
Halifax Echo, June 14:—"With by far the largest cargo of sugar ever brought to Halifax between her hatches, the hig British freighter Crown of Galicia, Captain Halliday arrived in port from Demerara on Saturday and is now discharging at Wockside. In all she has over 6.300 tons of sugar abound as well as a considerable quantity of molasses. The steamer's cargo is made up as follows:

Sugar 43,915 bags, 220 barrels and 15 boshehads: molasses, 2,324 nums and 239 barrels, All of this cargo is to be discharged in Halifax. From here the steamer goes to Sydney and will load rails for Prince Rupert, B. C.
