

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## LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

### UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,

As a opted at a General Meeting of the Society, held in the City of Toronto, on the third day of August, 1855; and amended at General Meetings held on the 13th day of April, 1880, and 18th day of November, 1887.

[UNDER THE ACT OF INCORPORATION.]

ARTICLE I. This Society shall be denominated the "UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY," having the same object in view as the British and Foreign Bible Society—that is, the circulation of the Bible, without note or comment.

II. This Society shall endeavour to unite all Bible Societies in the Province, and to concentrate their operations, in order to give more efficiency to the whole.

III. This Society shall maintain, in the City of Toronto, a general depôt of Bibles and Testaments, from which all Societies in connection with it shall be supplied with the Scriptures at the lowest price at which they can be afforded.

IV. The business of the Society shall be carried on by a Board of Directors' to consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer and Secretaries, and a representative from each Branch, as provided in Article V., together with twenty clerical and twenty lay members, so selected as to give the Board always, as before, a representative character as regards the principal religious bodies interested in the work of the Society, five of whom shall form a quorum. The five clerical and five lay members who shall have attended the least number of meetings of the Board shall not be eligible for re-election, except in cases where the non-attendance has arisen from illness or absence from the country, in which cases the Board may nominate such member or members for re-election.

V. Each Branch Society shall be entitled to a representative on the General Board. The President of the Branch shall be *ex-officio* such representative, or any other resident member whom the Committee may appoint as a substitute, who shall be a member of such Branch.

VI. At any meeting of the Directors, the President, or, in his absence, the Vice-President first upon the list then present, and in absence of such Vice-President, the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be chosen for that purpose, shall preside.

VII. Each person paying annually one dollar shall be a member of this Society; and persons paying fifty dollars at any one time, either to this Society or to any of the Societies in connection therewith, or through them to the British and Foreign Bible Society, or who may have rendered important services, shall, at the discretion of the Directors, be declared Life Members.

<sup>•</sup> VIII. Each Life Member of this Society shall be furnished with a certificate of membership, under the corporate seal of the Society, duly signed by the President and Secretaries.

IX. The Board of Directors for the time being shall have the appointment of the Permanent Secretary, Agents, Depositary, Colporteurs, Bookkeeper, and Assistants of the Society, and the fixing of all salaries and allowances; and shall have the superintendence and management of all the property, real and personal, of the and the requisit X. third T

of the Corporation, as well as the management and control of its general affairs and the appropriation of its funds, with full power to enact such rules as may be requisite to effect the objects contemplated by the Act of Incorporation.

X. The Board of Directors shall meet for the transaction of business on the third Tuesday of each month, at the hour of 7.30 p.m. Special meetings may be called by the Secretaries at any time, at the request of the President, or of any three Directors.

XI. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall be held on the second Wednesday in the month of May in each and every year, or at such other time as the Directors, for the time being, may deem best for the interests of the Society; when the Officers and Directors for the ensuing year shall be chosen; a report of the operations of the Society during the foregoing year shall be presented, together with the Treasurer's and Depositary's accounts duly audited. Special general meetings may be called at any time by the Board.

XII. In case of the death or removal of any Director or Officer during the year, the Board shall at the next ensuing meeting thereof fill such vacancy.

XIII. No alteration of these By-laws shall be made except at a General Meeting of the Society, and after one month's notice of the proposed alteration has been given to the Board.

#### RESOLUTION PASSED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS RELATIVE TO GRANTS TO SUNDAY-SCHOOLS, SEPTEMBER, 1878.

That in all applications for grants of Bibles to Sunday-schools, the applicant be requested to furnish the Secretaries with an account of the state of the school; the number of scholars and teachers; the amount of funds at the disposal of the managers; who are its officers; and why it is necessary to make such application; all of which should in every case be certified by a minister of the Gospel, or some person of known respectability. And further, this Boaro recommends that the Secretaries make grants in future only to destitute settlements; reporting the same to the next General Meeting of the Board of Directors.

#### REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE RELATIVE TO "GRANTS TO SUNDAY-SCHOOLS," ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS, 18TH JUNE, 1888.

That the forms of application for grants, already in use, as authorized by the Board in October, 1867, and September, 1878, regarding Sunday-schools, be continued, although it is right to state that the superintendents of schools have not availed themselves of the privileges offered in the form of September, 1878, to any extent.

In the opinion of your Committee, mission churches and schools, under denominational auspices, are not in general to be considered fit objects for the gratuities of the Society; but missions among Indians, Jews, French-Canadians, Chinese, Italians, etc., though under denominational auspices, are not to be taken as coming under this general rule.

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### FORTY-NINTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

## UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,

SUBMITTED AT THE ANNIVERSARY MEETING HELD AT TORONTO, WEDNESDAY, 29TH MAY, 1889.

By the kindly Providence that for nearly half a century has guided the movements of the Upper Canada Bible Society, we are brought, as directors of its work, to the time when it is customary to review the way by which the Lord has been pleased to lead us during the past year.

The retrospect, on this the forty-ninth anniversary of our existence as a representative organization, is fitted to inspire our hearts with gratitude and praise.

Our "work of faith and labour of love " has been crowned with a large measure of success, and in pausing to consider the past, we are led, with one of old, to exclaim "Great is Thy faithfulness," and with one heart we would inscribe the word "Ebenezer" as best expressing our recognition of the Divine assistance, which, as workers together with Him, we have experienced.

It is a source of great satisfaction to us—and will be to all who are interested in the advancement of the Lord's kingdom—to note the fact that though changes take place in the aspect of the religious world, and in the political relations of nations, the claims of the Bible Societies, organized as they are for the distribution of the Word of God, continue to be well sustained.

The nations are learning that material progress and glory are inseparably connected with an open Bible and the acceptance of the truths it contains. Individuals, not only in Christian, but in pagan lands, are discovering that the longings of the human soul for life and immortality can only be satisfied by personal contact with the once crucified but now risen Saviour, verifying the truth of God's word, that "Righteousness exalteth a nation."

The intellectual and the ignorant alike are subjects of the transforming influence of the Word of God, and to-day it is enshrined in the hearts of millions, and is more universally revered than ever before.

During the past eighty-five years 197,767,688 copies of the Scriptures, and portions thereof, have been issued by the British and Foreign Bible Society, and kindred societies in Europe, British India and America. Tribes and peoples, speaking nearly three hundred different languages and dialects, are now supplied with the Word of God in their own tongue. And our prayer is that the Word of God may thus continue to "have free course and be glorified."

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A dispensation of the Word of God has been committed unto us—the time is short, there is much to be done, the field is the world; on every hand the doors are opening for the reception of the truth. The Lord's command, as well as the example of Christian fathers and brethren in the parent and sister Bible Societies, should animate us, and the promised presence of the Saviour, "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world," should cheer and stimulate us to greater zeal and effort in the dissemination of the Holy Scriptures.

To many the present appears as a critical moment—the churches of the reformation in our Dominion have reached a crisis in their history, but while some are fearful, and are noting with serious apprehension the encroachments of ecclesiastical claims upon civil liberty, those who implicitly trust in the promises as revealed in the Word, while using every energy in defending the principle of religious liberty, calmly look for the gradual unfolding of the eternal purposes of God. One of these purposes is the drawing together of the evangelical churches in a closer bond of common sympathy and action, as foreshadowed by our Saviour's prayer, "That they all may be one; as Thou, Father, art in Me, and I in Thee, that they also may be one in us, that the world may believe that Thou has sent Me."

For the accomplishment of this great work, let the year upon which we are entering be one of more earnest and believing prayer, accompanied by a more steady abiding in Christ; then may we expect that the Word of God, which is the sword of the Spirit, will be mighty in our hands to the discomfiture of every form of opposition.

We are pleased to be able to state that no breach has been made in the directorate by death during the past year. We would, however, refer to the sudden demise of the Rev. Canon O'Meara, LL.D, of Port Hope, as announced in our January *Recorder*. Dr. O'Meara was an old and valued friend of the Bible Society, and rendered important service in the interests of Christianity among the Indians by his translation of the New Testament into the Ojibway language, which is still in circulation,

With regret we would also mention that in consequence of feeble health, Herbert Mortimer, Esq., an old and faithful officer of the Society, has resigned the position of Minute Secretary. Mr. Mortimer still continues a member of the Board, having been nominated as a Vice-President, and we hope soon again to see him at our meetings, and have the benefit of his counsel.

#### AGENCY AND VISITATION OF BRANCHES.

As in former years, those Branches desiring assistance in conducting their anniversary meetings were visited and addressed by one of the Society's agents.

Several Branches assumed the conduct of their meetings, and with a very few exceptions all have reported successful meetings and liberal contributions to the funds of the Society; and, with a view to economize, we would recommend that more of the stronger Branches should undertake the charge and make their own arrangements for holding their annual meetings, sending out their collectors, etc., etc.

It is very desirable that every Branch should make a report to Toronto at least once a year, if possible before the 31st of March, as our fiscal year closes at that date.

We regret the necessity of repeating that in some few cases communications have not had the attention desired, causing delay in completing

arrangements for visitation by the agents. Again we would endeavour to impress on the officers the necessity of prompt attention to this matter. As a rule, however, the secretaries and agents report very favourably of the faithfulness and assiduity of the officers of the Branches, for which we would tender our warmest commendation.

Twenty-three new Branches have been organized during the past year in the following named places, viz.: In Ontario—Pontypool, Zephyr, Elmvale, Coldwater, Humber Summit, Desboro, Markdale, Southampton, Allenford, Walton, Whitechurch, Riverdale and Glenmorris. In Manitoba—Oak Lake, Glenboro, Virden, Carberry and Neepawa. In the Northwest Territory—Indian Head and Wolseley. In British Columbia— Nanaimo, Kamloops and Chilliwhack. Depositories have also been opened at the most suitable places for the sale of the Scriptures.

There are now 440 Branches, most of which have Depositories for the sale of Scriptures, and 26 separate Depositories in connection with the Society.

By special request individual Directors of the Toronto Board visited a few of our larger branches, and we anticipate that much good will result from this personal contact with the officers and members of the Branches, and that the interest in the work of the Society may be stimulated.

Under the management of the Rev. R. Cade, of Sault Ste. Marie, a very enthusiastic meeting was held there lately, new officers were appointed, and new life and vigour will characterize the work of the Society in this important locality.

At Parry Sound, William Beatty, Esq., LL. B., kindly undertook the charge of their meeting there, the particulars of which have not reached us yet, but no doubt we will have a favourable report of the Branch and Depository.

The reports of the Agents invariably speak of the kindness and courtesy of the friends of the Society at the various places visited.

#### COLPORTAGE.

Our special work of Colportage has been carried on during the past year with continued zeal and vigour by Colporteurs Messrs. Taylor, Cromar, Dean, Lockhart, Sinclair, Armstrong, Clarke and McLeod, covering portions of the Counties of Frontenac, Lennox, Addington, Peterborough, Victoria, Ontario, Simcoe, Muskoka, Grey, Oxford and Norfolk, in Ontario; also in Manitoba and in Victoria, British Columbia. The work of colportage has been prosecuted in towns and villages, on the farm and in mechanics' shops, among railway men and lumbermen, &c., going from house to house, calling on the "well to do" and the poorer classes alike; and one of our colporteurs has actually invaded the bar-room, where he came in contact with a number of lumbermen returning from their winter's work in the woods, to whom he sold a number of Bibles which were carried home to their families. Hotel dining-rooms and kitchens, also shops and factories, where both males and females are employed, were also visited and many Bibles were purchased, some for personal use -others, in large print, to be sent to aged parents, and some pocket Bibles for brothers or sisters at the old home-in many cases only a part of the purchase was paid in cash, but almost invariably the balance was forthcoming after pay-day. Occasionally Roman Catholics purchase copies of the Scriptures and seem very glad to get them, while others, apparently in dread of being seen talking with the colporteur, refuse and close the door in his face. Questions are sometimes raised by the friends and support. ers of the Bible Society as to the necessity or expediency of our colpor-

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teurs visiting localities which are supposed to be fully supplied with the Scriptures; but let us note the fact that many families during the year are found to be entirely destitute of the Scriptures. Let us also consider that this house to house visitation is the only means by which it can be ascertained whether the occupants are possessed of that blessed book or not. A good house or a respectable neighbourhood is no guarantee of the character or condition of the people residing there, and if there are families in Ontario who have not the Word of God, surely it is the work of the Bible Society to seek them out and supply them with the "Bread and Water of Life." And if only one family or individual is thus brought into contact with the "Light," who can tell the result of the colporteur's visit or put a value on the good it may accomplish? Eternity alone will reveal it. "I say unto you, that likewise joy shall be in heaven over one sinner that repenteth more than over ninety and nine just persons which need no repentance."

Sometimes the colporteurs, from various causes, become quite discouraged, and are almost ready to give up, but their knowledge of the need of this work, their realization of the presence of the Master, and desire for the eternal welfare of their tellow men, has influenced and persuaded them to renewed vigour and purpose. The work of the colporteur is no sinecure, and it behoves us as friends of Christ to pray for those earnest Christian men, and encourage them in their arduous work, carrying the glad tidings to their fellow-men.

Several of the Fall Fairs in Ontario, including the Exhibition in Toronto, were visited by our colporteurs, and a large number of copies of the Scriptures were sold in different languages and in various styles.

A colporteur was engaged for three months in Victoria, B.C.; his labours were not very successful, at least so far as sales were concerned, but we earnestly trust that the hope expressed in his final report may be fully realized. He says, "I fervently hope that the work done the last three months will be successful in the hands of Almighty God in leading some to be more diligent in reading the Bible."

As mentioned in last year's report, our colporteur in Manitoba reported that the greatest demand of the settlers there was for general religious literature, the importance of which was strongly urged on the Board by the officers of the Branch at Winnipeg. After due consideration by the Board, a temporary arrangement was made with the Upper Canada Religious Tract and Book Society whereby their colporteurs were to carry our Bibles and Testaments, and offer them for sale at our regular prices, in conjunction with their religious literature, in this far-off and sparsely populated country. For this purpose the Board appropriated the sum of \$500, but at the close of the year it was found that only \$377.27 was required as our proportion of the expense. This arrangement, as carried out, was considered satisfactory, and the Board has decided to further aid in the extension of colportage work, and with that view, has appropriated \$1,000, by means of which one or two additional colporteurs may be employed in Manitoba and the North-West during the current year.

#### MANITOBA.

The Branches in Northern Manitoba have been visited by the Rev. J. Dyke, of Winnipeg. The returns are not all in yet, but we anticipate satisfactory results. Handsome remittances have been received from Winnipeg, Brandon, Emerson, etc. New Branches have been formed at Carberry and Neepawa by the Rev. J. Dyke.

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#### THE NORTH-WEST TERRITORIES.

The Rev. Alfred Andrews, of Qu 'Appelle, agent for the Society, has revisited the Branches and Depositories in the North-West, including those Branches organized by him last year. He has formed new Branches at Indian Head and Wolseley, also at Virden, Oak Lake and Glenboro in Southern Manitoba. His visitation of this territory, including 19 Branches occupied 47 days, during which time he travelled 2,332 miles—2,152 by railway and 180 by trails. Mr. Andrews has again performed excellent service for the Master, and increased the interest in the work of the Society in that hopeful section of our Dominion. His report closes as follows, viz., "It cannot be doubted that the work of our Society is one of the most important factors in building up a strong and vigorous commonwealth. Apart from the books we have supplied, I do not know of a dozen Bibles having been sold in the Territories during the past year."

The zeal manifested by the Branches, and the subscriptions already received, augur well for the future. Depositories for the sale of the Scriptures have been organized in connection with the Branches, and others are proposed.

#### BRITISH COLUMBIA.

The Rev. P. McF. McLeod, of Victoria, having been appointed agent for this Society in the Province of British Columbia, has organized new Branches at Nanaimo, Kamloops and Chilliwhack. He also visited the older Branches at New Westminster and Vancouver, and addressed their anniversary meetings, also assisted at the annual meeting at Victoria. Mr. McLeod is very sanguine regarding the prospects of all those Branches for the future.

The Rev. R. Jamieson felt constrained to resign the agency in this Province in consequence of advancing years, and in recognition of his important and valuable services rendered to this Society, without remuneration, the Board of Directors at Toronto has elected Mr. Jamieson a Life Member; and William James Armstrong, Esq., President of the Branch at New Westminster, having made a special donation of \$50 to the funds of the Society, was also declared a Life Member. Encouraging remittances have been received from Victoria, New Westminster, etc.

#### MONTREAL AUXILIARY.

The donations from our Branches to assist in colportage work among the French were duly transmitted to the officers of the Montreal-Auxiliary and thankfully acknowledged.

This Auxiliary has 212 Branches and Depositories. The total issues of the Scriptures during the past year were 18,591 copies. On the whole the officers report a year of quiet success.

#### OTTAWA AUXILIARY.

The Ottawa Auxiliary Bible Society has 78 Branches. Four colporteurs were engaged, two of them speaking French. Three thousand eight hundred and eighty-two volumes of the Scriptures were disposed of by the colporteurs during the past year.

Rev. R. Gavin, Secretary, states that the colporteur who visited the shanties during the winter met many lumbermen who were eager to receive the Scriptures. He also acknowledges, with sincere thanks, the dona-

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tion transmitted by us from our Branch at Elmwood to aid in the work of colportage among the lumbermen and French Canadians.

The total issues from the Depository were 9,994 volumes. The income was \$10,700, being \$1,000 in advance of last year; so our friends at Ottawa have cause to thank God and take courage.

#### QUEBEC AUXILIARY.

Through the liberality of the friends and supporters of this Society we have been enabled to assist our sister Society in Quebec in her colportage work among the French Canadians to the extent of \$1884.42.

The Rev. Edward J. Stobo, District Secretary and General Agent for Quebec, writes to our secretaries dated 7th May, 1889, as follows :

"I have great pleasure in forwarding to you the following resolution passed at our regular monthly meeting on the evening of the 29th of April and carried unanimously, viz.: Moved by Robert Brodie, Esq., and seconded by the Rev. John Harper, Ph. D.

"That the Committee of the Quebec Auxiliary Bible Society beg to place on record their grateful appreciation of the liberality of the Upper Canada Bible Society and Branches towards the work of Bible distribution in and around the City of Quebec, and the consequent extending of evangelical influence among the French speaking population of that dis-trict, and at the same time beg to assure their co-labourers in this work in Ontario that the large amount which has been placed at the disposal of the Quebec Society will materially assist in the unmediate use about to be made of it in bringing to many a benighted heart the knowledge of the truth as it is contained in God's Word."

"We have just appointed Madame Grenier to act as Bible woman, and hope for the best results. We are also about to appoint two additional colporteurs to labour in the outlying districts. "I trust the interest awakened in our work will not soon wane but wax

stronger as the days go by. Oh, that we realized its importance, and how it calls for prayer and heroic endeavour .- Pray for Quebec."

#### FINANCES.

The total income of the Upper Canada Bible Society from all sources for the year ending March 31st, 1889, amounts to \$32,618.56, being an increase of \$82.16 over the previous year.

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#### THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

The Annual Meeting of our Parent Society was held in Exeter Hall, London, England, on Wednesday, May 1st. The Earl of Harrowby, President, occupied the chair.

The following extract is taken from the Record, London, 3rd May :

"The Bible Society's gathering offered an example at once of the vicissitudes of the platform and of the power of a great cause to live and flourish notwithstanding. Two of the expected speakers, the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Earl of Carnarvon, were kept away, just as last year Mr. Spurgeon was. Sir Richard Temple, however, came to the rescue, and spoke with intelligent interest of the Society's work. But if the executive were unfortunate in their loss of speakers of name and fame at home, they were well served by the even more important persons, their fellow-workers in the field abroad. The two addresses of Mr. Macgowan, of Amoy, and of Mr. Young, from the Hudson's Bay Territory, were of singular interest and value. As examples of victory over intellectual difficulties there can hardly be found two more striking instances than are afforded by the fact that the "Divine Library" has been made intelligible to men as far sundered in type, in temper, and in mental range, as the disciples of Confucius and the scattered tribes to whom ' the Great Spirit " has shown the brightness of His glory in the invented syllabics of the Indian versions. We could wish to see the Bible Society meeting more fully attended. The work is indispensable; its prosperity is dear to all wide hearted Christians; its aims are noble; its achievements have no parallel in history. Its progress was illustrated in a few striking figures yesterday, at a meeting of the Society's friends at the Bible House, by Prebendary Edmonds, in a paper well calculated to evoke enthusiastic zeal for the work. Yet in the larger and the smaller meeting there was plain evidence that a fuller recognition is needed of the high spiritual advantage of the gracious dispensation of God's Providence which has made the Bible Society's work a first charge upon the conscience, the gitts, and the grateful glow of thankfulness of all who care that God's way may be known upon earth, His saving health among all nations.

We regret to note, from correspondence, that the revenue of this great Society for the past year was not equal to the expenditure by a considerable amount, thus severely reducing the large reserve fund.

The issues of Bibles, Testaments and Portions during the past year have amounted to a total of 3,677,204 copies.

From recent communications received by the secretaries of this Society from the Assistant Foreign Secretary of the Parent Society, we quote as follows:--

30th March.—" Allow me to express, through you, our great indebtedness to the Upper Canada Bible Auxiliary for the very handsome remittance forwarded in your letter of March 18th. The letters and remittances received from our Auxiliaries in this country during the last few days have not been altogether encouraging, depression of trade still making itself greatly felt in many quarters, but the letters and remittances which have reached us from British North America have been the bright spot in our financial horizon. Once more we have to express our gratitude for the efforts put forth on behalf of the Society."

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account, as it will prove an encouragement to them at a time when the future of the various auxiliaries is causing them some little anxiety. As we told when writing last, the contributions from the Home Auxiliaries have been on the decline for some years past, and efforts are being put forward to stem the tide and to revive the somewhat waning interest which they are showing. It is very gratifying to learn that your committee contemplate not only the holding out of a helping hand to Quebec, but also an extension of their own work in Manitoba and the North-West. We trust that you will keep us posted up in the result of your efforts, and we shall watch with much interest all action you may take in that direction."

#### ABSTRACT OF THE EIGHTY-FIFTH REPORT OF THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY, PRESENTED AT THE ANNUAL MEETING HELD IN EXETER HALL, LONDON, IST MAY, 1880.

The circle of the year is again complete; its opportunities are over; the multitudes to whom it was the last have departed; the world is older, the Day of Days is nearer, and once more the question is awaiting reply: "How has it been during this space of time with the Society's work of putting into the hands of the nations the message of Eternal life?" No greater or more noble work, surely, has ever engaged any part of the Christian energies of England than this; none more urgent in these days of social overpressure and strain, when the present is to so many a burden, and the future but a wandering dream. And though a year is too short a period in which to register the state of the tides of spiritual life, we cannot watch with too serious interest the slightest indication of their ebb or their advance. It shall be well with us, and a sign of greater days, if we receive the report of the Bible year with as deep concern as if it dealt with our own affairs—as if it announced to ourselves some calamity or loss, or gave us security of our own prosperity and our repose.

It may be said at once that neither from the statistics of issues nor of finance is there any indication of a specially progressive year. But, on the other hand, it has not been one of serious decline. The comparison with 1888 is a severe test. The ample credit balance of that year, the result of unexpected legacies, has not been repeated; and who can desire that totals should be raised at the expense of life? In every case the returns of mere quantities—the rise or fall of the statistical barometer are anything but a decisive guide.

Not the less will there be hearty regret among all the Society's friends that the total Income is lower than that of last year by nearly thirtyeight thousand pounds, and that there is an actual deficit of some thirteen thousand. The difference between the two years is, to the extent of thirty thousand pounds, in the item of Legacies; there is also a fall under the head of Sales and under that of Donations. The Balance Sheet shows a slight increase in the Free Contributions; no advance will be welcomed with more pleasure than this; and it is most earnestly hoped that this source of income will steadily and largely increase. This is the regular and the vital income of the Society; this is the result, not of the sudden and the unforeseen, but of the patient and continuous labour of auxiliaries

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and branches, and a test of popular interest and support. The devotion of the Honorary Home Secretary, and of all who so gladly make the Bible Society's interests their own, cannot be too warmly acknowledged, but much remains to be done before the days of the earlier enthusiasm and effort are fully restored.\*\*

The returns of Issues show also a considerable decrease. There have been put into distribution during the year a total of nearly three million seven hundred thousand copies. This is about half a million less than in 1887. The deficit is, however, largely accounted for by the natural subsidence of the Royal Jubilee circulation, and by the gradual lessening of the special demand for the Penny Testament which continued for some time after its publication. The falling off in both these respects was to be expected. Otherwise the circulation compares not unfavourably with some recent years, and impressively shows the immense extent of the Society's work.+

More important are the accounts of practical and directly spiritual affairs; and these, for the year that has gone, are generally favourable. As in every wide field-across which sweep the winds and fall the intermittent sunbeams from heaven-there is constant variety of light and shade. From countries which appeared last year to feel the touch of spring, the April promise seems to have departed; in other cases the genial season has advanced in warmth and glow; or is it that the alteration is rather in the less or the more sanguine spirit of the observer? On the whole it is an inspiring story, and the sensibility must be seriously chilled which is not stirred by alternate delight or depression as its awakening history is told.

But at this place, before the narrative touches the life and work of the year, there must be some reference to those who have "entered into rest." The Hon. Senator Ferrier, President of the Montreal Auxiliary, and since 1885 a Vice-President of the Parent Society, died on May 30, 1888. He was a busy man as well as devout, and his vigorous mind and hand were in full activity till within a few days of his death. The Right Rev. Dr. Hughes, Lord Bishop of St. Asaph, who was appointed a Vice-president in 1870, has also died; and on October 16 the Lord Mount-Temple, also a Vice-President since 1886. The Society has also lost several of the Hon. Life Governors. One of these, Thomas Griffith, Esq., died on September 27. In December, Captain E. Littlehales, R.N., of Sherborne, Dorset, died, "an old man and full of days," but stirred to the end with the instincts of that nobler life which is always young. Captain Littlehales was long a member of committee of the Bible Society and Hon. Secretary of the Thames Church Mission. In February of the present year, the Rev. J. E. Dalton, B.D., Rector of Seagrave, Leicestershire, passed away; and on April 22, W. Goodday, Esq., Colchester, whose liberal contributions indicated how near the Society's work was to his heart.

Several names have been added to the lists of Honorary office-bearers. The Lord High Chancellor of England, Lord Halsbury; the Lord Brassey, K.C.B.; Sir J. W. Dawson, K.C.M.G., LL.D., F.R.S., President of the Montreal Auxiliary; and Harry Coghill, Esq., of Newcastle-under-Lyme,

have been appointed Vice-Presidents. The list of Hon. Life Governors has received the names of the Rev. Patrick Fenn, of Manningtree, Essex; Captain Joseph Spence, the veteran Treasurer of the North Shields and Tynemouth Auxiliary; the Rev. F. J. Falding, M.A., D.D., Principal of Airedale College, Bradford, and for twenty-eight years a secretary of the Rotherham Auxiliary; John Macgregor, Esq., M.A., for many years a member of the Committee and well known for his Palestine tours; and John Murdoch, Esq., LL.D., whose indefatigable labours as agent of the Christian Vernacular Education Society will be long and gratefully remembered.

A certain bond, alike of race and history as of common faith, unites the western nations of France and Belgium, Italy and Spain. Differing among themselves, they differ still more widely from their Teutonic neighbours, as well as from the Slavonic peoples, through whom one passes to the vast and populous spaces of the East. Especially from a religious point of view this group of Western peoples is one. Among them, with least hindrance, the power of the Church of Rome has held sway; they have shown as, perhaps, nowhere else the natural results of its influences and its spirit. There is, in a report of the Bible Society, a natural fitness in turning to these nations first.

From France, from Belgium, and perhaps from Spain, the accounts are distinctly grave. Italy is different; a broad, if a somewhat faint, light stretches across its fields. The same light is not absent from Spain, but it is less apparent. France seems darker, and the shadow is, perhaps, deepest in Belgium, and most ominous of approaching storm.

The story of last year from FRANCE was one of evident hope. There was no remarkable advance; but the accounts suggested steady progress towards a more spiritual life. M. Monod was inspired by pleasant hopes. and reviewed the past with something like triumph. This year his mood is sensibly altered. The circulation has lessened to the extent of twentythree thousand copies; nor can it be accounted for by the indifference of the colporteurs; M. Monod's veterans in service, his most proved and trusted men, have been precisely the least successful. The usual and the irreconcilable enemy of the popular Bible is still active; but the priest is by no means the most serious foe. An invisible power, threatening the Papal Church itself, and yet largely her own creation-a fatal Frankenstein hanging over religion like a doom, La libre pensee-seems to grow into huger proportions year by year. It is a familiar story, but not the less painful. One, however, is not entirely prepared for the accounts which are seriously and sorrowfully given. M. Monod is quite aware of the amount of Evangelistic work carried on in Paris and elsewhere with conspicuous success; he knows with what facility copies of the Scriptures can be had gratuitously-the gifts rather of zeal than of discretion; and he is fully conscious of the widening tide of Protestantism in his native land. Even towards the end of his survey, as page after page of the ever-interesting record of colportage is read, the tone of despondency is lightened, and he closes his report with words of pleasure and of hope. But no one can read the general summary without the sense that a cloud broods over the spiritual temper of France, and that a poison works in the nation's blood. Next year all may be brighter-and what is a year in a people's history ?-but to-day the report is sensibly touched with disappointment.

South of the Pyrenees, what light there is in the sky seems to be slowly increasing. The description which is true of France will, however,

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practically apply to SPAIN. There is the same overshadowing materialism of thought-the vast majority of the men, and many of the women, are agnostics or spiritualists when they are not atheists; it is, as Mr. Jameson says, "the legitimate result of the sway of Romanism--the only presentation of Christianity the nation has had." Behind the most formidable enemy are two others-the Papal Church itself, and the general ignorance and paralysis of thought among the people. These acute and painful symptoms may, however, indicate the transition to better days. "Spain is passing through the same inevitable crisis as all Roman Catholic countries; the decay of faith is alarming and profoundly sad, but there is hope in the latter end;" and Mr. Jameson, who has known the country for twenty years, grows more sanguine instead of more despondent. The circulation since last return, though slightly less, is not unsatisfactory, and though "the work in this sad land is as difficult as it can be in any heathen country," there is on the whole a real, if a very gradual and interrupted, progress to that age of life and truth of which the Evangelical movement in Spain of twenty years ago was a somewhat impassioned dream.

The plains and the mountain valleys of ITALY seem to be spiritually, as well as literally, in the earlier and larger lights of dawn. The circulation has remarkably increased; it is the highest total ever reached in the peninsula; but a more impressive and perhaps more significant fact is the appearance-to use Sig. Meille's words-of "three unexpected allies to the Bible Society." The editor of one of the most widely circulated newspapers in Italy is an agnostic, but he has an acute perception of what will be popular, and last year there has been issued from the office of the Secolo of Milan the first number of an illustrated People's Bible in  $\frac{1}{2}$ d. parts, with a weekly circulation of over seventeen thousand copies. In the same city the head of the great publishing house of Treves is a Jew, but he, also, has felt the spirit of the times, and his presses are busied with an edition of the New Testament, also in serial parts, resplendent with the illustrations of Doré. To complete the impressive story, one of the most prolific authors, and perhaps the best Greek scholar in Italy, Sig. Bonghi, has begun to publish in Rome a Life of Jesus, and the book is practically a literal translation of the Gospels, ably and sympathetically edited. Sig. Meille adds a significant sentence: "These three publications have been the great literary events of the year; no work of any special importance has appeared to compete with them in the attention of the people. It is as if Providence had silenced every other voice in order that the Scriptures alone might be listened to, and of 1888, more than of any preceding year, may it be said with perfect accuracy, that it has seen the largest diffusion of Scriptures that was ever made in Italy." These evidences of the serious occupation of many minds with spiritual truth is pleasantly illustrated by the general tone of the report, and the year, though one of great economic depression and anxiety, may be remembered in the records of the nation's higher and more hopeful history.

North of the Italian Alps, and eastward from the frontiers of Belgium and of France, there is another group of nations, as closely united as those which have been passed in review. Switzerland, Germany, Holland and Denmark are still the possessions, as they are the historic homes, of the Reformation; on their plains and in their mountain fastnesses the battles of religious liberty were, in the sixteenth century, fought and won. They may justly be grouped together on this page, for, in the report of the year, one outstanding fact is the same in all. activity of each of these countries with reference to its own Bible work; the supply, from its own energies and resources, of its own people. SWITZERLAND, though still drawing her supplies from the stores of the parent Society, is actively pursuing the work of supplying her children, among their romantic mountains or by their inland seas, with the Word of Life. "The distinctive fact of the year, in regard to Germany," says Mr. Watt, "is the advance of the native Bible societies." HOLLAND, and perhaps DENMARK, are gradually preparing for the same nobler position of self supply. It is a position of things worthy of the past and full of promise for the opening history of the future, that it is the distinctively Reformation nations of their children the sword with which their fathers conquered and the staff on which they leaned for rest.

Some fuller reference must be made to GERMANY. The central fact of the year, as has been said, is the developing work of the native societies. The circulation of the British and Foreign Society is, according to its policy, gradually lessening, and ten thousand copies fewer were circulated last year than in 1887. But the German issues have risen by eighteen thousand, and there are many evidences of growing activity. Colonel Klefeker is rendering invaluable service to the army; the number of copies distributed has increased from twenty-one to twenty-eight thousand, and this may be confidently expected soon and rapidly to increase. The colporteurs have been busy and successful, but their work is hard, and there are still districts in the Fatherland as thoroughly Roman Catholic as Belgium or Spain. Even more depressing is the unspirituality of so many with whom the profession of Protestantism is little but the assertion of practical indifference or hostility. A single sentence from Mr. Watt's report touches in the most impressive way the tragedy of the death of the late Emperor Frederick: "One day in early summer a notice was received, from the Chancery of his Majesty that the annual subscription given by his late father to the Bible Society would be continued by himself. The following day the Emperor died." But the son of the dead hero seems of kindred spirit, and Mr. Watt closes the year's report with a sentence which illuminates all that goes before : "The exemplary family life of the young monarch Wilhelm II. stands out conspicuously beautiful, and the unmistakable and firm attitude which he, with the Empress, has assumed in favour of everything which tends to promote purity, truth, and godliness amongst his people must fill the heart of everyone with thankfulness who desires to see Germany prosperous and happy."

AUSTRIA-HUNGARY is in itself a group of nations. The Bible Society's work in this agency alone is a miniature of its work throughout the world. There is the same appeal to many nationalities, the same Polyglot issue, and almost every friendly or hostile power which is elsewhere encountered from east to west is represented within this varied Empire. Nowhere is there a more interesting field; unhappily much of the interest is painful, and directly suggested by the past. The lover of spiritual liberty and of the devout simplicities of the first days turns to Austria with sorrow often stronger than hope. These are the fields, these the mountain solitudes in which religious intolerance secured some of its completest victories – its victories and its everlasting shame. Happily Mr. Millard is able to forget the things which are behind in his eager and joyful reaching forth to those that are before. His spirit is so sunny that he sees the whole of his agency lying in the same delightful glow. After all, it is the better as well as the happier way; and for the past year there

are substantial facts to support the cheerful estimate. Never before, excepting in the year of the Vienna Exhibition, and scarcely even then, has there been so large a circulation in Austria-Hungary as during 1888. It almost touches two hundred thousand, and is nineteen thousand beyond the number of 1887. This is not all: there are everywhere pleaant signs of life. Not by any means that the difficulties are fewer, or that there are not also occasional evidences of spiritual decline. From almost every district there is a miserable monotony in the report that "the influ-ence of the priests is increasing," "the hostility of the Church is more bitter," "the efforts of Rome are more pronounced than ever." Mr. Millard only sighs as the words are read, and, turning to the brighter side, finds an increasing circulation of the Scriptures and a more devout temper among many of the people. "Had we but to do with the people themselves," he writes sorrowfully, "the people uninfluenced by prejudice and left to their own desires!" From almost every quarter, happily, there is a report of advance. In Hungary the circulation has been most extraordinary," the accounts are "most encouraging." Nowhere so much as in Bohemia "do we meet with so evident tokens that the Word of God is held in reverence, and is taking root in the hearts of many." In Bosnia, Bible work, though difficult, has been successful; in Roumania, though "indifference prevails to a large extent among the better classes, and ignorance among the peasants, there is every reason to be glad and of good courage." Poland, from the story of its year, varied as everywhere else, "suggests only gratitude for what has been accomplished;" and in the various sections "whatever cause there may be for regret over spiritual barrenness and alarming unbelief, there is much earnest searching after the truth, and longing desire to seek and find peace." The report concludes with an outburst of blended praise and prayer, touching because evidently unaffected, and eloquent because it is sincere.

Moving still eastward the narrative becomes occupied with another group of peoples, whom, to a large extent, common faith and a common government naturally unite. In this rapid review the TURKISH and the EGYPTIAN agencies may be considered together, for though it is a wide interval from Constantinople to Alexandria, both are centres of Turkish rule, and at the same time of the faith of Islam, Greece and the Greek Church form an exception, but it is the only considerable one; all else from the Roumelian frontier across Asia Minor to the utmost range of Arabia and of Egypt is under the crescent of Muhammad. It need hardly be said that not only political, but to a large extent Christian interests are deeply engaged on those borderlands between east and west ; here the powers of disintegration are working rapidly on the old, and a new future is shaping itself from the chaos of departing monarchies. In a comprehensive sentence Dr. Thomson indicates how difficult the tasks of the Society's forces are : "To visit the countless islands of the Ægean; to penetrate into the uplands of Albania and Macedonia, the haunt of bloodthirsty brigands who keep the land in terror ; to testify for the truth of God amid utter indifference and mockery on the part of some, and fanatical hatred and violence on the part of others; to uphold legal rights in opposition to local authorities who are ignorant of the very law they administer; to meet by patient labour the infidelity so prevalent in Bulgaria and elsewhere ;-such was the work to be faced, and your Agent is thankful to be able to say that in spite of all these difficulties not a little has been done.' This modest estimate is more than borne out by the long and circumstantial report which follows; the circulation has increased, and the year has been one of steady and encouraging work. One

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sentence may, perhaps, describe the most notable fact of the year, and it is full of deep significance and hope : 'It is my growing conviction,' says Dr. Thomson, ' that the truth is taking hold of the members of the Greek Church in a manner unprecedented for many centuries.' This is immensely important. Nor is there a less remarkable statement from Mr. Weakley, who is referring specially to the Muhammadan populations, and who also reports favourably of his work : 'In the estimation of faith it is no light matter that some copies at least of the books which contain in the language of the people the Divine message of love and life to sinful men have been placed already in nearly every part of the district. Men of South Arabia have taken them to their homes in Hadramoot and Yemen. Merchants have carried them across the Gulf of Aden to the African coast and up to Harrar. Shut out from Abyssinia the holy Books have been found and gladly received by the people of that mountainous land who have crowded down to the sea coast. A few have been planted in Suakin among the Muslim traders ; some have been set in Muslim hands at Yeddah, and rumour says that even wellguarded Mecca has been invaded by the silent messenger. Certain it is that the children of the Libyan Desert have not scorned to possess them, and that their brethren of the Eastern waste-the way of the Philistines-have at least one New Testament to spell out by the camp fire. Thousands have passed into the hands of men dwelling in the great cities of Egypt. With much difficulty and seeming defeat in places, the Muslim villages in Palestine and Syria have had here and there a copy of God's Word left in them. Among the lawless dwellers in the mountain of Moab the heavenly precepts are daily read; and among the people of the Ancient Churches everywhere the long-neglected oracles of God are gradually once more being received and studied. Official Islam and sacerdotal Rome here and there bitterly oppose with the instinct of fear, yet, were the work of the Agency at this moment to be wholly suspended, so widely has been sown the seed, though sparsely, that the planting of the Kingdom of God throughout the whole district might be taken as a fact to be rejoiced over, and regarded with intelligent hope.' No estimate of the year can be more authoritative than this, and none can perhaps be more encouraging.

But we are already standing on the threshold of the East ; its vast spaces open before us, and we hear the voice of the ocean, whose waves break against the shores of three continents. One immense empire is yet unmentioned ; it belongs to both worlds. The sun, rising from the Yellow Sea, and touching its frontier hills with his first ray, travels across its territory till the evening, and sees its utmost limit only when he sinks in the west. But RUSSIA fascinates the mind with a higher charm than that of territory. The portrait of one of its Emperors hangs in the Bible House, the story of his devotion to the Scriptures continues itself among his people, and his spirit seems still largely to animate the great world-power which is sure yet to stand among the dominant forces of the future. The history of Bible work in Russia concerns both east and west, and is one of the chapters of the history of humanity. It must be welcome news that the report of the year, both from the Northern and the Southern Agencies, has a great deal to encourage; in some instances it is strikingly favourable. Mr. Nicolson, whose territory stretches absolutely from the Baltic to the shores which look across the icy seas to America, cannot announce a rising circulation; but one of the reasons for its decline is itself a hopeful and suggestive fact-it is that the British Society has distributed fewer copies because the Russian Bible Society is increasingly endeavouring to provide and distribute its own. Mr. Nicolson adds: "Vast as the dimensions of European and Asiatic

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Russia are, one may look hopefully to the time when Bible workers will be found all over the Empire, nor are there so many places now completely beyond the call of the colporteur ;" and he proceeds : "The good work of selling the Scriptures in the villages and small towns of the Empire is going forward with a great measure of success; the official persons with whom we have to do in the provinces of the Empire never showed us more goodwill." The narrative which follows, and which touches with its human and endlessly varied detail the successive provinces from Lithuania to Eastern Siberia, is absorbingly interesting, and there is not a page on which light does not shine. Nor is there any lessening of interest, nor any less pleasant light on the records of the Southern Agency. In this quarter the circulation has swiftly increased; it is the highest ever realised; in some districts, to use Mr. Morrison's words, it has "enormously increased," "notably advanced," "proceeded by leaps and bounds." These references are to Cis-Caucasia and the Don Cossack country, to Kharkoff, and to "the Russian Jerusalem," Kieff. This broadening tide of Scriptural literature is seen better when the eye looks back half-a-dozen years. In 1882 the total circulation in the Agency was eighty-two thousand ; it is now a hundred and seventy-two thousand ; then we heard little of Trans-Caucasia and Turkestan ; but since 1882 the Bible pioneers have pushed forward their frontier six hundred miles, and annexed provinces which were then a terra incognita. There can be little doubt, from the evidence of both these important reports, that there is substantial reason for taking a very favourable view of the prospects of Bible knowledge throughout the Russian possessions. Everywhere the soldier is the colporteur's friend ; the authorities are frank and generally friendly ; the Church is becoming an independent source of supply. Let us hope well, and, if possible, work more devotedly for the people with whom so much of the world's future will in all probability rest.

So immense is the Russian Empire that, in Continental Asia, but two other considerable peoples remain—the myriad races of China—and with these may be grouped the Japanese—and those of Hindustan. Nothing these, nor to point out that it is an importance increasing every year. The part to be played in the next century by "the British of the East" and by the awakened intellect and energies of India it may be impossible to define, but it is certain to be great. And it will be a power for good or for dismay be pursued in vain. The importance in the Bible Society is realized or

The report of Bible work in CHINA for 1888 indicates a considerable advance of circulation in the Northern and about equal decline in the Central Agency. The reason of the lower numbers is, however, not from any lessened interest among the people, but solely from the less effective state of the colportage force ; and the same truth meets the student of these reports in other fields-one of the most impressive ways of saying that were only more colporteurs available the Society's work would stride where it now steps with difficuly, and advance by percentages which are now the exception instead of the rule. The surveys of the Chinese provinces breathe everywhere a spirit of healthy energy : the press is active, the colporteurs are devoted, but the tragedies of pestilence and of famine-the legacy of the overflow of the Yellow River-darken every page. The circulation in JAPAN is one of the pleasant cases of swift progress-the increase has been over a hundred per cent .-- thirty-seven thousand instead of the sixteen thousand of 1887. Yet this also was a remarkable advance on that of the year preceding. The journals of some of the forty-eight Japanese colporteurs read like a new

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chapter of the Acts of the Apostles; the dew of youth is on the ardour of their primitive and tender piety. There is something more remarkable than this: it impresses the thoughtful mind with the vastness of a silent but national revolution. It is the publication, almost within the same year, of the new Japanese Bible—the gift of Western Christianity to the child of new thought in the East; and of the Emperor's edict proclaiming universal religious liberty in the Empire. And this in a land where, fifteen years ago, the Government warned away, on peril of life, "the Christian foreigner and his God!"

We have at length approached INDIA, and great as must be our concern for other fields, it is deeper, more genuine, perhaps more anxious, as we survey the solemnising scenery of the ever-spreading Anglo-Asiatic cities, the crowded harbours, the vast and fruitful plains, the temples and palaces of Hindustan. Here the subtlest intellect of the East has its home : here it has built its school of Hindu contemplation and of life. Even the architecture of Greece cannot entirely throw that of mediæval India into the shade, nor its superb literature withdraw admiration from the florid splendours of the Sanskrit epics and dramas, or the metaphysical fervours of its books of ritual and devotion. We have already witnessed-and it is one of the greatest historic spectacles-the social regeneration of India under the influences of government seated in an island which, in the palmy days of Hindustan, was a home of savages. We may yet hope for a far more astonishing and a far nobler revolution-the consectation of the best powers of the Indian character, and the erection, among the ruins of the temples of Buddhism, of a great school of Christian learning, which shall throw its powerful rays, not only across every part of the vast peninsula, but into the furthest and the darkest recesses of the idolatries of the East.

There is a peculiar quality in each of the Indian reports ; it is noticeable year after year, and, though perhaps unconsciously present, it is in the highest degree suggestive and inspiring. It is the quietness of confidence which every summary breathes, the sense of the resistless progress made in stillness and calm by the rising tides of Christian thought, the assurance that, whether distant or near, the possession of India by Christ is merely a matter of time. Occasionally, as this year in the case of the Madras Presidency, it is necessary to notice an intensifying of opposition to Christianity, but the symptoms of hatred or fear do not trouble the confident record ; it is merely "a new stage of development," and, "one among the many indications that the truth of God is felt to be a growing power in the land." The same calm of conscious victory is felt in noting remarkable advance-the circulation, both in Calcutta and in the Madras Presidency, is the largest ever yet known -but there is no feverish delight expressed ; it is only what is taking place a little earlier or a little later, but which has long been foreseen. The same spirit seems not unknown among the natives, and if many oppose Christianity with the instinct of alarm, a much larger number regard its advance with philosophic indifference, and admire the clearer truth which is dispersing the earlier shadows of the mind, and which is destined to conquer because it deserves. Everywhere the record of the year seems favourable : the river of Christian literature broadens as it flows onward : the higher Education is steadily undermining the popular theologies and preparing for that "knowledge of Jesus which is the most excellent of the sciences"; the distribution of Scriptures among the students is continuing with excellent results; the work in the Zenanas is universally spoken of as of immense value and importance; and there are other and isolated incidents which have all the value of omens of approaching change-the formation of a Young Men's

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Society for the study of Christ; the suggestion of a native editor that, unless Hinduism is to be swept away, the example of the Bible Society must be followed, and an association formed to spread the Shastras among the people : the introduction of the Bible into some homes for family reading instead of the Ramayana and Mahabharata. These are small things, but they are straws which show how the deep and mighty stream of tendency is setting in the realm of the Hindu and Muhammadan mind.

One of the most graphic chapters for the year has been written by Mr. Haffenden, as he tells the story of his return to MALAYSIA, and the work of his colleagues there. It will be remembered by many that in last autumn five young men left England with Mr. Haffenden, won in several cases by his eager appeals, and stirred by his contagious zeal. They have now vigorously set about their work, and though the change must sometimes be felt a trying one from the meadows of Kent and Sussex to the crowded by-streets of Singapore, or the rivers of Borneo, there is no trace of despondency nor of regret. Indeed, the report is one of most stimulating progress. The circulation has leaped rather than moved from nineteen to thirty-seven thousand copies, an increase of seventy per cent.; but the purely Malay sales have gone up to a hundred, and this fact Mr. Haffenden regards with special joy. In this advancing circulation some thirty-two languages are represented, and not less than forty-four editions; but the leading tongues are Chinese, Malay, Tamil, Javanese and English. The total circulation since 1882 has been about a hundred and fifty thousand ; but when one recollects that the population of this Island-world is thirty-five millions, the true comparison will instantly be drawn, and it will be felt that all the successes of the past shrink before the immense task which yet remains to be done.

Only one other, and that the slightest, reference can, in this rapid survey, be made. It is to the colonies of our own people—to AUSTRALASIA, to SOUTH AFRICA, to BRITISH AMERICA, to the West Indies; and to these not as the haunts of a vanishing or a lingering heathenism, but as the homes of "that new world which is the old," the almost measureless spaces for the possession and the upbuilding of the Anglo-Saxon races of the future. It is to that "Greater Britain" the eye turns at the last, before it rests again upon the shores from which this journey of the mind began.

Two remarkable journals reproduce the year for AUSTRALIA In Mr Robjohns' letters, quick with movement and energy, the half-foreign, halffamiliar conditions of colonial life make themselves strongly felt. We have the sense of the ceaseless unrest of travel; the half-organized and perilous means of distant communication; the picturesque stretches of forest and mountain scenery; the young populous cities; the crowded or the scanty meeting; the representative committees, deliberative in turn about spiritual affairs and ever urgent finance; the Sunday school; the lady collectorsall so English, so homelike, yet evidently so moulded by the influences of a new hemisphere. For it is not the land of one race only-this new continent; nor are its neighbours such as we know on our shores, or in our streets at home. If in Mr. Robjohns' page we feel the beat of life, we see in Mr. Davidson's the visible picture of this new world, touched with the glow and breathing the spirit of the writer's genius. "The field itself is of characteristic and, to me, transcendent interest. To find the Rev. Daniel Mac-Donald in Melbourne taking oversight of the printing of our Efatese New Testament, with a consignment of arrowroot which the new converts had sent to help to pay for it; to meet the Rev. W. Gray in Adelaide, ready to go back to his Weasisi people, that they may both hear and read 'what comfortable words our Saviour Christ saith' in the Gospel of St. John ; to

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worship with timid inquirers from the 'Flowery Land,' and see them follow us with anxious eye as we talked to them of the Redeemer, and they verified the words of Eternal life from the Evangel we had placed in their hands ; to visit the extemporised tents of aboriginals in this great continent who had been taught the Word of Life at Point MacLeay ; to catechise a Papuan child concerning Jesus of Nazareth ; to be served by servants who read of Him in Pali, and converse with pearl-divers who trace the precious Word in Pangasinan ; to sail with Syrians, and read Moses and the Prophets with rabbis of Israel ; to preach at Catlowie with critics capable of studying Emanuel Kant as one's hearers from the fatherland of thought—all this reminded me that I had come to do work in a segment of our far-reaching arena where one's best abilities would be both required and rewarded." Happily the rewards are already being liberally given, and the year which fills its record with picturesque sketches can also add the evidence of widening interest in the Society and of deeper devotion to its work.

The last words of this record must now be written ; they are the most difficult justly to write or hear, for, if true, those only they must be which interpret the spiritual voice of the year and express its Divine message. That voice we cannot catch except in the silence from our own thoughts and our passions, nor obey except in the submission of our will. Yet surely it is no muffled message, it is no obscure oracle. Are not its words to us that all Divine work is completed but in the slow lapse of time and with infinite sacrifice ; that they serve God best who love Him most, and who cease most from their own wisdom; that it is for us to be obedient, to be patient, and to be assured of the end? "We are working now as they worked at those superb palaces and tombs which still dominate in India, though in ruins, the towns of the Muhammadan conquest. Far down into the foundations they sank, with what infinite patience we may imagine, vast masses of dull red sandstone, and built it up in mighty walls that only lose their gloom when glowing in the setting sun ; but on the summit they placed, as if to last for ever, some structure of fair white pierced and tretted stone, so fitting and beautiful, so airy and delicate, that it seems like a marble dream.

beautiful, so airy and deneate, that it seems nice is hardly at the foundation of "Let us be patient and continuous, working bravely at the foundation of this Christian empire, pouring into it true hearts and noble lives—the named and the nameless there together, treasures of thought and treasures of the priceless years. There is already rising on that foundation the vision of our faith and hope, once a dream, but now the fair and stately fact of a Christian world-empire, a fragment, vet complete in itself, of that great city—the holy Jerusalem, which descends out of heaven from God, and where the nations of the saved walk in the light of His glory."\*

### EXTRACTS FROM AGENTS' REPORTS.

REV. ALFRED ANDREWS-Agent of the U.C.B.S. for North-West Territories for 1889.-Our work for this widely extended field was begun December 19th, by visiting Indian Head. Our meeting, held in the Presbyterian Church was greatly aided by our excellent chairman, R. Crawford, Esq. They gave us a good collection, and then formed a branch Society, whose energetic officers have already got the depository well stocked and in working order.

The first anniversary of the u'Appelle Branch was held February 1st, in the Presbyterian church. The sales of the depository have amounted to about \$30. In addition to the collection a subscription of \$19 has been raised and donated to the U. C. B. S., less any local expenses.

Wolseley was reached at 3.30 a.m., and we held our first Bible Society meeting there in the evening. Good attendance, grand help from both Protestant ministers; collection \$2.90. Branch formed and books ordered at once. At Grenfell on the 6th, we had a good meeting, collection, \$4.45, but for

local reasons it was not deemed best to form a branch here at present.

Broadview meeting in Methodist church not largely attended, but interest well sustained. Active help from Presbyterian and Methodist ministers. Sales, \$35, and, besides paying local expenses, free contributions to the U. C. B. S. of \$11.85.

The Presbyterian church was open to us at Whitewood, and its esteemed pastor, Rev. A. Hamilton, presided efficiently at a large gathering, February 8th. All the officers appointed last year had removed, only a small stock had been procured, over half of which was sold New officers and better place for sale of books give us hope for a better year. A good supply of Bibles has been ordered.

Strangely enough, the same cause, with the exception of one officer, as at Whitewood had prevented the branch formed last year at Moosomin from being got into working order I spent Sabbath in the town and preached in both the Presbyterian and Methodist churches, attending and addressing the large Union Sunday School in the afternoon.

Our collectors brought in \$13 to the meeting. After paying for a book-case, the balance \$3.75 was donated to the U.C.B.S. A supply of books was ordered before I left

I took a freight train at midnight for Virden, was driven next day six miles into the country to hold a religious service, and back to the town for a meeting in the evening in the new Methodist church ; attendance small, but those present went in heartily for a Branch Society, and collectors were appointed to canvass the town. Here also we were greatly aided by both the Presbyterian and Methodist ministers.

On the 13th we reached Oak Lake. Thomas Wright, Esq., assisted by the Presbyterian and Episcopalian ministers had secured a good meeting, collection \$7.40. Branch formed and collectors appointed.

By a freight we reached Brandon on the 14th, and were driven across the country 40 miles to Stockton where I preached on Sunday morning, and in the evening 9 miles off, at Glenboro the new county town of Cypress, and at present the terminus of the Manitoba and South-West Railroad, 105 miles from Winnipeg.

The public meeting at Glenboro was large and enthusiastic. Collection, \$5.20 A promising branch was formed here and books ordered.

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Stockton was formed three years ago, and is only a small branch, but the friends refused to have the branch closed, gave us \$9 and appointed collectors to augment the amount. These last four places are in Manitoba. On the 20th we took train for Winnipeg, and then on Friday following for the West.

At Qu'Appelle the address given at the Bible Society meeting a fortnight before on "The History of the English Bible and Bible Distribution" by special request was repeated to a crowded audience on the Sabbath evening, February 24th. On Monday morning at two o'clock we were on our way for Regina. The beautiful brick church of the Presbyterians was opened for the meeting -grand help from the Presbyterian and Methodist ministers, good meeting,

attendance, 118, sales good, and subscriptions liberal. Meeting in the Methodist church at Moose Faw, February 26th; good meet-ing, warm assistance from Presbyterian and Methodist ministers, sales good,

and subscription best of any branch yet visited, attendance, 85 Maple Creek.-Meeting, Methodist church, 27th, sustained heartily by both Protestant ministers of the town, sales small, but promised better place for

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eg. .20 accommodation of books shortly. As there was no train timed to leave before Friday, we held a preaching service and administered the Sacrament on the

Medicine Hat meeting was small. Through some want of understanding our Thursday evening. method of supplying stock this branch had not done anything during the year, but with new officers and supply of books ordered and case to hold them in, it is hoped that we may have a better report another year ; collection, \$2.00, and collectors appointed to canvass the town after the books arrive.

Banff in the mountains was next in order. Sabbath, March 3rd, preached in Banff Presbyterian Church in the morning; at Anthracite, five miles distant, at 14 o'clock, and in Methodist Church at Banff at 19 o'clock. Good meeting on Monday night, Revs. A. J. McLeod, and C. Williams aided us in the meeting and Rev. M. Christmas, Episcopalian assisted in the service of song.

good, and subscription, \$40.28, besides a collection of \$5.90. The closing of the mines Anthracite has passed through a hard year. during a large part of the year has greatly crippled the people, nearly all of whom depend entirely on work in the mines for a living. I took \$20 worth of whom depend entirely on work in the mines for a living. Sales small, meeting poorly attended ; subscription and collection, \$33.95. All free to U.C.B.S., except cost of book their stock to replenish other places.

Calgary meeting, March 8th, was not largely attended as the night had to case be changed from the original date, but the interest in our work seemed hearty, collection, \$4.65, subscriptions not completed. Books ordered, and active oper-

ations at the depository will, I hope, soon be realized. Having to wait for a large part of a day at Dunmore, I visited most of the

houses and sold eight Bibles and three Testaments, value, \$9.30, At Lethbridge, the terminus of the Coal and Navigation Company's Railway,

preached on Sabbath, March 11th, morning and evening, and addressed the Presbyterian Sabbath School in the afternoon. Good meeting Monday evening, collection, \$6.75. We were greatly aided by the ministers of the Presbyterian and Methodist churches here, as we were last year.

March 12th, I had a hard drive of 33 miles to Fort McLeod through the worst and almost the only snowstorm of the season. Our horse was an imperfectly broken broncho and we had two large rivers to ford. He went through the Belly River at Lethbridge, perhaps 200 yards wide, tolerably well, but at Fort Kipp when about midway in the stream of the Old Man's River, he refused absolutely to advance. The water was about 2 or  $2\frac{1}{2}$  feet deep in the ford, and there he stood, the more we wanted him to go, the more he wouldn't go. At length after due trial of patience, a young cow-boy on horseback came to our relief and succeeded in pulling us over the stream. Good meeting at Fort McLeod, collection, \$4.65. I was ordered to send for a supply of books for the branch, and left them a small stock to commence with.

At all places visited, I went carefully through the stocks in the depositories, and made arrangements for securing good cases with glass fronts in which to keep the books. At Banff donations of books were made on behalf of the Society to the Banff Sanitorium for the use of guests of six Bibles and eight Testaments, and at Anthracite for the hotel there for similar use, one Bible and one Testament, total value, \$4.60. It was in my plan to have visited the Mormon settle-ment on Lee's Creek, 40 miles south-east of McLeod near the Boundary Line. With this in view I had supplied myself with 40 books. At Lethbridge I had met one of the saints who assured me that there would be no difficulty in selling a lot of Bibles among his brethren, but the tremendous snowstorm had obliterated for a time all trace of trails across the uninhabited prairie, and as there were three rivers to ford it was deemed unwise to venture out, and even when the snow melted it might be days before the rivers could be crossed, so I was reluctantly compelled to return back to Lethbridge on Thursday. We managed to cross at Kipp better than on the journey out, being kindly furnished with a mounted policeman who conducted us over a better ford. Reaching Belly River we found it frozen over and had to leave our rig on the south side and pick our way over on the thin ice between the places of open water as best we could, and to be frank we breathed freely when we reached the Lethbridge side of the river. Unwilling to travel on Sabbath I spent the last day out at Medicine Hat, March 17th, preached for Rev. C. Teeter, Methodist, in the morning, addressed his Sunday School in conjunction with Dr. McLean in the afternoon, and preached for Rev. J. Herald, Presbyterian, in the evening. Mr. Niblock, the superintendent of this division of the Canadian Pacific Railway, resides at Medicine Hat, and expressed a desire to obtain at his own expense about a dozen Bibles to place in the cabooses of the freight trains on his division. These I have forwarded to him since my return.

Tuesday morning, March 19th, at two o'clock we reached our home, having by the kind providence of God been enabled to carry out our programme in almost every particular. Everywhere I was received as the agent of the Bible Society with the greatest kindness and cordiality, and it is a matter of regret that I have not space to mention particularly in every case the kindness shewn to me, which I shall never forget.

It cannot be doubted that the work of our Society is one of the most important factors in building up a strong and vigorous Christian commonwealth.

Apart from the books we have supplied, I do not know of a dozen Bibles being sold in the Territories during the past year. The subject of my evening addresses in nearly every case was "The History of the English Bible and Bible Distribution," and with gratitude to God I am able to say that the manifest appreciation of the subject by the audiences addressed, without a single exception, has very greatly cheered and encouraged me in my undertaking on behalf of the Society.

REV. MANLY BENSON-*Picton*.-A well attended meeting held in the Presbyterian Church, Mayor Port, presiding. It was determined by the officers and committee to hold meetings for business quarterly, during the year The amount contributed at the public meeting was a handsome advance over the previous year.

Milford.—Your agent was called home to attend a funeral, but secured the valuable services of Rev. Jos. Young, to hold the Milford meeting, who reported an interesting gathering of the friends of the Society, and an increase in the collection.

*Cherry Valley.*—The evening was very cold, the gathering not large. The contributions were good, and an additional number of collectors were appointed to canvass for the Society,

Bloomfield .--- Your agent was greeted with a full house. Meeting held in the Methodist Church, and was enthusiastic. The Rev. J. A. Jewell, B.A., was

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present, and gave an opening address. Collection and subscriptions at the meeting ahead of previous year.

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Wellington.—Here the branch was re-organized, a liberal collection taken, officers appointed, who enter heartily upon the work, and a good return may confidently be expected. Rev. W. R. Young rendered valuable help.

Tamworth.—The Rev B. F. Stratton opened the meeting, which was held in the Methodist Church. The officers seemed to be of the right stamp, hearty in their efforts to advance the good work of our Bible Society. The returns from this branch will be liberal.

Newburgh.—" The largest attendance we have seen for many years at a Bible Society meeting," was the remark of one of the workers returning from the meeting. The Rev. J. J. Leach, Ph. B., gave a short but interesting address; the meeting was held in the Methodist Church, of which Mr. Leach is pastor.

Deseronto.—This growing town will continue to keep up a vigorous branch of the Bible Society and Depository. The Rev. Mr. Craig, Presbyterian minister, in whose church the annual meeting was held, presided. Rev. Mr. Campbell (Methodist) was also present. Deseronto's offering will be largely in advance.

Melrose.—A pleasing feature of this branch was the deep interest taken by the young people of the neighbourhood. A choir, specially organized, enlivened the annual meeting with sacred song. A good congregation met your agent, and the committee are hopeful that the returns financial will be larger than usual.

REV. J. R. BLACK-*Elmvale*.—In this thriving village, midway between *Minesing* and *Penetanguishene*, I organized a branch. The officers are all excellent men, and the secretary an old friend of the Bible Society.

Penetanguishene.—The Rev. Mr. Currie, president, showed your agent much kindness. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church; the addresses were given by the Rev. Mr. Lloyd, Episcopal, and Rev. Mr. Currie. The attendance was exceptionally good.

*Midland.*—The attendance here was below our expectations; but the officers elected are true friends of the Society, and they expressed at our departure an increased sense of their duty. The Revs. Messrs. James and Taylor were present, and took part in the exercises.

Minesing.—This is one of the best branches in this northern section. The people generally come to the annual meetings. The officers have an intelligent appreciation of their duties, and do not shrink from their performance. The contribution is nearly \$ for from this rural section; yet there is reason to expect that these will be augmented during the year.

Rugby.—The branch here is nearly a quarter of a century old, and gradually obtains a larger place in the affections of the people. At our meeting, the aged but enthusiastic president, George Tudhope, presided. The Rev. Mr. Dobson delivered an appropriate address, and reports were read showing progress.

Bracebridge.—Here the meeting was poorly attended, owing largely to two other gatherings at the same time. The interest was good, and the collections large. Care was manifested in the election of officers, and next year Bracebridge will be well to the front, and in the work of the Society may be expected to make a further advance.

Coldwater.—Rev. Messrs. French, Episcopal, and Bedford, Methodist, interested themselves in the organization of a branch in the village. The place of meeting was St. Matthias' Church; Rev. Mr. French presided. The attendance, however, was very slim; but officers were appointed, and there is no reason why the branch should not become one of the best in the country. The village contains some six hundred inhabitants; the surrounding country is rich in arable land.

*Edgar.*—The meeting was held in the Congregational Church; the attendance was small. Rev Angus Trickett, Baptist, and Stillwell, Congregational, briefly advocated the interests of the Society, and the collectors, so far as they had gone around, reported increased contributions.

REV. E. BRÓWNELL.—There was no meeting last year at Cayuga. I left home on Saturday morning in order to reach Cayuga to preach on Sunday, which I did in the Methodist Church. The Bible Society meeting had been announced for Sunday evening. The church was crowded, Dr. Baxter, the president, in the chair. The secretary read his report; telling speeches were delivered by Rev. Mr. Douglas, Presbyterian, and Rev. Mr. Teeple, Methodist, ministers. The Agent also addressed the meeting. The choir did splendid service. You will see Cayuga financially has done well this year.

Nanticoke.—Roads dreadfully bad. President in the chair; Rev. Mr. Jackson, of Jarvis, this year again aided me very much in the meeting. The Rev. Mr. Seaman, Episcopalian minister, also gave a fine address; the audience was fair. There is life in the branch of Nanticoke.

*Cheapside.*—No meeting on account of the dreadful rain. Inspected the Depository, kept well by Mr. Bodell. Rev. Mr. Jackson will preach a sermon on the work, and aid the officers in appointing collectors for the year.

Selkirk.—The best meeting the friends said they had ever had, which was largely due to Rev. Mr. Duff, the pastor. There was a full house, splendid choir, and an unusual degree of enthusiasm.

*Cayuga*, *South.*—This is the best branch I have visited, all things considered. Good audience, good singing, good address by Rev. Mr. Litt, Evangelical minister, and good financial results, meeting in Evangelical Church.

Dunnville.—Meeting in Presbyterian Church. I did not look for a meeting, because of the rain, but we had a fair house and fine spirit. Revs. Messrs. Wilkinson and Bowlby, of the Methodist Church, and the Presbyterian minister; all addressed the meeting very effectively; a union choir rendered good service. Dunnville has had the best year in its history, sales more than doubled, stock finely displayed by Mr. Harrison.

*Ridgeway.*—Meeting in the Methodist Church larger than last year. Rev. S. Wilson, pastor of the church, gave a neat address.

*Port Colborne.*—Meeting in the Methodist Church not large, the pastor was away from home. Rev. Mr. Philmore and new secretary aided me very much. I hope for better things from Port Colborne next year.

REV. A. CAMPBELL.—*Moira*.—The night stormy, yet the meeting fairly attended. Part of the collectors had completed their work and reported, and the others will report soon. Pastor Rev. T. Cleworth, present, to render good service. Officers and collectors appointed, and prospects good for coming season.

Roslin and Thomasburg.—This branch has suffered very much from the great loss of their efficient secretary, Mr. Henry, who died during this year, one who was always in the front in good works. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church at Thomasburg, and was enlivened and cheered by the efficient services of the pastor. Rev. T. Cleworth. For a stormy night the audience was good, and taking into consideration its drawback this year, the report will be a fair one.

Tweed.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, a fair turn out, interest good. The pastor, Rev. Wm. Limbert, did much to stimulate the meeting. Part of the collectors reported, and the others are to follow in this good work; and when the work is done, the report, like Madoc, will be respectable.

*Madoc.*—The president, A. F. Wood, Esq, away on Parliamentary duties. E. D. O'Flynn, Esq., in the chair, with his accustomed ability. The meeting was held futur and flour

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held in the Methodist Church, was larger than usual, and a good prospect for the future, as the report of finance shows. Rev. D. Wishart was at the meeting, and rendered good service. Madoc is noted for good works, the branch will flourish.

Campbellford.—Meeting held in the Baptist Church, president in the chair; officers present, good congregation for stormy night. Ministers of the town present, and rendered good service. Meeting enthusiastic, and the prospects good for coming year. Committee ordered enlargement of stock and forwarded bill by Agent.

Stirling.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, president in the chair; officers present. Rev. J. J. Rice and Rev. Gray, present, and took deep interest in the meeting. The Depositary, Dr. Boulter, reported stock all paid for. Officers elected for the coming year, and prospects encouraging.

Frankford.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, the president in the chair. Revs. S. A. Deprau and Codel were present, and rendered good service. Minutes of last meeting read; officers and collectors appointed; meeting addressed by Agent. Stock in the Depository examined by officers, and enlargement recommended. Meeting enthusiastic, and officers encouraged to promote the good work.

Trenton.—Meeting held in Grace Methodist Church, East Trenton; night stormy, yet President, W. H. Austin, said attendance was larger than usual. President in the chair. Revs. D. F. Gee and R. Duke (Methodist), present, and rendered good service; address by Agent; officers and collectors appointed. Depository stock examined by officers and Agent, and it was recommended that enlargement be made. A subscription and collection taken up; a good prospect of more to follow during the month of February.

REV. JAS. A. R. DICKSON—Copetown.—On the evening of Monday, February 11th, 1889, I visited Copetown branch. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The president of the branch was present and occupied the chair, and there was a good attendance. The Rev. J. G. Forman, pastor of the church, took the introductory exercises. After, the efficient secretary, J. F. Fry, Esq., read his report; he also read the appeal sent out on behalf of Quebec. The Agent then delivered his address, which was attentively listened to and evidently enjoyed. One notable feature of the meeting was the large number of young men and women present. A good report may be looked for from this place.

Alberton.—Next morning a friend of the Bible Society conveyed me to Alberton, to the home of Mr. Secretary Brown, where I was most hospitably entertained. The meeting was held in Trinity Methodist. There was a capital attendance of old and young. The interest in the proceedings was marked. Mr. Brown, after his report, read here also the appeal on behalf of Quebec. Here I had the pleasure of looking over the record of the branch for the last thirty years, and in the minutes of the second year of its existence, I noticed a motion to the effect that a Bible be presented as a gift to each collector as a recognition of their services, a wise act, which would pay the prudence it revealed over and over again. Zeal has many motive forces, does not this act touch one?

Hespeler was the next place I visited on behalf of the Society. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, and was largely attended. A fine choir rendered most valuable assistance, singing several pieces during the evening. There were present the president, Rev. Wm. Morlake, and the Rev. J. Haigh, and the Rev. C. Henders. All the speaking was left to the Agent. Collectors were appointed to make a thorough canvass, and cover ground that has been left for some time untouched, so that good returns may be expected. Dr. McIntyre moving a vote of thanks, said, he for one would double his subscription.

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Strabane was my next point. This branch has a most intelligent and efficient secretary in Mr. Wm. Nichol. Last year a Sabbath service was held here, and a collection of nearly \$18 was taken up. This year without the Sabbath services the contributions will be about as large, so that a real advance is seen. The attendance was quite large. A well-trained choir sang frequently during the evening. Were this attended to in every branch, the meetings in very many cases would be made far more attractive, and the feeling in them warmer, and the results more gratifying. Often the meetings are quite ineffective, because interest and painstaking have gone down to zero.

Waterdown.—Here Bible Society matters were in an unfortunate state. The meeting had not been as well announced as it might have been, yet there was a very fair attendance. The president, Dr. McLaren, filled the chair in an able manner. Collectors were appointed, who no doubt will do their duty faithfully and well. The Rev. Wm. Burns took a lively interest in the proceedings, and assisted by his prayers and counsels.

At  $\mathcal{F}erseyville$  we had an excellent meeting, it is said the largest in twelve years. The president of the branch had moved away, but the Rev. Alfred A. Bowers occupied the chair, took the introductory services, and introduced the Agent. The choir of the Methodist Church, which had been secured by the secretary, Mr. Finlay, gave important aid, making the service attractive. Last year instead of collectors visiting the people, collections were taken up in the two churches; this year they were advised to return to the old method, and did so. The good people here are in excellent spirits, and will no doubt make liberal returns.

*Kilbride.*—Great difficulty was experienced in arranging a meeting at this place. To secure its being held, I had to drive right out from Galt. The meeting had been announced for the Presbyterian Church, but it was thought best to hold it in the Methodist Church, taking advantage of their weekly prayer meeting. The president of the branch occupied the chair, the Methodist minister in charge read the Scriptures and engaged in prayer. The Agent delivered an address on the work of the Society, giving reasons for its being liberally supported, after which the secretary read his report, and the collectors were appointed.

Burlington.—The meeting was fairly well attended, considering that no meeting had been held the previous year. Rev. R. H. Abraham, B.A., presided, and the Methodist minister assisted. A large choir was present to give their valuable aid. After the Agent's address, officers were elected and collectors appointed to canvass the village and district immediately, and from them we look for an excellent report. This branch ought to make itself felt, and doubtless will. Many warm friends of the Bible Society are here, and none more so than the minister.

Glenmorris.—Here a branch was in existence thirty years ago, and after a brief trial of existence, expired. We had a good meeting, and considerable incerest in it. Mr. Pettigrew told of his interest in the work of the Society, and the benefits to be derived from connection with it, especially in broadening our views and enlarging our sympathies. After the Agent's address, Mr. Fleming, one of the officers thirty years before, was chosen president, and the other officers appointed with collectors for the region round about. This is a good substantial community, untouched by any branch near, and without doubt will do its part in the great work of giving the Bible to the world. The officers are good and faithful men.

REV. J. B. DUNCAN.—It would not be fair to infer that the fewness of the numbers in attendance is an indication of the interest in the work of the society; such is not the case. At *Laskey*, for example, the meeting was the smallest of

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any, and yet the work of collecting was nearly finished, and as the president said to those present, the return given in so far indicated that the sum expected to be raised would exceed that realized during any one year since the formation of the branch. At Temperanceville the attendance was somewhat larger than at Las-As the field occupied by this branch is wide, the friends are in the habit of holding their annual meetings at different places in rotation. T is year it was held at Spring Hill, close by King Station, in the Episcopalian Church. The minister in charge, Rev. Mr. Short, and Rev. Mr. Hunt of the Methodist Church were present, and gave really admirable addresses. In the absence of the President, Rev. Mr. Amos, of Aurora, one of your agents, occupied the chair. The work of collecting begun will soon be finished and the monies remitted in good time to appear in the Society's report. There are interested and zealous friends of Bible work in this locality. Temperanceville and Spring Hill might, I am of the opinion, be dealt with as two distinct branches, there is a considerable distance between the two places, and the field is large enough for both. At Thornhill the annual meeting was held and arrangements were made for beginning and completing the canvass for subscriptions at the earliest possible moment. At Newton Brook, a small place, two miles south on Yonge Street, a new branch might with advantage be formed, The two resident Methodist ministers there, might be communicated with in regard to the advisability of such action. What has been said of these branches may be said of Downsview and Richmond Hill, at both of which there are warm friends of the society, who will not fail to look after its interests. An exceedingly pleasant meeting was held at Parkdale, a number of reverend gentlemen being present who contributed by their remarks to its interest and profitableness. A discussion arose as to the advisability of forming a new branch in Toronto (west), to be distinct from Parkdale. The idea found favour with the friends, and it was suggested that the members in that neighbourhood should confer together in reference to the matter, and if agreed regarding it to communicate with the executive committee.

**KEV. J. FRAZER**—*Woodville*.—The annual meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The devotional services were conducted by the Rev. A. Ross, pastor of the congregation. The meeting was above the average, Messrs. Reid and Gilchrist, the worthy president and secretary respectively, who have occupied these positions for a long time, were at their posts, manifesting as deep an interest as ever in their work.

Eldon.—This branch was re-organised last year. Considerable sales were madebut owing to a change of Pastorate, nothing more was done. The annual meeting was a good one, and at it matters were so arranged that the expense of an Agent will not be required next year. In the hands of the Rev. M. McKinnon and the officers appointed the interests of the Society will be well cared for.

Manilla.—Cheering meeting, the officers all in hearty sympathy with the work, and lend themselves to it. The President gave an excellent address, he was followed by Rev Mr. Lloyd, pastor of the Methodist Church, in which the meeting was held, who in a stirring address upheld the Bible and its work as all important. The choir of the church also added greatly to the success of the meeting which was a hearty one in every way.

At Sonya your Agent spent Thanksgiving day, and addressed a fine congregation in the Presbyterian Church. The worthy president, Rev. Mr. Currie, was not found in good health having been laid aside from work for some time. He was improving at the time of your Agent's visit, and we trust the Master will graciously grant full restoration and yet many years of service in the vineyard.

Oakwood.—The annual meeting here was not very well attended as to numbers. The venerable president, though in poor health, presided in an efficient manner. The devotional exercises were conducted by the Methodist minister, pastor of the church. Oakwood is a thriving little village in which considerable

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business is done, and also an educational centre having a prosperous high school. The depository is now in the hands of a live business firm.

Cannington .- The annual meeting here was a good one, the resident Presbyterian minister, Rev. J, B. McLaren, and Methodist, Rev. W. Watch, lending a helping hand. Mr. McLaren retired from the president's chair, and was succeeded by Mr. Watch. Between them and the officers, arrangements will be made for holding their annual meeting without an Agent next year. Cannington is growing rapidly as a trade centre, and is doing well in all Christian work

Little Britain .-- Long years ago when Mr. Whiteside, and one or two other kindred spirits took an interest in Bible Society work in this neighbourhood, they did not in all probability think much of the future, yet the future has borne fruit, Dr. Whiteside grew up a patron of the Society, and has now been called to his reward. The meeting of the Bible Society is a hearty meeting here; may the good seed sown still bring forth fruit. Rev. Mr. Bryden, in whose church the meeting was held, opened the meeting with devotional services, and addressed the congregation; Rev Mr. Pilkey, Christian minister, was also present. The choir rendered some appropriate music. Your Agent was glad to be there.

Cambray .- This was the most thinly attended meeting of the series, but we were not unmindful of the promise "Wheresoever two or three are gathered together in my name, &c.," and by another year if the faithful few are found growing in grace, your Agent then will be greeted by a better Bible Society audience than ever at Cambray.

Glen Arm.-Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church, religious services were conducted by your agent, and sermon preached. The church which is a large one, was nearly filled by young people, "youths and maidens;" surely good will spring up, much good in such promising soil. Rev. Mr. McDonald was present, and one of his elders closed the meeting with prayer.

Fenelon Falls .- Despite an unfavourable evening the meeting held in the Methodist Church was very good ; Rev. Mr. McAmmon, Methodist, and Rev. Mr. Lochead, Presbyterian, were present and assisted. The choir of the Methodist church gave some excellent pieces of music. Collectors were appointed and would proceed with their work at once.

Dunsford .- The night an unfavourable one and there was no turn out, collections will be taken in the various churches in this village.

Mount Albert.—A rough night but a good meeting. Rev. Mr. Harris, pastor of the Methodist Church, in which the meeting was held, conducted the opening services, and addressed the meeting; the choir of the church gave some appropriate music; a deep interest is taken in the work here by earnest hearted men; a good subscription was taken up at the close of the meeting.

Bobcaygeon .- Twelve miles in the rain from Fenelon Falls to find that the notices of meeting had miscarried in some way. The time however was improved by addressing the Presbyterian prayer meeting. The officers were visited, and as they are active men the interests of the Society will not be allowed to languish.

Zephyr.-A branch was formed here with encouraging prospects. Good officers, a good place for depository, active churches. and a good farming section should give good results.

REV. J. B. FRASER, M.D.-Meaford.-Meeting held in the Baptist Church, the pastor, Rev. A. Gay, a warm friend of the Society, in the chair. The Rev. E. Roberts, unavoidably absent, was elected president. Collectors were appointed, who will endeavour to recover the ground lost, through failure to collect last year. The meeting was scarcely up to the average, on account of bad roads and snow storm.

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Angus.—Small meeting on a fairly favourable evening. Short addresses by the Rev. J. Leishman, and president of the branch, Mr. A. Stewart, added much to the interest of the meeting. A union choir furnished some excellent music. Collectors were appointed, and the branch promises to do better financially.

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Painswick.—Beautiful moonlight night but small meeting. The president Mr. Hunter, evidently a zealous friend of the Bible Society, and the secretarytreasurer elect, Mr. J. C. Morrison, gave short but appropriate addresses. The Rev. Dr. Fraser, of Barrie, also contributed much to the interest of the meeting by an appropriate address.

Lefroy and Bell Ewart.—An encouraging meeting, most excellent and appropriate music, for which we were indebted to a union choir. After the Agent's address, a few most appropriate remarks were made by the president and secretary. Collectors were appointed, and arrangements made for a thorough canvass of the district, which is not large.

*Churchill.*—Better meeting than usual. The president, the Rev. W, A. Duncan, occupied the chair, and gave an admirable address on the worth of the Society, advancing many reasons why it should be liberally supported. The choir, which was under the president's able leadership, rendered some most appropriate selections, which added greatly to the attraction of the meeting.

Craiguale and Str ud.—A good meeting. The venerable president of the branch, Mr. Chantler, of Stroud, an enthusiastic friend of the Society in the chair, opened with an earnest address: he was followed by an excellent statement by Mr. McCraw, and stirring addresses by Revs. Savage (Methodist), and McConnell (Presbyterian), interspersed with appropriate music by the choir. The collection and subscription at the meeting amounted to about as much as the total contributions reported last year. When the appointed collectors have done their work, a large remittance may be looked for.

Thernbury and Clarksburg.—A fair meeting in the Presbyterian Church. The business of the branch is in good shape, and the collectors work for the year completed. Clarksburg gives \$25, a fair contribution; Thornbury, the larger place, only \$9 50; the collection at the meeting \$5 85, an earnest of larger contributions next year. We venture to think that Thornbury will not be satisfied to give less than Clarksburg. The Rev. Mr. Fleming conducted the devotions, and gave a short address, in addition to most hospitably entertaining the Agent. Both sections of this branch will do better than their best of past years.

Stayner.—The best meeting so far of the series. Interesting addresses by the president, the Rev. Mr. Stevenson (Methodist), and the Rev. Mr. Moodie (Presbyterian). The collection \$6 gives promise of a liberal contribution in response to the call of the collectors. The choir of the Methodist Church, in which the meeting was held, rendered very acceptable assistance. The president-elect for the year, the Rev. Mr. Croft (Episcopalian), will, it is hoped, help very materially to extend the local interest in the Bible Society.

Avening and Creemore — An encouraging meeting. The president, Mr. Joseph Wood, is an enthusiastic friend of the Society, and in his address from the chair, pressed the claims of the cause very effectively. Addresses were also given by the Rev. Mr. Vickery (Methodist), and the Rev. Mr. Henry (Presbyterian), which added much to the interest of the meeting. The choir of the Methodist Church, in which the meeting was held, furnished most appropriate and delightful music. Collectors were appointed, and a larger than average contribution may be confidently expected.

Singhampton.—The meeting, which was held in the Methodist Church, was smaller than it was the day before. The president, the Rev. H, D. Cooper (Episcopalian), made a very efficient chairman, and gave an earnest address on the claims of the Society. Rev. Mr. Wallace (Presbyterian), also spoke very pointedly and practically. The choir of the church added much to the interest

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of the meeting. The secretary, Mr. D. Grant, jr., is a most efficient officer, and the interests of the cause will be well looked after.

Maple Valley.—A purely country branch, but a capital meeting; a church full of interested people; exceptionally good music by a combined choir; the business in good shape and promptly dispatched; an address from Rev. Mr. Wallace, pastor of the church; and a very creditable collection. Good returns may be expected when the collectors report.

REV. R. D. FRASER—Hampt n.—Much the same audience as last year. A good practical address from Rev. E. Barrass, M.A. (Methodist), who occupied the chair in the absence of the president. The appointments made last year for increasing the area worked by collectors resulted in a considerable increase in the contributions There is still one territory uncanvassed.

Garden Hill.—As evening closed in a heavy and steady rain fall began, which ruined the prospects of a meeting. The president, Rev. R. A. Rooney, was absent from home, and only the secretary, Rev. Dr. Jamieson, and your Agent, put in an appearance at the church. Dr. Jamieson and the secretary promised to have the collectors appointed, and the work of the Society noticed from the various pulpits the Sabbath before the collectors should commence their work. In this way it is hoped that at least the standard of the previous yeare will be reached.

*Hope.*—Meeting in the Methodist Church at Canton; small, but intelligent, and thoroughly interesting. The venerable president, Rev. R. Hurley (Methodist), in the chair. His continued enthusiasm for the Bible Society was evidenced by the personal efforts made by him during the year in the collection of funds, and by his admirable address from the chair. Rev. Messrs. Kilgour and Tomkins (Methodist), in brief speeches, expressed their sympathy with the cause. Hope is one of the substantial branches.

Newtonville and Kendal.— The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church-Kendal, with a very fair attendance and close attention. R. Hodge, Esq., an old resident and friend of the Society, presided. Rev. A. Leslie, M.A. (Presbyterian), of Newtonville, acted as secretary, and also delivered a practical address, Although but a single collector had done his work, the financial result was far in advance of the previous year. I think the field will be fully overtaken this year. There ought to be a large return from the branch.

Orono. --R. Moment, Esq., was in his place. G. M. Long, Esq., the faithful secretary, was prevented from being present by reason of his duties as reeve of the township at the county council. The audience looked small in the large Methodist Church, but it was composed of true friends of the Society. Valuable help was given by Revs. T. Dunlop (Methodist), J. A. McKeen, B.A. (Presbyterian), and Elder Garbutt (Christian).

West Darlington.—A very cold but beautifully clear night. The meeting was held in the Maple Grove Church (Methodist), at the eastern limit of the field. Arrangements were attempted at the previous annual meeting in the direction of extending the canvass to this section, but they were only partially successful From the interest manifested at the meeting I confidently expect that a good return will be made this year from Maple Grove neighbourhood, as well as from the part of the field previously worked.

Enniskillen.—A somewhat small gathering in the Presbyterian Church. A short and earnest address by the president, Rev. A. McLaren (Presbyterian), gave a good start to the meeting. The branch has a little more than held its own, and if all the collectors appointed will do their work may easily make considerable advances.

*Cartwright.*—A very cold and rough night, and therefore a smaller attendance than last year. The meeting was held in the new Methodist Church, a neat and

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commodious edifice. Cartwright almost doubled its contributions last year. There is an excellent business-like committee with Thomas Werry, Esq., a welltried worker in the Bible cause, at its head. Rev. R. Hassard (Methodist) spoke very earnestly and forcibly. Cartwright branch is sure to keep up its reputation.

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REV. THOS. GOLDSMITH—Mount Pleasant (Brant).—Here I had my first meeting, November 6th. Though the attendance was not large (but above the average for some years), it was spirited, and the prospects for this year are good We were ably assisted by Rev. Mr. Sinclair, Presbyterian Minister, in whose church the meeting was held: officers and collectors were appointed and an early canvass will be made for the funds of the Society.

New Durham.—Here the ministers within the branch had anticipated the Agent's visit, and held meetings in the several school sections in their territory, and I am glad to learn with satisfactory results.

**Princeton.**—The night dark and rainy, yet all within the church bright and cheery, the meeting was held in the Episcopal Church, and its minister, Rev. Mr, Johnston, and Rev. Mr. Moore, of the Methodist Church, were present, and gave excellent addresses, and will hold several meetings within their field. I look for a marked revival in the Princeton branch this year, and increased financial returns.

Drumbo.—Though the attendance here was not large it was said to be above the average for the place. I was efficiently aided here by the Methodist minister whose Christian hospitality, and that of his excellent wife, I heartily enjoyed, They promise a vigorous effort in this branch, and I hope their return may justify their expectations.

On Saturday I went to St. George, and called on some of the friends of the Society, and on Sabbath by arrangement of the committee I preached in the Presbyterian Church, and in the evening I preached in the Methodist; Presbyterian, and Baptist ministers gave up their evening services, and with their people joined with us in a united service. The spacious building was crowded, the several ministers taking part in the service, and the collection was given to the Bible Society. On Monday evening the annual meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, the Methodist, Presbyterian, and Baptist ministers taking part in the meeting, which was the largest held for many years in the place. This branch has taken a new lease of life.

Washington.—This is an old vigorous branch. Here I enjoyed the able assistance and hospitality of Rev. Mr. Masson; the meeting not large but enthusiastic and will, I trust give a good financial report this year.

Chesterfield Branch had its meeting this year in Bright. We had the Rev. Mr. Robertson, Presbyterian, and Rev. Mr. Moore, Methodist minister present, the latter in the chair. They gave stirring addresses and the meeting was large and promises good results. The next day being Thanksgiving day I preached for Mr. Robertson at Chesterfield, reminding the people of the Bible Society, and in the evening visited Plattsville. Here we had a full house in the German Methodist Church, their minister in the chair, addresses good, and the prospects for the year encouraging.

Thorold.—I received the warm hospitality which my old friends Mr. and Mrs. Munro know so well how to dispense. The meeting though not large was one of real interest. We found the books of the Depository in a bad state, they had been in a fire, and had been on the street for some time, and were many of them much injured. A committee was appointed to look after the matter, and Mr. Munro was appointed Depositary. A good staff of collectors will proceed to canvass for subscriptions, and I am sure Thorold will give a good report of itself.

North Pelham .- They had no meeting here last year and nothing was done.

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We had but a small attendance as the roads and weather were most unfavourable, but we had an enthusiastic meeting and appointed a good staff of collectors who will go into the work at once.

Font Hill.—Here the branch reports no meeting for five years. Though the night was cold and dark we had a good congregation, fine singing, and good addresses from the resident ministers of the Methodist and Baptist Churches. Officers and collectors were appointed and they enter hopefully upon the work.

Welland —Two excellent ladies volunteered their services to collect, the meeting went heartily into reorganization, with Rev. Mr. Brownell, president. The discussion which was very profitable was participated in by our venerable and tried friend, Rev. Mr. Kennedy. and Rev. Mr. McCuaig (Presbyterian), and Rev. Mr. Brownell (Methodist); I hope this branch may have a long career of usefulness.

From here I went to *Niagara Falls*, and on Sabbath preached in the morning for the Presbyterians, and in the evening for the Methodists Monday evening we had our meeting in the Methodist Church, the venerable and Rev. Canon Houston, president, in the chair. The attendance though small was said to be more than average for the place. I had the assistance of the Rev. Mr. Emory (Methodist) on the platform, and his kind hospitality in the family. Two excellent young ladies have undertaken to collect for the Society.

Niagara Falls, South, had a grand meeting. Though a public concert divided the interest with us, we had a good attendance. Rev. Mr. Acheson, the veteran president, was at his post and of course presided. The choir of the church discoursed good music, and the ministers of the Methodist and Presbyterian Churches were present to aid by their council, and advocacy of the good cause. Their subscriptions though not complete were well advanced, and will be about the same as last year.

Niagara.—The night was dark and a down-pour of rain, yet a goodly number were out. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, the minister of the church presiding. The Methodist minister gave a good address, as also the chairman, in opening the meeting; collectors were appointed and all ready to begin their work. All seemed hopeful for a successful year.

REV. E. B. HARPER, D.D. — *Eramosa.*—This branch was visited on December 27. The meeting was held in the Congregational Church, where a goodly number assembled. The report of the collectors showed a gratifying increase on last year. The president, J. A. Armstrong, Esq., took the chair and opened the meeting. The choir of the church assisted greatly by appropriate music. Rev. D. McCormick, pastor of the congregation, gave an earnest address, and the Agent spoke for thirty-five minutes and received good attention. The officers of the branch were appointed. The money was voted in equal sums to the U. C. B. S. and the B. F. B. S. This branch is living, healthy, and fruit-bearing.

Eden Mills was reached through pouring rain on the evening of the 16th of January. The Rev. Mr. Walker, Methodist minister, conveyed me from Rockwood to Presbyterian Church, just outside the village, where the meeting was to be held; the officers of the branch, with a very few others, were present, to whom the Agent spoke for half an hour. The money was voted to the U. C. B. S. The appointments for the next year were made, and the meeting was closed.

*Beverlev* (Kirkwall, P.O.) was reached on the 19th February. The distance from Brampton is almost fifty miles, which was passed over by rail and sleigh. The roads were heavily drifted; yet the Presbyterian Church, the place of meeting, was reached at 7:45: there was a larger attendance than last year; but, the illness of the Rev. Mr. Carruthers, the efficient president of the branch, detracted from the pleasure which his presence would have supplied. Mr. Menzies opened the meeting and gave a beautiful and fitting address, and the Agent followed in an address, which was well received. The members of the committee were all re-appo and the Acte

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Acton.—This thriving village was visited on 26th February. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, of which Rev. Dr. Gifford is pastor. Although the snow was falling fast the attendance was good; a large union choir gave their services and added much to the interest of the meeting; the president, Mr. Warren, took the chair; the secretary, Dr. Lowry, reported the sales and collections for the year. The Rev. D. B. Gordon, of Georgetown, gave an excellent address, full of practical suggestions, and the Agent followed; the collections were \$12.71. The officers were then appointed, and thanks tendered to the choir, the collectors, and the retiring president.

Campbellville.—Meeting was held in the Methodist Church, which was well lighted, comfortably warm, and nearly filled with friends of the Bible cause. The president, Mr. James Moffatt, took the chair and conducted the meeting. A letter from the Board of Directors was read, asking for additional means to extend colportage in the Province of Quebec, and in view of its requirements, two thirds of the money raised was voted to the U. C. B. S., and one-third to the B. & F. The Rev. Mr. Birks and the Rev. Mr. Blair gave able addresses, after which the Agent spoke and the collection was made.

Nassagawevi was taken on the 28th February, the meeting was held in thee Methodist Church, which was in every way more comfortable than was the town hall last year; we had a fair attendance and good singing by the choir. The officers of the branch were in attendance, and attended to their duties with promptitude and harmony; the Revs. Blair and Birks aided again with good speeches, and the Agent added his proportion. Here, too, the appeal having been made in the interests of Quebec, the meeting followed the action of Campbellville, by giving two-thirds of the funds to the U. C. B. S., and one-third to the B. & F.

Malton.—Meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church on the evening of the 21st March. The attendance was select, although not large; the Rev. Mr. Sanderson was the only minister present; he opened with devotional exercises. The president took the chair, and after a short speech, assigned to the Agent all the time he needed. Malton did well last year, and engages to do so again. There is no Depository kept here.

REV. DR. HODGKIN.—*Beamsville* was the first place visited. Here I had not been for upwards of forty years, and was gratified by many proofs of progress. The Depository sales had been small, a great part of the stock needs marking down, and additions are needed. Arrangements were made by the officers to attend to this; financial matters had run sadly behind. At the meeting the attendance was small as usual. The new president, Rev. E. H. Koyl, is likely to fill the place well, and show considerable interest in the work.

*Grimsby* was visited on the following day; meeting neither large nor enthusiastic, although the branch here surpasses any of its neighbours in contributions. The Depository is well kept, accounts correct, and the proceeds remitted.

Smithville, eight miles distant, was reached by stage. The Depository was visited and found satisfactory. The meeting in the Methodist Church was smaller than I expected, and the interest not as great. No minister of the neighbourhood was present. On the following day, "Thanksgiving" service was to be held in the Presbyterian Church, and it had been announced that there would be a collection to be given to the Bible Society. I also attended this meeting and addressed it; Thursday, I was at St. Anne's, three miles from Smithville, but the heavy clay was better for the fields than for the roads. The meeting was in the Presbyterian Church, a fine building, marking strongly when contrasted with the old frame one across the road, the progress in outward things that had been made. The meeting was well attended, and the people were interested. The Depository is well managed.

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*Wellandport* was my destination on Friday, its distance of six or seven miles travelled by one horse mail "rig." The village is pleasantly situated at the the head of navigation on Welland River or Chippewa Creek The night was very cold, the first decidedly heavy frost; this, perhaps, unfavourably affected the meeting, which, however, was very creditable. The usual routine business was transacted, but there was nothing of special interest.

My next meeting was at *Caistorville*. Returning to Smithville on Saturday morning, in the afternoon I was taken from thence by Mr. Harvey Buckbee, of Fulton, to his home, where I found my niece, his wife, with every arrangement for my comfort. I preached on behalf of the Society to a good congregation at "Ker's," Caistorville branch, and was then taken seven miles for another sermon at Caistorville, in the evening. Here, on Monday, the annual meeting was held; the attendance was stated to be particularly good, and those present seemed to be interested. Their usual arrangements were made with all appearances that they would be carried out. Depository is satisfactory.

*Caistor* branch had its meeting on Tuesday; the meeting was a good one. Some difficulty was found in appointing a Depositary, as the former one was about to leave the neighbourhood. The next meeting was that of *South Saltfleet* branch, and was held at Tapleytown. The Rev. Mr. Smith (Church of England), the former president, who had rendered valuable service to the branch, had recently removed to Elora. The meeting was good; there are some warm friends of the Bible cause here, and it is to be hoped that their ardent wishes may be realized. The Depository appears to be well cared for, and to have a good assortment.

REV. E. D. McLAREN—Cheltenham.—The meeting was held in the Baptist Church, the chair being occupied by the pastor, the Rev. E. T. Carter, who, along with Rev. J. L. Campbell, of the Presbyterian Church, conducted the opening exercises. Your Agent's address was supplemented by short, but earnest and hopeful speeches from Mr. Campbell and Mr. Carter. The audience though not large, was very attentive, and all present seemed to be deeply impressed with the importance of the Bible Society work. I hope to hear of increased liberality shown by the branch.

*Hillsburg.*—The next night was intensely cold, and the audience was correspondingly small; but the warm enthusiasm of the genial president, and the efficient secretary-treasurer, and the deep interest manifested by the few who were present, largely compensated for the indifference of the absentees. The audience listened with closest attention to the statement submitted by your Agent, as well as to an earnest appeal by the Rev. Mr. Armstrong, which brought the meeting to a close.

Georgetown.—In the unavoidable absence of the president, the chair was occupied by Mr. George Fraser, an old and staunch friend of the Bible Society. Words of cordial approval and encouragement were spoken by the Rev. D. B. Gordon, of the Baptist Church, and by the Rev. Joseph Fennell, of the Church of England. Mr. Fennell was selected president for the ensuing year. The report of Mr. Harrison, secretary-treasurer, which was in every way an admirable one, showed that the contributions of the Georgetown branch for the present year were larger than they had ever been. A similar increase is hoped for next year.

Derry West.—The almost impassable state of the roads formed a sufficient excuse for the smallness of the attendance at the annual meeting of the Derry West branch. The president was in his place, and the few friends who were assembled with him showed not only by their presence, but also by the close attention they gave to your Agent's remarks, that the interest of this branch in the Society's operations is still active. RET Hall. McLei in good to this Ho

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REV. J. MCMILLAN—*Drayton.*—The meeting was held in the Temperance Hall. The president, Mr. Wilson, was in the chair. Elder Rosser, and Mr. McLeish were present, and spoke warmly in favour of the Society; the stock is in good order and everything has been arranged and calculated to give succesto this branch.

*Hollin*—We arrived here early in the day and had ample time to visit friend. Dr. Fell and Mr. Hugh Maxwell had their work in good shape and were present to report. Our meeting was in the Methodist Church; the president was absent, but Captain Thompson was called to the chair and conducted the business with ability; he was added to the committee. No minister was present but the Agent, the meeting was better attended than last year, and there was a good report of work done by the collectors and people. Everything was left in good working order for another year.

*Glenallan.*—This branch was not visited last year, and as might be expected things were out of order, but the Bible Society has many warm friends in the place; our meeting was in the Presbyterian Church. The Rev. James Harris, Methodist, presided; he, and the Rev. Mr. Norris, the pastor, made excellent speeches, and gave all the help they could to the Agent, and collectors were appointed, and immediate action aimed at. This branch will give good account of itself at the Bible house, Toronto, when the collectors make their return.

*Rothsay.*—This branch works well; it had its highest record last year, means and methods were adopted to reach if possible a higher figure this season than any yet attained; all the office bearers were in their places ready to report, the meeting was in the Methodist Church. The Rev. Mr. Edmison, my host, was present, and made a good speech; the stock is in good order, it is a pleasure to meet this branch, the work is loved for its own sake and is done well.

*Moorefield.*—This is a nice village, the night of our meeting was fine, we met in the Methodist Church, and the pastor, Mr. McLachlin was with us, and he spoke warmly of the Bible Society; the Rev. Mr. Edmison was also present part of the time, he is a man always to be relied upon. The stock is in good order, officers and collectors were duly appointed, and good results may be expected.

Garafraxa.—Our meeting at this place was in the Methodist Church, the Rev. Mr. Wright, as president, took the chair. This branch had a good record last year, Christian people of all denominations feel deep interest in the cause as God's cause, all the office bearers were on hand to report; the stock well kept, the night was fine and audience good. The Rev. Messrs. Willimot (Methodist), and Millican (Presbyterian), spoke after the Agent's address, commending the Society.

Mimosa.—This branch is seven miles from last place, it was not visited last year and was found in a state of disorder. We met in the Presbyterian Church where a large audience gathered, Mr. J. Leslie acted as president, the usual address was delivered, followed by several addresses by the people themselves. The Society was soon reorganized, and collectors were appointed. A fine spirit was manifested, and no doubt good work will be done this year.

REV. J. G. MANLY.—The work of the year cannot be reviewed without gratitude and thanksgiving. Graciously helped by the Divine Hand, I was not once hindered or delayed by accident or illness, and did not miss a single appointment. Following up the lectures of previous years, on "Bashan and Israel," "Egypt and Israel," &c., with the lecture on "Babylon and Israel," in order to secure increased appreciation of the Divine Book, and lay a broader and deeper foundation in the hearts of the people for the work of Bible supply, I was encouraged by many indications of acceptance—in attendance, sympathy, and gifts. The magnificent British and Foreign Bible Society, the best and grandest in the world, including its peerless auxiliary, the Upper Canada, needs only to be better known to be much more loved and helped. To this end, I have continued to promote the better circulation of its most interesting annual report,

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containing seventeen maps, geographical and linguistic, and describing worldwide evangelism. Even now, after eighty-four years, comparatively few have an adequate conception of what this philanthropic institution is doing at home and abroad, in helping the churches, helping multiform beneficence, helping all evangelical missions throughout the world. It ought to become much better known, in what it has done and is doing for all mankind, by translating the Scriptures into more of the world's thousands of tongues, by revising former translations, by immensely multiplying copies and widely circulating them by a colportage Agency that not only carries the written message, but bears witness to its import and worth, by branch Societies that provide and localize supplies of Scripture, and furnish pecuniary aid, and by visiting Agents that increase and help the branches, and represent the whole organization.

The North-second section, comprising *Thornton*, *Ivy*, *West Essa*, *Alliston*, *Beeton*, *Rosemont*, *Cookstown*, *Bond Head*, and *Bradford*, was visited in August and September, according to this order, including Sunday services at West Essa and Alliston. In some places the harvest was deficient, in others abundant, but everywhere are felt the supremacy and worth of the Bible and its work in the world.

The Kingston sections, east and west, are on the whole decidedly advancing, in both Scripture circulation and pecuniary contributions. The colporteur, Mr. Lockhart, aided me in parts of the field. Rain hindered at Cataraqui and Odessa, as did some local changes elsewhere. Parham, Seeley's Bay, and Inverary are well chosen places for Bible supply.

Verona seems much the same, Sunday services would much help it and Harrowsmith and Sydenham. Pittsburgh, under the Rev. J. Gallaher's presidency, and with other ministerial help, appreciates Bible Society services and Bible supply. Garden Island is always encouraging. The attendance at Wolfe Island is always much dependent on moonlight, weather, and the state of the roads. The Battersea and Sunbury branch is encouraging, and is now ministerially reinforced. Bath and Amherst Island are strong points.

The Wroxeter meeting is always good. A Sunday might well be spent for it and at Mc Intosh and Belmore, which are all good places for Bible work. Lakelet meeting good on a dark and rainy night. Union Sunday services at Clifford (with good collection), and Harriston twice, well attended. Teeswater is a model Society, in the hands of a model Secretary. The meeting was well attended in rainy weather, and well opened and conducted, by the retiring president. The Society covers both town and country. Gorrie has been depressed by a succession of fires, but is heartily helped by the resident ministers. Fordwich meeting was well attended by the people, and its three ministers. Holstein gives both help and promise. Three well attended Sunday services in the flourishing town of Mt. Forest, in three different churches, gave twenty-one dollars to begin the yearly finances of this well officered branch. At Arthur I found both hearty ministerial help and ready volunteering for collecting work. Grand Valley, better for spirit than numbers.

Bluevale meeting well attended on a dark and rainy night. Usual good gathering at Belgrave. A town of such increase as Wingham, with the concurrence of all its ministers, may well be expected to become a strong factor in Bible Society work. Good meeting at St. Helens, and vote of thanks to the retiring president after long service. Lucknow meeting thinned by rain, but collecting work nearly done. Large congregations at Langside and Kinlough. Brussels hindered by rain, but a hearty meeting and good collection. Good attendance at Atwood after last year's increase of twenty dollars. Trowbridge growing. Molesworth well attended in rainy weather. Listowel meeting attended by four ministers, speaking well to a small audience in a perfect downpour; business well transacted.

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Best attendance as yet at *Breslau*, in New Mennonite Church. Large attendance at *Bloomingdale*, in German Methodist Church, and at *Winterbourne* for both Thanksgiving service and Bible Society, aided by three ministers. Good attendance at *Linwood*, with increased help after a better harvest. Fair attendance at *Hawksville*. Encouraging service at *Elmira*, *New Hamburgh* as before. Pleasant meeting, though not large, at *Preston*.

New society hopefully formed at *Pontypool*, a thriving village, about twenty miles west of Peterboro, on the Canadian Pacific Railway, where a supply of Bibles was much needed, Only one church here as yet, whose pastor from Ballyduff heartily helped and was made president. Capital meeting in the fine new Presbyterian Church of *Keene*; good attendance, good service of song (which should be always), good president and secretary, and good co-operation of all the ministers, after good work last year. Fair attendance at *Hastings*, with two ministers, in ungenial weather with muddy roads. Good meeting at *Norwood* in the Episcopal Church, with pastor and the other ministers and people.

Very spirited, earnest, and well addressed meeting at Windsor, resolving on adequate action for so important a town (soon to be a city), and giving a collection of eighteen dollars. A good friend present volunteered to collect. An early committee meeting to be held for the work. Receipts increased at Amherstburg. Hindered by rain and bad roads at West Tilbury, but better prospects with the new minister, with whom Comber also (with its large attendance) is not likely to retrograde. Walked three miles of a bog road and back, climbing fences and jumping ditches, and acquiring tenacious clay, for the Buxton meeting, as no conveyance could be had. The meeting was interesting and well conducted by the Methodist minister, Mr. Mason, living at a distance. Buxton and the flatlands generally should have Sunday services, in the season of better roads. Caught the early train for the Muirkirk Station, and a walk to Duart, for a good meeting and a well managed Society, aided by the Presbyterian clerical president, and the Episcopal pastor. Fingal affected by a sad accident preventing the president, but well addressed by the Rev. G. Sutherland who evinced a thorough acquaintance and sympathy with the Society; good secretary-treasurer appointed. Good meeting with good men, Baptist, Presbyterian, and Methodist, at West Lorne. Best attendance as yet of the Kintyre branch, which is in good managing hands. Aldboro gives promise, despite rain and mud at the service time. Rodney is a central Depository for three branches as well as a distinct branch, and gave a good meeting.

Good meeting at Warsaw, and good speeches. Presbyterian, Baptist, and Methodist, with 30 miles of travel for it. Cavanville affected by another gathering. Mt. Pleasant affected by constant rain. Springville meeting addressed in a day of storm, and adjourned. Bethany meeting good with two ministers, though lessened by a different meeting at the same time Janetville anniversary, a great success, with two discourses, crowded attendance, good collection, and forty dollars of subscription. Omemee meeting good, doubling its collectorship.

Two Sunday sermons, and a Monday evening lecture in the *East Williams* branch, with better atten tance in a snowy time. *Parkhill* and *Camlachie* meetings good. *Forest* specially helped Quebec. *Arkona* bestirred and hopeful. To *Ravenswood* for a good meeting and back, in a fierce storm. Two services and annual meeting in *Thedford*, with rough weather and good attendance. Catalogued and repriced the stock. *Mocretown* as usual. *Wallaceburg* can do much better. *Dresden* doing well, and also *Watford*.

The Lakefield meeting, north of Peterboro, was the best for years, despite counter attractions. Adjourned Springville meeting, good in cold and stormy weather. Pleasant meeting for East Puslinch. Two services, and Monday evening meeting at Thamesville; and Sunday afternoon services with good attendance at Botany; followed by McGillivray and Biddulph. Successful meetings at Elim-

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ville and Kippen. Kirkton and Brucefield postponed on account of other meetings. Sermon at Brucefield. Good audience and lecture with encouraging result at Varna. Best meeting at Bayfield I have known, with four ministers, income more than doubled, and Depository satisfactory. Clinton reached by stage in a storm, and found as usual, fruitful under excellent management. Best meeting I have known at Goderich, and good sales of Scripture. A well attended and cheering meeting at Waldemar. Two services and lecture for Londesboro. Better attendance and fair sales for the new branch at Kinburn. Large attendance at Nile. Dungannon, and Manchester. The Blyth anniversary that never fails was affected by snowstorm, but the income is not lessened, and the sales of Scripture are large. Two services at Egmondville, with better audiences than before.

May the word of the Lord, year by year and daily, have free course and be glorified, till Jerusalem the new is made a praise in all the earth !

REV. T. ALBERT MOORE—*Hagersville*.—Owing to the extremely disagreeable weather, the annual meeting was poorly attended. Rev. Messrs. Sanders (Methodist), and Cripps (Baptist), both rendered assistance. The Agent addressed the meeting, after which the officers and collectors were appointed. Either from oversight or negligence, this important territory was not canvassed last year, but it is expected that this year's financial returns will manifest a large hearted earnestness in the Bible Society work at this place. The Agent enjoyed the hospitality of the efficient secretary during his visit.

Oneida.—Despite the very bad roads, the Presbyterian Church was well filled by the earnest friends of the Bible Society. Rev. Mr. Caswell is a great help at the annual meeting. The Agent's address was very attentively listened to, after which a good collection was taken up. This branch is thoroughly worked, and is in a very healthy condition. Owing to advancing ag the former president resigned, but this branch will continue its vigorous work.

York.—The Grand River having risen very high I was forced to retrace my steps to Hagersville and Caledonia, from which place I reached York by stage. It was a disagreeable evening, but a pleasant and successful meeting in the Town Hall Interest was added by an address by Rev. Mr. Sifton (Methodist), and also the presence of the choir of the Methodist Church. A good return will be made by this branch. The old officers were efficient and were deservedly re-elected.

*Glanford.*—I spent Sunday here, preaching three times in the interests of the Bible Society in as many Methodist Churches. Close attention was paid at each place, and the subscriptions taken up at the close of each service, promised considerable advance on former years. The hospitality of the genial secretary was thankfully received, and heartily appreciated.

*Binbrook.*—A very small meeting in the Methodist Church, presided over by the Rev. Mr. Walker, president. The Agent presented reasons, results, and benefits, of the Bible Society work, and was closely followed throughout. The reports were highly satisfactory, and showed that the collectors do thorough work. Rev. Mr. Culver gave a short address.

East Ancaster.—This branch will in future be known as Carluke. A small small but intelligent audience who seemed deeply interested in Bible work. Rev. Mr. Doherty (Pre.byterian), in whose church the meeting was held gave valuable aid. The Agent pressed the claims of work among the French Canadians, and their need of the Word of God. Your Agent was very kindly received here as everywhere else. This branch will doubtless increase its contributions.

Ancaster.—The meeting was held in the town hall where about sixty had gathered. Rev. Messrs. Clark and Youmans were present and gave brief addresses, after the Agent had presented the claims of the work. This branch is well officered and a bright future seems to be for it. Re Churc account consid tors w was p but t branc Socie

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REV. J. H. MOORHOUSE — Alton. — The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. A tea meeting in the vicinity doubtless affected the attendance. The accounts were clearly presented by the efficient secretary, Mr. Scott, and were considered satisfactory. The officers of last year were re-appointed; the collectors were carefully appointed. The Methodist minister, the Rev. Mr. Thompson, was present, and rendered excellent service. The Depository is carefully kept, but the stock being low, I recommended replenishing. The officers at this branch are all reliable, and will doubtless take good care of the interests of the Society.

Shelburne.—In the afternoon I visited the school and announced the meeting in the various rooms; meeting held in church of the United Brethren. A counter-attraction doubtless lessened the attendance, but a fair number, about sixty, assembled, and the meeting passed off heartily. Three ministers were present: Presbyterian, Methodist, Church of England. The accounts were duly presented, officers elected, and collectors appointed. Inquiry revealed the fact that there must be considerable territory in the adjoining country unoccupied for the Society; and Horning's Mills, Laurel and Corbetton, were suggested by the meeting as desirable points for the organisation of branches.

Dundalk.—A poor attendance, but the business was carried through thoroughly. We succeeded, I think, in electing an efficient set of officers. I called on them personally next day and they all consented to act. Rev. W. H. Moss, Methodist, appointed president, was at the meeting and gave help. Despite the small attendance I believe good work was done, and the branch will be the better of the toning up. I was glad to find under other discouraging circumstances, that the branch had attended to the collections during the past year, \$34.25 being on hand.

Desborough.—This is a point some nine miles out from Chatsworth. The meeting was held in the township hall, fully 150 were present. Your agent spoke some fifty minutes on the history, nature and operations of the Bible Society. Rev. Messrs. Rogers and Fairlie, also spoke in favour of the work. It was then moved that a branch should be formed at Desborough. The motion was enthusiastically carried. Officers and committee were carefully selected and appointed, and four of the collectors were appointed. This was one of the heartiest meetings I have ever attended. I fully expect that Desborough will also give a good account of itself.

North Sydenham.—Meeting in the Presbyterian Church. The Rev. Mr. Dewar, for so many years president of this branch, and a warm friend of the Society was at the meeting, not being prevented by his blindness from thus manifesting his interest in the work. Rev. Mr. Cumming, Baptist, was appointed chairman, and he filled the position ably. There was a good attendance, 100 or more, and the address of your Agent was attentively listened to. The meeting hearty, and the collection the largest given during my tour, \$12.55. A vote of thanks was tendered to the choir from Leith, who kindly gave their assistance in the singing.

Markdale.—I called on the resident ministers whom I could reach. On Sunday I preached three times, morning and evening in Markdale, in the afternoon at Berkley, five miles out. On Monday, the meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. There was a fair attendance, about sixty-five. I presented the claims and work of the society as clearly as I could, after which it was unanimously decided to organize a branch Bible Society at Markdale. Several years ago there was a branch here, but from some cause it had ceased to exist. Markdale being a stirring village of some 800 inhabitants, with available country around, there is no reason why a branch there should not thrive and do good work. Pains were taken to elect good officers, and collectors were appointed.

Mono Centre .- Meeting in the Presbyterian Church. The night was dark and

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misty. This, together with the fact that diphtheria had shown itself in the neighbourhood, doubtless affected the attendance. There were 34 present; the president, Mr. Coleman, having removed to Orangeville, Rev. G. Ballantyne occupied the chair, and offered some appropriate remarks. Minutes and accounts read and adopted; officers and collectors duly appointed. I found the Depository here almost dead, the stock being very old, and it was decided to provide a case and order a stock of books. This will be not only an advantage to the neighbourhood, but will also aid in advertising the work of the Society.

*Camilla.*—Meeting held in the handsome and commodious Presbyterian Church, a fair attendance, sixty-one. After the opening exercises business was duly attended to. Owing to its proximity to Mono Centre and Orangeville, this branch is small, but the people are interested in the Society's work, as evinced by their contribution last year amounting to \$30. Under the efficient presidency of Rev. G. Ballantyne, this branch may be expected to continue prosperous.

REV. J. L. MURRAY—Southampton.—I commenced my labours by organizing a new branch in this town. I found the leading men of the place, clerical and lay, in full sympathy with the object of my visit, and glad of the opportunity of giving a helping hand in so good a cause. The Rev. Mr. Tolmie, "mine host," in whose church the meeting was held, occupied the chair, and heartily seconded my efforts. The Methodist minister was no less cordial in his support. After the addresses a branch was organized by the unanimous vote of the meeting, and with considerable enthusiasm. Some of the most enterprising and zealous men in all the churches of the town were elected as officers and committee men. A collection of \$8.19 augurs well for the free contribution that may be expected from Southampton this year.

*Burgoyne.*—At our meeting I was ably assisted by the Rev. Mr. Sherlock, of Arkwright, and by the officers of the branch. The contributions from Burgoyne last year were not liberal, but they are expected to be doubled this year.

Arkwright is the smallest branch on my list; it is circumscribed by adjacent branches. Its record for the last eight years is not very flattering, but the Rev. Mr. Sherlock (Methodist), who is the only resident minister in the place, is determined that the year 1889 will have a different tale to tell. The evening was very wet and stormy, which militated against our attendance, yet all the necessary machinery was set in operation for the present year.

Paisley.—This is a large and living branch, whose contributions have been liberal for many years. Our meeting was held in St. Andrew's Church, whose pastor, the Rev. John Gillies, occupied the chair. There were present, besides, the Rev. Messrs. Rupert, McEwan and Johnson, all of whom spoke well and to the point. The good record of Paisley in the past is to be improved upon during the present year if promises are not illusory.

Pink rton.—My recollections of last year's visit to this branch were very pleasant, and those of this year are equally so. Exceptionally good music was furnished by a choir made up for the occasion out of the different church choirs of the town. The Methodist minister of the place, the Rev. Mr. Fydell, was my right-hand man. Considerable enthusiasm was awakened, and a liberal collection of \$7 70 was the immediate result of it. Collectors are now at work to procure a handsome free contribution to the Society.

Hanover.—I spent the Sabbath in this town, and preached in the Presbyterian Church in the morning, in the township of Normanby in the afternoon, and in the Methodist Church in the evening. The president of the branch, the Rev. N. Paterson, was confined to his bed by a fractured limb and a dislocated ankle. The Rev. Mr. Higley, Episcopalian, was called to the chair, and was also appointed president for the year. He gave a lucid and comprehensive address in advocating the claims of our Society, and was followed by the Rev. Messrs. Wal Chu lang succ

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Walker and Galloway of the Methodist Church, and Kose of the German Baptist Church, all of whom spoke admirably. Mr. Kose's address was in the German language. Much credit is due to our secretary, John Proctor, Esq., J.P., for the success of this branch; he is a host in himself

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Wiarton.-..Here, and here only, our meeting suffered by coming in collision with another meeting. Our meeting in the circumstances was not as large as that of last year. The enthusiasm last year was unusually high, and the collection was liberal; but, partly on account of the death of our Depositary, Mr. McMillan, and mainly on account of the Scott Act agitation, which began immediately after our meeting, no subscriptions were solicited during the year. Wiarton this year promises to double its usual contributions within the next six weeks.

Allenfor:.—Here I organized a new branch under very favourable auspices. The absence of Messrs. Moore and Burwash, at a county temperance convention, was regretted by us all; yet the meeting was a good one, and the branch which was organized at its close, gives promise of a successful future. Earnest intelligent Christian men were elected to office, and collectors are to be sent out without delay to canvass the village and the surrounding country for subscriptions.

Tara and Invermay.—Our meeting here last year was excellent, and our meeting two weeks ago was better still. The branch is in good heart because it is in good hands. Mr. A. Brunton, a veteran Bible Society worker presided, and was ably assisted by the Rev. Messrs, Smith and Hanna. All the clerical brethren present spoke briefly, feelingly, and to the point. Officers were elected and collectors appointed, and everything was done to ensure success during the present year. A liberal collection was taken up.

Durham.—This branch sustained a loss during the past year by the removal of its excellent president, the Rev. C. F. Farthing, of the Episcopalian Church, to a larger parish in Woodstock. His successor, the Rev. A D. Dewdney, was elected secretary, and shows as deep an interest in the Bible Society as Mr. Farthing himself. The Presbyterian, Methodist and Baptist clergymen were also present and did yeoman service at our meeting.

Watton.—In this village I organized a new branch on January 28th. It is five miles from Brussels, and a still greater distance from Blyth and Seaforth. There is ample room for a branch here. There was a good meeting in the Presbyterian Church, where we met for organization. After my explanation of the object and operations of the Society, there was a unanimous desire expressed for a branch and a Depository in Walton. In a few minutes the desire was gratified. Everything was put into good working order, and collectors are now going their rounds for the first free contribution.

Whitechurch.—Is a village on the G. T. R., half-way between Wingham and Lucknow. It was important that there should be a branch of our Society in it, and I called a meeting there for the purpose of organizing one. My highest expectations were more than realized. There was a large and enthusiastic meeting held in the Presbyterian Church, which was presided over by the Rev. Mr. Carson, Methodist; later in the evening he was elected president of the newly organized branch. Good live men of the various churches of the place were elected to office.

*Riversdale.*—I organized a new branch here last night. The village is small and the country round it is not of the best quality. Besides, French Roman Catholics make up a considerable percentage of the population. Still, there is room for a branch in Riverdale. Our meeting for organization was held in the only Protestant Church in the place, the Presbyterian, and was very cordial and enjoyable. The night was very stormy, and our attendance suffered in consequence of it. After my address, organization was decided on by a unanimous voice. The Rev. Mr. Gray was elected president of the new branch, and he and the other officers elected will not flag in their efforts to make the movement a success.

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REV. CANON O'MEARA—*Prince Albert.*—The Rev. Mr. Philp met me at the station and entertained me mosthospitably at his house. The public meeting was held in the basement of the Methodist Church, and was fairly attended considering the smallness of the place and its proximity to the larger branch at *Port Perry* Addresses by the chairman, Rev. Mr. Kean, and your Agent were listened to with evident interest by the meeting. Determination was expressed to do better in the coming than in the past year.

*Port Perry.*—Was driven to this place, which is within sight of Prince Albert, by my kind host, the Rev. Mr. Philp, and was kindly and hospitably entertained at the house of my friend, the Rev. Dr. Carry. The meeting was held in the Baptist Church, and was fairly attended. The president, Thomas Courtice, Esq., in taking the chair, gave a very interesting address on the work of the Society, and was followed by Rev. Messrs. Manning, Methodist, and McEwen, Presbyterian, with short but spirited addresses, after which your Agent spoke; visited the Depository which I found in good order, and in a prominent place.

Green Bank.--The president, the Rev. Mr. Walker, of the Methodist Church, kindly came to Port Perry for me, and drove me to his parsonage in Greenbank, where I was most hospitably entertained during my stay. The meeting was held in the basement of the Methodist Church, and was addressed by the Rev. Mr. McMillan, the newly elected president, and Rev. Mr. Walker, who, as well as your Agent, was listened to with marked attention and interest. The night was stormy, yet the attendance was fair

Brooklin.—The Rev. Mr. Harris, of the Church of England, met me at the station and took me to his house, where I had the opportunity of meeting the officers of the branch at tea after which a good and inspiriting meeting was held in Mr. Harris' church, at which addresses were delivered by the Rev. Mr. Harris and the Agent to a fairly numerous and very attentive audience.

*Pickering*.--Was kindly entertained by the secretary-treasurer, B. Bunting, Esq., who presided at the meeting, which was held in the Presbyterian Church, and though small in numbers, was evidently deeply interested in the details and arguments which your Agent on behalf of the Society was able to bring before them.

Dumbarton.—The meeting was held in the basement of the Presbyterian Church which is the only one in the village; the chair was taken by Mr. Parker, the president of the branch. The Rev. Mr. Craig, the minister of the church, gave a very effective address on the work of the Society, and as well as your A ent, was listened to with close attention and evident interest by a respectable audience.

Highland Creek — I was met at the station by the Rev. Mr. Burt, Church of England minister, president of the branch, who was the only local minister present at the meeting, which was held in the Presbyterian Church, and was gratifying not only from the numbers present, but from the fact that an unusual portion of them were young men who were specially addressed by both Mr. Burt and your Agent, on the wisdom of taking God's word for their guide from youth, through life, and until death. There is no Depository connected with this branch.

Columbus.—The Rev. Mr. Harris, of Brooklin, sent me to Columbus in his buggy; stopped at the store of Mr. W. Purves, the Depositary, where I examined the books and found them in good condition. At the meeting the chair was efficiently filled by W. Smith, Esq., M.P., who spoke warmly on behalf of the Society and its work, after which your Agent spoke on the same subject to an attentive though sparse audience.

Ashburn.—Rev. Mr. Harris drove me to Ashburn, which is one of his out stations. The meeting was small. The president, Rev. Mr, McClelland, was absent through illness, and his place was taken by Mr. Harris, in whose church the meeting was held. No other local minister was present. Your agent endea-

voured to point out to the meeting that the work of the Society, being that of the whole Christian church, ought to command the interest and to enlist the hearty co operation of the whole Christian community.

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ch a. *Kinsale.*—The meeting at this place was largely attended, especially by young men, which I regard as a hopeful feature. It was held in the Temperance Hall, and the addresses of your Agent and others were listened to with evident interest. The president, by whom your Agent was kindly entertained, was in the chair.

*Claremont* — Mr. Hartop drove me to this place where the last meeting of the series was held in the Presbyterian Church. All the ministers of the place were present and assisting. Your Agent was greatly encouraged by this feature, and the heartiness of his reception by the meeting, which gave promise of increased energy in the cause of the Society for the coming year. The village is a flourishing one, near a station of the C. P. R. The Depository is well kept here, and the books in good order.

Whitby.—In pursuance of arrangements made by the officers of this branch, the meeting was held on the evening of the above date in the Baptist Church. All the resident ministers of the town in sympathy with the object of the Society were present and assisting. Though the night seemed to be the herald of a cold snap, the meeting was a very encouraging one, both for the number present, its representative character, and the fixed attention given to your Agent, and the other speakers setting forth the Divine authority of the Bible, and other claims of the Society that makes the universal dissemination of the Word its great object.

REV. CHAS. O'MEARA—Lakeside.—This, the opening meeting of the series, was one of the most encouraging. It was held in the Episcopal Church, and was presided over by the president. The attendance was large, and the attention given to your Agent's address was very helpful to him, and full of promise for the Society's work during the coming year. The pastor of the church being absent in London, the Rev. Mr. Waddel, of the Baptist Church, conducted the devotional exercises, and gave a short but practical address. Collectors were appointed, and every preparation made for an energetic and systematic carrying on of the good work.

Kint re.—The meeting here was not as large a one as the fine night and good roads might have been reasonably expected to bring out. The president, Rev. Mr. Munro, of the Presbyterian Church, and the Rev. Mr. Husband, of the Methodist Church, ably assisted your Agent. At the close of the meeting a gentleman present asked for information as to one or two items in the Society's accounts as published in their annual report. The explanation given by your Agent will bear good fruit this year.

Corinth.—Although due and timely notice had been sent and replies received, I found that unfortunately a church in the neighbouring country had selected the same night for their tea-meeting. The officers of the Society were on hand at the appointed hour and place of meeting, but after routine business had been transacted, the audience was still so exceedingly small as to preclude the hope of doing much good by addressing them. The energetic secretary, Mr. Amos, and zealous treasurer, Mr. Evans, and myself, then determined to walk out to where the meeting was being held a distance of between two and three miles. I was cordially received by the pastor, who regretted very much that his entertainment had clashed with our meeting, and asked me to address the audience, which I did, and also invited them to hear me further on the following Tuesday at Culloden, distant only a few miles.

Tilsonburg.—Here, again, the audience was small, but the officers were on hand and full of zeal. The collection at the meeting was considerably in excess of that of last year. The committee appear to be in every case the right men in the right place; and not as is too frequently the case mere figure-heads. I have no fear that officered by such workers as Rev. Mr. McGregor, the president, and A. W. Reavely, B.A, the secretary, this branch will cease to obey the great Captain's orders and go forward.

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Dereham.—The meeting of this branch was held in the Presbyterian Church, Culloden, and was a pleasing contrast to the one of the night previous in point of numbers, being exceedingly well attended. I was rejoiced to find that my few words of invitation given at the tea meeting on the Friday night had borne such abundant fruit. The collection was more than double that of last year.

*East Oxford.*—Meeting held in Baptist Church, Burgessville. Although not quite as large as that in Culloden, it was a good one, and resulted in an increased collection, and a promise of hearty work in the future.

*Beachville.*—Here again we were favoured with a glorious night, and a good meeting. This branch is in good hands, and will take at least its full share of the good work. It is particularly fortunate in having for its president Alfred Shaw, Esq., who, in addition to the earnestness and zeal which are generally so characteristic of the various presidents of branches, possesses exceptional advantages in the leisure time placed at his disposal by his position as a retired gentleman farmer.

Innerkip.—The meeting here was held in the basement of the Presbyterian Church. Both the resident ministers were present, and helped to make the success of the meeting by their hearty co-operation, and brief but pointed addresses. Some ground has been left unworked by the collectors last year, but arrangements were made to remedy this defect for the coming one. Here, as everywhere else, I found the best possible results to have followed from my having adopted the Society's suggestion, and written a personal letter to each one of the resident ministers working in the neighbourhood of a branch to be visited. The time devoted to this work is indeed well spent.

Harrington —I was glad to find this branch in a flourishing state. The meeting was considerably above the average in the matter of attendance. The old officers were all re-elected for the ensuing year. This branch is especially favoured in having for its president, the Rev. Mr. Gordon, who for many years has been in charge of the Presbyterian Congregation, and who is a life-long and most self-sacrificing friend of the work of the Society. So long as Mr. Gordon is spared to labour in his present sphere of usefulness, this branch, is, humanly speaking, certain to be maintained in an efficient and prosperous state.

REV. J. SOMERVILLE.—North Bruce was the first place visited on 5th February; I found it impossible to undertake the visitation earlier. The weather was stormy, the meeting small. Those who were present took a thorough interest in the work. The officers are active and fully alive to the importance of the work of the Society.

Underwood — Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church, Rev. Mr. Little presided. Here, the secretary, Mr. McKinnon, is a model, and the Depository is carefully managed, and a good result will appear this year.

*Tiverton.*—Meeting in the Methodist Church, with the minister of the church in the chair. Addresses were given by the ministers of the Presbyterian and Methodist churches. The village and surrounding country are carefully mapped out and collectors appointed. The Depository is well managed

*Pine River* and *Amberley*.—Roads impassable, no teams have been able to cross, and so failed in reaching my destination. Arrangements were made to have the meeting held by Mr. McFarlane.

*Port Albert.*—Road to Port Albert was also completely blocked, but the meeting was held by Rev. D. G. Cameron. Preparation had been made before hand so that all collectors' reports were in at the meeting.

*Kincar.line.*—Spent the Sabbath here, preaching morning and evening; had arrangements made to preach at Port Albert, Dungannon and Ashfield, but found it impossible to reach those places.

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e e Ashfield will be glad to have a meeting next year, and felt disappointed that arrangements had not been made. It would be well to visit that branch next year.

*Ripley.*—A good meeting, although not very large. Rev. Mr. Sutherland gave valuable aid. The Depository is carefully managed, and all the officers of the Society take a deep interest in the work.

Bervie.—Rev. F. G. Newton in the chair. There is a good deal of enthusiasm in Bible Society work in this village and district. Mr. Amey, of the Methodist Church, gave an address. There will be a good return from this branch.

Armow.—The storm during the night completely blocked all the cross roads, so that I failed reaching Armow, but made arrangements with Mr. Amey, for the subsequent meeting.

Glammis.—Rev. Mr. McMillan in the chair, and able assistance was given by the minister of the Baptist Church, where the meeting was held. The district was carefully mapped out and collectors appointed. Considerable interest was manifested in the good work.

REV. M. L. WING—Millbank.—We had a meeting in the evening which was very poorly attended. The Rev. Mr. McKibbon was present, who also had duly announced the meeting and takes a good interest in this branch. We managed to straighten up matters again by electing the officers and arranging for a new stock of Bibles. It is hard to erect this branch out of its ashes The secretary of last year moved away during the year.

Tavistock.—The meeting was held in the Baptist Church and pretty well attended. The Baptist minister, Mr. Stern, was not able to attend on account of absence from the village. The president of the branch, Rev. L. Wildfang, was present; also the Rev. J. A. Schmidt, who gave an address. The bulk of the speaking was left to the Agent. The night was somewhat unpleasant, but I think more interest might be taken by the different churches of Tavistock. The business, with a few changes in the officers, was soon despatched, and the meeting then brought to a close.

Crediton.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. It was a dark and rainy night, but quite a number gathered to attend the Bible meeting. The interest at this branch is quite good. After an address by the Agent, the Revs. C. Stabler and Fife gave stirring addresses. It was a good and lively meeting. The Depository, held for years by Mr. Charles Brown, is well kept. Some changes were made in the staff of officers.

Zurich.—The meeting was held in the Baptist Church and was well attended. There are always a number of good Christian people ready to support this good cause. The Revs. Th. Hauch and Strempfer were present, also the Rev. J. W. Ortwein, of Dashwood, six miles distant. They all showed their interest in the cause by short speeches. This was a purely German meeting. An address was also given by the Agent. It was indeed a very interesting meeting. Some change was made in the officers.

Sebringville.—Although it was a rainy and dark night, a well attended meeting was held in the Episcopal Church. All felt cheerful in their beautiful Church. The choir of this church gave some excellent singing, which increased the interest and made the meeting very pleasant indeed. After the Agent's address, the Revs. M. Maurer and W. J. Yaeger also gave brief and stirring speeches.

The meeting for the *Shakespeare* branch was held in Temperance Hall. A cold but clear night; the attendance was considered fair. Here I found the Depository in good circumstances. The secretary, Mr. Mowat, had made all

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necessary arrangements for the annual meeting. The president, Rev. J. Mc-Clung, was present and conducted the meeting. Besides an address by the Agent, the Rev. A. Stewart, of North East Hope, also gave a very interesting and instructive address. The Rev. A. Stewart's church, about four miles from Shakespeare, contributes over twenty dollars.

*Milverton.*—The Methodist Church was secured for the annual meeting. It was literally packed with people; besides, the pastor of the church, Mr. Gee, Rev. Messrs. Braun and Kay were also present and took a lively interest in the meeting. The work is looking up. There were no collectors out the past year, bnt things will be better another year.

On Monday, November 26th, I held the annual meeting at *Mildmay*, in the Evangelical Church. There was a large and cheerful gathering, two choirs, one German, the other English, gave us most excellent music alternately. The meeting felt very much the absence of its president, Mr. Johnson, who several months ago died in the triumph of Christian faith. After, the Revs. G. Braun, D. N. Brand and Mr. Berry, had spoken, the Agent followed with an address. Several changes have been made in the staff of officers. The books in the Depository are well kept. A liberal collection was taken up.

*Elmwood.*—The meeting was held in the Mennonite Church, and was fairly attended. The choir of the church gave good music. Present were Revs. Haist, Leggatt and Detweiler; all gave stirring addresses. The Agent wielded his two-edged sword here, first in speaking German and then English. The Depository was changed to Mr. M. Kaufman's new and commodious store.

Ayton.—The meeting was better attended than for some time; the president was at his post and gave a good address. The Rev. C. Tinkbeiner spoke for some time after the usual business had been transacted. The Agent's address closed the meeting; there was a good collection. The officers were highly pleased at the result of the meeting and felt encouraged to go on. Dr. McLean keeps the Depository in good order, the sales have largely increased during the past year.

REV. ALEX. YOUNG.—Millbrook, 12th of November. The meeting there was held in the Town Hall, and was well attended, the number present being more than double that of the last annual meeting held about ten months before. The following ministers of the place were present and took part in the proceedings:—Rev. Messrs. Cameron (Presbyterian), Allen (Episcopalian), and Burns (Methodist). The resolution passed at the last annual meeting to open a Depository in the village had not been carried out, but was again taken up and assurances were given that the matter would receive immediate attention.

South Monaghan and Cavan was visited on the following evening, Tuesday the 13th of November. The Rev. Mr. Cameron kindly conveyed me to the place. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church at Bailieboro, and was largely attended, the building being completely filled. All the officers were present, reports were submitted and adopted, Rev. Messrs. Cameron and McCamus assisted. This is an excellent branch, and well managed by an able staff of officers.

Coldsprings.—Wednesday afternoon, 14th, I reached Coldsprings. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church at Cambourne, and was well attended; in the absence of the president, who had removed from the district, Mr. Williams, one of the vice-presidents, occupied the chair. Reports were presented and adopted. I was assisted by the following reverend gentlemen, viz.:—Messrs. J. R. Gilchrist (Presbyterian), Shalcross (Congregationalist), and McManus (Methodist). Pursuant to a resolution passed at the last annual meeting, a Depository has been opened, and the work of the branch has been well carried out.

Fenella — The meeting of this branch was held in the Methodist Church at Harwood, on the evening of Thursday, the 15th of November. The atten-

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dance was large. The president, Rev. James Ross, occupied the chair and rendered valuable assistance. The Depository opened since last annual meeting is doing well, and the general prospects of the branch are good.

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y n e Colborne.—This meeting was held on Friday evening, the 16th of November, in the Presbyterian Church, and was a great improvement in point of numbers and attendance over last year. All the officers were present, and I had the help of the following ministers, viz.:—Rev. Messrs. Duncan (Presbyterian); Hughes, Carr, Edmonson, Tomblin (Methodist); Dowling (Baptist), who all took part in the proceedings. A political meeting in the village the same evening interfered in a measure with the attendance, and slightly hastened the business

*Percy.*—On Saturday, November the 7th, I left Warkworth, sixteen miles distant, where I arranged to s end the Sabbath. Appointments were made for me by the committee to preach in the Presbyterian Churcn in the forenoon, in the Methodist Church at Dartford, about four miles from Warkworth, in the afternoon, and in the Methodist Church at Warkworth in the evening. The congregations were large at all these services, and collections taken up in aid of the Bible Society. The annual meeting of the branch was held on Monday evening, the 19th of November, in the Presbyterian Church, Warkworth; the attendance was fairly good. A political meeting in the village the same evening had a similar effect to that of Colborne. This is one of the best organized branches in the section. The officers and collectors are deserving of the highest commendation.

Castleton.—This meeting was held in the Methodist Church on Tuesday, the 20th of November. The attendance was small, branch in languid state. The Rev. Mr. Sexsmith (Methodist) and Souter (Baptist) were present and took part in the proceedings.

Vernonville.—The officers of this branch had arranged to hold two meetings on successive evenings, one at Vernonville and the other at Wicklow, and in deference to their wishes, I attended both. The first meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church at Vernonville, and was well attended. The Rev. Messrs. Lord (Presbyterian) and Morgan (Christian) were present and gave their assistance. The second meeting was held in the Methodist Church, in Wicklow, the following evening, Thursday, November 22nd, and was fairly well attended. The Rev. Messrs. Dowling (Baptist) and Balfour (Methodist) assisted.

Grafton.—The meeting of this branch was held in the Presbyterian Church on the evening of Friday 23rd of November. The attendance was large, and the meeting very spirited. All the officers were present. The Rev. Messrs. Lord (Presbyterian) and Balfour (Methodist) were present and gave valuable help.

Brighton.—The meeting was held on Tuesday, the 27th November, in the Baptist Church. The night was dark and rainy, but the attendance was good considering the weather; this was the only unfavourable night at the meetings in the section. The following ministers of the place were present and took part in the meeting, viz. —Rev. Messrs. McLeod (Presbyterian), Buchanan (Methodist), Reddick (Baptist). In accordance with a resolution passed at the last annual meeting, the above-named ministers preached sermons to their congregations on the work of the Bible Society the Sabbath before the meeting of the branch, urging greater interest to be taken in the work of Bible-reading and circulation. All the officers were present, and the reports of the Society were presented and adopted.

### COLPORTEURS' REPORTS.

## EXTRACTS FROM COLPORTEURS' REPORTS.

JOHN CLARK—Victoria. British Columbia.—As instructed by the committee, I have taken advantage of every opportunity of recommending the Scriptures and doing missionary work, and I hope and believe that quite a few may be led to read the Bible or Testament where it has been much neglected. I have had considerable pleasure in the work in many houses. I am received by many with pleasure and sympathy, and by others with but scant courtesy. Whenever I have met the latter class I have tried to overcome their prejudices, and have sometimes succeeded. I have been able to proceed with my work continuously, as you will see by report. I have met with but few homes without a Bible only one, where I gave a testament; they expressed a wish to purchase one, but they had not the means, and, on promise to read one I gave them a Testament. I have also had some very interesting conversations with the people on the Bible, which I hope and expect will result in good. I have met with quite a few Catholics; many refuse to even talk about it, but with several I have prevailed with them and overcome their fear of the priest, and sold them Testaments.

P. DEAN.—Have had a full share of the trials and difficulties incident to the work, but can truly say the Lord has opened up the way for me, so that I have been enabled to accomplish what seems to me a fair amount of work in the matter of sales, considering that some part of the country through which I have been travelling this month is poor. But what is done in the way of sales does not by any means represent the hard toil and real drudgery performed by the Colporteur as he trudges on the weary miles day after day; but through the mercy and blessing of a Gracious Providence, I have good health, and meet with a great deal of kindness from the people as a rule.

J. LOCKHART.—I believe I never found money so scarce as it is now in this section of the country; the long continued drouth has discouraged the people, so that they are afraid to spend a cent for anything. I strive to tell the people that if we would live right the Lord would send us all the rain we need, and I often read the 28th chapter of Deuteronomy, and strive to persuade the people to live nearer God, for He knows best what we most need. You see I have sold a good many copies this month, and I have also given away a good many, but I gave to none that could buy.

J. E. TAYLOR—Port Arthur is a growing town, and I find that there has been a great increase since I was here five years ago. There have been a great number of people settled since I last visited here. There are about 5,000 people in this place, and taking in Fort William with C. P R men and the mining district, we have about 10,000 people in the Thunder Bay district, which I trust I may be able to visit before I leave these parts. The mines are about twenty miles west of Port Arthur. I shall try and visit them next week God willing. And as to its wants, its crying need (I may say), I have never seen the like in all my twenty years' experience, there is a complete famine for God's Word. I am sure that it would cheer the hearts of the committee if they could follow me around and see the willingness with which the people buy a cheap Bible and Testament for their children; some of them are very poor and very thankful for the Bible Society. There are a great many railway men at Fort William, and at this place and all along the C. P. R., until you reach Sudbury. I now leave the month's worl the Bibl

work with our Heavenly Father, praying that God will bless His own Word to the salvation of many precious souls. As you will see I have sold about 300 Bibles. It will show the committee the need of my labour in this part.

I went to Fort William, where I found a great number of railway men at this place where there was much need of God's word, and I found the people very ready to purchase Bibles for their children when brought to their doors. The C. P. R. have got about 300 men working at this place, so that it will be a great railway centre for the C. P. R. I found a great number of miners who were ready and willing to purchase Bibles for their families, and very thankful for God's Word brought to them so cheap. I also visited Beaver Mine.

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n s e e t My next place was at Cockburn Island. It is about five years since I was on the Island, and I find agreat number of families gone; there are only about twentytwo families left. I went back over the Island and visited the families and supplied them with Bibles. I was out to the lumber camps, and I had one preaching service on Tuesday night, and we had a good time, a good number attending,

JAMES SINCLAIR.—The month of April in the backwoods country is always hard and difficult to travel, on account of the breaking up of sleighing, which leaves the roads unfit to travel on. I have been travelling in a portion of Macaulay township, then I went north of Huntsville, in the township of Perry. I have canvassed the village of Novar on the line of the P. J. R R., also east and west of the R. R. I have to do all the travelling on foot, no roads fit for waggon; on account of high water some portions of the roads are flooded and I have had to turn back, still I have done fairly well with all the drawbacks. I beg to state that I have been well treated and received by the settlers. I am now preparing to visit Emsdale, on the P. J. R. R. and the country around, and then northwards, and visit the different villages and farming settlements, as well as I possibly can on foot.

I have been travelling and canvassing in the townships of Muskoka, western part, and in the south and western part of Morrison, and I beg to report to you that I have done very well for the month of October. Days are getting short and roads heavy in many places, travelling is very slow, reception among the different classes of people is generally very good. There would be a great many more willing purchasers of the Scriptures, but a large number are short of money. I expect to have more or less hardship on account of the weather in November and December, but if health permits, I mean to work hard and faithfully.

# FORTY-NINTH

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# ANNIVERSARY MEETING

The forty-ninth Anniversary of the Upper Canada Bible Society was held in the Elm Street Methodist Church, Toronto, on the evening of Wednesday, May 29th, 1889. The Hon. G. W. Allan, President, took the chair a few minutes after eight o'clock. On and surrounding the platform were seated the Revs. Dr. Pierson, of Philadelphia, U.S., Dr. Castle, Dr. Potts, Dr. Caven, Dr. Thomas, Dr. Gregg, Dr. Parsons, Dr. McTavish, J. G. Manly, W. A. Hunter, W. S. Blackstock, J. Neil, W. G. Wallace, Chas. Duff, Wm. Brookman, Wm. Patterson, James Grant, T. S. Ellerby, Messrs. Warring Kennedy, J. K. Macdonald, N. W. ## The proceedings opened by singing the hymn

### "Jesus shall reign where'er the sun,"

followed by a Scripture lesson from 2 Timothy iii. 14 (seq.), and prayer by the Rev. D. G. Sutherland, D.D., pastor of Elm Street Church.

The Chairman in delivering his opening address, said :--

MY CHRISTIAN FRIENDS AND MEMBERS OF THE UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,-For the last two years I have been unavoidably prevented by other duties from being present at our Anniversary Meeting. I am glad, therefore, to have an opportunity afforded me in opening our proceedings this evening to say how heartily I rejoice at again being present here, and having the honour of filling the chair. I wish it were in my power to congratulate the meeting upon being a larger one, but the inclement state of the weather quite accounts for any lack of attendance, and we are glad to welcome our friends who are here this evening. Moreover, I think that in the revenue of the Society for the past year, we have very satisfactory proof that the friends of the Bible cause are not flagging in their exertions, for I find from the Report that the receipts this year amount to between \$32,000 and \$33,000, a larger amount than has been previously received; but although this is a larger amount, I venture to think that we still come short of what we ought to do in this Protestant Province of Ontario, and in this wealthy City of Toronto, to further the work of our Society. There are many signs of the times, however, which, I feel, fully warrant us in believing that we may look forward to a still larger and more earnest support of the Society, and among these is the very cheering and I think very important movement to endeavour to bring more closely together, and into more fraternal relations with each other. the various Christian bodies, who, though they may differ as to some points of doctrine or forms of church government, nevertheless are all agreed in acknowledging the Holy Scriptures, in the words of one of the Articles of my own Church, "as containing all things necessary to salvation." I think, my friends, that when Christian men are all agreed that the one tie which should bind us all together is the common belief in the one revealed Will of God, we shall surely also be more united in supporting societies such as this in sending forth that Word of God with its blessed message of peace and salvation to the whole world.

To refer now to some of the items of interest in the Report, you will be glad to know that during the past year we have been able to assist in extending very materially the work of colportage in Manitoba and the North-West, and that we have also, thanks to the liberality of our Branches, been able to assist the Quebec Auxiliary in adding to the num-ber of its colporteurs and Bible women. Now, I do not know of any more important fields of labour, within our own country, than are presented by Manitoba and the North-West, nor do I know any part of our country where those who are labouring to spread the pure Word of God are more worthy of our hearty sympathy and assistance than in the Province of Quebec. Recent events in that Province have stirred up very strong feeling in the minds of those who value above all things religious truth and freedom; but whatever may be the differences in the views of those who have taken a prominent part in the discussions which have arisen out of these events, there can be no difference of opinion, I think, among all earnest Christian men, that we have in the teaching of Holy Scripture the strongest and most effective weapon against darkness and error. I think, therefore, it is our clear duty, and we shall best be fulfilling the obligations laid upon us as Protestants, if we strive with all our might to wage war against error and superstition by that "Sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God; " and while carefully guarding against any encroachments upon religious truth and liberty in our country, we should do all in that spirit of Christian love and charity which the Gospel inculcates. How know we, indeed, if we were more earnest in our efforts to circulate the Holy Scriptures among those to whom it has hitherto been virtually a sealed book, how much of the religious antagonism which now, unhappily, subsists between ourselves and many of our fellow-subjects in the Dominion, might not be in a great measure removed, if not done away with altogether?

Look at what is being done in France by the great parent Society, in spite of many obstacles and discouragements, to spread the knowledge of God's Word, and the blessed results that have followed from the labours of its colporteurs in bringing the Bible within the reach and putting it into the hands of people, who, but for them, would never have known that such a book existed.

In connection with this work in France, I was greatly struck with some words in the report of one of the Society's colporteurs in the Gironde. "I find," he says, "that pious Roman Catholics who have once been persuaded to accept and to read the Bible, become the best propagators of the Book." Another colporteur writes: "I very frequently find among Roman Catholics persons who, without having become Protestants, have been led to a deep knowledge of the Truth by the sole agency of the Word of God, especially of the New Testament. I cannot say how many there may be," he says, "but there are more than is suspected by those who

never visit among the Roman Catholics." Are not such instances as these full of encouragement to us to aid by every means in our power the work of Bible circulation among those of our fellow-subjects, to whom, as I have already said, the Bible hitherto has been in a great measure a sealed book.

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In reference to the Society's work in Ontario, our colporteurs have, during the past year, been labouring with continued zeal and vigour in parts of the counties of Frontenac, Lennox, Addington, Peterborough, Victoria, Ontario, Simcoe, Muskoka, Grey, Oxford, and Norfolk, and I commend to your consideration the paragraph in the Report which refers more especially to their work, and which says of them: "Sometimes the colporteurs, from various causes, become quite discouraged, and are almost ready to give up, but their knowledge of the need of this work, their realization of the presence of the Master, and desire for the eternal welfare of their fellow-men, has influenced and persuaded them to renewed vigour and purpose. The work of the colporteur is no sinecure, and it behooves us as friends of Christ to pray for those earnest Christian men, and encourage them in their arduous work."

Let me now refer briefly to what is going on in the work of Bible circulation in other parts of the world. I see by the Report here among the Free Contributions is the sum of 6,197 to the British and Foreign Bible Society, and in connection with this subject I would call attention to the words of the President of our great Parent Society, the Earl of Harrowby, in his opening address at the last Anniversary Meeting, where he advises all who have the opportunity to read and study carefully the Annual Report, to help them to form some estimate of the greatness and extent of the work of the Society. Without some acquaintance with that Report it is indeed difficult, if not impossible, to form anything like an adequate idea of the gigantic nature of the work in which the Parent Society is engaged all over the globe. Let us take, for instance, in the first place, the editorial and translating work of the Society.

At the beginning of the century the versions of the Holy Scriptures were confined to fifty-four languages, now the British and Foreign Bible Society alone circulates the Holy Word in two hundred and eighty-seven languages. Then during the past year the Editorial Sub-committee were concerned in the translation (or revision of translations) of some seventy or eighty languages or dialects, and this work of revision and improved translation is constantly going on, for the Society has missionaries all over the world, working for it in the translation or revision of translations of the Bible.

To quote some of the instances: In one part of the world a Kalmuck New Testament has just been finished, after many difficulties, the translator, Prof. Podgnieff, having had to spend a long time in the nomadic camps of the Kalmucks to read to them what he had written and make quite sure that his version was good and sound. Then, again, in Africa, there was a complete Bible in Swahili, the work of Bishop Steere, on which he had expended a great deal of labour, and there had been very great rejoicing in Madagascar over the new version of the Madagascan Bible, after thirteen years of hard work! So in China, also, the same ceaseless work is going on, and I may mention that I had the great pleasure, only a week or two ago, of hearing something of that work from one of the Society's colporteurs who had been labouring for many years in China, and was passing through Toronto on his way to his native country for a brief period of rest. In Japan the issue of portions of the Sacred Books in 1887 was only 16,000, last year it rose to 37,000, and now a complete Bible has been published for Japan. Again, at Singapore, the centre of the work among the various Malay races (for whom the Scriptures have been translated into thirty-two languages and dialects!) the Society's agent reports that whereas in 1887 the total circulation was 19,000, no fewer than 37,000 were circulated in 1888.

In reference to another field of the Society's labours, Egypt and Arabia, Lord Harrowby quotes the words of the Society's agent in Alexandria, in summing up the result of the work there, and they are so interesting that I cannot help giving them to you. He says:—

"Some copies at least of the Divine Message of Love and Life to sinful men have been placed already in nearly every part of the district, in the language of the people. Men of South Arabia have taken them to their homes in Hadramoot and Yemen; merchants have carried them across the Gulf of Aden to the African coast and up to Harran; shut out from Abyssinia, the Holy Books have been found and gladly received by the people of the mountainous land, who have carried them down to the sea coast; a few have been placed in Suakim, among the Moslem traders; some have been set in Moslem hands in Yeddah, and rumour says that even well-guarded Mecca has been visited by the silent messenger! Certain it is that the children of the Lybian desert have not scorned to possess them, and that their brethren in the Eastern waste, the way of the Philistines, have at least one New Testament to spell out by the camp fire! Thousands have passed into the hands of men dwelling in the great cities of Egypt; with much difficulty and seeming defeat the Moslem villages in Palestine and Syria have had here and there a copy of God's Word left in them; among the lawless dwellers in the mountains of Moab the heavenly precepts are daily read, and among the people of the ancient churches everywhere the long-neglected oracles of God are gradually being once more received and studied."

If time would permit, I might go on to allude to the Society's work in India; and if we turn from the East to the Christian countries of Europe, there is the same ceaseless work going on for Christ and His truth. Every country in Europe has been carefully mapped out under the Society's agents, with their army of colporteurs, for the distribution of the Scriptures, and many are the encouraging and interesting details which their reports contain, but which I must not detain you with now. I have indeed ventured to allude thus briefly to the world-wide work of the great Parent Society, because therein we have an example set before us. While undoubtedly we should address ourselves earnestly to do with all our might what our hands find to do in the Home Field, we should, I think, exhibit a very inadequate idea of our duties and privileges if we stopped there. I say "privileges", for is it not one of our greatest privileges as Christian men to assist in the glorious work of sending forth to all the world the Message of God's Love and Mercy to mankind, and all those treasures of wisdom contained in that blessed Book which we call the Bible? May God stir us all up to greater and more loving exertion in His glorious cause, and may this gathering this evening, and the words which shall be spoken to us by those who have come here to address us, be made instrumental by God's blessing to that end.

The Chairman sat down amid continued applause, and Dr. Geikie in response to his call rose, and after expressing his great interest in the work of the Society and his confidence in its future success and growth,

moved the first resolution, seconded by Mr. N. W. Hoyles, the resolution being as follows :

"That the Report submitted be adopted, and that the following gentlemen be Officers and Directors for the ensuing year."\*

The Chairman then introduced the Rev. Arthur T. Pierson, D.D., of Philadelphia, with a few well-chosen words, calling upon him to move the second resolution.

Dr. Pierson said :

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,—I have the honour to move the resolution which you will find next on the programme:

"That, tried by whatever test, the Bible vindicates its august claim to the exalted dignity of being the Word of God, and especially the Revelation of the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ."

The Bible has in all ages been at once the focal point of the affection of believers and the central point of the attack of unbelievers. To believers it is the Golden Mile-stone, erected in the Forum of the ages, toward which all roads lead, and from which all paths radiate; but, to the enemies of God and Christ and of the precious Gospelof our Lord Jesus, the Bible is the central point of attack, because it is the very central part of the fortress of our faith-all else but pertains to the surrounding, circumvallating outworks which may be taken without the destruction of the Christian religion itself; but to undermine the Bible is to strike our faith at its centre, and therefore, as the conflicts of the ages grow hot and desperate, the attack becomes more and more determined upon the Word of God. It seems to me that, in these days especially, we behold the enemy-and, I regret to say, some who by their profession as disciples might be expected to be its friends-massing, directly or indirectly, their entire forces against the Word of God. Now, you will notice in the language of this resolution that there are two things to which your attention is mainly called. In the first place, there is a claim *indicated* here for the Bible; and in the second place this claim is to be *vindicated* for the Bible. The claim that is indicated is, in the first place, that it is the Word of God, par excellence, in a unique and original sense, the Word of God; and secondly, that it is the Revelation of the Gospel; and thirdly, that it is the book of a Person-the Lord Jesus Christ. Then, as to the vindication, I shall undertake, if the time allows, to show that, tried by three tests mainly, it vindicates the august claim. In the first place, the test of Time; in the second place, the test of Truth; and in the third place, the test of Life.

It is quite possible that, speaking as I do, extemporaneously, I may so dwell on the former proposition that I may not have time properly to discuss the other portion, but I shall hope to be guided by a Higher Wisdom in expatiating upon these heads of discourse that I have indicated.

Now, in the first place, let us look at the august claim which the Bible sets up for itself. It is pre-eminently and in a sense solely the Word of God. What is a word? A word is simply the incarnation of thought in human language. Every word, therefore, suggests to us two things, an idea or conception, and a vehicle or expression. The Bible is the Word of God in this double sense; there is the conception of God, back of it, and there is the expression of that conception in it. And these two things are inseparably connected. You cannot dissociate conception from

expression. We think in language. Our ideas are vague until they take in the mind linguistic forms. Verbal embodiments are associated with speech; before the word is on the tongue it is in thought, and language has marvellous power in connexion with thought. It gives it definiteness, distinctness—it gives it even colouring; therefore Wordsworth very profoundly said, as a philosopher as well as a poet, that "language is the incarnation of thought."

We know there is no little controversy waging in these days (there has been, in fact, all through the ages) as to how far inspiration may be affirmed of the Bible; whether the conceptions of the Bible are inspired and its language human, or whether the inspiration extends to the language even, the very forms of speech used, and to the very words used and I wish flatly to put down my foot upon this platform, that I could accept no inspiration that does not reach to the words of the Bible. (Applause.)

Burke said : " Every word in a sentence is one of the feet upon which that sentence moves; to shorten one of those words, or change its place in the sentence, or alter one of those words, may be to change the entire direction which the sentence takes in its onward movement." You cannot change the language of Scripture without interfering with the substance of Scripture, so closely and so immediately and so inseparably is the language in which the conceptions of God are embodied or incarnated linked with and associated with the conceptions themselves-and I do not see how anyone who examines the Bible can have any doubt reasonably remaining as to the teaching of the Bible on this subject. Let me give you what I think you are all familiar with, two very prominent instances of these hints, in the Word of God, at what may be properly called, in a true sense, verbal inspiration, though that is a very much abused term, in the conception which people form of it when they hear it. By verbal inspiration I simply mean the inspiration of the language in which divine conceptions are expressed. It is not necessarily implied that in every case the substance or idea conveyed is approved of God. For example, when the Bible says that the serpent said unto the woman, "Ye shall not surely die," the record is inspired, but the sentiment is very far from being inspired. We do not mean by verbal inspiration any such nonsense as that every sentiment expressed accords with God's mind, as I suppose any person of sound sense would at once perceive; but simply that when God puts in the Bible any one of His conceptions for the human mind to apprehend, the language is guarded so that the conception shall be adequately and accurately expressed according to the divine mind.

Now, it is a curious fact that, in the tenth chapter of John, thirty-fourth verse, the argument for the inspiration of Holy Scripture depends, as you will remember, not only upon the thought but upon the very word of Scripture. The quotation is from the eighty-second Psalm, "I said, ye are gods," and our Saviour, referring to this, and quoting it, says: "If he called them gods unto whom the Word of God came (and the Scripture cannot be broken) say ye of Him whom the Father hath sanctified and sent into the world 'Thou blasphemest,' because I said, I am the Son of God?" Now, the pertinent point in this quotation is this, that the entire argument of our blessed Saviour turns upon the inviolability of the word employed—the Scripture cannot be broken even so far as to exchange in it or subtract from it a word. Take the other singularly unique instance of testimony of the same kind. Paul says to the Galatians, quoting from

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the Book of Genesis the promise to Abraham and others like him, where Christ is referred to as the Messianic Seed-" He saith not of seeds, as of many, but as of one, 'of thy seed,' which is Christ;" and there the argument turns not simply upon the word which cannot be changed, but upon the number of the word, that cannot be altered from singular to plural. It seems to me that with these two instances before us we need no other testimony. We can see that God designs to impress the peculiar signature and seal of his approbation upon the very words in which divine ideas are clothed and divine conceptions expressed. The Bible sets up the august claim to being the Word of God, inspired, and infallibly inspired. Now, there is danger in certain concessions of inspiration. It is one of the resorts of modern scepticism and infidelity (lying often within the bounds of the nominal Church of God) to concede that the Bible is inspired, but to insist that every other book is inspired also. Milton's "Paradise Lost" is inspired. Well, all I can say is, if it is inspired, there is a great deal of error in it that must be inspired too! It is said that Newton's "Philosophy" is inspired, that Bacon's "Novum Organum" is inspired, that Edison was inspired to produce modern inventions pertaining to electricity. Well, this is the inspiration of genius. There is a sense in which we believe that all poetry, and all philosophy, and all oratory, and all discovery and invention are inspired, but it is the inspiration of genius, and the concession fails just here, this inspiration is not infallible. There may be much truth and there may be much error, and they are hopelessly mixed, if man is to be the judge of what is truth and what is error. We must have in the Word of God not only an inspired book, in this broad sense of inspiration, but an inspired book in the narrower sense of inspiration — an inspiration which constitutes this Book an infallible guide in faith and in duty.

We all feel the necessity for some court to which final appeal may be made, and to which we may carry up from lower tribunals all doubtful cases for absolute and final adjudication. The time used to be when men depended upon sun dials for their knowledge of the time of day; watches were invented, then chronometers by which watches might be regulated; but when you want to regulate your chronometers you must take God's clock of the ages, and you must erect your transit instrument, and watch when the sun crosses the meridian, for during six thousand years the sun has never failed to come to his meridian point by the thousandth part of a second of time, day after day. And just so, wherever even conscience utters an uncertain sound, or gives a doubtful verdict; wherever the common sense of mankind, or the communis consensus Christianorum, the consensus of Christian disciples-which may be by no means infallible-varies we correct our human watches by God's unchangeable clock dial, for somehow, my dear friends, nothing beneath the stars runs exactly right. The Bible is God's final Court of Appeal. We come to it to correct the variation of our human compasses and determine precisely the line of direction in all things that pertain both to doctrine and practice.

And then the Word of God sets up an august claim to being the one and only revelation of the Gospel. That is because, for our salvation, we absolutely need a revelation. We should have known nothing about salvation but for the Bible. These are old thoughts—I pretend to bring nothing new to you to-night, though I hope to be able to set some old thoughts before you in some new lights; and I beg you to notice that we should infer from nature no such thing as a possible salvation. There is

nothing so inexorably unforgiving as nature. If, by accident, I fall from a precipice, or by design jump from a precipice, in either case I am dashed to pieces. If I handle edge tools, I am just as sure by carelessness to be cut, as by design. There is the wound, and even if that wound is healed by time, and cured, there is the scar. If you should search in the natural world alone you might look over the universe and never find one suggestion or hint of forgiveness. Nature never saves; she has no salvation. Obedience to her laws is the only hope of prosperity or wellbeing, no repentance will undo the wrong or cancel the damage, and you must look to God alone for a scheme of salvation, and only through the Word of God. It is a matter of pure *revelation*; it is not in the universe otherwise; you cannot otherwise discover it for yourself, you cannot infer it by any process of argument; it must be simply a revelation, something brought out of darkness, and from behind the veil of obscurity, and revealed. Now, if you want to apprehend and appreciate the value of the Bible as the positive revelation of salvation, and the only revelation of salvation, I pray you to take perhaps the foremost of all the systems of heathenism, and just for a moment compare it with the Bible. Take, for instance, Buddhism. Now, there are three great postulates of Buddhism-incarnation first; second, transmigration; third, annihilation. Buddha found this world in a hopeless condition of entanglement, men down in the horrible pit, and the miry clay of their own sensuality and selfishness and depravity, rotting in their own vices, warring against each other and warring against themselves, and there was no deliverer. When they died they only passed from one form of existence to another; it was a transmigration from one animal form to another, perhaps a higher, perhaps a lower, and there was no escape from this thirty-three thousand transmigrations, sphere upon sphere, condition of existence upon condition of existence, world upon world, in the great system of planetary spheres, in which man might carry on after death another existence in another form, returning from time to time in the spiral round of their existence to this same planetary system. And now the question was, How shall man be redeemed from this horrible condition, and saved from this terrible destiny? Buddha professed to have found some method of deliverance-the extinction of all desire, physical, mental, moral, spiritual-a life of contemplation, meditation, suppression of all passion, of all lusts, of all aspirations, of all ambitions -that was the hope of Nirvana, which is virtually annihilation-if it is not annihilation of being it is annihilation of personality, as a drop loses its individuality when it drops into the sea. Now, compare this scheme of salvation, of escape from endless transmigrations in personal annihilation or the annihilation of personality-just compare that scheme of salvation with God's scheme of salvation in Christ : Justification through the atoning Blood, Regeneration by a transforming and enlightening spirit, Sanctification by the power of the Word of God and Blood of Christ and the influence of the Holy Ghost conjointly, and so deliverance at last-from the penalty of sin first, and the power of sin second, and the presence of sin third, the preparation of man for the eternal life of blessedness and fellowship with God, by the re-creation of man in the image of God and the elimination of all sinful propensities and passions, and the final union of a redeemed soul with a redeemed body. None of the religions of earth have ever invented such a scheme of salvation, or even suggested the possibility of such a scheme, and one of the most remarkable things about it is that it saves God as well as man; it saves God

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either from indifference to sin, and so complicity with it, on the one hand, or from condoning offences, and so impeaching His own attributes, on the other. Mercy and Truth meet together, Righteousness and Peace kiss each other; there is harmony in the attributes of God, and there can be reconciliation between God and man, without either man's losing his respect for God, or God's losing the perfection and symmetry of His own character.

Then, again, I beg you to notice that this Bible which sets up this august claim to being the Word of God, and the only Revelation of the Gospel of Salvation, is the Book of a Person. "In the volume of the BOOK it is written of ME." There is only one Book and there is only one Person-the Book of God and the Person Jesus Christ-and this Bible is pre-eminently the Book of a Person. If you turn to the New Testament you have the historic portion of it centralizing about Jesus Christ, a fourfold Gospel. Not four Gospels, but one Gospel. We frequently say, and very incorrectly, the Gospel of Matthew, or Matthew's Gospel, Mark's Gospel, Luke's Gospel, John's Gospel. The Bible never speaks in that way. It is, "The Gospel according to Matthew," "The Gospel according to Mark," "The Gospel according to Luke," "The Gospel according to John"; one Gospel in a fourfold aspect, like the mystic creature in Ezekiel's vision, a creature having four heads, these heads facing in different directions, but one creature. Here is the fourfold Gospel, the fourfold face of the cherubic creature of Ezekiel's vision. In Matthew it is the face of the lion of the Tribe of Judah; in Mark it is the face of the sacrificial ox or calf; in Luke it is the face of a man; in John it is the face of the eagle, soaring far above the level of humanity into the clear empyrean regions of the upper air, and looking directly in the sun's own face. It is a fourfold Gospel, or if you please to change the figure for a moment, I remember in one of the scientific galleries of the old world to have seen a fourfold combination of mirrors, so accurately and skilfully adjusted that when you stood upon the stool that was set in the midst of them, you saw the image of yourself not simply reflected in the mirrors, but projected from the mirrors and between them. So it is here, a fourfold mirror of Jesus Christ. You see not simply a redection of Christ in Matthew and in Mark, and in Luke and in John, but the fourfold combination of the mirrors projects His image like a living personality before your eyes. Here is the Christ, the historic Christ, in the narrative of the Gospels, and marvellous is the image thus projected. Have you ever noticed that men, when they give themselves to the delineation of biography, always deal in encomium; it is scarcely possible to avoid it. When men begin to depict and record character, they indicate their enthusiastic admiration of heroism; but when these evangelists sit down to the task of describing the living Word of God, there is not a single word of encomium; in their portrait of the living Word of God, I repeat, there is not a single word of encomium. They give the bald, naked facts without comment. There is no breaking out into enthusiasm over the matchless personality that they depict, but, themselves guided by a higher Hand, they give us the portrait without any admixture of human colouring.

But most of all, and most remarkable of all, when we look back into the Old Testament, we find this same Being, so marvellously depicted in the historic Gospels, is already pourtrayed in prediction. Now, I speak of this old argument because I am satisfied that we are not, brethren of the ministry, making half enough of the marvellous proof of Christ's

divinity, which is embraced in the prophetic Scriptures, and which really covers both the Person of Christ and the inspiration of the Word of God. Allow me very faintly and rapidly to sketch the outline of this argument. I will not speak at all of other prophetic predictions in the Old Testament. There are about six hundred and sixty-six distinct prophecies within the thirty nine books of the Old Testament; there are three hundred and thirtythree of them that centre about our Lord Jesus Christ. From remotest ages, from the time of the first promise in Genesis that the seed of the woman should bruise the head of the serpent, these promises, growing from that germ, expanding and ramifying like the branches of a tree, antil they reach the tiniest and remotest twig of prophetic prediction, all centralize in one Person, our Lord Jesus Christ. And as history comes along and touches one of these prophetic predictions after another, and sets it aflame, the prophetic plant becomes a burning bush, and we take the shoes from off our feet, for the place we stand on is holy ground. This argument is impregnable and it has never been successfully assailed, simply because it cannot be successfully assailed. Men have attacked the Bible from almost every other point of view, but they have not dared to attack the Bible on the score of prophecy. The most that they could say as to that was what Voltaire and Porphyry and a few others have said, that these prophecies were so accurate and wonderful that they could not have been written until after the events had occurred. I cannot stop to speak at length of that "argument" or show its utter absurdity as to the Person of Jesus Christ. Malachi wrote about four centuries before Christ. There was then a cessation of the prophetic spirit, and we have no prophet between Malachi and Matthew. There could be no reaching across these four centuries, or any connection or collusion between the prophetic writers of the Old and historic narrators of the New Testaments, and God allowed this cessation in order that there might be no possibility of any doubter saying, in future ages, that the historic records of the New guided the prophetic writers of the Old in the delineation of the Person of Jesus Christ. Now, set it down in your minds and memories that there is this large gap, this wide gap of four centuries, and then remember that in the Old Testament, in three hundred and thirty-three distinct particulars, the Person of Jesus Christ, His character, career, even to the minutest details, is wonderfully and accurately set forth; and now tell me how can it be possible that these Old Testament writers should not be inspired, and how can it be possible that He, whom they graphically pourtrayed at least four centuries before he was born, should be other than the august per-sonage which he claimed to be? I wonder how many, even of those in this audience, have really mastered this argument from prophecy. I remember, when I was myself a doubter, that the study of the prophetic Scriptures in a candid spirit effectually and finally removed the last vestige of my doubts, and I have never had any since with regard to the inspiration and infallibility of Scripture or the Divinity of Jesus Christ. When I wrote my little book, which some of you may possibly have seen, called "Many Infallible Proofs," it was simply an endeavour to delineate for others the path by which I had found my way out of that dark forest of sceptical opinion.

Now look, just for a moment—some of the younger friends here, at least, it may interest to follow me in a train of thought they have not hitherto taken. You know how difficult it is to produce an accurate and shrewd guess of future events the moment you enter into detail. We

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may possibly give a good general conjecture when it is not required of us to be definite, but the moment we add particulars we get from the region of simple into that of compound probabilities. Now, Bible predictions start from a simple germinal foundation, the Seed of the woman bruising the serpent's head. Beginning there, they ramify, as I have said, branching in every direction more and more minutely. He is to come, for instance, of the seed of Seth, then of the seed of Abraham. Then of Abraham's two sons, of the seed of Isaac, of Isaac's two sons, of the seed of Jacob, of Jacob's twelve sons-there you have twelve branches, and one must be taken as the branch of the Messianic Line-he is to be of the line of Judah, and then, by-and-by, of the line of David. Now, each ramification multiplies many-fold the impossibility of chance fulfilment of these predictions, and yet not only is the line of the Messianic ancestry accurately depicted, but even the place of birth, Bethlehem-Judah, to distinguish from any other Bethlehem; even the time of birth. In the ninth chapter of Daniel it is to be seventy weeks, being in the Hebrew seventy heptades, or "periods of seven," "from the going forth of the commandment to restore and rebuild Jerusalem unto the coming of the Messiah." And when you remember that the going forth of that commandment was about 457 B.C., if you will add the thirty-three years of public ministry, you have exactly 490 ! Not only so, but even minor details, more elaborate details than these are indicated. As, for instance, the number of pieces of silver which were to be given in His betrayal, the person that was to betray him, and the manner of His betraying -even His dying cry on the cross, "My God, my God, why hast Thou forsaken Me?" And if you will study carefully the twenty second Psalm you will find-what is not revealed in the English translation, but which is clearly seen in the Hebrew-it is a psalm of sobs, broken up into fragmentary sentences—My God, My God . . . forsaken me? Far from helping me . . . words of my roaring! You find it all set down there,—a dying person, just about entering the unseen world, breath failing,-the physical energies exhausted, voice scarcely adequate to the pronunciation of a single word--it is gasp after gasp. That twenty-second psalm is a psalm full of gasps. It represents some sufferer pierced in hands and feet, naked, exposed to the view of the people, his muscles subject to the severest tension (as they were in crucifixion), his bones protruding as it were from the skin, in an agony of suffering tortured with awful thirst, surrounded by wild men insatiate for his blood !-- it gives you all the various particulars in that vicarious agony. Not only so, but there are even paradoxes with regard to our Lord that never were explained until He came on earth to suffer and die. I cannot stop to speak of them, but you will find instances of them in the fifty third chapter of Isaiah,-more than ten are remarkably given there. He was to be despised and rejected, yet a Saviour; He was to die, and yet He was to live; He was to be taken from prison and from judgment, as a condemned malefactor, and yet justify transgressors; He was to be without natural offspring, and yet was to see of the travail of His soul and be satisfied, having a numerous seed. Before Christ came all these mysterious sayings were dark enigmas, never understood, but when He appeared, and His life and death unrolled before men, it was like Champollion, standing before the obelisks of Egypt and translating the inscriptions that had stood unread and undeciphered for thousands of years.

O my friends, this is a marvellous book. It vindicates its august claim to be the Word of God, the Revelation of the only way of salvation, and the biography of the marvellous Person, the Person of the ages, the Lord Jesus Christ,—and as I connect the first part, with the second part of my remarks, let me say that the vindication of this Bible is found on the very surface of it, by anyone who will look. You need not to go and read botany, geology, mineralogy or kindred sciences to find confirmation of this Word of God. Here is the document, and here is the seal and signature of God affixed to the document, it is the seal and signature of prophetic prediction historically fulfilled, and the little child, the man of little brains and common education can read in both its Testaments, can compare the prophecies of the Old with the historic portraits of the New, and can see that outline, that sketch that is begun in Genesis, to which delineation after delineation is added by the pencils of the prophets, taking on flesh-tints and colouring when the Evangelists add to the prophetic portrait what they had known and seen and handled of the Word of Life.

Now, I beg you to follow me for a few moments, and I trust I shall not trespass upon your patience unduly, if I say a few words with regard to the vindication of this august claim set up for the Word of God. In the first place, as I have indicated, it is tried by the test of *Time*.

Now time is itself a grand test of all institutions and of all literature. You remember that this Bible is the oldest book existing in our day, and that it is almost the only book that comes down to us from distant ages that is unmutilated. What means the disappearance of almost all ancient literature and the sole survival of this as the most ancient of all books? Remember also that there was every reason why the Bible should not have survived, for it encountered from the beginning the resolute and desperate antagonism of the human race. The Bible is the only book on theology or morals that does not cater to mankind. It assaults man at every point,-it rebukes sin, it rebukes selfishness, it rebukes worldliness, it has no affiliations this side of Heaven. It resembles the snows that descend on the mountain tops; only as they melt and pour their streams down the mountain side, the water never comes to us in absolute purity,you can only find that on the mountain tops themselves, in the newly The Word of God belongs to the mountain tops, and all fallen snow. else on this human level bears the marks of man, and belongs to the earthly level. The Word of God is the only thing that comes down from the mountain tops without taking up the filth and the defilement of earth. But, as I was going to say, the wonderful thing about the Bible is, that, meeting as it does with the antagonism of man at every point, it has survived! This is the book toward which the rage of man has been pointed. This is the book that monarchs have associated all the force of their armies and all the power of their edicts to burn and bury and annihilate, and yet here it is, not a book lost, not a sentence irretrievably gone, it is all here. And not only so, but if you should take every copy of the Bible out of the earth to night by some strange miracle, if it were possible to destroy every Old Testament, and every New Testament, and every fragmentary portion of the Word of God. every verse of this Bible could be collected from current literature. It is interwoven through the literature of the ages. When this question was raised, long, long ago, of taking the Bible out of human society, Dalrymple—you know he had a fancy for such researches—undertook to find out how much of the Bible could be found in the literature of the first four centuries, and after a few

months' search he found every verse, except seven, and he said he believed a little further search would disclose the seven. To-day one-half the literature of the civilized and enlightened nations revolves about the Word of God and two-thirds of it never could have existed in its present form, if it had not been for the Word of God. The apologetic literature that crystallizes about the Word of God is very large, but the literature that attacks the Word of God is still larger, and viewed from the broad foundation of common-sense and reason the assaults on the Bible are as great a vindication of its divine origin as the documents defending it. I tell you, my friends, that men do not worry themselves beating down a man of straw; it is the substantial value of the Word of God, it is its imperishable excellence, that makes it an object to assault it and undermine the confidence of people in it; but after all these centuries of strife, after all these millenniums of opposition, the Bible has more adherents to-day in the world than it ever had, and more devoted and earnest believers that would go to the stake for the sake of it, than it ever had in any past generation !

Again I beg you to notice that the Bible has been tried by the test of Truth. I think one of the most remarkable things about the Bible is this consistency with all truth; and I wish, Mr. Chairman, I was at the beginning of my speech now, and could have the whole evening before me. I would like to meet the scientists-so-called-with regard to their affirmations that the Bible is hopelessly in antagonism with modern science. The glory of this book is its truthfulness as to God and men and nature. Now, if there is one test which, being applied to the Word of God, might be supposed presumably to be a test that could not be successfully applied, it is the scientific. And here I want to say, without pretending to being a scientist, that after having studied the Word of God on the one hand for thirty years, and natural science on the other hand, I challenge any one man to bring a single established fact of modern science against which the Bible hopelessly militates. Now, let us remember that this Bible is the oldest book, hence it might reasonably be supposed that the errors which obtained in ancient days would certainly have found their way into it, as they found their way into every other book. What was known about all these sciences when Moses began to write? Supposing, according to one discovery of "higher criticism," the Bible did originate in later times, and not in the times ascribed to it, even then these sciences were not understood. How is it that not an error has crept into this Bible? Now, let me stop to define. I do not say there is no language adapted to popular apprehension which comes into the Bible, that there is no popular language that finds its way there; but we have the same thing in modern conversation. I sat down with a gentleman of high scientific attainments, who said that he went up the Alps to see the sun rise. The sun did not rise, the horizon went down; the sun never arose and never set, the earth simply revolved on its axis. Well now, if we use in common talk, what is incorrect scientifically, but is justified by popular usage, may not the Bible do the same thing? We speak of dew as being distilled in the far off depths of heaven, whereas we know that dew is nothing but atmosphere giving up vapour, depositing moisture at the touch of a cooler surface, as the ice-pitcher in the dining-room condenses and collects the drops from the air; the pitcher is making dew, that is all, it is not coming from very far off, either. These are simple instances of popular language, and find their way into the Bible as a matter of course; but they do not contradict

science-they have nothing to do with science. The Bible is not a scientific book, its object is not to depict scientific truth, and therefore we cannot expect to find it teaching science; nevertheless, God is the Author of it, as He is the Author of all truth, and therefore I willingly concede that it is inconceivable that God should fill the Bible with scientific lies, because its object is not the teaching of scientific truth. It claims to be the Word of God. There is but one way in which it can be true scientifically, and yet not anticipate scientific discovery, that we may form in our own mind. If there be terms which can be selected from human speech that are so elastic and flexible as that without disclosing scientific facts in advance, they may accommodate themselves to scientific facts when discovered, it would seem that that is the best thing that could be done by the writers of the Bible in the matter of expression touching science. It is the very thing that has been done. You open at the first chapter of Genesis, and what do you find in the very first chapter? You find the word firmament. Now, the ancients believed that the concave above us was a solid concave of metal, and that the stars were fixed in that concave, and that it revolved in diurnal rotation around the earth. That word "firmament" finds its way into the Bible, because it was the closest word to express, in the minds of the translators, the Hebrew word "rakya," but the Hebrew word means simply "expanse;" had Moses been Ormsby, McKnight, Mitchell, or one of your grandest astronomers in the British Empire, like Rosse or Herschell, he could not have chosen a word that would more accurately express the exact fact, then unknown to men, that there is simply an expanse of space between the stars and the earth.

Well, I know it is said that Moses and geology are hopelessly at war! What does geology teach? As far as it teaches anything it teaches a wild watery waste, then the arising of the continents above the surface of the water, the appearance of the sun and moon in the heavens, after the moisture fog and mist had been dispersed on the third creative day; then the growth of enormous vegetation, in its three forms of plant, herb and tree; then the creation of animals, from lower types up to man. Just exactly *that order* does Moses follow in the six creative days, and his is the only ancient book that touches on cosmogony that does not teach nonsense. If I take the old East Indian books what is the system of cosmogony I find there? I will give it to you, as nearly as I can:

"Ages upon ages ago this earth began to be. It was made in seven stories of flat triangular plains resting upon the heads of elephants with their tails turned out ! And the elephants were supported upon a great tortoise, and the tortoise rested upon the coil of a great snake, and the snake rested upon-nobody knows what !" That is Indian cosmogony. Compare it with Moses' sublime account of creation. Will you tell me who it was that so guided Moses that he should not use a single term anywhere in his account of the six days of the creation that should not be accordant with the discoveries of modern science ? Comparative anatomy has shewn within the last two hundred years, that the order of creation was from a lower type to a higher. It began with the fish, the proportion of whose brain to the spinal cord (which is accepted as the standard) is two to one. Then came the reptiles, two and a-halt to one; then the birds, three to one; then mammals, four to one, and then followed man with thirty-three to one as his ratio. Absolutely Moses' order ! Who taught Moses comparative anatomy? Who can account for the mistakes that Moses-didn't make?

Well, I can only glance at this subject-if I am not already wearying you-but I have touched just rapidly on a few of the different sciences, that you may see the marvellous elasticity of the phraseology of the Scriptures, how it anticipates science, like the acorn enfolding the germ of the mighty oak, yet to be grown and expanded in time. Here, for instance, is astronomy. Now, we read in Jeremiah that "the hosts of heaven cannot be numbered," even as "the sand upon the seashore cannot be measured." Well now, people might have said that was a poetic exaggeration, but it is a considerable exaggeration even for a poet, because, when Hipparchus made his estimate of the number of the stars, he counted and catalogued them, and it was done also after his day, it was found that there were about 3,130 in the entire concave of Heaven, that could be counted. Well, if Jeremiah understood the simple principles of arithmetic, he could surely count 3,130? He could hardly say they were quite as countless as the sands of the seashore? But when Galileo turned his telescope to Heaven, he found it to be no poetic imagination or exaggeration, for when that rude brazen tube was turned to the stars it began to be seen that they were countless,-but when Lord Rosse turned his great reflector to the stars four hundred millions became visible and countable, and when Herschel began, from the foot of the dark continent, to explore, he found the Milky Way, that stretches its white banner across the firmament, comprised simply millions upon millions of stars, that stand like countless warriors in serried ranks mustered so closely that only the light that flashes from their silver helmets reaches our eyes! Who taught Jeremiah astronomy? Who led him to use poetic phraseology, that exactly accommodates the facts of modern science, though those facts were not discovered until thousands of years after ? Still take another example, here are the mysteries of optics. Now, I suppose, amongst the last discoveries of science are the facts with regard to light, Let me repeat, just for the sake of argument. You take a rod, and suspend it in the air, and start it vibrating, and it will give forth sounds, going from the lowest to the highest, but when they become so rapid that the vibration can no longer be represented in sound, the vibration passes to colour, through the whole order of the colours of the spectrum, and when it can no longer be represented by colour, it becomes—LIGHT! So that light is really music. Did you ever think of it? And the reason we do not hear the music in the light is because our senses are not attuned to those high vibrations. The lowest we can hear in the scale is  $16\frac{1}{2}$  vibrations to the second, and the highest we can hear is 38,000 to the second, and when it gets beyond 38,000 we cannot discover it as sound vibration, but it reveals itself to us in colour, and then in light. Now, do not you see that light is vibration, movement, motion, akin to music? Let us turn to the Holy Word, I could give you a dozen passages, let us take two--" The morning stars sang together." It took a good deal of intrepidity on the part of our translators, to translate the Hebrew word "ranan," which means to vibrate with a musical motion, "sang," but it absolutely expresses the fact, and to the ear of God the morning stars are singing. "Thou makest the out-going of the morning and evening to *rejoice*." It is the same Hebrew word, to give forth tremulous vibrations, like a musical instrument. "Thon makest the outgoing of the morning and evening to vibrate musically." Who taught the prophets and psalmist to use language which exactly accommodates itself to modern discoveries, made within the last thirty-five years, that light is like music, a form of vibrating

motion? Compare also Psalm xix., where light and sound are strongly associated.

Take another instance of scientific accuracy. Solomon says in the twelfth chapter of Ecclesiastes : "Or ever the silver cord be loosed or the golden bowl be broken, or the pitcher be broken at the fountain, or the wheel broken at the cistern." I suppose we all understand that life is a kind of quadruped, it goes on four legs. There is the brain, the respiratory system, the heart, and the nervous system. What did Solomon know about physiology? And yet look at the marvellous description. The "silver cord" is the spinal marrow that passes down the back, from it the double system of sensor and motor nerves radiate in every direction; loosen that, you die. Pass your dissecting saw horizontally through the cranium, turn over the top of the skull, it is a "golden bowl" that holds the brain; shatter it, life departs. Open the chest, you find here the lungs, the "pitcher" close to the fountain of life, shaped like a pitcher, with a spout like a pitcher; it takes in the air, and it pours out the air; this is the "pitcher at the fountain." Now look closer, here is the heart, it draws up the blood through pipes of blue, it pulses forth the blood through pipes of crimson exactly as the "wheel" at the ancient cistern used to draw up the water through one set of pipes and propel it through another ! Who taught Solomon to use language that exactly accommodates itself to Harvey's discovery of the circulation of the blood, hundreds and hundreds of years before the circulation of the blood was thought of?

And so in every department of science you may go through this Word of God, and you will find no single well-established fact of science contradicted in this Holy Scripture anywhere. I know that infidels often try to make out that there is a good deal of antagonism between the Word of God and their "science." There is, and there ought to be! When they find anything that they think is a fact, and they think it bears against the Holy Scriptures, they ram it into their gun with a double charge of powder, and fire, and expect to see the defences of Christianity totter under the tremendous shock of their artillery! But lo, the walls stand, and there is not even a breach, not one stone fallen out, not even the mark of an impact. If you come to examine, you will find that instead of hurling some huge solid shot of hard fact against the walls of Christian defence, they have been simply firing a paper wad of their own fanciful theory, which took fire from their own powder before it got out of the mouth of the gun ! Let science become settled and established, let us pass from the domain of hypothesis to unquestioned and accredited fact, and then bring these facts to compare with the Word of God, and there is no collision. Or, if there appear to be conflict, it is only like the failure of stereoscopic views to come together into one complete picture, when we look first into the eyepiece. We have only to wait until we get the common focal centre in which the visual rays may coincide, and the pictures will come into harmony. So all we have to do is just to wait and be patient until we get the eye on the proper focal centre, and all the facts and truths of science, and all the statements of the Word of God will harmonize absolutely and come into place.

Well, a word about the *ethical* truth of the Bible. I think it quite remarkable, dear friends, that the Bible should not only teach ethical truths so sublime and magnificent, but that it should actually contain within the compass of its ethical teachings not a single grain of error. Find me within this entire Word of God one solitary immoral teaching—

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one solitary thing that justifies sin! I know some people say David caused those people that he conquered to be sawn asunder, to be scraped and torn to pieces by harrows, to be split asunder by axes, and burnt up in lime-kilns! Yes-if you do not know any more about it than that, he did. But suppose that that word "made them to pass under" only means what it meant in Roman days for people to pass under the yoke, why then he simply set them to work at lime-kilns, drawing harrows, cutting down trees and using saws; quite different, is it not? But it is astonishing to see how eager some people are to get a shot against the Bible. They do not stop to see if there is anything in their hand, but if it only appears to be something that can be hurled against the Word of God, away it goes! It reminds me of the strictures of one of the Boston papers, stating that the whole story of the quails in the wilderness was absolutely absurd, because Moses represented them as falling on the earth several cubits high; and an estimate was made by the editor as to how many each Hebrew would have for his breakfast, dinner and supper, and how many he would have over to give to the heathen neighbours around about ! If I should tell you that coming here to this church to-night I saw a flock of quails three cubits high, you would not think I saw them piled three cubits high, but flying three cubits high, so that I could take a stick and knock them down easily. That is exactly what Moses meant, that they came within reaching distance so that they could be easily knocked down. He did not consider, I dare say, that the newspapers were ever going to be published, or gather such absurdity from the language he used. As I have said, the ethical truth of the Bible is marvellous,-no condoning of offences, no commending of iniquities,-the purest moral code ever found in the world, absolutely free from all adulteration. And then, when you come to its splendid conceptions, look at the spiritual truth,-think of God, Eternal, Omniscient, Omnipresent, Infinite, All-wise, just, good, merciful, true, a Spirit, and a Spiritual God. And then think of the fact that there are no half-truths in this Bible,-I think that is also most marvellous. I will give you one illustration if you will bear with me. Take the fifteenth chapter of Luke, it is a most instructive chapter, it contains three illustrations, three revelations as to the "lost, found." It is a common thing for ministers of the Gospel and commentators to say that it contains three parables; it contains only one. He "spake this parable unto them;" it is in three forms of representation; he does not pass to the second and third and say "another parable," because it is one parable illustrating one great subject, and there are three divisions or representations. We recognize the trend of the parable, it is how the lost is found. I simply want to call attention to the fact that no half-truths are presented in this chapter. The first part of this parable is the shepherd seeking the lost sheep and carrying it back on the shoulder; it is not even led or driven home, but is borne home on the shoulder, the place of strength. In the second part, the woman loses a piece of silver from her necklace, and sweeps the whole house until she finds it, but even when found it must be lifted up, and placed there on the necklace among its fellows. Well, after you have got these two representations you might suppose that, in the matter of salvation, God does all and man has nothing to do; he is simply the sheep lost by wandering to be found and brought back, or like the senseless coin on which the image and superscription of God was once placed, which, by contact with the world and currency in a worldly society has had that image and superscription defaced, if not effaced; and which must be

picked up by the Spirit of God, who with His lit candle searches for the lost soul among the rubbish of this world, and who reclaims it and puts it on the necklace of the Bride of Christ. Christ does not leave us with these half-truths. Men leave us with half-truths, and perplex us by omissions, but here Christ goes on, and he gives us the third representation that completes the three-fold parable: A certain man had two sons. You notice the son did all the straying, and he does all the returning. He comes to himself, he repents, he resolves, he confesses, he takes the attitude of reconciliation, and he is met by the Father, but there is nothing done by the Father except to run and meet him when he has come home. So you have the grand truths of salvation presented, first from one hemisphere-God's side, and then from the other hemisphere-man's side. Well, I have always felt myself to be, as near as you might express it, a Calvinist, but I do not think that Calvin possessed a monopoly of truth; I do not think he was as infallible as the Bible is. Now, I think that Calvin offset the mischievous emphasis that had been placed upon the agency of man in salvation by taking his position on God, and he made the will of God the centre of his system, and taking his position on God the necessary effect was that man dwindled into insignificance. Let me illustrate. Suppose you are studying the solar system, and can take your flight through space. You take your stand upon the earth; why, the earth fills the horizon, and the sun is merely the largest luminary in the Heavens, it is far off and small, and the earth close at hand is a great body. Now, will you take your place on the sun? The sun fills the horizon, and you do not even see the earth! The way to study the solar system is to get midway between the earth and the sun, and then you will get an idea of the proportions of the two. Arminius took his stand on man, man filled the horizon, and God appeared comparatively small. Calvin took his stand on God, and God so completely filled the horizon that man dwindled into insignificance, if he did not disappear altogether ! Now the difference between Divine and human teaching is this, that man takes one position from which to view truth, and so sees it only partially,-when God teaches truth He gives us both sides of the sphere, He puts half-truth to half-truth, and so when Christ taught about the soul He first took His stand on God, and man seemed to be nothing but simply a lost soul recovered by infinite mercy, brought back by infinite grace, into the fold, fastened again to the necklace of the Bride of Christ,as stupid as a sheep that knows not when it wanders, as senseless as a coin that does not even know that it is lost or ever bore an image and superscription of an imperial character. But when Christ has shewn us that half-truth, He wheels around and shews us the other half-truth,-if from the one side of salvation God does everything, from the other side, man does everything, and it is only when you put the two together that you have the rounded sphere of truth, that links salvation both with the activity of God and the responsive activity of man. God elects a man to be a saved man, and man elects God to be his God and Saviour, and so the wonderful test of truth in the Bible is the ethical completeness of it, and the spiritual sublimity of it.

Now, there is only one other test that I have time to apply. I have spoken of the survival of the Bible as the fittest, and the only fit, to survive. I have spoken of the test of truth. I want to say one word, in conclusion, about the test of practical *life*. Now, as to this crucial test of the Word of God and of every other system, let me simply call your attention to one

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verse that was read by our brother in the opening of the service : "All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness, that the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works." Here the five objects of the Word of God are indicated ; without amplifying upon them at all, let me refer to these five objects set down here, as reached by the Word of God.

First-Instruction-revealing truth that we never could have found out in any other possible way. Second-Reproof-that is where the Word of God deals with the conscience, that is, where it sends its dart into the moral sense, and arouses the whole man to see he is a sinner against God and man; and then thirdly-the Word of God is for correction. The word means literally, setting upright. Man is fallen, the Word of God sets him upright and turns his feet into the way, restores him when erring. And the fourth object is-Teaching "instruction in righteousness,"-training the disciple for every good work. He has had truth revealed by the Bible that he could not otherwise have discovered ; his conscience aroused, he has been set upright, corrected, restored; now he is to be taught in righteousness. It is the kind of teaching referred to by Christ when He said, "Go, disciple all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, teaching them to observe, etc."; there is the instruction that comes after the setting upright, it is the training in righteousness, it is training the man to be a veteran soldier in Christ. And fifthly and finally, it is the furnishing him in all good works for service in the Kingdom of God. That is the practical test of the Bible; wherever it has gone it has taught men what they did not know and could not have found out for themselves, it has pricked the conscience and reproved man of sin, it has aroused the will to holy resolve and set the man right before God, once more made an upright man of him, it has turned him out a skilled soldier and warrior, and it has furnished him as a workman for all good service.

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My dear friends, here is God's House-Beautiful. It is a Palace. You may enter by simple faith, and you may ascend to its topmost storey by simple obedience. It is a grandly-furnished Palace. It has in it a refectory, with milk for babes, with bread and strong meat for those that can assimilate such food, and with honey sweet and delicious to the taste, and the Water of Life. He brings us to the banqueting-house, and His banner over us is Love. In this House-Beautiful is a lavatory, where is at once a laver and a mirror. You come up to it, and in the clear, still surface you discover, as in a mirror, your deformity and defilement, and in the same water in the laver, which, as a mirror, discloses your defilement, you may wash your defilement away. In that same apartment there is a fountain of blood that is more efficient even than the laver of the Word, for while the laver of the Word sanctifies, it cannot justify. You may come to the fountain of Blood to be justified, and then, by the Blood and the Word and the Spirit, together, you shall be sanctified and perfected in holiness. In that same Palace-Beautiful there is a dormitory where the tired and worn and weary pilgrim lies down as in a chamber of peace and looks out through the window toward the sunrise and beholds the delectable mountains, and refreshes himself for the toils and strifes and conflicts of the coming day. In that same blessed Palace-Beautiful is God's gallery, where He has arranged before us portraits of prophets and saints, and martyrs and apostles, and, above, the immaculate portrait of the Son of God. In that same Palace-Beautiful there is a conservatory where the very plants and flowers and fruits of the Celestial City may both be perceived

and partaken of; and if by obedience you ascend the spiral staircase, you shall come last of all to the observatory, whose windows look out on celestial scenes themselves, and through the cloudless atmosphere you shall get a glimpse of the face of God.

The speaker concluded amid a breathless silence, which was broken on his resuming his seat by a storm of applause, and the motion having been duly seconded by the Rev. H. G. Baldwin, B.A., was put and carried.

Then followed the third hymn on the programme,

Sing them over to me again, Wonderful Words of Life.

after which the Rev. B. D. Thomas, D.D., rose to move the third resolution, speaking as follows :—

My DEAR FRIENDS,-I want to set your minds at rest. At this late hour I am not going to make a speech. I had prepared one, as requested, but I am not going to deliver it. I shall doubtless have abundant opportunity for doing so in the future. It would be a very unwise thing, after the magnificent address to which we have just listened, to attempt anything more than the formal submission of the resolution placed in my hands. If a man wanted to sacrifice himself, there could not be a more favourable opportunity. I am reminded of a story told of Robert Hall. On a certain Saturday afternoon a conceited little minister, living in the neighbourhood of Bristol, obtruded himself somewhat officiously into his study, and then began profusely to apologize. Mr. Hall, with a pretty clear comprehension of the man's calibre, said, facetiously, "Do not apologize-do not apologize. Why, I had Sir James Macintosh here until three o'clock this morning, and his conversation actually carried me up to the third heaven. I am glad you have come, for you will soon compel me to feel that I am yet amongst the creeping things of earth." Now, I do not desire that any such remark should be made about myself. Truly, we have been lifted up to the third heaven, and I do not intend to facilitate your descent.

I have, sir, felt sometimes like apologizing for defending the Word of God. It seemed to me like painting the rose, or adding lustre to the glories of the morning. But to-night, as those solid arguments were advanced, and as those eloquent words were spoken, which have fallen from Dr. Pierson's lips, I have had no such feeling. It was an exhilaration which I shall not soon forget, to have so graphically disclosed the granite foundation upon which my faith in that blessed Word is established.

I believe in this book from Genesis to Revelation. I go with Dr. Pierson all the way. I don't blink at the story of Jonah. I have as much respect for Moses to night as I had before the higher criticism touched him. I believe that if God gave us the book, that He gave it to us in its integrity. If a part of it is inspired, then all of it is inspired. He who bestowed upon us such a gift, knew how to preserve it from interpolation and errors that would destroy its value. I am thankful for the full and blessed confidence that most of us, I trust all of us here this evening, have in this book as the veritable Word of God. I can joyfully say with Luther, not only in respect to the doctrine of justification by faith, but in respect to the whole of the inspired record : "Herein I stand, I can do no other. So help me, God." I might be permitted to say that apart from the unwisdom of my indulging in a speech at this hour, that it is altogether unnecessary, as you will readily see, if you will bear in mind what you have been listening to, while I read the resolution :

"Unique in the position which it holds in the ever accumulating volume of the world's literature, impregnable to the persistent and strategic assaults of its enemies, imperial in its influence upon human life, the Bible is worthy of a supereminent place in our appreciation and affection, and no effort should be lost to extend its benefits to every human being that lives."

I ask if Dr. Pierson has not thoroughly exhausted that resolution?

The resolution, after the applause that greeted the conclusion of Dr. Thomas's remarks subsided, was seconded by Mr. James Brown, and duly carried.

After the collection the Rev. W. S. Blackstock, in moving the fourth resolution, said :

Mr. President, I have very much pleasure in moving that the cordial and hearty thanks of this meeting be presented to the gentlemen who have addressed us this evening. I am sure this will meet with the hearty approval of everyone here present to-night. We have the promise of Dr. Thomas's speech; it is to come hereafter, but I think we are very much indebted to him for the few observations he has already made, especially in regard to the address, the incomparable address we have had the pleasure of listening to. I think it has stirred our minds. It has done us good, and it has confirmed our faith in that book that lies at the foundation of all our hopes. I have very great pleasure in moving this resolution.

The Rev. Wm. Brookman seconded the resolution, which was carried.

In response to the conveyance of the vote by the Chairman, Dr. Pierson said :

Mr. Chairman, allow me to explain that. speaking as I did, extemporaneously, without a clock before me, I think I overstepped my time, and owe an apology to the audience and speakers. It reminds me of a story about a certain Scotch minister, who was asked, after an unusually long discourse, whether he felt fatigued. "Na, na, freend, I wasna tired mysel', but it wad ha dune your heart gude ta see hoo exhausted the gude folk were!" (Laughter.)

The fifth resolution, as follows, was moved by the Rev. Chas. Duff, M.A., and seconded by Alderman Geo. E. Gillespie :

"That the hearty thanks of this meeting be presented to the pastor and trustees of this church for its use on the present occasion, also to the organist and the choir for their valuable services this evening."

And carried amid applause, the meeting being brought to a close by the Doxology and Benediction.
