## **Entirely Matter For The** Justice Department

Canada's Militia Office Not Moving in Vanceboro Affair -- Extradition Requested--Warrant Sworn Out But Not **Effective Till This is Arranged** 

Ottawa, Feb. 3—Whatever the motive behind the blowing up af the C. P. R. bridge at Vanceboro, the dominion government is insisting upon it being treated primarily as an offence under the criminal code, and demanding the extradition of Van Horn. That request sent to Washington, last night, will be put before the American department of state, and an immediate answer is ex-

The department of justice, and not the militia department, is dealing with the matter. It is not treated here as evidence of a series of raids or as possessed of any special military significance, as a matter of fact the militia department is taking no proceedings in the matter.

It is rather the minister of justice and the dominion police under his jurisdiction who are dealing with it.

Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., attorney-general, said today that locally there had been no change in regard to the holding of Von Horn at Vanceboro. The dominion authorities at Ottawa were taking the matter up and negotiations

with Washington were in progress. WARRANT OUT BUT NOT EFFECTIVE YET

Vanceboro, Maine, Feb. 3—Under the auspices of Canadian officials, a court session was held last night at McAdam Junction, at which testimony was given before Police Magistrate Luke Lawson, who later issued a warrant against Von Horn. A copy of the warrant was delivered to Deputy Sheriff Ross.

No service was made on the prisoner, local authorities having decided that the warrant had no legal standing unless accompanied by an order for extra-

Paris, Feb. 3—The French War Office this afternoon, reported as follows:

"In the country north of the Lys there s nothing to report.

"Between the Lys and the Oise, in the sector of the Nouvette, to the east of Lens, French batteries put an end to a spirited fusilade from the enemy.

"The Germans endeavored to float down the river Anore some blazing rafts, starting them from a point above Aveluy, which is north of Albert. We were successful, however, in stopping these floats before they exploded.

"Our artillery has continued to secure excellent results in the valley of the Aisne. We have made slight progress and have taken prisoners and have repulsed a counter attack, to the west of Hill No. 200, near Perthes.

"In the Argonne, a second German attack took place yesterday near Bagatelle, at about six o'clock in the evening. This also was repulsed, as had been an attack previously reported and which took place at one o'clock in the afternoon.



Today's reports from Russia are to the effect that their armies are still meeting with success both in Poland and the Carpathians. The German attempt to break through to Warsaw has not been successful, while the Russian flank flanks.

been successful, while the Russian flank movements appear to be progressing satisfactorily. The Germans have continued their desperate efforts to break through the British lines toward the French coast ports but without success. Their losses are reported to be in the proportion of three to one.

A German official order, referring to the transportation of British troops to Fiance says:— "We shall use every method of war at our disposal against them." How this order is to be interpreted is shown by a German attempt to torpedo a British hospital ship; and a Berlin newspaper declares that they will not refrain from torpedoing English merchant ships simply because the lives of a few are thereby endangered. In other words Germany will continue barbarian methods of warfare.

A Count Von Reventiow, in a Berlin paper, declares that as Britain is trying to stave Germany that country should conduct a war "without scruple" against the Allies, and particularly against Britain. This is exactly what Germany has been doing. She has done it in Belgium, in Northern France, in the English Channel. It is her settled policy. She has no regard for the ordinary usages of civilized warfare.

PLOYERS AND WORK-PEOPLE

Short Title.

This act may be cited as the Free Public Labor Bureaux Act.

Interpretation

In this act, unless the context otherwise requires—

(a) Minister, means the Minister of Labor.

London, Feb. 3—Warning against allowing the endurance of the soldiers to be worm down in case of a prolonged war was uttered by Sir Owen Seaman, editor of Punch, and addressing a Methodist Brotherhood meeting. Germany had two aims, a craving for territorial extension, and a desire to spread her own kultur, but the first had failed, as shown by her attempts at colonizing,
