R. A. Macaulay, of St. John, Presents Strong Case For New Brunswick Representatives On Deputation

URGES JUSTICE FOR MARITIMES

Federal Government Asked to Enforce Policy of Canadian Trade Through Canadian Channels, Adequate Equipment of Ports And Restriction of British Preference

(Special to The Times-Star.

OTTAWA, Feb. 26-A monster delegation, numbering over 600 men, today met Premier King and his Cabinet and urged that the Canadian Govern and put into operation an all-Canadian transportation policy that would tend to improve the condition of the country's national ports by increasing the traffic passing through them.

The Prime Minister commented upon the size of the delega-tion, remarking that the intention seemed to be "to take the government by storm. He said that he was very pleased to welcome the delegates, and to listen to their representations.

"That Canadian ports, east and west, be developed and equipped to take care of Canadian exports and imports, and ways and emans to be Yound by which this will be accomplished to the general advantage of Canada."

The above resolution agreed upon by members of the great delegation which waited upon the Dominion government this morning, was presented shortly after the arrival of the delegates at the committee

The time set for the delegation to meet the government was 11.30 a.m., but owing to the size of the crowd, there being about 600 delegates and representatives, and the delay in getting everyone seated, it was close upon noon before Premier King rose to welcome the delegation.

Before 11.30 the large committee room was filled to overflowing with maritime delegates and also with members of the House of Commons. It was the largest number of people packed into this room since the now historic meetings of the private bills committee last session when the Church Union bill was being considered.

A Rare Occasion.

It is not often that a deputation of this nature comes to the capital. Now and then the Ontario communities send down large deputations chiefly in the interests of hydro-electric development, and once in a while some of the larger cities are strongly represented here by their leading citizens.

The Valley Railway.

It is understood that New Brunswick is strongly urging upon the government the desirability of taking over the St. John Valley Railway and incorporating it in the National system. This has been advocated for some time,

Transportation Policy.

The deputation took a strong stand on transportation policy. They pointed out that from the days of Confederation the dominant idea in transportation policy down to recent date was to make trade flow along east and west likes. This, it was contended, was the property of the Dominion government, but it is contended that the Pranscontinental, and the Canadian Pacific Railway, the Grand Trunk Pacific, the Transcontinental, and the Canadian Northern.



10 SHIPS NEEDED Combine Doubts Peterson's
Ability to Get Them—Officials Say They Can

(British Anited Press.) LONDON, Feb. 26.—The fight of the North Atlantic Shipping combine increasing in bitterness. The com-bine is using every possible means of pressure at its command in order to force Premier Mackenzie King to bring the Preston charges before the Imperial Shipping Board. Sir George McLaren Brown and Sir Percy Bates are taking a most prom-inent part in this respect.





DELEGATES RECEIVE A CHEERING SEND-OFF ON LEAVING ST. JOHN

More Than 500 at Depot When Special Departs Carrying Envoys to Ottawa, Confident of Success of Their Mission

CONFIDENT in the justice of their cause, enthusiastic and optimistic as to the results of their mission and determined to impress upon the Government and Parliament the necessity of an all-Canadian transportation policy, two hundred St. John delegates left here yesterday afternoon in the C. P. R. special region of eleven cars for the epoch-making conference

Although there was no set celebration or send-off planned for the mission which is carrying the plea of the Maritimes for a transportation policy that will restrict the British preference to imports through Canadian ports and the routing of Canadian trade through Canadian channels, more than 500 well-wishers were at the Union Depot when the special train pulled out, ample evidence that the people of this city are vitally interested in the business on hand.

IMPORTANT MISSION TO ALL CANADA

But the importance of this misson is not confined to St. John, to the Province of New Brunswick, or to the Maritime Provinces. Every province in Canada will be looking toward Ottawa today. The conference with the members of the Federal Cabinet, and later with the Senate and the House of Commons, is a gathering of national import. Never before in the history of the Maritime Provinces has such a representation from the provinces down by the sounding sea carried the case of the Maritimes to Parliament Hill. There can be no question as to the representative character of this deputa-tion. It is composed of men whose interests are wrapped up in the development of the Maritime Provinces and who sincerely hope for that prosperity which was predicted would follow Confederation.

PEOPLE EVERYWHERE SUPPORT PROJECT

Capital and Labor have joined hands and go to Ottawa today pleading the same case. Down the Line.

"Workers must fight every attempt to reduce wages; if the wages of carpenters are reduced, carpenters buy textiles, and the wages of textile workers are reduced," said Green. "Textile workers will have less money to buy commodities produced by other industries; they eat poorer food; they make the old shoes last longer, burn less coal or no coal at all. So it goes, and every reduction of wages in the lone run, increases unemployment.

"Unemployment has steadily receded before the advance of the trade union movement, which has reduced hours of labor, raised the rates of pay, fostered the development of machinery and taught the workers to demand and get better conditions and higher standards of living."

Unions work constructively for the good of mankind by obtaining wage increases for workers, Green said.



> JUHN ROGERSON

Noted Carver Made Figureheads in Old Shipping Days

WITHIN FEW WEEKS OF 88TH BIRTHDAY

Skill Shown in Decorative Work at St. David's Church.

Within a few weeks of being 88 years of age, John Rogerson, famed as a wood carver and whose figureheads adorned many a fast St. John sailing vessel in the old days, died at 2.30 o'clock this morning at his home in Carleton street. He had enjoyed good health, and had been ill only since last

Born in Scotland.

Mr. Rogerson was born in Rochmaben, Dumfriesshire, Scotland, on April 2, 1887, and with his mother and brothers came to St. John in June, 1849. His father had preceded the family to Canada and was established in Portland. Mr. Rogerson's skill as a carver won for him a widespread fame, and for many years he followed his trade as a carver of the figureheads and trimmings of the wooden vessels which were built in St. John and as a designer and maker of the hanging signs which used to mark the places of business of the important city firms. His work was in great demand, and he and his partner, John Cochrane, could hardly keep up with the demand for their work.

Their place of business was on Mill street, opposite the site of the railway station, now occupied by the C. P. R. freight sheds. Both Mr. Cochrane and Mr. Rogerson served their time as apprentices to Mr. Rogerson's uncle, Edward Charters, who left St. John in 1857 and took up residence in Prince William.

Some of His Work. St. Andrew's Society possesses a very handsome carved chair, which is an excellent sample of Mr. Rogerson's work, and the beautiful carving in St. David's church was his gift. He had carved the woodwork for the second St. David's church, and after that church was destroyed he did the carving for the present edifice, devoting many days and months of painstaking labor to that self-imposed task.

One of the most recent pieces of carving which Mr. Rogerson completed was a panel showing Queen Margaret instructing King Malcolm in the Holy Scripture. This piece, which he made for the members of his family, is among his best works.

Sterling Qualities.

Mr. Rogerson had been one of the most widely known of St. John citizens and one of the most highly regarded. He possessed the sterling qualities of the Scotch character in integrity, industry, deep religious fervor and kindly feeling. He retained his memory and his faculties to a remarkable degree and during the last few months had been engaged in writing some of his recollections of the early days in St. John. He was able to give an accurate account of the wooden ships which made St. John a world-famous port. He knew them all and had made the figureheads for very many of them. He could recall the pioneers of the city and tell of its development up to the present time. In later life he was in the Customs service here.

Mr. Rogerson was an elder of St. David's church and one of its oldest members. He had worshipped in each of the three church buildings. He was the third oldest member of St. Andrew's Society. On June 18, 1863, hae was married in St. David's church to Miss Jean McKay, who died many years ago. Three daughters survive, Mars, Anne, who is Mrs. McAdams of Brooklyn, N. Y., and Miss Helen, of the Western Union staff in St. John.

In addition to his three daughters, Mr. Rogerson left a brother, William, in Toronto. The arrangements for the funeral had not been completed this afternoon.






