Declaration of Principles.

Pythian Knighthood has its conception in the exemplification of the life test of true friendship existing between Damon and Pythias.

Friendship, or mutual confidence, being the strongest bond of union between man and man, and only existing where honor has an abiding

place, is adopted as a foundation principle,

As the ideal knight of olden time was the personification of all the higher and nobler attributes of man's nature, the candidate for knighthood had to prove himself worthy of acceptance by those who valued friendship, bravery, honor, justice and loyalty.

The Order of Knights of Pythias-founded in Friendship, Charity and Benevolence, which it proclaims as its cardinal principles—strives to gather into one mighty fraternity worthy men who appreciate the true meaning of friendship; who are cautious in word and in act; who love truth; who are brave in defending right; whose honor is untarnished; whose sense of justice will prevent, to the best of their ability, a personal act or word injurious to the worthy; whose loyalty to principle, to family, to friends, to their country and to the constituted authority under which they enjoy citizenship is undoubted; and who, at all times, are prepared to do unto others as they would that others should do unto them.



To the Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge, Knights of Pythias, of the Maritime Provinces:

Brethren,—The time has arrived for me to give an account of my stewardship. While it will be with no undisguised feelings of relief that I shall resign the reins of office into other and I trust abler hands, the severing of the present relations with those close personal friends who compose the order of the Knights of Pythias in this domain will tinge my joy with sadness. When I accepted office for this year it was, as you will remember, with the distinct understanding that I should not be called upon to visit all the lodges, provided I did not overlook "Bridgewater," N. S., and "Far East," Newfoundland, and yet I have personally visited a majority of the lodges and arranged that

deputies should visit the rest.

In this connection let me remind you (and especially some facetious writers of fraternal correspondence) that ours is a domainof "magnificent distances," and that to visit a certain lodge ("Far East, Newfoundland,) I had to travel more than two thousand miles (1636 miles by rail and over 600 miles by water), and spent most of a fortnight on the road.

My reception on nearly every visit was sufficiently enthusiastic and gratifying as to lead me to hope that it may result in some benefit to the lodge by renewing the interest of the members.

A PAMPHLET.

A pamphlet giving a synopsis of the origin, objects and growth of the order, with other matters of interest adapted to this domain, has been prepared by your committee as authorized at our last convention. I feel that it will prove a power for good if properly utilized and distributed by our members.

OFFICIAL CIRCULARS.

Official circulars sent out during the year have reached you; 944

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with their contents you are familiar and I will not reproduce them here.

APPEALS FOR AID.

Appeals for aid have continued to reach my office, but in each case I felt justified in kindly but firmly declining to permit their circulation in this domain, with the one exception of that for the Rathbone Memorial Fund.

MEMBERSHIP.

While from the Supreme Domains and from many Grand Domains there came sad tales of loss, I still had hoped that our reports would show an increase in our membership, but such is not the case. We may suggest hard times, business depression or what you will to be the cause, but the fact remains that there is a growing lack of interest in the order. Our lodges and members must be kept alive to all the good features we have to offer and encouraged to take advantage of every one, or other and more pushing societies will sap our strength and stunt our growth even while we have safer and better endowments and fraternal privileges than their own. A state of lethargy is exhibited in a sufficient number of lodges to make one anxious for their future unless they can be shaken up and new life sent coursing through their veins. Whose duty this shall be is not for you or me to say and then recline at ease, assured that we have done our part. No officer or officers of this Grand, Lodge can hope to do it all, but every knight who loves his order must awaken to the threatened danger and loyally act his part.

ENDOWMENT RANK.

If the Endowment Rank was with us a flourishing institution, I feel that it would go far to lessen our loss of numbers. I have found an interest manifested concerning this rank where I have addressed the lodges, as I have on every opportunity, on the matter of life insurance; and I trust that the next Grand Chancellor may succeed in interesting the members even more than I have done, to the end that an active section may be started in every lodge.

Having been questioned by a legal gentleman in one of the lodges as to the status of the Endowment Rank in Canada, I wrote for information along the line of his questions to the Department of Justice at Ottawa, and feel that the matter is of sufficient importance to insert both the letter and the answer here.

HONORABLE SIR,—The order of "Knights of Pythias" is a secret fraternal society incorporated in the United States. Its membership is over 500,000.

There are many subordinate lodges in Canada, with a Grand Lodge in Ontario, Manitoba, British Columbia and the Maritime Provinces.

Life insurance (in the "Endowment Rank") is a feature of the order, but it is entirely optional with the members. In this connection I desire to ask a few questions, if I may be permitted.

to ask a few questions, if I may be permitted.

1. Is it necessary for a secret fraternal society such as this (that offers insurance to the members of the order alone) to make a deposit with the Canadian government?

2. If it is necessary, has such deposit been made?

3. Under existing circumstances, whatever they are, is it legal to urge members in the Canadian lodges to join this branch of the order (take out life insurance policies)?

4. If the order has no deposit in Cauada and an insurance claim should be disputed, could the beneficiaries sue in Cauada and if successful collect the insurance without resorting to the United States courts?

DEAR SIR,—Your letter of the 22nd instant addressed to the Hon. the Minister of Justice has been transferred to this Department for reply.

In answer thereto, I have the honor to enclose a copy of the Insurance Act, with amendments to date, and refer you to section 43 thereof. If your society comes within the true intent and meaning of said section 43, the provisions of the Act requiring a deposit and the issue of a license do not apply to it. The Society has not made a deposit with the Dominion Government and inasmuch as it does an endowment business a license could not be issued to it nor a deposit accepted from it. Your last two questions are purely questions of law which do not come within my province officially and I would not with any degree of propriety express an opinion concerning the same.

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43. Nothing contained in this Act shall apply to any society or association of persons for fraternal, benevolent, industrial or religious purposes, among which purposes is the insurance of the lives of the members thereof exclusively; or to any association for the purpose of life insurance formed in connection with such society or organization and exclusively from its members, and which insures the lives of such members exclusively.

UNIFORM RANK.

Of this branch of the order only the most favorable mention can be made. It is composed largely of the working members of those lodges where it now exists and I would gladly see it extended to every other. I believe it would influence the members for good and excite a new interest in our order.

Having written at length on many subjects in my last year's report, such as the matter of suspensions, memorial day, a local history, correspondence, our country's flag, etc., I see no reason for enlarging on them here.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

 I recommend that a charter be granted to Marysville Lodge, No. 18.

EXPENSES.

Although I visited fifteen lodges last year and but ten this year, my expenses were greater this year than last on account of Newfoundland, and in addition exceptional and unforseen expenses in connection with the funerals of departed brothers, have swelled the account. Some items should really appear as incidentals, but I have included them as part of my account.

IN MEMORIAM.

It is not without a feeling of personal loss, that it becomes my sad duty to chronicle the recent death, within a few weeks of each other, of my immediate predecessor, Past Grand Chancellor H. V. Cooper, and Past Grand Chancellor F. L. Peers. In each of them the order has lost a staunch champion and every knight a brother. But their "hands were filled with deeds of charity, the golden keys that ope the palace of eternity." We can now but pay tribute to their memory and seek to emulate their virtues.

SWEET UNION.

Our society teaches loyalty to our flag and the constituted

government under which we live, and I am sure there can be found no more loyal citizens on either side of the line than those who compose the order of the Knights of Pythias. This much granted, it can then be readily understood that it is with a proper spirit of thankfulness that the brethren in this domain see that great nation to the south, in which so many of our brethren live, rising above petty jealousies and old time prejudices, and finally discovering that her "traditional enemy" is no enemy at all, but is now, as for many years back, her best and surest friend. May the trend of these two nations continue to be closer toward each other, until the white-winged dove of earthly peace shall spread his pinions over both, binding them in at least friendly federation, so that with misconceptions removed and a mutual understanding, our community of interests, united strength and infinite resources shall compel the peace, civilization and progress of the world; and may the Knights have, as they will richly deserve, a large share of the praise.

SUPREME CHANCELLOR.

I have to heartily congratulate you that the convention is to be honored by a visit of our Supreme Chancellor, Brother Colgrove. You know of him and how hard, during his official term, he has labored for the uplifting of our noble order. May the fates permit and the brethren labor that his visit here may be as pleasant to himself as it will be profitable to us.

CONCLUSION.

In concluding this, my second and last annual report, I wish to thank all officers and members of all Lodges, Subordinate and Grand, who at any time have aided or been particularly kind to me. To the Grand Keeper of Records and Seal especially I am much indebted for his valuable and frequent assistance. To the members of the Grand Lodge I beg leave to return my sincere thanks and grateful acknowledgement for the honor conferred upon me. The uniform courtesy that has been shown me both by the officers and members of the Grand and the various Subordinate Lodges has made my work comparatively easy, and your expressions of esteem and good will have made it pleasant. Memories of these years will stand out like oases by the pathway of life and ever remain withme "until this mortal casket is forever stilled." And when the Supreme Ruler of the universe shall issue that summons to "come

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Report of Grand Keeper of Records and Sea'.

ST. STEPHEN, N. B., AUGUST 2, 1898. PYTHIAN PERIOD XXXV.

To the Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge, Knights of Pythias, of the Maritime Provinces.

BRETHREN,—As usual at this time it is my duty to offer for your consideration the annual statement of the work and business of this office for the year ending August 2nd, instant.

The delay in getting reports from lodges very much interfered with the preparation of my report, hence of necessity I am compelled to be more brief than usual.

The semi-annual returns of the eighteen lodges which form this grand domain—especially for term ended December 31st, 1897,—show a slight loss in membership, the decrease being forty-eight compared with the term ended June 30th of said year. This loss, however, is very nearly made up during the term ended June 30th last, and our membership at that date, compared with June 30th, 1837, indicates a decrease in membership of but nineteen.

While I am sorry to have to record a slight decrease in membership (the first decrease met with during the nine years I have held this office), still I think we may congratulate ourselves that it is no worse. It is needless for me to try and explain causes. All of you are familiar with the business stagnation experienced during the past year on this continent, and where such depression exists, idleness as a consequence follows, and the membership of fraternal bodies like our own suffers. Suspension for non-payment of dues is the principal cause of our loss. During the past year no less than eighty-eight fell by the wayside from this cause, while the grim reaper claimed ten.

The suspensions were divided as follows:—Springhill, N. S., 22; St. John, N. B., 15; St. Johns, N. F., 14; Woodstock, N. B., 12: Moncton and Milltown, N. B., 6 each; Advocate, N. S., 5;

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ed mrm 97, ht SS, th th, mive t it 411 ng ts, nal 1es ess he S., В., 5; Amherst, N. S., 4; St. Andrews, N. B., and Parrsboro, N, S., 2 each. Lodges in other sections of the domain held their own, some making slight additions.

Referring to the financial condition of subordinate lodges, I am pleased to state that, notwithstanding an unusually large expenditure for sick benefits, the gross assets of the lodges at June 30th last amounted to twenty-two thousand, four hundred and sixty-three dollars and fifty-four cents, showing an increase for the year of about one thousand dollars.

For relief of brothers, funeral and other benefits there was paid the sum of nineteen hundred and eleven dollars and ninety-four cents.

The fund accumulated for the benefit of widows and orphans at June 30th amounted to five thousand, nine hundred and fifty dollars and twenty cents, which shows an increase for the year of five hundred dollars.

And Whereas, By his regular attendance at the convention of the Grand Lodge, by his wise counsel, by his zeal in advancing the interests of the Order and in contributing towards the spread

of the principles on which it is founded;

Therefore Resolved, That the Grand Lodge in annual convention assembled record its appreciation of the high character of the deceased brother, the deep regret with which the news of his death was heard by the membership generally throughout the domain, its confidence that he is now enjoying the eternal reward promised to him who is faithful to the end and its deep sympathy with the bereaved widow and children;

And Further Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the widow of our late brother and be entered on the records of the Grand Lodge and that a Memorial page be inserted

in the Journal.

Whereas, Within the circle of the Pythian Period just closed Brother Hedley V. Cooper, a Past Grand Chancellor of this Grand Domain, and a zealous and faithful member of the Order, has been called to answer the dread summons and has entered that mysterious realm from which there is no return,

And Whereas, This Grand Lodge desires to place on perpetual record its high appreciation of the worth of the deceased brother, of his zeal for the order and of the merit which won for him the highest honors which this Grand Lodge can bestow;

Therefore Resolved, That the Grand Lodge in annual conven-

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tion assembled testify by entering this resolution to our deceased brother on the records and by dedication of a Memorial page in the Journal of Proceedings, that the deceased brother contributed largely to the success of the Order in the domain by his untiring zeal and devotion and that the news of his premature death was heard with deepest regret by the membership generally,

And Further Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be sent to the widow of our deceased brother.

The report was received and adopted, and the recommendations as conveyed in the resolution ordered to be carried out.

Brother R. H. Cooper, of No. 5, gave a brief account of the life of Brother Peers, and dwelt particularly on the deceased's attachment to the order.

Brothers H. J. Logan and Murray Fleming likewise made eulogistic and kindly remarks as to the character of Brother Peers.

Brother Moulson followed by a few kindly remarks as to the loss sustained by the deaths of Brothers Cooper and Peers.

On behalf of Cumberland Lodge, No. 5, Brother Gilroy thanked the members of Grand Lodge for their expressions of sorrow in reference to Brother Peers.

Brother Moulson, after feelingly and thoughtfully referring to the enforced absence of Grand Keeper of Records and Seal Henry, offered the following resolution:

Whereas, Our devoted brother, John C. Henry, Grand Keeper of Records and Seal, is now laid upon a bed of sickness and unable to attend the annual convention of our Grand Lodge,

And Whereas, Brother Henry's heart has been in the Pythian work and his constant aim and ambition has been to advance the best interests of the order;

Therefore Resolved, That the members of the Grand Lodge extend to Brother Henry their heartfelt sympathy and pray that he may very soon be restored to his usual health and strength.

The motion was seconded by Grand Master of Exchequer Logan and adopted, and a copy ordered to be sent to Brother Henry and likewise entered on the minutes.

The newly installed Grand Chancellor made a few appropriate remarks, thanking those present who had elected him to his present station, and called on the other Grand Officers who severally addressed the Grand Lodge in brief.

Supreme Representative Grimmer inquired if there were any special claims that Grand Lodge wanted brought before the Supreme Lödge. No response was made.

A vote of thanks was tendered to Brothers Robinson and

Cooper, who had so ably undertaken and performed the duties of Grand Keeper of Records and Seal.

A vote of thanks was likewise tendered Frontier Lodge, No. 4. for the use of their hall and hospitalities extended to Grand Lodge.

The vote was gracefully acknowledged on behalf of Frontier Lodge by its Chancellor Commander, Brother Geo. J. Clarke.

There being no further business presented, Grand Chancellor Godsoe closed the Grand Lodge in due form, and declared it adjourned accordingly until the second Tuesday in August, 1899, when its next annual convention will be held in the city of St. John, N. B.

To the Grand Chancelior and Members of the Grand Lodge, Knights of Pythias, of the Domain of the Maritime Provinces:

BROTHERS,—Your Committee on Fraternal Correspondence herewith beg leave to report that the journals of forty five domains have been reviewed.

It becomes my painful duty to first speak of the death of Bro. H. V. Cooper, Past Grand Chancellor and chairman of this committee. During the time of Bro. Cooper's connection with the order, he worked zealously and lovingly for her advancement and we mourn the loss to Pythianism of so good a man. Grand Chancellor his work was faithfully performed and the Lodge of Bridgewater has many reasons to cherish his memory. Upon the roll of deceased Knights his name will ever occupy a first position and the noble example left behind will be a glorious incentive to every brother to emulate his life and works. This untimely death left a great vacancy on this committee and the work fell wholly upon your unworthy correspondent. Had it not been for the kindly and invaluable assistance of the Rev. Bro. Shatford of Bridgewater Lodge, No. 15, the task would have been hopeless and I am glad of this opportunity to publicly tender my heartfelt gratitude to the brother for his willingly rendered services.

All the journals were reviewed that came to hand, so that if any domains feel slighted at being unmentioned in this report, they will kindly remember that the fault lies not at the door of the correspondent. Of course the effort being a first one and by a most inexperienced hand, the report will be found full of shortcomings and perhaps brief. For the faults we commend ourselves to the charity of the Grand Lodge and for the brevity we seek a justifi-

cation in the fact that it is no small task for a man to undertake such reviews, when he is already overworked by the irksome

duties of his profession.

A general tone of improvement seems apparent in the different domains, though there is still much to be desired. So many of the Grand Chancellors' reports for 1897 seem to be replete with the cry of "hard times" and "financial depression" that we are almost compelled to excuse the tardy progress upon these grounds. Second consideration, however, reveals another and more deplorable reason for the immense and it seems irremediable drawbacks to the order-I mean, suspensions for non-payment of dues. This subject has become so hackneyed as to scarcely admit of another mention; but, brethren, something must be done. But what? Fully five-sixths of the entire initiations became suspensions during the past year. What reasons are given for it? Many are inclined to "hard times," but this can scarcely be so for how then could there be so many initiations? If initiatian fees can be paid, surely annual dues might be. I am inclined to the reason suggested by a brother to the south that enforced "sickbenefits" are largely the cause. Lodges undertake to pay too high a benefit for the financial income and the result is assessment. Nothing in the world is so tiresome as being continually assessed. It causes dissension and then disruption. Let us "incorporate in the Endowment Rank certain features looking to the payment of certain sums for disability, temporary and permanent." Or if we could induce every member to go into the Endowment Rank, he would have a most profound reason for remaining in the order. The idea of his personal loss on being suspended would impel him to pay his dues promptly. As a corrective to this awful drain, one Grand Chancellor offered a prize banner to the lodge having the fewest suspensions. In some lodges the master of finance is allowed a certain percentage on all dues collected. These are all good measures and I would earnestly recommend the adoption of one at least (or a better if discovered) and thus free our beloved order from this dreadful pestilence.

Nearly every journal has a favorable mention of the Endowment Rank, showing the wonderful progress of this feature of our order. The Uniform Rank is very quiet. I would suggest the printing in the journal a report from the brigade commander, as the lack of information on this feature of Pythianism is/alarming. Another ef

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of her thing that seems most worthy of remark, is the duty of all officers to memorize the ritual so that work might be done most effectually. In some lodges there is a move to do away with printed rituals and, personally, I am much inclined to such a step. For a candidate or knight to hear our beautiful ceremony perfunctorily read from the rituals, is at least calculated to detract from the value of lodge proceedings.

One domain has appointed a grand lecturer, well versed in the secret work, to visit all subordinate lodges and instruct them in their duties. We would heartily recommend the adoption of such a measure in our own Grand Lodge

For the benefit of the brethren to the south we have something to say. In reviewing the journals I find that wherever we are mentioned in the reports issued from the neighboring republic, with the possible exception of half-a-dozen, we are scored most mercilessly. For those who gave a kind mention we are deeply grateful, for those who mentioned us not at all we are at least thankful, that they had the good grace to pass us over when they could not favorably criticize, and for those who spared not our feelings, we would ask in the future the same charity for our frailities, that they would wish for themselves. Possibly when they remember how nobly the Empire, of which we are a fraction, stood by them in this Cuban embroglio, they will sink national feelings and not forget that another tie binds us beside that of Pythianism—a common language.

And now, brethren, with the hope that my maiden effort will be appreciated, I pray for the order in general and for this Grand Lodge in particular, an ever increasing prosperity, and trust that the tenets of our profession, Friendship, Charity and Benevolence, will stamp themselves indelibly on every Pythian heart.

ALABAMA.—The journal of this domain comes to us in a bright, tasty cover and gives a glowing history of the order for the past twenty-five years.

The silver anniversary was celebrated at Huntville, May 4-6, 1897. The Grand Keeper of Records of Seal says he had a hard task discovering from past records the progress of the order during the last quarter of a century. The early years of Pythianism in this domain were fraught with conflicting elements, but as time rolled on difficulties were lost sight of and all labored for the prosperity of the order with heart and hand. Whilst we commend much there is much also to be regretted. Out of a total of 13,486 initiations since 1875, no less than 5,907 were suspended for non-payment of dues. This is fearfully degenerate, and we pity the poor creatures who have such a small idea of honesty and good principles. Total membership, 7,555; lodges, 154. Carelessness on the part of the officers and lack of interest generally are both bemoaned by the Grand Keeper of Records and Seal. The Grand Chancelior did splendidly during his term of office. "Our John," as he is happily styled, visited 121 lodges. Members increased 600 and lodges instituted were 14 for the year. A great amount of business was transacted. We regret the absence of Foreign Correspondence as, to us, it appears a most important feature in all journals, giving an idea of Pythianism growth.

ARIZONA.—The fourteenth annual session was held at Kingham,

May 26-28, 1897.

The Grand Chancellor grandiloquently speaks of their great land with its "rains, cattle, horses and sheep." His report is a bundle of official circulars, deputy reports, etc. He could not visit all the lodges on account of scarcity of funds and pressure of business. The Endowment and Uniform Ranks receive a pithy notice and an appeal is made for contribution to the Rathbone Monument Fund. Lodges, 12; membership, 626; finances on hand, \$413.05. The report of the Supreme Chancellor is commented upon and must have been a thorough one. He objects to balls, concerts, excursions, etc., being held on Sunday in the name of the order. Good for Brother Colgrove.

No correspondence on reviews. Next session at Tucson, May, 1898.

The fifteenth annual session was held at Tucson, May 11 and 12, 1898.

The report is small and otherwise easily reviewed. Grand Chancellor Pitchard has a most gloomy report, declaring that the losses of the order throughout the United States exceed the grains by 1c24. The suspensions for non-payment of dues is the chief drain and seems impossible of remedy. The Rathbone monument fund, Endowment and

Uniform Ranks get the largest notices and seem to be about holding their

Grand Keeper of Records and Seal simply gives us a tabular statement without comment of any kind. Number of lodges '96, 12; at close of '97, 15. Membership in '96, 626; at end of '97, 741. Cash on hand in '96, \$3,414 10; in December, '97, \$4,671.52. This looks fairly good in spite of the Grand Chancellor's opening remarks about the order in

Thirty-four documents were considered by Grand Lodge, many of them of importance. The "Stars and Stripes" ordered to fly above order flag. There is no Fraternal Report. As the journal is small and presents little reading matter to the brethren, correspondence would be doubly appreciated.

In this domain three black balls are necessary to reject a candidate upon first ballot, but if two be found then a second ballot is taken, whereupon two black balls are sufficient for rejection. A good change.

The session was a most busy one. Under the caption "reception and entertainment" a description of the parades, short accounts of glowing speeches and a mention of the concert are given.

IOWA.—The twenty-eighth annual convention was held at Clinton, on August 11 and 12, 1897.

This journal is well arranged and affords pleasurable reviewing. It is bulky and full of interest to every Knight of Pythias. The Grand Chancellor's report is long, too long. It must have taxed the liberality of Grand Lodge to insert all its multitudinous phases into their journal. Some of our brethren to the south are veritable "gasometers."

The report of the Grand Keeper of Records and Seal is good, showing splendid progress. The domain has 416 lodges, and a membership of 24,050. There were 1942 initiations, 386 reinstated and 324 admitted by card. This looks extremely well. The tenets of the order were adhered to nobly with respect to relief, not less than \$22,190 41 having been spent. Brother Walker does his duty nobly. But here comes the state deputy drawing for salary and expenses \$2,748 60, from the treasury. We thank the proper ones that we don't and could not indulge in such a luxury. The session was a busy one. The election of officers seemed to be close and no doubt created fun. The Supreme Chancellor was present and electrified the brethren.

KANSAS.—The twenty-seventh annual convention was held at Fort Scott, May 17 and 18, 1898.

A special convention was first held for the purpose of confering Grand Lodge rank on all qualified past chancellors. Grand Chancellor Bird first discusses the state of the order, showing a yearly decrease in membership for the last four years. His reason for this lamentable state t

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of affairs is that "a large number of us have drifted from our Pythian moorings and have anchored within the harbors of a large number of other societies, no better and in many instances not so good as the order of Knights of Pythias, and in this way there has been such a lack of interest in our order that some of our old-time ardent admirers and workers have fallen into a lethargic sleep from which, I am glad to say, a large number are awakening." Some thirteen decisions were made, all important. The Endowment Rank is given a heavy notice and seems to be flourishing. Over 50 official visits were made and many other matters of importance dealt with. The Rathbone Sisters come in for a share of praise. Brother Bird even labored for the order on the Sabbath. He was somewhat superfaithful.

Membership 11,448, a decrease of 226 for the year. Initiated during year 1,000, suspended 1,359. Balance on hand 1896, \$32,816.21, on hand 1897, \$29,758.74. This is most deplorable retrogression all round.

A communication from Ontario Grand Lodge, respecting the reduction of supply prices to cover customs duty, was referred to a committee which never reported.

The Fraternal Report is about average.

The Grand Chancellor's report is more than lengthy and covers every detail of the work. Drought, financial panic and yellow fever, were the curses of this domain and did much to hamper and cripple their progress. The Grand Chancellor bemoans the financial depletion and diminution of subordinate lodges and rolls, but declares that many lessons of wisdom have been learned. A letter from Supreme Chancellor Colgrove "re" the Rathbone monument, is very patriotic and reminiscent of that good and great man. Few new lodges were instituted, as it was not deemed advisable to establish them unless they promised much for the good of the order. The appointment of a grand lecturer is touched upon and the step eloquently and forcibly commended. A brother's death and anothers illness, together with prevalent yellow fever, prevented Brother Bernstein from doing his work to his own satisfaction.

Grand Lecturer Harris did a noble work, visiting all lodges, except in New Orleans and addressing twenty-five public meetings. Much good was apparent. Membership 7,043, decrease of 572. Lodges 121, same as

last year. Cash on hand \$41,587.62, decrease \$2,482.57.

The District Deputy's reports are all printed in full. Beautiful memorial pages decorate the journal. A bill was passed in the House of Representatives, authorizing the Knighis of Pythias to erect a sanitarium at Hot Springs.

MANITOBA AND NORTHWEST TERRITORIES.—The sixth annual session was held at Winnipeg, July 21, 22, 1897.

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MARYLAND.—The thirieth annual session was held at Baltimore, February 8, 10, 1898.

The first report is that of the Grand Keeper of Records and Seal, who in one paragraph sums up the condition of the order in this domain. Lodges, 106; an increase of 2. Members, 7.230; increase of 58 Amount on hand, \$20.8,655.51. Relief, sick benefits, \$22,000.71 The Pythian directory is a good idea and might be imitated by other Grand Lodges. We can thus know readily who are our brethren and what lodge they belong to.

The same old cry is given by the Grand Chancellor—"business and financial depression." This domain caps the climax for suspensions—thirty often for a single lodge. Some sixty odd lodges were visited

A commendable review of journals is given by the correspondence committee, but in common with other domains of the south they have given us the "go-by." We think it would be a good idea to append a list of domains from which no journal was received. We would then know who to blame when a review was not made—otherwise we can't.

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


