

SHOULD MAKE FOR PEACE

According to her own accounting, the war has cost Russia the colossal sum of \$1,050,000,000. This does not include what she has lost in territory or domestic disturbances, but simply the expenses involved in her military and naval operations. It is interesting to compare this with the strain upon the resources of France as a result of the France-German war. The losses incident to that conflict, the commune and the cession of the eastern districts to Germany have been estimated at between three and four billions of dollars. Comparatively a small share of this is to be credited to the bare cost of the war itself, because that lasted but a few weeks, while the conflict that Russia waged was continued over many months. So Russia would not seem to be in as bad a condition as was France, even including all that she has suffered in her numerous and destructive domestic outbreaks. On the other hand, while she has more collossal natural resources than France, they are largely undeveloped, and she lacks the developers; that thrifty, conservative and patriotic class that came to the rescue of their country in distress with their savings. Moreover, while Count Witte might steer as firm a course as did M. Thiers if he had as free a hand, there's the rub. Thiers made his people optimistic. He won their confidence at a critical time and Witte might do the same thing were he not carrying that old man-of-the-sea, "the system," still on his shoulders. Russia has opened the twentieth century with an object lesson that should make for peace through all its coming years.


