### PRINCESS OJA'S FUNERAL.

An English Missionary Officiated, By Special Request.

Victoria, B.C., Feb. 25.—News was brought from Tonga by the steamer Miowera of the death of Princess Oja, of Tonga. Before the King's marriage to Lavinia it was generally considered that Oja would probably be the lady to whom the King would show his handkerchief.

Described one of her side from a long line of nine Kings and on her mother's side from the Tui Tonga through Chief Tuga, she had a large following and the funeral was a novel one. She was buried in the cemetery of the Tongans, on the shores of Nukunono, where rest many of the Kings and Queens. At the request of the King an English missionary, Rev. J. B. Walker, officiated. All the Tongan royal family and nobles and the nobles of the colony were present. It was dusk before the funeral ceremony was completed, and then the body was carried from the seashore to build a mound over the grave. The labor was continued intermittently during the next four days and nights. Unfortunately the Premier and police interfered on the last night and threw a number of natives into prison because they chose to follow out old Tongan custom of burning incense at the grave at night, a custom which, in the case of the late King, Tubou, was observed every night for more than a fortnight.

### BEET ROOT SUGAR MEN

Ask the Government to Impose Countervailing Duties.

Ottawa, Feb. 25.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. W. S. Fielding and Hon. Rydner Fisher received a delegation from the beet root sugar industry today. The delegation was received in the Premier's office. Representatives of the industry from Galt, Berling, Lindsay, Dresden, Walkerton and Peterboro were present. Archibell, M.P., introduced the delegation. The delegates asked that countervailing duties be imposed on beet root sugar. They also asked that the time be extended for admitting duty free machinery to be used in the manufacture of beet root sugar. The Premier said that the government would take their representations into consideration.

## PUT UNDER PROVISIONAL LAW

Mr. Monk Introduces His Bill to Amend the Interpretation Act.

NEED SHOWN IN RECENT QUEBEC CASE

Where a Railway Incorporated Under Federal Law Was Exempt From Municipal Restraint.
