



NORTH TORONTO NOW WITHOUT A COUNCIL

Messrs. Hwoe, Burnaby, Irwin and Parke Quit Board as Protest Against Action of Mayor Murphy and Allies in Defeating Will of People Expressed at Polls.

North Toronto is to-day practically without a council.

Councillors Howe, Burnaby, Irwin and Parke last night tendered their resignations, and followed up their action by immediately withdrawing from the council table.

The situation was brought about by the refusal of Mayor Brown and Councillors Murphy and Grice to resubmit the sewerage bylaw, endorsed by the ratepayers, but defeated on the third

reading in council by the mayor, and his allies. The action of the four councillors was in the nature of a bombshell and created a profound sensation in the crowded chamber. Councillor Parke has, owing to illness, been absent from Noted Missionary and Author wh died at Bradford yesterday.

has, owing to illness, been absent from his official duties for three months, but his signature appeared on the letter of resignation read by Mr. Burnaby. The situation is unique and is said to be without a parellel in the province. Briefly summarized, the events leading up to last night's sensational climax are as follows: People Voted Yea.

In July last the ratepayers of North Toronto voted on a bylaw to exptnd approximately \$140,000 for the installa-tion of disposal works and a sewerage system. The measure carried after one of the keenest fights in the history of the town by a majority of 43. Immediately after the passage of the bylaw Councillor Parke, who had taken a prominent part in forwarding the movement, was taken ill and Councillor Howe left for a prolonged trip to the Northwest following the first and second readings of the bylaw. Later, when the legal time for the passage of the bylaw had all but expired and council met to give it the third reading, Councillors Murphy and Grice left the room, breaking the quorum and ren-

On the return of Councillor Howe from the Northwest, a determined cf-fort was made by him and Councillors Burnaby and Irwin to arrange a meeting with T. Aird Murray, C.E., the engineer charged with the preparation of the plans, and later this was effected. On Friday night a private conference was held with the engineer behind clos.



Explosion in Wellington Colliery on Vancouver Island -Many Rescued Alive, But Injured.

NANAIMO, B.C., Oct. 5 .- (Special.)-Thirty men are now known to be dead as a result of an explosion in No. 2. Mine Extension of the Wellington Colilery Co., 15 miles from here, at 9 a.m. to-day.

Up to 7 o'clock this evening eight bodies had been recovered, namely: T. Thomas, J. Molineaux, Andrew Moffatt, A. Montague, Thomas O'Connell, W. Davidson, E. Dunn and one uniden-

The work of rescue still continues, but it is not expected that any more bodies will be recovered before more bodies will be recovered before morning, as the portion of the mine where the explosion occurred is badly wrecked, the brattice being torn down, and the rescuing parties are very badly hampered by gas.

The majority of the men killed are old residents and well known.

There were over 50 men entombed, but about 25 were rescued, tho all were more or less burned and injured.

LONDON, Oct. 5 .- Premier Asquith left London unexpectedly this evening for Balmoral, whither he was summoned by the King. The premier left the house of commons in the middle of the debate on the most important

An all-round easing of prices took place at the markets for Cobalt stocks to-day. Fractional declines were introgressalmost thruout the list, resulting in a disappointing market after the better tone of the last week. Fractional declines were not sufficient to so apathetic to render any subject to such issues as were put on offer, while the outside orders were not sufficient to soave the market from the weakness which developed.

Public interest in Cobalt securities at the present is light and the easing which occurred to-day is due to this fact more than to anything else. Brokers complain of the dearth of buying orders, and when any large selling appears, a slump generally wentuates, while a sympathetic tendent in other sections of the market follows any movement in certain issues.

Considerable tradings was done in Beaver and Liftle Nijosing, but in each case the lack of support was pronounced and lower prices were realized. Beaver sold as low as 35 cents, a loss of two points from yesterday's close, while Little Nijosing was down to 20 cents, and closed weak. Slaver Leaf sold as low as 12 cents and closed fractionally higher.




