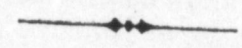

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SYNOPSIS.

The Annual General Meeting of the Board of Trustees of Queen's College, was held in the College, on Wednesday, the 20th July, 1853.

The Meeting having been duly constituted, on the motion of the Hon. William Morris, seconded by Hugh Allan, Esquire, the Hon. John Hamilton was unanimously re-elected Chairman of the Board for the ensuing year.

Dr. Cook gave in a verbal report of his proceedings in Scotland, in regard to the appointment of Professors—laid on the table testimonials in favor of Mr. Weir and Mr. Geddes, and expressed in strong terms the favorable opinion entertained of the Rev. Mr. Milroy, by Dr. Fleining, Professor of Moral Philosophy in the University of Glasgow.

It was resolved, That in view of the present financial condition of the College, the Trustees might reasonably be expected to be able to offer the following Salaries to the Professors, viz:—

The Rev. Dr. Machar, the Hon. John Hamilton, Andrew Drummond, and John Mowat, Esquires, were appointed a Committee to ascertain on what terms the House of the Archdeacon could be obtained, and to take the opinion of an Architect as to the changes necessary to be made for the accommodation of the College. The Committee were authorised to offer Five Thousand Pounds for that Building and the Grounds connected therewith, and to report to the Board if the offer be not excepted.

It was unanimously resolved, that the Rev. James George be appointed Professor of Logic, and of Mental and Moral Philosophy in the University.

The Rev. J. Malcolm Smith was appointed to the Chair of Ecclesiastical History, Biblical Criticism and Hebrew.

Dr. Cook was authorised to write to Professor Menzies, in name of the Board, requesting him to nominate Mr. Weir, or Mr. Geddes to the Classical Chair in the University, or failing them, such other person as he thinks qualified.

It was resolved, that the Rev. Alexander Spence, the Hon. John Hamilton, Hon. William Morris, Hon. Peter McGill, and Hugh Allan, Esquire, be a Committee to look out for a properly qualified Principal, and as soon as they have found an individual whom they judge suitable, and whom they have ascertained to be willing to accept the office, they report the same to the Board.

The Board resolved, as early as possible, to open up the Faculties of Law and Medicine in the University; and appointed the Rev. Mr. McGill, the Rev. Dr. Machar, John Mowat, and Hugh Allan, Esquires, a Committee to consider the best method of doing it, and take steps in the meantime for having Lectures delivered next Session in Anatomy and Physiology, and in Jurisprudence and Colonial Law.

It was resolved, that the Salaries of Professor Smith and Williamson be fixed at £375, in consideration of present claims on Fees, and the other Professors at £350, and that all the Fees exacted from the Students be henceforth paid into the Treasury.

The Synod Clerk handed in an extract from the Records of Synod, dated 13th July, 1853, intimating the re-election of the Rev. Hugh Urquhart, Rev. Alexander Spence, and Rev. John Barclay, as Clerical Trustees, and the Lay Trustees reported the election of Dr. James Hamilton, in place of John Young, Esquire, and the re-election of Andrew Drummond, Hugh Allan, and John Cameron, Esquires, as Lay Trustees, whose names the Secretary was directed to place at the top of the Roll of Trustees, in accordance with the Terms of the Royal Charter.

Professor Smith handed in a list of Books added to the College Library, during Session 1851-'52, and 1853-'54.

The thanks of the Board were voted to the Rev. Dr. Cook for his valuable services in proceeding to Scotland for the purpose of procuring Professors for the University.

It was unanimously resolved, that the cordial thanks of the Board be given to the Rev. Dr. Machar, on his retirement from the Principalship of the College, and for the fidelity and diligence with which he discharged its duties; and that the thanks of the Board be also given to the Rev. Mr. George, and the Rev. Mr. Urquhart for their faithful discharge of the duties in their several departments during the past Session.

The Senatus of the College were authorised to appropriate the Matriculation Fees of the Students to the purchase of Books for the College Library.

It was resolved, that the Board confirm and approve the Proceedings of the Executive Committee during the last year, and record their thanks to the Committee, and the Honorable the Chairman, for their valuable services.

PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

THE first meeting of the Executive Committee, after the publication of last report, was held on Tuesday, the 6th July, 1853, when a letter was read from Archibald John Macdonell, Esquire, offering to purchase the remainder of the College lands on College Street, at £100 per acre. It was resolved to offer the land to Mr. Macdonell at £125 per acre, payable one-fifth down, and the balance in four equal annual instalments, with interest; which resolution the Secretary was directed to communicate to him.

On the 24th August, a meeting was called by the Chairman, at the request of the Rev. Mr. George, who stated that he had been unable to make up his mind as to accepting permanently the appointment in the College offered to him at the late General Meeting, and suggested, that if a temporary arrangement could be entered into for the ensuing Session, without detriment to the interests of the College, it would give him longer time for consideration, and also allow his congregation sufficient time to look out for a suitable person to succeed him. The Committee, while expressing their willingness to meet Mr. George's views in any matter consistent with the interest of the College, at the same time strongly urged upon him the necessity of a speedy decision, and it was finally agreed, that he should intimate to the Committee, before their next monthly meeting on the first Tuesday in September, his acceptance or non-acceptance of the appointment.

At the meeting on 6th September, the Chairman read a letter from the Rev. Mr. George, intimating that after much anxious consideration he had deemed it his duty to accept the appointment in the College offered to him at the late General

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Meeting; and the Secretary was instructed to write to Mr. George, expressing the satisfaction of the Committee at his decision.

The Chairman stated that A. J. Macdonell, Esquire, had agreed to purchase the lands on College Street, on the terms offered to him, and that the necessary documents had been duly executed.

A letter was read from Mr. James Rollo, Assistant Teacher in Queen's College School, tendering his resignation of the situation. Also, one from Mr. McLennan, the Head Master, intimating that Mr. Rollo had consented to continue his services in the School till the 1st of October, but no longer; and that he had endeavoured to fix upon a person to recommend to the Board, but without success.

The Secretary was directed to write to Mr. McLennan, urging him to continue his endeavours to find a suitable person for recommendation to the Board as Mr. Rollo's successor.

James M. Creighton's account for printing Synopsis of Proceedings, 1852-'53, amounting to £5, was presented and ordered to be paid.

On the 1st October a letter from Mr. McLennan was read, recommending Mr. William Smith Ireland, as Mr. Rollo's successor in the School. The recommendation being supported by the Rev. Dr. Machar and the Rev. Professor Smith, Mr. Ireland was accordingly appointed Assistant Teacher.

Letters to the Chairman, from the Rev. Dr. Cook and Hugh Allan, Esquire, stating that Mr. Weir had accepted the Classical Professorship in the College, and would be in Kingston early in October, were read by the Secretary.

Two accounts, one for Fuel for the College and Boarding House, amounting to £25, and one for repairs in the School Room and Offices, amounting to £9 17s. 6d., were ordered to be paid.

At a Meeting on the 1st November, the Treasurer was authorised to pay to Mr. McLennan, the Salary of the Assistant Teacher in the School up to 31st October.

The Chairman read a letter from Archdeacon Stuart, dated 31st October, offering to dispose of his House and Grounds for £6000, payable as follows:—£2000 in three months, and £1000 on the 1st day of February in each of the years 1855, '56, '57, and '58, without interest. It was agreed that the Trustees present, with the Rev. Dr. Machar and the Professors,

should meet the following day to visit and inspect the premises.

E. W. Palmer's account for Printing Catalogues of College Library, amounting to £15 5s., was ordered to be paid.

A meeting was called by the Chairman on the 3rd November, to take into consideration the proposition of the Archdeacon in regard to the purchase of his House and Grounds. It was the unanimous opinion of the Meeting, that his offer should be closed with; and the Chairman, F. A. Harper, John Mowat and Andrew Drummond, Esquires, were appointed a Committee to complete the arrangements for the purchase.

On the 6th December, the Treasurer was authorised to effect Insurance on the Buildings lately purchased, to such an amount as he should consider necessary.

Mr. Donald McMillan having offered 8s. per acre for the East-half of Lot 17, in 1st Concession Belmont, and the Chairman having ascertained on enquiry that the land was worth about 10s. per acre—it was resolved to offer it to Mr. McMillan at the latter price, payable one-fourth down, and the balance in three equal annual instalments, with interest.

There was read a letter from the Crown Lands Department, dated Quebec, 23rd November, intimating that an order in Council issued on the 21st November, not acceding to the Petition of the College for a grant of land as a site for Buildings.

The Treasurer submitted a statement from Mr. McLennan, shewing an amount of £11 received by him from the Pupils for fuel, up to July last; less £2 3s. 3d. disbursed by him on account of the School, leaving £8 16s. 9d. to be paid into the Treasury.

An account from Messrs. J. D. Bryce & Co., for window blinds, amounting to 6s. 6d., was presented, and ordered to be paid.

At a meeting held on 7th February, 1854, the Secretary stated that Mr. Donald McMillan had agreed to purchase the east half of Lot 17, in 1st Concession of Belmont, at 10s. per acre; that he had remitted the first payment, and that the Title Deeds had been prepared and forwarded to him.

The Chairman mentioned that the first payment of £2000 on Summerhill House and Grounds having fallen due, the amount had been paid that day by the Treasurer.

Mr. Drummond stated that he had effected Insurance on the buildings to the amount of £1000, and that a policy for a similar amount effected by the Archdeacon had been transferred

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to the Trustees. He also stated that Lot No. 1, (broken front,) in the 14th Concession of Colchester, had been sold to Mr. Rowland Burr, Toronto, at 7s. 6d. per acre.

A letter was read from the Trustees resident in Quebec and Montreal, approving of and authorizing the purchase of the Archdeacon's House and Grounds.

Sundry accounts amounting to £18 18s. 10½d., were presented and ordered to be paid.

The Chairman, John Mowat and Andrew Drummond, Esquires, were appointed a Committee to have charge of the newly acquired College Property, to see that the necessary repairs be made, and to contract for having the grounds properly fenced in. The Committee were also authorised to have some firewood laid in for the use of the College.

The Chairman, the Rev. Professor George, and the Rev. Professor Smith were appointed a Committee to make application to the Ordnance Department for a grant of that portion of land adjoining the property of the College.

The Rev. Professor Smith, Rev. Professor Williamson, and Mr. Drummond, were appointed a Committee to confer with some of the Medical Practitioners of Kingston, with a view to the establishment of a Medical School, in connection with the College, and to report to the Trustees.

On the 7th March, a Deputation from the Medical Practitioners of Kingston, consisting of Drs. Sampson, John Stewart, Dickson and Strange, attended and presented a communication respecting the establishment of a Medical School, in connection with the College. The communication was referred to the Committee appointed last month, to report on at next meeting.

The Chairman read a letter from the College Senatus, requesting to be informed whether Dr. Cook had made up his mind to accept the Principalship of the College; and stated that he would refer the letter without delay to the Committee appointed at last general meeting to seek out a Principal.

An account submitted by Mr. Mowat was referred to the Chairman and Mr. Drummond, to report on at next meeting.

The Salary of the Secretary for the past year was ordered to be paid; also, his account for Stationery and Postages, amounting to 19s. 11d.

The Treasurer presented a statement of Instalments due on lands purchased from the College, amounting with Interest, to £200 8s., and the Secretary was directed to write to the several parties, requesting payment.

Mr. Drummond and Mr. Mowat were appointed a Committee to see the Proprietors of the Buildings at present occupied by the College, and endeavour to arrange with them for taking the premises off the hands of the Trustees, at the close of the present Session.

The Annual Report of the Trustees to the Colonial Committee of the Church of Scotland, was forwarded by the Secretary on the 19th March.

On the 4th April, the balance due Mr. Mowat was, on the recommendation of the Committee to whom the account was referred at last meeting, ordered to be paid.

The Chairman read a letter from Mr. McLennan, Head Master of Queen's College School, intimating his desire to close his connexion with the College School on 1st October next.

An account from Mr. James Morton for Rent, from 1st May, 1849, to 1st May, 1854, amounting with interest to £336, was referred to Mr. Mowat and Mr. Drummond, for the purpose of having it adjusted by getting the interest deducted, and to report at next meeting.

Mr. Mowat and Mr. Drummond reported that Mr. Morton was willing to take his portion of the premises off the hands of the Trustees on the 1st day of May next; and that Mr. Sadlier had declined taking the building owned by him until the expiration of the lease, but would have no objections to the Trustees sub-letting it.

The Committee to whom was referred the communication from the Medical Practitioners at the last meeting, reported that it was their intention to correspond with the Committee appointed at the General Meeting in July last, to consider the best method of opening up the Faculties of Law and Medicine in the University, so as to ascertain their views before taking any action in the matter.

At a meeting held on the 18th April, the sum of £18 was granted, to be applied by the Senatus to the purchase of Prizes for deserving Students.

Mr. Drummond reported that Mr. Morton would not agree to deduct the Interest on his Rent account.

Mr. Mowat and Mr. Drummond were appointed a Committee to rent the land belonging to the College, at present leased to Mr. Morton.

A letter was read from Mr. Alexander McMahon, offering 13s. 9d. per acre for Lot No. 9, in the 13th Concession of Port-

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land, £25 to be paid down, and the balance in four equal annual instalments, with Interest. It was resolved to offer him the land at 15s. per acre payable in the manner proposed by him.

Mr. Mowat and Mr. Drummond were authorised to make arrangements for renting a portion of the College Buildings to some one of the Professors.

The Boarding House Committee were authorised to re-engage the Janitor, John Anderson, for a further period.

It was deemed advisable that the Professors should visit some of the Congregations in connection with the Church of Scotland, as soon as practicable after the close of the Session; and that an appeal be made by the Trustees to the Synod, urging that body to bring the claims of the College before the country.

Professor Smith was authorised to make arrangements for the removal of the College Library to the new College Buildings.

The Secretary was directed to have a Synopsis of the proceedings for the past year printed and circulated amongst the Trustees, previous to the General Meeting on the first Wednesday in June next.
