

and the minister of Agriculture, who passed it over to J. A. Ruddick, Cold Storing Commissioner, and the latter requested G. H. Vroom, Dominion Apple Inspector, to discuss the matter with the representatives of the Board of Trade.

A conference was held this morning, when Mr. Vroom stated that an inspector and helper would be in Halifax all the year round to inspect the apples sold in this market; this is not a new appointment, Mr. Vroom using the members of his present staff, who will, in turn, attend to this local business. It was thought, however, by the local produce people that a permanent man should be appointed, and with this end in view, further correspondence will be held with the Department at Ottawa.

It was generally felt by those engaged in the apple trade that on account of the shortage in the apple crop this year there should be a more rigid inspection, as, no doubt, prices will be high; and therefore the necessity is greater protection to the rubble from fraudulent packing.
