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## BY-LAWS.

#### Section, I.-Constitution.

1st.—The Society shall be called "THE LADLES' PROTESTANT HOME OF QUEBEC," and its objects are to afford a temporary home to destitute and unprotected women, and female children of all Protestant denominations in the city and immediate vicinity of Quebec, in which, while their bodily wants are cared for, their spiritual welfare may also be promoted by moral influence and religious instruction. The Committee of management shall also have a discretionary power to afford out-door relief during the winter, where congregational funds shall have been inadequate to meet all demands, but in all cases a certificate from a clergyman, or from the person in charge of the poor-fund shall be required, testifying to the amount already afforded by said fund.

2nd.-The objects of the Society being more for industrial employment, than for reformatory efforts, all immoral characters, as well as intemperate persons of hopelessly confirmed habits, shall be deemed inadmissable.

3rd.—All persons being Protestant, subscribing one dollar annually, shall be members of the Society, and shall be entitled to a vote at the annual meeting; provided always, that their subscription shall have been duly paid to the Treasurer at leat one week before the said annual meeting.

4th.-The affairs of the Society shall be managed by a committee of ladies, consisting of a President, a Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and at least twentyfour other ladies, who shall be elected at the annual meeting.

5th.—The said Committee shall have power to draw up rules for their own guidance, and to maintain the discipline of the Home, as well as to fill up vacancies in their own numbers during the year; provided always, nothing shall be enacted in said rules which is inconsistent with these the constitutional laws of the Society.

6th.—A Committee of nine gentlemen, being Members of the Association, shall be appointed every year at the annual meeting of the subscribers, whose duty shall be to take charge and care of the real estate of the Institution, to control the application and investment of moneys known as the Building Fund, and any increase thereunto made, and to advise with the Ladies' Committee in all matters of importance. Three shall form a quorum of said committee, all acts relative to real estate or Building Fund, or investment of moneys, must be approved or sanctioned by said Committee or a quorum thereof, before they shall have force to effect. The said Committee shall act as Auditors of the accounts.

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7th.—There shall be an annual meeting of the members of the Corporation in the month of February in each year, when the managing Committee of ladies retiring shall present their report, embracing a retrospect of the transactions of the past year, a cash statement of the affairs of the Society to the 31st December, as well as any matters of prospective interest or importance that they may have to submit.

8th.—The assistance and co-operation of all elergymen is to be invited, to promote, by their pastoral visits, the religious instruction and spiritual welfare of the inmates of the Home.

9th.—As persons of all denominations are admissable to the Home, all services or proceedings of an exclusively sectarian character are discountenanced; it being provided, however, that every possible facility shall be afforded to any visiting Protestant elergyman to assemble those of the inmates who may be members of his church.

10th.-That wards for both male and female patients shall be organized so soon as the funds of the Institution will permit.

11th.-None of these laws shall be altered or repealed, and no new law shall be added, except at the annual meeting of the members of the corporation, and not unless two-thirds of the members then present shall vote in favor of it.

#### Section 2.-Committee of Management.

1st.—The Committee of Management shall meet on the first Monday in each month for the transaction of business. Five shall form a quorum. At this meeting the ladies for duty for the month shall be appointed.

2nd.-The office-bearers of the Society, with the four visiting ladies, shall form an acting committee for the month, and shall meet every Monday for the transaction of ordinary business. Three shall form a quorum.

3rd. -Special meetings of the Committee of Management may be called by the President, at the request of not less than five members of the committee. Special meetings of the acting committee may be called by the President at her discretion.

4th.-The Vice-President, in the absence of the President, shall act in her stead; in the absence of both, the committee shall elect a President pro tempore.

5th.-The duty of the President shall be, to preside at all meetings, strictly to preserve order, to appoint committees, and to be arbitress in all debates.

6th.—The duty of the Treasurer shall be to receive all subscriptions and donations, and make all payments authorized by the Committee. She shall keep a list of the inmates of the Home who are entitled to relief from Church or other funds, and the amount of such relief. In the event of her absence from the meeting, it is expected that her book shall be sent for examination. 7th. keep a r the busi the ann admissio

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#### Section 3.-Order of Business.

1st .- The meeting shall open and close with prayer.

2nd.-After the meeting is called to order, no person to speak except on the subject under discussion.

3rd.---After the reports are read and the books examined, each lady in rotation to lay before the Committee any proposition she may have to make.

4th.—Any member bringing forward applications for admission, must make full inquiry into the case, with a view to discover the character and circumstances of the individual before affording them relief.

5th.—All orders for admission must be signed by the Secretary, except in urgent cases which have not been broaght before the Committee.

6th.-Vacancies for inmates cannot be preserved beyond a month after the order for admission had been granted.

#### Section 4 -Rules for Ladies on Duty.

1st.-The four ladies appointed for duty for the month shall arrange amongst themselves the division of their duties.

2nd. - One or more shall visit the Home daily, examine the Matron's books, note in their own book any event of importance, and take especial care that order, eleanliness and industry exist in every department.

3rd. -They will examine all work done and received, and see that the same is entered by the Matron in the book kept for that purpose.

4th.-They will give out all supplies according to the ratio laid down; to obviate confusion; one lady of the four keeping the key of the pantry for a month.

5th.-In the last week of the month they will examine the inventory of the Home property, and note down any losses reported by the Matron.

6th -- No inmate to be discharged without a written order from one of the ladies on duty, with whom will also rest the power of admitting; though, except in extreme eases, it is not desirable to receive any one whose case has not been brought before the weekly board of management.

7th.-They will give permission to inmates to go out when necessary, limiting the hour of return to 4 P. M. in winter, and 9 P. M. in summer.

Sth.-They will read the Scriptures to the inmates daily, and make arrangements each Saturday for the going to church on the Sabbath.

9th.—All observations to be noted down for the information of the weekly board of management, in whose hands will rest the power of redressing complaints and altering existing arrangements.

#### Section 5.-Duties of Matron.

1st .- The Matron will carry out all the rules of the establishment, and endeavor in every way to obey the orders of the ladies of the committee.

2nd.-She will render a faithful account of all stores and property placed in her charge, note down in her book all events of importance, all donations and visits, and keep, in a separate book, an account of all work received and sent out.

3rd.-She will read prayers to the inmates each night and morning, and, as far as possible, give them spiritual advice and instruction.

4th.—She will be personally responsible for the administering of all medicines ordered by the Physician, and for the carrying out of his orders concerning the sick. She will see that all meals are properly cooked and served, and promote in every way the health and comfort of the inmates.

5th.-At the end of each month, she will report to the ladies on duty any loss or breakage that may have occurred in the house property since the previous examination of the inventory.

6th.-She will not receive or discharge any inmates without a written order from one of the ladies on duty, or from the Secretary.

7th.-She will examine the person and boxes of all the inmates on first entering, and on dismissal, and when necessary, cause a thorough ablution.

Sth.-Whenever an inmate has been absent, the Matron will be especially careful to see that she does not bring back with her any spirituous liquors.

9th .-- She will read the rules to each inmate on their entering.

#### Section. 6 .- Rules for Inmates.

1st.-Hours for rising, five o'clock in summer, six in winter.

2nd.—Hours for morning prayers, eight o'clock in winter, seven o'clock in summer; breakfast immediately afterwards.

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4th .- Hour for supper, six o'clock.

5th .-- Hour for evening prayers, eight o'clock.

6th .- Hour for retiring to rest, nine o'clock. No light allowed after half-past nine.

7th.-A daily routine to be carried on with regard to the sweeping, dusting, scrubbing and making beds. Each room to be well aired every day.

Sth.—All the general work of the house, such as cooking, washing, bringing in wood, making fires, scrubbing, &c., to be done by such women as are appointed to the work by the ladies on duty.

9th.-The work of the establishment to be diligently carried on till supper time ; after that each woman may attend to the mending of her own clothes.

10th.—All visits to friends, and from them, to be asked permission for from the ladies on duty. The bringing of spirituous liquors into the house, or the use of them at all, is strictly forbidden. Any transgression of such rule to render the offender liable to expulsion.

11th.-Drunkenness, dishonesty, open contempt of religion or disobedieuce to the Matron and rules of the establishment, to render the offender liable to expulsion.

12th.-Each person, on entering, must signify to what Church they belong, and there they will be expected to attend on every Sunday.

13th.-No property admissable except wearing apparel, and in the event of the owner's death while in the Home, such apparel to become the property of the Institution. All moneys to be given in charge to the Matron.

14th .- All complaints are requested to be made to the ladies on duty.

The above rules to be read to each inmate on their entering the Home, and it is to be understood that they will obey them before they can be received.

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## LADIES' PROTESTANT HOME,

#### 1874.

By the mercy of God, we have once more reached the close of a year's operations of the "Ladies' Protestant Home," and your committee have again the pleasant duty laid upon them of bringing before their numerous friends and supporters the interests and claims of the institution under their care. They trust that by hearing of the benefits conferred upon so many of the helpless, aged and forlorn inmates, and the good done both to them and the little girls who are sheltered from want and misery in this "Home," that the public may be stirred to see and feel the need there is for increasing their liberality towards this most useful and much-needed charity.

During a portion of the past year, considerable anxiety has been felt on account of the prevalence of sickness in the city, but the committee humbly and gratefully acknowledge the loving and sheltering care of our Heavenly Father, in keeping the inmates free from any sickness, except such as is incident to the advanced age of some, and the delicate health of others.

Death has only once entered the "Home," within the twelve months, bringing with it a blessed release to the aged and afflicted sufferer who was called away—she had been in the "Home" from July, 1869, till March, 1874. There have been 75 persons in the "Home" during the year, 28 of these have been new admissions; 18 have been discharged, one has died, and at the end of the year 57 persons remained as inmates.

A great deal of knitting and some plain work has been done by the women, and nearly all are diligent and desirous of doing what they can for the benefit of their temporary home. Most of the household work also is performed by the more able-bodied of the women, thus making the expenditure in servants' wages very light.

The Committee feel that they are greatly indebted to their excellent Matron for the harmony and order which reign in the "Home," combining, as she does. rare executive ability with great consideration and kindness in the management of all under her care.

The children have enjoyed excellent health, and, though young. perform daily household tasks, besides receiving a good English education from their teacher, Miss l'arke, who kindly and patiently endeavors to train these little girls to be useful and lovable in their way through life. One child has been adopted since our last annual report was laid before you, and one has been placed in a situation as servant; both are doing well.

The children are also faithfully and regularly instructed on Sunday by the same young ladies who have so kindly devoted a portion of the Lord's day to this good work for several years.

Amongst the changes which have taken place during the year, the Committee record, with much regret, that they have been called upon to receive the resignation of their valuable Secretary, who, for nine years, has faithfully and cheerfully fulfilled the onerous duties of that office, but has now to devote herself to the comfort and welfare of a beloved member of her own family circle.

They also desire to express their sense of the loss they have sustained in the removal by death of Mrs. White, who was for very many years a valued and constant friend of the "Home."

The Committee tender their warmest thanks to the visiting physicians, Drs. Boswell, Montizambert, Richardson and Parke, for the constant and prompt attention they have kindly given whenever their professional services have been required. Tl in a worl who a co Mess who

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visitdson have have The roof of the "Home," which for some years had been in a very defective state, was renewed last summer. The work was done in a very efficient manner by Mr. Vézina, who likewise did some repairs to the cottage, the whole at a cost of \$770.32, which sum was kindly advanced by Messrs. John Gilmour and James G. Ross, to the latter of whom the institution is still indebted for the sum of \$324.

The Committee most gratefully acknowledge the handsome donation of \$400 from "A Friend," to purchase firewood for the "Home." They have also to acknowledge the liberal donation of \$11.40 from Mr. John O'Leary, being the amount of his account for repairs.

Rev. Mr. Rawson has continued his services during the year, with much acceptance by all who attended them. To him, as well as to the other clergymen and friends who visited and conversed or prayed with the women, either regularly or from time to time, the Committee tender their hearty thanks, earnestly desiring, as they do, the spiritual welfare of those under their charge.

Thanks are given to the proprietor of the MORNING CHRONICLE, for the generosity constantly shewn to the "Home," in sending a daily paper and for free printing; also to the *Mercury* and *Gazette*, for the insertion of all notices sent. One kind friend undertook the management of a Christmas tree for the children. They spent a very happy evening with Santa Claus and his many appropriate gifts, not the least of which was a bountiful repast, provided by several friends whose liberallity overflowed the bounds of the children's wants, and found an outlet in those of the older inmates, who not only shared the good things provided, but were present at the distribution of the children's gifts, and enjoyed the happiness of the little ones.

Thanks are tendered to Hon. W. C. Howells for his admirable lecture on "Worship in the Forest," delivered in aid of the funds of the "Home," the net proceeds of which were \$39. To Mr. Carr for giving readings for the benefit of the "Home," net proceeds \$39.75. To "two little girls" for the proceeds of a sale got up by themselves, \$16.15. To "three little girls" for the proceeds of a sale got up by them, \$13.25. To the proprietor of Marchmont, for throwing open his green-house in aid of the "Home," realizing \$22.25. To C. E. Levey, Esq., for a Christmas dinner, \$20. To the "Sewing Society" of the Congregational Church, for a donation of \$10.

The Committee have much pleasure in acknowledging collections made in behalf of the "Home" in four of the city Churches: \$133 received from the English Cathedral; \$22 from St. Matthew's Church; \$52 from the Wesleyan Church, and \$35 from Chalmer's Church.

A donation of \$50 is gratefully acknowledged from the St. George's Society.

As will be seen in the Treasurer's statement the Government grant, which the Committee has been wont to acknowledge from year to year, has been considerably enlarged and duly received.

Many valuable contributions to the household stores have been given, among which we may mention: A barrel of flour from Mr. Hetherington, one from Mr. Chalmers, and one from Messrs. W. & R. Brodie. A barrel of sugar and a chest of tea from a friend; two half chests of tea from Mrs. James Nicoll of Newcastle-on-Tyne, England; butter from Mr. Gillespie; large quantities of beef and mutton from Mr. Thomas Delaney and Mr. Joseph Smith; Easter veal from Mr. Tozer; pork from a friend; a plentiful Christmas supply from Mr. Thomas Andrews, also from Mr. James Hossack, besides stores of vegetables, fruit, poultry, milk, dripping, and a large quantity of soap, for all of which the donors have the thanks of the Committee.

Again, thanks are due to the "Industrious Bees" for a welcome gift of clothing for the women and children, to Messrs. Pierce & Paterson for a valuable parcel of books, magazines, and stationery, and to some friends for cast-off clothing. It is impossible to enumerate all the favors done to the "Home" and its inmates by kind friends, or all the comforts and luxuries bestowed on the sick, both by those whose names and good deeds are familiar to us all, and by many who have chosen to do good in secret. In concluding this report, the Committee would earnestly commend the necesities of this institution to the liberality of the public, and invite all who are interested in it to visit it for the s faces and feebl year "Ho pron dear time our mak ing 13

it for themselves. The children of the "Home" appeal to the sympathy and interests of all hearts, and by their bright faces and healthy appearence, shew that they are happy and well cared for. Some of the women are not old, though feeble or infirm, but many of them are far advanced in years, and who that has an aged mother can pay the "Home" but one visit without feeling his or her heart prompted to contribute something for the sake of those so dear to them, to assist in making the declining days of these timeworn pilgrims more bright? May God put it into all our hearts to do more for the poor and needy; striving to make "light at evening tide" for the aged; and the morning of life purer and more blessed for the young.

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


