



THE HOPEFUL GLEANERS' MISSION BAND meets in Church Parlour on the second Wednesday of each month, at 4 o'clock.

MISSIONARY COLLECTORS visit their districts after the first Sabbath of each month, leave a copy of the *Presbyterian Record* with every family of the congregation, and are expected to pay the sums received to the Treasurer on the Wednesday evening following.

THE MISSION COMMITTEE meets at the close of the Prayer Meeting on the first Wednesday after the Communion.

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ADDRESS FROM THE SESSION.

DEAR BRETHREN,—The Session had earnestly hoped that the close of another congregational year would not have found us without a pastor; but since the declination of our call by the Rev. Mr. Smith, of Berwick, no movement has been made in favour of another. We do not doubt, however, that in answer to many supplications the Great Head of the Church will send us a man after His own heart. May the time, if it please Him, not be distant.

We cannot be ignorant of the fact that in many ways, especially in regard to the visitation of the sick, the congregation suffers by vacancy; yet we have an abundant reason for gratitude in the continued good attendance upon Sabbath services, and the acceptable pulpit supply secured; in the success which has attended the Sabbath School and Bible Classes during the year; and in the unimpaired liberality with which the schemes of the Church have been supported. It is very pleasing to find that the Sabbath School and Mission Band show increasing zeal in working for the extension of the Redeemer's Kingdom. The Session hope that the statement of contributions for purposes not congregational contained in this Report will be prayerfully pondered. What is expended on strictly congregational objects is not necessarily any criterion of interest in the Kingdom of God; though the proper maintenance of ordinances among ourselves is certainly an important duty.

During the past twelve months death has made many breaches among us, and we mourn the absence of beloved brethren and earnest and efficient labourers in the Master's vineyard. In no previous year of our history, perhaps, has the obituary list of members in full communion been so large. It is impossible in these few

sentences to speak of these departed friends individually; but one of them filled so large a place in the work and counsels of the congregation, and devoted his exceptional attainments so successfully to the teaching of the Young Men's Bible Class, that the name of William Johnston must be here recorded. May we listen to the voice which says—"whatsoever thy hand findeth to do do it with all thy might."

The Session would earnestly and affectionately remind the brethren that the absence of a pastor lays upon every member of the congregation increased obligation, as it were, for the interest of the body—for mutual edification. Whilst therefore prayer is unceasingly offered that the Lord will send us a true pastor, let none of us neglect to stir up the gifts bestowed upon ourselves; and let not our zeal in any part of Christian duty suffer decline. "Whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things; those things which ye have both learned and received and heard . . . do; and the God of peace shall be with you."

ABSTRACT OF MINUTES OF CONGREGATIONAL MEETING.

WEDNESDAY, January 21, 1885.

The thirty-first annual meeting of the congregation having been duly intimated from the pulpit, was held in the lecture-room on the above date.

The meeting was opened with devotional exercises conducted by the Rev. Dr. Caven, Moderator of the session, after which the meeting was called upon to elect a chairman.

On the motion of Mr. McIntosh, Mr. Thos. Kirkland was elected Chairman, and on motion of Mr. T. O. Anderson, Mr. John Paton was appointed Secretary to the meeting.

On the motion of Mr. H. W. Darling, the minutes of last annual meeting were taken as read, and confirmed. The Secretary of the Managers, Mr. W. E. Long, read the annual report of the Managers for 1884, and the Church Treasurer, Mr. J. Y. Reid, read his financial statement for the past year; in doing which he referred to the church debt having been reduced during the past year to \$17,000. He stated that there are subscriptions to the Building Fund still unpaid and which are considered good, amounting to \$1,095, and he urged upon the new Board of Managers to endeavour to reduce the debt to \$15,000 at as early a date as possible.

It was then moved by Mr. T. O. Anderson, and seconded by Mr. Wm. Gordon, "That the report and the Treasurer's statement be received and adopted, and

that the thanks of the Congregation are due and are hereby tendered to the Managers, and especially to the Treasurer, for the manner in which they have discharged their duties."

Nominations were then called for, to replace the four Managers retiring by rotation, and to fill the vacancies caused by the death of Mr. H. Johnston and the removal from the city of Mr. J. T. Monteath.

The following nominations were received: Messrs. J. Y. Reid, A. McDonald, C. B. Robinson, H. W. Nelson, John Lowden, T. O. Anderson, A. Telfer, A. A. Allan, J. Bruce, T. Clarkson, J. O. Anderson, J. Bink, J. Young, Robt. Darling, H. W. Darling, John Paton, Jas. Peattie, Wm. Gordon and Dr. McPhedran.

The Chairman requested Messrs. Woodbridge, Douglas, Nairn and Carrie to act as scrutineers in taking the vote.

The vote having been taken by ballot, the Scrutineers reported the following as duly-elected Managers: Messrs. A. McDonald, J. Y. Reid, C. B. Robinson, John Lowden, H. W. Darling and James Peattie.

Mr. C. B. Robinson moved, seconded by Mr. Wm. Gordon, "That the Auditors for last year, viz.: Messrs. H. W. Nelson and John Paton, be appointed Auditors for the current year." Carried.

It was then moved by Mr. Kerr, seconded by Mr. R. Kilgour, "That the thanks of the congregation are due and are hereby tendered to Mr. Douglas, the leader of the Choir, and as some token of appreciation for his valuable services the Managers are hereby authorized to pay him the sum of three hundred dollars." Carried.

It was moved by Mr. Darling, seconded by Mr. Nairn, "That Dr. Caven, Mr. Kerr and Mr. Kirkland be a committee to prepare and print the Annual Report of the Church." Carried.

On the motion of Mr. Nairn, a vote of thanks was passed to the members of the Choir for the help they had rendered in connection with the service of praise in the Church. Carried.

Dr. McPhedran referred to the imperfect heating and

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ventilation of the church, and suggested that an improvement might be made in this connection.

Mr. Darling described the system in operation in the church, and stated that it is the best the Committee on Building could hear of unless steam were employed, which would be much more expensive.

The Chairman stated that no system would work well unless properly looked after, and suggested that the Managers appoint a small committee to take charge of this department.

Mr. Woodbridge gave notice that at the next annual meeting he would introduce a motion to the effect that the six retiring Managers shall not be eligible for re-election for the following year.

Mr. Darling moved that the Chairman vacate the chair, and that it be taken by Mr. Reid.

This having been done, Mr. Darling moved, seconded by Mr. McIntosh, "That the thanks of the meeting are due and are hereby tendered to Mr. Kirkland for his conduct in the chair." Carried.

Mr. Reid conveyed the thanks of the meeting to Mr. Kirkland, who responded appropriately.

At the request of Mr. Reid, the Rev. Mr. Simpson then closed the meeting with prayer.





REVENUE.

CONTRIBUTIONS FOR THE SUPPORT OF ORDINANCES are made in three ways: (1) Weekly Offerings, in envelopes placed on the collection plate each Sabbath; (2) Quarterly Subscriptions; (3) Contributions placed on the collection plate. The sittings are all free, no pew rents being charged to any one. The first method has been adopted by the greater part of the congregation, and the Managers greatly prefer that it should be adopted by all.

ENVELOPES are given at the beginning of each quarter, and on the allocation of sittings; and any one not now receiving envelopes, and desiring to contribute in this way, is requested to give his or her name to any of the Managers, who will attend to the matter. Those occupying sittings are expected to contribute according to their means.



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MANAGERS' REPORT, 1884.

In presenting their Annual Report, the Managers feel that there is great cause for thankfulness to God, that, despite the very unfavourable position in which the church has been placed during the past year in the absence of a settled pastor (a want that has been felt in every branch of the church work), they are still able to report the temporal affairs of the congregation to be in a satisfactory condition, and, while deeply regretting that the vacancy occasioned by the departure of our late beloved pastor from our midst has not been filled, they know that God is ordering all things aright, and will, in His own good time, send us that spiritual guide so necessary for our edification and comfort.

It is gratifying to notice, by reference to the Treasurer's Statement, that there has been an increase in the ordinary revenue as compared with last year.

The Building Fund has been reduced by \$2,000, the greater portion of which was paid out of ordinary revenue, leaving the debt upon the Church edifice at the present time \$17,000, bearing interest at six per cent. per annum. The desire expressed in last report that the amount might be reduced during the year to \$15,000 has not been altogether fulfilled, but as there are subscriptions still to a considerable amount outstanding, which will doubtless be paid during 1885, we again express the earnest hope that, before another annual meeting is held, the looked-for reduction will have been accomplished.

There are at present no outstanding liabilities, with the exception of a balance due our Treasurer of \$132.51.

For the first time in many years the numbers of the office-bearers of the Church have been broken in upon by death. It is but a few days since the remains of our esteemed brother, Mr. Wm. Johnston, were carried to the grave, followed by the heartfelt grief of every one who knew him. Although he had only been upon the Board of Management for about a year, he had in other capacities taken a large and most important share in the work of the congregation, to the members of which he had endeared himself by his unassuming piety and gentle bearing, and who deeply mourn his loss. All his work bore testimony to his sound judgment and liberal culture, the latter having been obtained under circumstances alike creditable to his strong will and indomitable industry, and to the most casual observer of his career it was apparent the very highest positions in almost any sphere of labour to which he might choose to devote himself would have been speedily within his reach had it pleased God to spare him. He leaves behind a record of unwavering faith in the love and merits of the Master he delighted to serve, and of steady, earnest, and efficient work in His cause.

The Managers have also been deprived of the services of another of their number by the removal from the city of Mr. J. T. Monteath, who had for a length of time

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faithfully filled positions of usefulness in connection with both the church and Sabbath school.

Mention has also to be made of the death of Mr. Thos. Miller, who for so many years performed the duty of church officer and who was very suddenly called away, in May last.

The Managers retiring by rotation are Messrs. Reid, Darling, McDonald and Lowden. Two others will of necessity require to be elected to fill the vacancies before mentioned.

The year which has just closed has not been particularly eventful in the history of our Sabbath school. The work has continued to go on in the usual quiet way which has hitherto marked its career; and while we may not be able to chronicle much material progress, we have certainly cause for devout gratitude to God who hath filled our hearts with food and gladness, and given to us all things richly to enjoy. There have not been wanting indications of progress in spiritual things—the Lord hath been mindful of us in this regard, and

He will bless us still. There is the testimony of many amongst us—of teachers and scholars alike—that the Sabbath school has been to them a blessed time and place, and that in Christian fellowship and study of the Word of God together there has been a good secured that the world cannot give nor take away.

We find that the number of scholars' names on the roll-book is as follows:—*The Infant Class*, which is still under the care of Miss Caven and Miss Inglis, has a roll of 30 male and 28 female scholars—total 58. *The Intermediate Classes*, taught in the main room up stairs, have a roll of 88 male and 83 female scholars—total 171. *The Advanced Class* for young women, taught by Mr. Kirkland, numbers 55: and the class for young men, taught by Mr Johnston, numbers 30. This makes the total number of names on the roll 314—showing a decrease of 33 from the previous year's Report. This decrease, when we consider the present circumstances of the congregation having been without a pastor for about fifteen months, is not large, and it will also be observed that the attendance on the infant class has not been nearly as large as in some previous years.

The number of teachers' names on the roll is 16 male and 17 female—the same number as in last year's Report.

Besides the infant class and the advanced classes, there are 14 male and 14 female intermediate classes being taught at present in the schools.

It is matter surely for devout thankfulness to God that amid any changes that have occurred amongst us during the past year, the year was suffered to close without any teacher or scholar being removed by death. Not a few of the scholars, and some of the teachers as well, had been laid aside by sickness—many of whom we are glad to say have entirely recovered or are nearly well, and whose presence amongst us we devoutly pray may be continued for many years to come. There are those, however, who are still or were connected with the school on whom God's hand is laid, and in regard to whom we feel anxious. He who is the tender Shepherd

It is with the most profound sorrow we have to announce what by this time is already all too well known to you—the death of our much esteemed and beloved brother Mr. Johnston. While this Report is presumed to be simply a brief record of the past year's work amongst us, and of the way in which God has led us; and while, as we have just said, the year was suffered to close without the angel of death calling hence any of our number, yet this year on which we have been suffered to enter has at its opening bid us look on the changed countenance, and to weep with the sorrowing parents, sisters and brother of our dear friend and fellow-worker. The event has come so suddenly we feel that words fail us to utter all our thoughts, and that silence is all but forced upon us in this trying dispensation. It is but a few days ago since we grasped his friendly hand, and heard the ring of his cheery voice, and little dreamt it was the last time we should speak to each other on this side the grave. Oh, how solemn such a providence!

All who knew Mr. Johnston knew him only to love him. It was felt by himself for some considerable time, and quite evident to very many of his friends he was far from well. Living as he had done a life of the busiest kind—doing more work mentally and physically the last ten years of that life than many men do in twice the time—it was hardly to be wondered at that a rest of some kind was inevitable, but little did we think the rest was to come so soon and in this form.

It is not necessary here to indicate anything like all the points of heart and life, of faithfulness and truth that characterized our dear brother as he passed in and out amongst us. Known as he was, not only to this congregation and Sabbath school and to the city, but to an exceedingly wide circle of friends throughout all

Canada, he was known only to be a man of unflinching integrity and Christian service—a man who had he lived would not only have been an honoured and faithful citizen of the Dominion; but, what is of more account, a devout follower of the Lord Jesus Christ. It was because he loved his Saviour he sought to do good to his fellow-men, and whether the service rendered was directly to his God, his country, or among his home circle, it was rendered wholly, we believe, in the name and for the sake of Christ. Like the apostle of old whose life and mission is our study during these weeks, he also could truthfully say “to me to live is Christ—living or dying I am the Lord’s.”

We bow, as we can only do, with submission to the Divine will. It is a great loss to us as a Sabbath school—his departure never to return—a very great loss to this country so dear to him, and an almost irreparable loss to the home in which he lived and loved so well.

What can we say! What can we do! We are as dumb before God. “Even so, Father, for so it seemeth good in Thy sight.” “Thy will be done.”

In consequence of Mr. Johnston’s illness it had been arranged in the meantime to transfer the care of his class to Mr. Kirkland, and that the male and female advanced Bible Classes should meet together at the same hour, and we hope in the coming weeks to see a very largely increased attendance.

We are indebted, not a little, to the kindness of Mr. Houston who took the charge of Mr. Johnston’s class on several occasions during the past year. Mr. Johnston, through his incessant hard work in connection with his profession, had cause to be absent occasionally from the city on the Sabbath, and on every such occasion very much to his regret, for he was a faithful teacher and loved his class.

He was so earnest and devoted in all his work, not only in connection with the Sabbath school, but in all Church work in which he took part—so unobtrusive, yet indefatigable in his every endeavour to do what he could to further specially the interests of our school—we felt, in parting with him, we were about to experience a loss in many ways which we could not easily bear. We commended him, and forget not to commend him still, to the gracious care and comfort of the Master of the Vineyard, and trust that in the future, more even than in the past, he may be the humble but honoured disciple of the Lord he loved so well.

Meetings for business have been held during the year as they were found necessary, and the usual devotional meeting, held at the close of the school each Sabbath, has been found more than ever a blessed season of spiritual communion.

The anniversary of the school was held on the 4th of January, last year, and was, as usual, a very successful meeting. The Rev. Mr. McEwen and W. B. McMurrich, Esq., addressed the meeting, and a selected number of the teachers and scholars sang a number of hymns very nicely under the leadership of our faithful friend Mr. Douglas, the leader of the Church Choir.

The usual summer gathering of the Sabbath school scholars, with their parents and friends, was held in the month of July last, at Victoria Park, and proved to be one of the most attractive and best attended meetings of the kind we ever had; everything passed off very pleasantly indeed, nothing occurring in any way to mar the enjoyment of the day. The scheme of lessons principally in use amongst the classes has been that of the International Series, and, as in past years, has been found to answer admirably.

There have been the usual reviews of the lessons during the four quarters of the year conducted by the Superintendent.

Excepting the advanced classes, all the scholars are

supplied monthly with the illustrated papers they have been in the habit of receiving for some years past. These papers in turn again have been doing good service, many of the scholars returning them after having read them to the Librarians; and quite a large quantity, with a considerable number of books from the Library, that had also been well read, were sent to a Mission school on William Street, in this city, this school being under the care of the Central Presbyterian Church.

We also sent to one of the Mission stations in the County of Bruce in connection with our Church, during the past summer, about 40 volumes and 300 children's papers which were thankfully received and would be doubtless put to good use. We have still some volumes and papers on hand which will, on some fitting opportunity, be devoted in the same way.

The Librarians report 750 volumes in the Library, and that the same are now being very generally used by the scholars and many of the teachers as well; the Library is evidently very much appreciated by a very large number in the school. Some 65 new books were added to the Library during the past year. Messrs. Gibson and Douglas are to be congratulated on the care and attention which they devote to their duties, and we could not very well have much better service. It is an important part of the work, and it is quite evident they study to do their work faithfully. At the last meeting of the teachers held for business purposes, it was unanimously decided to change the hymn-book used in the Sabbath school; the book in use last year, and for some years past, being the same as is now used in the church.

The book agreed upon, and considered as the most suitable to be used hereafter, is the collection of hymns published by the Assembly's Committee for use in Sabbath schools. We believe this will be found to be a change for the better.

At the beginning of last year and at the request of the President of the Mission Band, missionary boxes were distributed to a number of the scholars, and in this way

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the Missionary Fund of that useful society was increased to the extent of \$22.25. The Treasurer of our Association reports that there have been collected altogether in the school for missionary purposes as follow:—

It is a tribute for the life Thou hast given, for the blood Thou hast shed and the joyous hopes Thou hast inspired to cheer and direct our mortal pilgrimage. Meek spring of heavenly wisdom, boundless ocean of universal, ardent, unprovoked, and undiscouraged charity, pour Thy Spirit into my breast and into the breasts of all Thy servants whom I here address. Teach them to interest themselves in this blessed work as becomes men who are distinguished by Thy venerable name and honoured by the ministration of Thy glorious Gospel! Baptize us all with the fire of that love which is stronger than death! In many ways the year which has passed has been one of the most successful in the history of our Association. The circle which our membership embraces has grown wider, the interest in our business has been maintained and heightened, and the work of the Association has been participated in more generally by the members themselves. It is perhaps not too much to say that the Association has now come to play a not unimportant part in securing that degree of cohesion and unity, especially among the younger members of the congregation, which it is so desirable to obtain. Particularly under the circumstances in which the Church is at present placed has the influence of the Association been felt in this direction, and it is matter for thankfulness that the Association has been enabled to take even a small share in the work of preventing the disintegrating results which might have been feared would follow from the continued want of a pastor.

The Association, while confining itself mainly to the intellectual and moral improvement of its members, has

also undertaken to render some assistance in an object which the congregation at large has taken in hand, viz.: the procuring of a church organ. The results of its efforts, which it is hoped will be substantial, will be announced in next year's report.

Along with the congregation in general, the Association was called upon during the past year to suffer a great loss in the removal by death of Mr. William Johnston, whom it pleased God to summon to a higher sphere. Mr. Johnston had filled the offices both of Vice-President and President of the Association, in which he took a deep interest, and his great and invaluable services were ever cheerfully and zealously rendered. While mourning his loss we shall cherish his memory with affection.

During January, February, March and April of 1884, seven meetings, and during the part of the present season prior to the close of the year, three meetings were held. Two open meetings were held, one on April 15, at the close of last season, and one on 23rd December, 1844, the latter being in aid of the Organ Fund.

One of the principal features in the programme of the Association for the present term is a series of essays upon celebrated men and women by members of the Association, both ladies and gentlemen. Judging from those which have been read so far, the series promises to be a success.

Our membership is now sixty-four, and the average attendance at the meetings has been about fifty.

The financial position of the Association is also satisfactory, the Treasurer reporting a balance on hand at the close of last season of \$40.37.

REPORT.

In the good providence of God we are permitted to make another annual statement of work done during the past year for missionary and educational objects. Since last we met in this capacity death has been amongst us, and some who took a deep interest in this society are with us no longer—they have gone to their rest and reward. "Blessed are the dead who die in the

Lord, they rest from their labours and their works do follow them."

The amount received from collectors in monthly instalments was \$1,479.73, and paid direct to the treasurers, including collection at the last annual meeting, \$843.57. The collection for Home Missions at the two diets of worship yesterday amounted to \$127, which after deducting the usual Sabbath collection, leaves \$100, adding to these sums interest received for moneys deposited during a part of the year, \$32.20, the entire revenue of the Association will be seen to be \$2,503.15.

Of the amount thus reported there was contributed specially: For Augmentation of Ministers' Stipends, \$509; for Foreign Missions, \$10 by Mrs. Wm. Kerr, \$6 by Mrs. Peter Christie; \$14.60 by a Friend, per Mr. Reid, for French Evangelization; and for the McAll Mission, Paris, \$30 by Mrs. George Smith.

Deducting these amounts, and \$47.65 paid for *Records*, which are distributed by the collectors, there remains, exclusive of yesterday's collection, \$1,785.90 to be allocated among those Schemes of the Church for which they have been contributed.

Your Committee desire to submit the following allocations of the amount for the approval of the congregation. For the Assembly's Home Mission Fund, \$735.90; Foreign Mission Fund, \$230; College Fund, \$400; French Evangelization, \$100; Manitoba College, \$100; University Scholarship, \$60; Augmentation Fund, \$160.

The amounts mentioned do not show all that the congregation have contributed for Missions during the year. The Sabbath school gave \$304.70; the Hopeful Gleaners' Mission Band, \$350. Assembly's Fund, \$22.50; Presbytery and Synod Fund, \$47.65; Aged Ministers' Fund, \$40; Ministers' Widows' Fund, \$20; Knox College Endowment Fund, \$2,543.33; Manitoba College Debt, per Principal King, \$1,430; The Murray-Mitchell Auxillary, \$137. Adding these sums together it will be found that the whole amount contributed by the congregation for missionary and educational purposes is \$7,398.33.

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
