Town Council Meeting. The Town Council met in special session on Monday evening last, Mayor Winslow in the chair.

The Mayor stated that the meeting was called for the purpose of receiving the tenders for building an addition to and otherwise improving the public wharf property.

After the minutes of the previous meeting had been read the clerk read the following communications:— From J. B. Inch, Supt. of Education, stating the school grievance of the ratepayers in Duke's Ward would be brought before the next meeting of the Board of Education; From Miles Chipman of Toronto in reference to the putting in of a water works system in the town at a reasonable figure.

Both communications were laid on the table. A. Edward Loggie addressed a letter to council complaining of an over-flowing cess-pool near his residence, exposing the inhabitants to typhoid fever, and other contagious diseases, and requesting the council to have the evil remedied.

On account of the Board of Health not having a chairman, Mr. Wyse's resignation being accepted by the government, nothing could be done by the Board until a new chairman was appointed. The Provincial Secretary had informed some of our citizens that Mr. E. A. Strang would be a probable successor to that office. In the meantime the matter was referred to the public works committee to act in conjunction with the Board of Health and report at next meeting.

A letter of thanks for the use of the Town Hall for one session of the Teachers' Institute was received from the secretary, Mr. J. Howard Crocker.

Ald. Snowball, chairman public works committee reported as follows:— CHATHAM, N. B., 29th Sept., 1898. To His Worship the Mayor and Town Council.

We would report in reference to the street through from Wellington to Duke or Lydia St. that we have seen Miss Kelly, but she could not give us any decision without first seeing her nephews, the Whites. This she promised to do and report to aid. Loggie. Not having heard from her up to today, we interviewed Mr. White and he says they cannot come to any arrangement themselves in the meantime. We interviewed Mr. Thos. Murray and he will sell his portion for \$1.50 per foot street front.

We have notified the several companies having poles erected in town that they must not erect any more without the permission of the road commissioner and that those now up must be placed so as not to interfere with either the usefulness or appearance of the streets. We have also asked them not to allow advertising matter to be placed on the poles and also requested them to paint the poles in the town limits.

QUESTIONS. Ques. Sept. 20.—The International Commissioners met in joint session for an hour this afternoon and adjourned, to meet again on Thursday. The adjournment until to-morrow is taken because of the ceremonies attending the unveiling of the Champlain monument, in which the members of the High Commission are to participate.

The American Commissioners met this morning and again this afternoon. They listened to arguments of Messrs. Babcock, of New York and Fallon, of Ohio, who represent the interests of the United States inland fisheries.

As usual, all the proceedings were behind closed doors, but so far as the fresh water fisheries are concerned it is understood that the Americans and the Canadians will agree with little trouble. Both sides desire the better protection of the fresh water fish, and no doubt this part of the proposed treaty will readily be disposed of. Interests of the United States farmers will be heard Thursday. Aaron Jones, of South Bend, Ind., worthy master of the Washington, D. C., has notified the Commissioners that he desires to be heard. It is presumed they will protest in a general way against the reduction or the removal of the tariff on Canadian agricultural products, especially barley, hay, oats and potatoes.

for concessions. It was only a matter of etiquette that they decided to bring the matter before the council, for the company had the right to build these tramways by acts passed by the legislature in 1885 and 1886. But they did not wish to be unreasonable, and have decided to act in the best possible way with the town officials.

Before proceeding any further in this matter he wished to say, as the representative of Mr. Henderson's, that they would not at all entertain the proposition in the report as passed to-night. It was simply an absurdity, as the owners were now receiving from \$200 to \$300 in rents.

The settlement of the Kelly property was in his hands now and he would do what he could to have it made over to the town. From the peculiar way in which title could not be given, but he would hunt up the records and have the matter settled.

Mr. Tweedie then read the acts passed by the legislature in the years 1885 and 1886 empowering the Sulphite Fibre Co. to build tramways on the public highway for the interests and workings of the said mill, etc. From the power within these acts they could do this with out reference to the council provided they did not go beyond their privileges, but the company were agreeable and did not want to act as they are fit, but to work in conjunction with the road commissioner. The act gives them the power and they wish to run a tramway from the mill to the wharf along Water Street, the motive power to be horses instead of steam, and also to run a water pipe across the street to "the hollow."

Ald. Groat said that on St. Andrew's St. there were two tramways, and they were a nuisance and a danger to the people around that section. Property was very much reduced in value, and he did not think the people's rights ought to be further encroached upon, especially now as we were trying to improve and clear the streets. He did not see why the company should not do as in other cities: that is, by going to the people for these privileges. Then, the town might purchase property for them instead of having them monopolize the whole of the street.

Mr. Tweedie said ald. Groat was mistaken. There was no town council and there was no other way of securing them, but by applying to the legislature, and the proposed bill had been published and no objection raised. Every facility was granted to the company to establish the mill in Chatham and a 15 years' release of taxes was given them. Everyone would agree that the factory did a great good, and it was partially due to them that they were there to-night. He agreed with ald. Groat that it was desirable not to encumber the streets, but in this instance it was for the interest of the town and had to be done.

Ald. Snowball said everything should be done to assist the company in making the business profitable, so as to form an inducement for the establishment of other industries. Ald. Groat was, no doubt, trying to protect the people.

Ald. Groat said he certainly agreed that the factory had done great good, but he did not want to see the people trampled on. If they wanted to open a tramway let the town purchase property for them so as to leave the streets free and the people would not have their lives at risk as at present on St. Andrew's St.

Ald. Snowball said water street was very narrow at this place and the public works committee would have Mr. Fish survey the road. He considered it entirely too narrow to admit of a tramway being run on it, and it would certainly be very dangerous, especially in winter. A strip of land, say 10 ft. wide should be purchased along the river bank and leave the road free to the public. He moved the following seconded by ald. Maher:— Resolved that the matter laid before the council by Ion Mr. Tweedie be referred to the public works committee to report on, and that, in view of the matter, the public works committee be instructed to find out if property can be secured to widen the street some ten feet or thereabouts, in that locality, and report at next meeting.

International Commission. QUEBEC, Que. Sept. 20.—The International Commissioners met in joint session for an hour this afternoon and adjourned, to meet again on Thursday. The adjournment until to-morrow is taken because of the ceremonies attending the unveiling of the Champlain monument, in which the members of the High Commission are to participate.

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Indications are going to take a very determined position on the lumber question. A. S. Hardy, Premier of Ontario, and George W. Ross, Minister of Education, arrived here to-day and represent the Ontario government in the lumber question. They declare unreservedly that no concessions will be made on the part of the Canadian government in the way of permitting logs to go free into the United States unless the United States makes some concession in the way of reducing or removing the present duty of \$2 per thousand feet of Canadian sawn lumber.

Ontario's Legislature passed a law last year that no logs out on crown lands by American lumbermen should be taken into the United States to be sawed into lumber in American mills. The law was a protection \$2 duty put upon all Canadian lumber in the Dingley bill, but it has been a disastrous law to such of the American lumbermen as own large tracts of crown lumber lands in Ontario.

These men contend that the Canadian government knew when it sold the timber in American mills, and having this knowledge, the government had no right to pass a law of this character. Canadians waive that point, and say it must be free logs and free lumber or no chance at all.

Clark Wallace, former Minister of Customs, now representing the Canadian Manufacturing Association arrived here to-day to confer with the Canadian Com-

missioners. He counsels them to stand by the present protective duty upon certain manufactured goods sent to Canada from the United States. Textiles and manufactured iron implements are the principal articles upon which he urges that no reduction be made.

C. M. Hays, general manager of the Grand Trunk Railway company, has been in consultation with both the American and Canadian commissioners, and states that there will probably be little difficulty in settling the bonding question, the alien labor question and other matters in which the railroads are concerned. He says the views of the commissioners on both sides are along the same general lines.

Although nothing is revealed to indicate what progress is being made by the commission, or what results are probable, Senator Fairbanks, chairman of the American delegation, gives the assurance that the achievements so far is gratifying and indicative of satisfactory results in the end.
