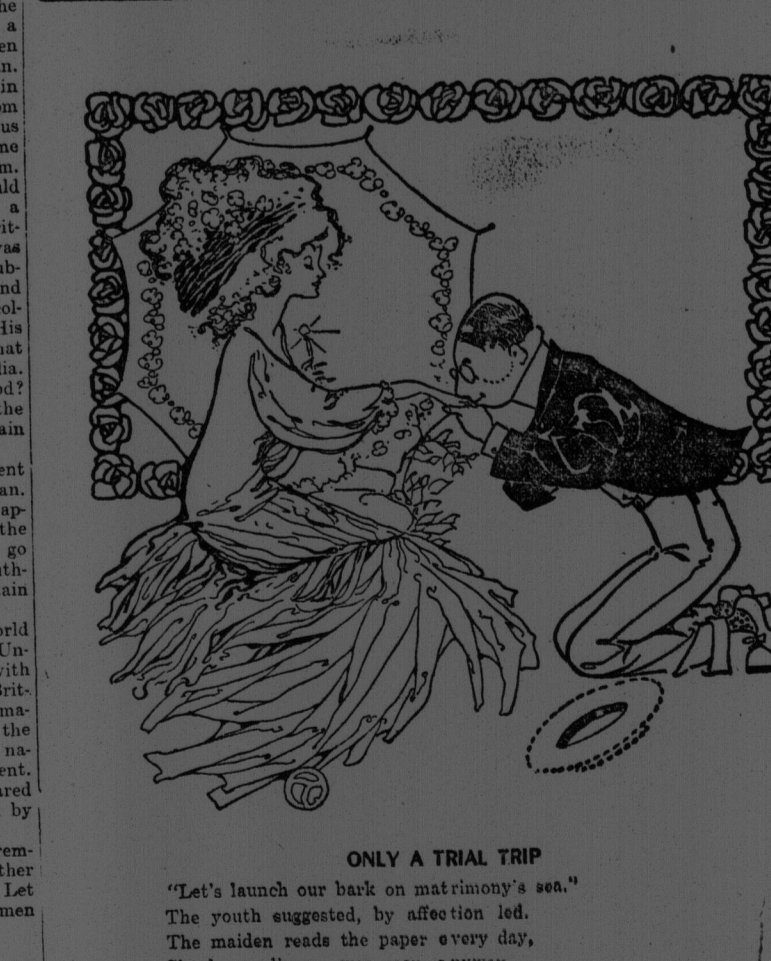

LIGHTNING'S HAVOC IN THE OIL FIELDS

Tulsa, Okla., Aug. 18.—Approximately \$100,000 worth of oil and tanks in the Oklahoma fields were destroyed by fire during a severe electrical storm late yesterday. A mile and a half northeast of Keffau, a 35,000 barrel steel tank of the Kansas & Oklahoma Company was struck by lightning. A short distance to the north two 10,000 barrel tanks went up in flames and still further north another 35,000 barrel tank was hit. In the same field three 10,000 barrel wood tanks were consumed.

CAN BE NO APPEAL IN CURREY CASE

Chief Justice Barker Hands Down Decision to His Effect—Question of Judge's Right to Try a Case is Raised

This morning in Chambers, Chief Justice Barker in the matter of the application of Mrs. L. A. Currey for leave to appeal from the decision of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick to the Supreme Court of Canada in the Currey separation suit, handed down a written judgment in which he decided that the case was not appealable.

On Tuesday afternoon, M. G. Teed, K. C., for Mrs. Currey, made the application, D. Mullin, K. C., for Dr. Currey in a lengthy argument contended that the case could not be appealed.

Fred. R. Taylor, counsel for Donaldson Brodeur in the case of Andrew Hall vs. Donaldson Brodeur, which is being heard before Mr. Justice McKewen in chambers this morning, raised an unusual preliminary objection when he said that His Honor was not competent to try this claim as judge of the Supreme Court of Judicature, Kings Bench Division and not a judge of the Supreme Court, who under the act is named to try cases of this nature.

Dr. W. B. Wallace, K. C., for Hall argued contra. Judgment on this point will be delivered when His Honor deals with the matter of the appeal.

G. P. R. WORK ON THIS DIVISION GOING ON WELL

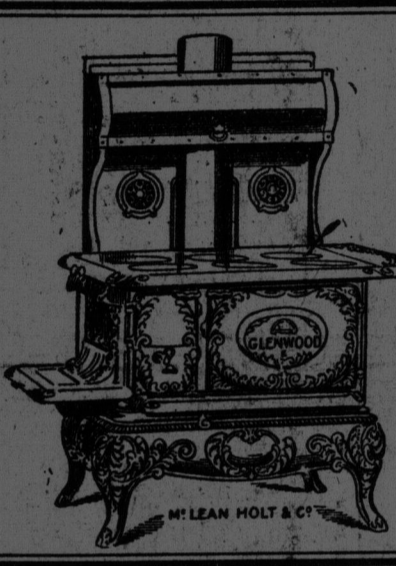
