## RULES

TO BE OBSERVED BY THE

### ADMISSION COMMITTEE

OF

## "THE HOME FOR THE AGED."

I.—Every application must be made in writing, stating the age, religious belief, and temporal circumstances of the applicant.

II.—No person shall be admitted who has not attained the age of 60 years, unless dispensed with by the general committee of the Home.

III.—No person can be admitted unless one or two securities shall guarantee the payment of £10 per annum in quarterly payments in advance.

IV.—If the person admitted shall possess any personal or real estate, or articles of furniture, the same to become the property of the Home, on her decease.

V.—That as it is impossible to accommodate all who apply and only a limited number can be admitted, this institution is more especially designed for those, whose reduced circumstances require this assistance, and are compelled to seek a home in old age.

VI.—No persons will be admitted into the "Home" except they hold the scripture doctrines of the Divinity of Christ, the Deity and personality of the Holy Spirit, the total depravity of man, salvation through the Atonement of Christ, the necessity of Divine influence, the obligation resting on all men to repent and

believe the gospel, the necessity of practical holiness as the evidence of union to the Saviour, the eternity of future rewards and punishments, and the Divine and perpetual obligations of the Christian Sabbath.

It shall be the duty of the committee of Admission to enquire particularly into the moral character and disposition of all who are to be admitted into the Home, and to require that all inmates attend the religious services in the Home unless prevented by illness.

VII.—Any person shall have the option of leaving the Home on giving a quarter's notice and the payment of all dues. If any are discontented and unhappy, or refuse to submit to the rules and regulations of the Home, they are at liberty to leave at a month's notice.

VIII.—Whenever any doubts shall arise respecting the individual to be admitted, reference shall be made to the general Committee of the "Home."

IX.—No person shall be admitted unless one or two securities shall guarantee the payment of £10 per annum in quarterly payments in advance.

X.—If the person admitted shall possess any personal or real estate, or articles of furniture, the same to become the property of the Home on her decease.

XI.—That as it is impossible to accommodate all who apply and only a limited number can be admitted, this institution is more especially designed for those whose reduced circumstances require this assistance, and are compelled to seek a home in old age.

## REPORT.

ANOTHER year has closed since we presented our friends, and subscribers, and the public in general, with a report of the *Home for the Aged*, now permanently established in the city, and enrolled among the number of the Benevolent Institutions which adorn the community, and call forth the admiration and praise of every reflecting mind.

In sending forth this our *Fourth Annual Report*, we desire *First*, to express our unfeigned thanks to Him, the Giver of all good, who has crowned our humble efforts with abundant success, and made the Institution a happy and Christian home. *Secondly*, to acknowledge the kindness of those friends and benefactors, through whose liberality the Home has been sustained, and many aged members of Christian churches rendered comfortable and happy in declining years.

The Home for the Aged is situated in Gottingen street, opposite the Asylum for the Deaf and Dumb. It is an extensive and valuable property, and has cost the Committee, together with repairs and a new addition, £1391 19s. 9d. There remains a mortgage on the premises of £600, which sum we hope ere long to see paid off, by bequest, or otherwise, and the establishment made a self-sustaining institution. It is capable of accommodating comfortably twenty-five inmates, who pay £10 per annum if they reside in the city, and £15 or more per annum, if they reside out of the city. They are provided with every comfort and advantage, temporal and spiritual; and under the kind and judicious management of the Matron, Mrs. McKie, cannot fail to be happy and contented. There are at present residing in the Home fourteen aged and infirm persons, most of whom have seen brighter and more prosperous days, and who might but for this institution, have been subjected to many and great privations.

The Home for the Aged was founded by WILLIAM MURDOCH, Esq., a successful and honorable merchant in this city, who, on

retiring from business, left towards its endowment the munificent sum of £1000. It has been in operation four years ; and if the success of the past be a just criterion for the future, the Committee may well "take courage and go forward," in humble reliance on the guidance and blessing of the Most High.

During the past year we have admitted four into the Home, and we have to record the death of two. And here we desire to pay a tribute of respect to the memory of the late Dr. Hume, the kind and disinterested Medical Visitor of the Home, who from its first institution had gratuitously attended the sick and dying.

The Committee being aware that some misunderstanding exists regarding the class of persons for whom this institution was intended, take the liberty of publishing an extract from a letter written by the first and largest contributor to the establishment : "My attention being called to the benefit of an institution in Halifax for distressed elderly persons, who have seen better days, who are thus left unprovided for, at that time of life when the infirmities of age prevent their doing any thing whereby they could assist themselves, I shall on my part be willing to contribute *One Thousand Pounds*, to be secured on mortgage approved by the Committee of Management, the interest to go to the support of this laudable undertaking."

In concluding this our Fourth Report, we hope a generous community will sustain us in "our labor of love," and enable us to continue to afford a comfortable and happy home to those already entrusted to our care, and also to others, who from unavoidable circumstances, may from time to time seek admission into the *Home for the Aged*.

The Committee render their sincere thanks to the unknown friend who sent the handsome Reading-desk for the convenience of the gentlemen who conduct the Sabbath services.
