the Americans that unless they admit our lumber and refined nickel free of duty or at a low rate of duty, we must take immediate measures to protect ourselves. They might also be able to show that free admission of Canadian barley into the United States would be a fair return for free admission of American corn by Canada. There are some other natural products, including coal, that might pass freely between the two countries with advantage to both. On the whole there is reason to hope that a treaty of lasting benefit to both countries may be arranged.

THE GRAVENHURST SANITARIUM. Although the consumptive sanitarium is not situated in Toronto it is to all intents and purposes a Toronto institution. Toronto has an isolation hospital for contagious diseases and several hospitals for non-contagious cases. Consumption is a disease for the treatment of which we have no special hospital or sanitarium in Toronto. And yet of all diseases it is the one that demands the most careful and scientific treatment. Toronto is not very well adapted, climatically, for the location of a consumptive sanitarium. The institution has been placed in Gravenhurst because the Muskoka district has certain advantages which Toronto does not possess. A strong case can be made out in favor of the request that has been made that the City Council should contribute towards the support of the Gravenhurst institution. The Western

PROTESTS OF LITTLE AVAIL

Much Pleading Makes Controllers Reluctant Only to Extent of \$150.

And \$500 Was Made in Grants, So That Rate Remains Stationary So Far—Parks Committee Would Have Been Better Off to Stay Away, but Aid. Saunders Gets \$500 More.

From 2 o'clock until 6 yesterday afternoon the Board of Control sat in an open court to listen to protests against their own carrying out of the draft estimates. The meeting was exceedingly warm towards the end, when the parks appropriations were being voted on. All Leites incurred, Aid. Burns caused by his presence to liberality, and a sharp tilt between the twain ensued across the table. Aid. Hubbard did not mince words in his condemnation of the alleged extravagance in the Parks Department. In this he crossed swords with Chairman Score and with the Park Commissioner. The parks representatives went away with \$500 less granted than they had when they came. But \$500 was added for sewage disposal experiments to the Board of Works, and \$500 was made in grants. So that, after much wrangling, only a meagre \$600 extra was wrangled yesterday from the Controller. No further meeting will be held on the estimates till the middle of next week.

Appeal for Dispensary Grant. "Ladies first" was the order followed, and Dr. W. B. Atkins introduced three ladies, who added a charm to the weight of his appeal for a grant towards the new Dispensary on Spadina street. Last year the grant had been cut off, and while \$1000 was spent, only \$800 was raised. By the Controller Hubbard favored a small grant, since there was no other hospital within a mile, and the Mayor sent the applicants away bidding them be hopeful. At His Worship's suggestion, \$400 was subsequently voted.

Cheapest Planets. Revs. A. J. Broughall and John Gillespie voiced the tale of woe for the House of Industry. They asked for \$15,000 for the planetarium last year, but got along with \$12,000. They had already received an interim grant this year of \$10,000, but had drawn already over \$10,000 for this and other expenses up to December they required \$100. The estimates only provided for \$12,000, inclusive of the interim grant. They were doled out promises.

For Study of the Heavens. Terrestrial organizations gave place to a consideration of bodies celestial. Mr. Arthur Harvey tutored an appeal for a grant to the Toronto Astronomical Society by promising to set aside one or two evenings per week to allow school children the free use of the telescopes elsewhere with to the benefit of the A. Burns and Hubbard strove to retrieve it by making a further cut of \$1000 in the \$4000 left for High Park. The Commissioner urged that half the amount asked for had already been spent by his committee. Aid. Hubbard, in heated fashion, called this crooked way of doing business, and Chairman Score objected to the expression "crooked" as being ungentlemanly and the Mayor pitched it up by defining Aid. Hubbard's implied meaning satisfactorily.

"How would you spend \$4000 in High Park?" was asked, and when the Park Commissioner replied, "In sodding and grading," Aid. Burns contended that work would destroy the rusticity which gave the Park its charm. A compromise was effected by making the grant \$3500.

Views as to the Rate. Everybody was excited, and the Mayor proposed a few minutes' respite to allow everybody to cool off. Aid. Score's pertinacity in asking for heavy park appropriations led Aid. Burns to ask what he was making a fool of when Mr. W. J. Gage was heard in the interests of a grant to the Gravelhurst Sanitarium. He was given no satisfaction.

City Hall Notes. Mayor Shaw, Aid. Burns, Aid. Leslie, City Treasurer Coady and City Solicitor Hardy yesterday morning to General Government's pledge not to open a bill in the next session, permitting the issue of \$100,000 debentures to furnish and build the new City Hall. Mr. Hardy promised consideration.

The Mayor desired to dislodge those who were misled to suppose that the city was ever intended to bring the 10th Regiment to Toronto. All that was embraced in the memorial of Council was a recruitment depot, the city to furnish the building.

The hour of Hon. W. E. Gladstone's arrival was awaited with interest. The public school board have requested the free use of the Exhibition grounds for their annual games, June 13.

R.M.S. Gallia. Montreal Gazette. Shortly after 6 o'clock last evening the Beaver Line R.M.S. Gallia arrived in port with passengers and a general cargo, after a very enjoyable trip across the bay.

Although the Gallia is comparatively a new boat to the St. Lawrence trade, she has had a record of being a favorite boat with transatlantic passengers, having been an excellent money-maker here and there with the usual luxuries of this venerable line.

During the past two seasons there has been quite a revolution in the steamship business, not only as regards tonnage, but because the scenery of the St. Lawrence route is fast becoming second to none for its beauty. The old saying that competition is the life of trade is fully demonstrated by the latest acquisition to the Beaver Line fleet, and the management have evidently realized that many a traveler for pleasure, "there are others" who are anxious to combine business with the former.

THE TORONTO GENERAL TRUSTS COMPANY.

The sixteenth annual meeting of this company was held at its offices on the 23rd instant. Mr. John Hoskin, Q. C., LL. D., the president of the company, occupied the chair, and among those present were Sir Frank Smith, W. H. Beatty, E. A. Meredith, W. Brock, E. Jaffray, Samuel Alcorn, T. Sutherland Stayer, James Henderson, J. K. Osborne, H. S. Howland, Alfred Irving, J. G. Scott, A. B. Lee, P. C. Jarvis.

Mr. W. H. Beatty, the Managing Director, acted as Secretary, and submitted the usual statements, showing the operations of the company for the year ended 31st March, 1898. He also read the report of the company, as follows:

Sixteenth Annual Report. The Directors of the Toronto General Trusts Company beg to submit their sixteenth annual report, with the accompanying financial statements, showing the operations of the company for the year ended 31st March, 1898.

The new business committed to the care of the company for the year amounts to \$2,500,000, both in value and in the number of estates, of any year in the company's history. The very large increase of this large volume of new business will be better shown by an examination of the following summarized statement, namely:

In addition to the new business thus summarized, the company has, during the year, been appointed trustees of bonds and debentures for a large amount, as well as for the performance of other duties, which may ultimately lead to permanent work.

Notwithstanding the business of the company has so largely increased during the year, and that it has in the aggregate assumed such large proportions, it will be observed that the net profits have not correspondingly increased. The establishment of five new trusts companies during the past two years, and the fact that the year just created for certain classes of business, and the great reduction in the rate of interest, have, however, been largely reduced the net profits of the year. The assumption of such a large volume of business necessitates the employment of a large and competent staff, even although the net profits have not correspondingly increased.

The profit and loss statement herewith submitted shows the sources from which the revenues of the company are derived and the charges against such revenues. The net profit of the year, as shown by the provision for every ascertained or estimated loss, amount to \$28,039.06. Out of these net profits, the Directors have declared dividends during the year of 9 per cent on the paid-up stock, amounting to \$22,000, and interest on the credit of profit and loss \$5838.06.

At the beginning of the year there stood at the credit of the company the sum of \$54,538.78, and during the year \$10,154.58 has been written off for accrued interest on the mortgage of the company's contingent account \$44,202.20.

Under the provisions of the Loans Corporation Act, it has been decided to change the close of the company's fiscal year from the 31st of March to the 31st of December, and the effect of this change has been taken.
