It is a common idea that moist wood is more subject to decay than dry wood. That this is only true within certain limits is pointed out by the Forest Products Laboratories of Canada (Dominion Forestry Branch) who state that recent investigations indicate that wood which contains less than 25 per cent or more than 60 per cent of water is not subject to decay by wood-destroying fungi. Examples of the protective effect of moisture extend further back in time than the foundations of medieval buildings to the pre-historic piles of the Swiss Lake Dwellers. The latter timbers have been subperged in water for thousands of years without becoming unsound. The most modern application of the principle may be seen in certain large Canadian pulp mills where the immense stacks of pulpwood are sprinkled with water. This sprinkling not only prevents rotting but is a most efficient means for the prevention of fire.



As a receiving aerial, when the plane of the coll is in the direction of the advancing waves, the strongest signals are obtained and although not as powerful as the large antenna, it is capable of receiving signals from long distances when connected to very sensitive amplifiers.


Signals have been received in the East, from the Pacific Coast and from Germany on a coil aerial consisting of a few turns of wire used in conjunction with highly sensitive amplifiers.

As a direction finder, it serves a valuable purpose for it not only receives the electric waves but determines the direction of the transmitting station. It may be used therefore by government radio inspectors in the detection of stations which violate the radio law governing transmission. When the plane of the coil is in line with the advancing wave, the strongest signals are received, whereas when the plane of the coil is at right angles, the energy induced in the coil by the wave is at a minimum. The induced current circulates around the coil instead of oscillating up and down as in the case of the ordinary type of outdoor antenna.

UNDERWATER WIRELESS.

Submarines completely submerged and at a considerable distance below the surface of the ocean have received radio signals from far distant points by the use of a heavily insulated wire supported on short masts and grounded each end to the metal hull of the submarine. Not only is it possible for the submarine to receive messages beneath the waves, but it may transmit radio signals and in this way communicate with a nearby vessel. By use of this type of coll aerial with its directional properties, the submerged submarine not only detects the wireless waves but can determine their direction. In this manner a ship may exchange signals of recognition with an invisible protector.





DIET FOR CHILD DURING THE SECOND YEAR

Usually after the twelfth month, the mother should select a diet schedule. Every new article of food should be carefully prepared, and given at first in very small quantities. All meals are to be given regularly, with nothing between meals. With many children this expansion of the diet list is attended with considerable difficulty. They are thoroughly satisfied with milk, and refuse all other form of nourishment. In such cases, withhold the milk until the more solid articles of food have been eaten. If both are given at the same time, the child will prefer the milk and when he has finished drinking it he will refuse the solid food. The following diet schedule will permit the mother to select a suitable meal from the foods listed

10 P.M.—A tablespoonful of cereal jelly in 8 ounces of

and well-cooked strained beans.

3 P.M.—Chicken, beef or mutton broth, with rice or with stale bread broken into the broth. Custard, cornstarch, or plain rice pudding, junket, stewed prunes. Bran biscuit and butter or stale bread and butter.

6 P.M.—Farina, cream of wheat, wheatena (each cooked two hours). Give one to three tablespoonfuls, served with milk, or with butter and salt. A drink of milk. Rusk or stale bread and butter.

The following suggestions have proved to be helpful when properly used with bottle feedings, and they may be used in conjunction with Eagle Brand Condensed Milk.

Always pour the milk from the can into the spoon—allowing it to level itself but not run over. You can readily understand that by dipping the spoon into the can you get more than a level spoonful, because of the milk that would adhere to the bottom of the spoon.

When you have added the milk to the water stir thoroughly. This is important.

When baby is four months old, give one teaspoonful of strained orange juice, diluted with equal quantity of boiled water, once daily before feeding time. Gradually increase the amount until you are giving the strained juice of a half of an orange undiluted, once daily before feeding time. Orange juice may be continued until child is old enough to eat other fruits as well as oranges.

OATMEAL JELLY

When baby is five months old, add one teaspoonful of oatmeal jelly to each feeding. Gradually increase the amount until you are adding three tablespoonfuls of oatmeal jelly to each feeding. To make oatmeal jelly add four ounces of oatmeal to one pint of water; boil for three hours in a double boiler, and add enough water so when cooking is completed a thin paste will be formed. This while hot is forced through a strainer; to remove coarser particles. When cold a semi-mass will be formed. Oatmeal jelly may be continued until child is old enough to eat well cooked whole cereals.

Oatmeal water very often relieves this condition. To make oatmeal water add one heaping tablespoonful of oatmeal to one pint of water, and boil for three hours in a double boiler. This will make a little more than half a pint of thick gruel to which add one pint of water that has been boiled. After straining mixture through fine strainer, you should have a little more than a pint of whitish liquid. This should be used with each feeding instead of the plain boiled water. If you find that this makes bowels too loose, dilute oatmeal water with plain boiled water.

Barley or rice water may be used instead of oatmeal water. If necessary two to three drops of plain codliver oil may be given twice daily added to the morning and night feedings.

DIARRHEA

LIME WATER

It is seldom necessary to use lime water with Eagle Brand Milk but should there be undigested particles of food in the bowel movements (which seem to be otherwise normal) or should there be vomiting of large curds shortly after feeding—or colic—it would be then advisable to try lime water. 


