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AN ACT TO INCORPORATE THE ALUMNI OF KING'S COLLEGE, WINDSOR.

Passed the 30th day of March, 1847.

WHEREAS, a number of persons have associated themselves under the name of The Alumni of King's College, Windsor, for the promotion of Education, and have raised by private contribution sums of money which they are desirous to expend in aid of the funds of the said College, and the Collegiate School, at Windsor, connected therewith, in or towards the maintenance and support of the teachers therein, or in such other way as may best conduce to the end which they have in view, and they are desirous of obtaining assistance from the Legislature, by the passing of an Act of Incorporation for enabling them to hold property, and to manage their affairs with greater ease and convenience.

I. Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor, Council and Assembly: That John T. Twining, James B. Uniacke, Henry Pryor, Hugh Hartshorne, and all and every such other person and persons as now are members of, or in the said society, and their successors, shall be and are hereby appointed a body, politic and corporate, in deed and in name, by the name of "The Alumni of King's College, Windsor," and by that name have succession and a common Seal, and by that name shall sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded, at law and in equity: and in all courts and places, and be able and capable in law to have, hold, purchase, get, receive, take, possess, and enjoy, lands, tenements, hereditaments and rents, in fee simple or otherwise, and also goods and chattles, and all other things real, personal and mixed, and also to give, grant, sell, let, assign or convey the same or any part thereof, and to do and execute all other things in and about the same, as shall or may be thought necessary or proper; and also shall have from time to time and at all times, full power, authority, and license to consti-

tute, make and establish such Bye-laws, Rules and Ordinances, as may be thought necessary for the rule and good management of said society, the establishing of officers proper for the management of its affairs, and declaring the extent, duration, and authority of the offices and officers of the society, and their mode of appointment, and generally for promoting the objects of the society, provided such Bye-laws, Rules and Ordinances, be not contrary and repugnant to the Laws and Statutes of this Province, or those in force within the same, or to the Laws and Statutes of King's College, Windsor, respectively, at the time such Bye-laws, Rules and Ordinances may be constituted and established, or to the provisions of this Act; and provided, also, that the said society shall not hold at any time, lands, tenements, hereditaments, goods, chattels, property or effects, of greater value than ten thousand pounds.

II. And be it enacted, that all persons paying an annual subscription of twenty shillings or upwards, or making at one time a donation of twenty pounds or upwards, shall be entitled to be members of the said society, having been duly admitted, pursuant to the Bye-laws thereof, provided that such annual subscription or donation be actually paid into the funds of the society, and provided that no person now a member of the said society, or who, hereafter, may become a member of the same, shall, at any time hereafter, continue a member of the same, unless he shall have heretofore paid, or shall hereafter pay at one time into the funds of the said society a donation of at least twenty pounds, or shall hereafter annually, and from year to year, pay into the said funds the sum of twenty shillings or upwards: and if such annual subscription, or payment of any such annual member, shall not be paid on the first day of May in each year, such member shall thereupon cease to be a member of the said society, until such annual subscription or payment shall be actually paid, or until such person shall otherwise become a member of the said society, under some Bye-law or Rule thereof.

III. And be it enacted, that the said society shall be governed, and its affairs managed, by a committee of nine, comprising a President, Vice-President, and seven other members, a Secretary and Treasurer; the said committee to be henceforth called the Executive Committee, and such other officers as the said society, from time to time may think proper.

IV. And provided and be it enacted, that John T. Twining, D.D.,

now the President of the said society, shall after the passing of this said Act, be the President of the said society; that the Hon. Henry Hezekiah Cogswell, now the Vice-President of the said society, be the Vice-President of the said society, after the passing of this Act; that Samuel L. Shannon, Esquire, now the Secretary and Treasurer of the said society, be the Secretary and Treasurer thereof, after the passing of this Act; and Samuel P. Fairbanks, Henry Pryor, James B. Uniacke, William J. Almon, Robert Fitzgerald Uniacke, Mather B. Almon and Charles Twining, now the Managing committee of the said society, shall after the passing of this Act, be the Executive committee of the said Incorporated society, until an Executive committee be elected under this Act.

V. And be it enacted that all persons, without regard to religious denomination or difference of religious sentiment, may be and at any time hereafter become members, of the said Incorporated society, being in all other respects entitled to be and become members of the said society, and now, and at any time hereafter, may hold any of the said appointments, or any other offices and appointments in the said Incorporated society, being duly elected and appointed thereto, pursuant to the Bye-laws thereof, any thing contained herein, or in any Rules, Regulations, or Bye-laws of the said society, to the contrary notwithstanding.

VI. And be it enacted that the said society, incorporated as aforesaid, shall have power from time to time hereafter, to appoint the President, Vice-President, and Executive committee, at some general meeting of the said society, by a majority of the members of the society present, the whole number present being not less than twenty members, according to such regulations concerning such appointments as may hereafter be made by any Bye-laws of the said society, to be made by virtue hereof.

VII. And be it enacted that the secretary and treasurer of the said society, and such other officers as may hereafter be required for the management of its affairs, shall be appointed in such manner as shall be declared by the Bye-laws and Rules of the said society, to be passed by virtue hereof.

VIII. And be it enacted that all donations to the said incorporated society, to constitute life members or otherwise, of not less than twenty pounds, shall be invested under the direction of the executive committee as a permanent fund for the benefit of the said

society, and that the funds of the said incorporated society shall from time to time, be laid out and applied by the executive committee in such way and for such purpose only as any general meeting of the said society may direct or appoint, and that the executive committee shall be bound and are hereby required annually to account to the society for all their acts, receipts, expenditures, and doings whatsoever, in the said office, and to make a report annually to the said society, at its general meeting, of the progress and state of the said society, and of its affairs generally.

IX. And be it enacted that a general meeting of the said society shall be held once, that is to say sometime within the last ten days of the month of June, in each year, and as much oftener as may be directed by any Rule or Bye-law of said society.

X. And be it enacted, that the executive committee of the said society shall meet and assemble as often as there may be occasion, and any three members shall form a quorum.



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BYE-LAWS

The Alumni of King's College, Windsor.

PASSED AT A GENERAL MEETING HELD AT HALIFAX HOTEL, JUNE 27, 1848.

I. Besides the Annual General Meeting of the Incorporated Society, it shall be competent for the committee at any time, either of their own accord, or upon a requisition signed by at least ten of the members of the association, upon giving seven days notice in the public papers, to call a special general meeting of the association, specifying the purposes for which it is called, and in which meeting it shall be competent for the association to transact any such business as may be required. Ten members shall be deemed a quorum for the transaction of business.

II. That the books, accounts, and papers of the association shall be open at all times to the inspection of all the members, and the secretary shall furnish an account of the affairs of the association whenever required by the committee.

III. That the treasurer and secretary, and such officers as shall be requisite for the incorporated society, shall be annually appointed by the executive committee.

IV. That at the annual meeting of the association, the president and vice-president shall alternately go out of office, accompanied by the first three of the committee, and that all or any of them having a majority of votes, shall be eligible to be re-elected.

V. That at any meeting, members not present, may vote by proxy in writing, to be held by any other member; provided that no member shall be entitled to vote either personally or by proxy, whose dues are not all paid up for the preceding year.

VI. That the funds of the association will be appropriated for the payment of one or more professors or lecturers, and one or more scholarships at the university of King's College, or one or more teachers or exhibitions in the Collegiate School at Windsor, to be denominated the Alumni professorships and scholarships respectively.

VII. That the association will scrupulously apply such donations as may be made to them, to such specific objects in aid of King's College, as may be directed by the donors respectively.

VIII. That all meetings of the incorporated society shall be opened with prayer.

IX. (*Passed at general meeting of June 21st, 1849.*) That the elections for members of the incorporation shall be by ballot.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

PASSED AT DIFFERENT TIMES, AND NOW ORDERED TO BE PUBLISHED.

THAT no resolution or proceeding inconsistent with or modifying any resolution or proceeding adopted by a general meeting, be entertained by the executive committee in Halifax, except upon a month's notice to the committee being given by the person proposing the same, and that no such resolution or proceeding be carried into effect until the same shall have been confirmed by a general meeting to be summoned for the consideration thereof, if necessary to be arranged before the annual general meeting.

That a corresponding committee of three residents in Windsor, or its neighborhood, the chairman whereof shall be, if possible, a member of the executive committee, be appointed to meet on the second Wednesday in every month, and at such other times as may be expedient, upon summons of the chairman, to confer with the officers of the College or Collegiate School upon any subject to be submitted to them either by such officers, or by the executive committee in Halifax, in reference to the College or School, and to report thereon to the executive committee.

A month's notice shall be given of all resolutions affecting the rights of members, or creating new offices or salaries.

No individual shall be entitled to vote under a parochial certificate, unless he be authorised by a parish meeting.

All annual general meetings of this association shall be holden at Windsor.

That the treasurer make up his annual account to the 30th of April in each and every year.

All undergraduates, resident at College, shall be competent to compete for the prize or certificate for modern languages.

At the annual meeting held at Windsor, June 29, 1859, Dr. King moved the resolution, notice of which was given at the last annual meeting by the Rev. Dr. Twining, in reference to the mode of election of Governors, viz : that the present mode of voting for each individual separately and in alphabetical order be discontinued, and that the usual

mode of putting all the names proposed on the same ballot, out of whom those having the highest number shall be declared elected, should be adopted; which motion was seconded by Dr. Almon. After considerable discussion, Mr. A. M. Cochran moved in amendment that the following proviso be added: "Provided that no person shall be declared elected as Governor unless he have a majority of votes cast." The amendment was seconded by Nepean Clarke, Esq., and carried. The original resolution of Rev. Dr. Twining, as amended by Mr. Cochran's proviso, then passed.

At the general meeting, October 17th, 1856, it was resolved, "That the right of voting by proxy be in no way interfered with."

The following resolution was passed at the general meeting, 24th June, 1857:

Resolved, That the ballot be not sent round for any officer of this association, or of the Board of Governors, whose name has not been previously proposed and seconded by some member of the association; and that the ballot be not taken until all the names of the persons intended to be proposed for any office be given.

At the annual meeting held at Windsor, June 27, 1860, the following resolution was proposed by Dr. Almon, seconded by Rev. Dr. Robertson, and passed:

Resolved, That a Prize of £5 be given to the student passing the best examination for Matriculation, in June next. The day of examination and other details to be settled by the President of the College.

At the annual meeting held June 25th, 1862, this grant was discontinued from the want of funds.

At the same meeting, the Rev. G. W. Hill moved the following resolution, which was seconded by Dr. Almon, and passed unanimously:

Resolved, That the Executive Committee of the Associated Alumni be empowered at their monthly meetings, during the interval between one annual general meeting and the next, to elect members of the Incorporation, provided that no black beans be cast against them.

Rev. Professor Hensley moved the following resolution:

Whereas, The funds of this association are pledged, and consequently no funds are left for providing the alumni scholarship and the usual prizes.

Resolved, That honorary certificates be granted in the several departments instead of the prizes as heretofore. Which passed.

REPORT.

THE Executive Committee of the Associated Alumni of King's College, Windsor, submit for the approval of its members, their sixteenth annual Report.

In their last Report your Committee alluded to the commencement of the new Collegiate Buildings, and they have now great pleasure in congratulating the Association upon being enabled to meet within its walls, and trust that in a short period the building will be in a position to be handed over by the contractor.

It may not be out of place here briefly to advert to the circumstances which have led to the accomplishment of this most desirable work. As year by year each successive Encænïa brought together increased numbers of the friends of the College, the necessity for some more suitable place in which the interesting ceremonies usual upon such occasions could take place, became more and more apparent. The old Hall, hallowed as it is by many pleasing associations, was manifestly unsuited for the exigencies of the times, and the increasing value of the Library and Museum rendered additional accommodation absolutely necessary. The subject was first formally brought before the association at the Annual Meeting held in June, 1858, when the following resolution was proposed by the Rev. Dr. Gray, and unanimously adopted.

Whereas, it is highly desirable that there should be a building erected for the purpose of furnishing rooms for a Chapel, a Library, a College Hall and Museum, under the same roof, and that such Building should be constructed of stone or brick.

Therefore resolved, that it be deemed a primary object of this Corporation to collect funds for this purpose; and that a committee be appointed to devise means for carrying this design into effect; and that this corporation do respectfully express their wish to the Governors that some portion of the general funds should be appropriated to this desirable object."

At that meeting an influential Committee was appointed, and the sum of £85, then in the Savings Bank, being proceeds of sale of lands presented to the Incorporation by Mr. Merritt, was appropriated to this object. At the ensuing Annual Meeting in June, 1859, this Committee partially reported that they considered the idea of erecting a permanent brick or stone building would have to be abandoned, as the cost would be too great; and that they had under consideration the idea of a temporary wooden building which could be used at other times as a gymnasium.

At the annual meeting in June, 1860, no action was taken in the matter, and the subject remained in abeyance until the meeting of June, 1861, when the following committee was appointed to raise funds for the object: Dr. Almon, Dr. King, J. C. Cogswell, D.C.L., P. C. Hill, D.C.L., H. Hartshorne, D.C.L., A. M. Uniacke, D.C.L., Rev. Prof. Hensley, M. A., Rev. G. W. Hill, M. A., Sec'y. Your Committee feel that the thanks of this Association are justly due to that Committee for the manner in which they have discharged the arduous duties which devolved upon them. The result of their labours being a subscription list of £1800, the most of which has been paid up.

The foundation of the building was commenced in the autumn of 1861—and a special general meeting of the Alumni was called at Halifax on the 12th April, 1862, to receive the report of the Building Committee. At that meeting plans and specifications were submitted, and a resolution was passed adopting the same (with the exception of the tower) and authorizing the Committee to enter into the necessary contracts, with Mr. Lang, to construct the building for the sum of £2,250. A resolution was also passed pledging the funds of the Association for the payment of the contract, and indemnifying the committee from any personal liability.

At the last annual meeting the Building Committee reported progress, and a resolution was passed directing the roof to be slated, and the ceiling to be open worked, which alterations involved an additional expense of £155. A Committee was also appointed, consisting of Dr. King, Prof. Hensley, Judge Bliss, Dr. Cogswell,

P. C. Hill, D. C. L., and Henry Pryor, D. C. L., to devise means to make up the deficiency in the subscription list.

A special meeting of your Committee was called on the 13th Dec. last, at the request of the Building Committee, who reported that an installment of £400 would shortly become due to the Contractor, and they called upon your Committee to carry out the resolution passed at the special general meeting in April previous.

After some consideration it was deemed advisable, in view of the importance of the subject, to call another special general meeting, which was accordingly held on the 22nd December last. At that meeting a resolution was passed authorizing the President to open an account with one of the Banks, for a sufficient sum to meet the payments as they became due under the Contract. This negotiation, however, failed; and another special general meeting was held on the 31st January, 1863, at which the President was authorized to pay over to the Building Committee the sum of £375, being the amount of a mortgage held by the Incorporation, upon real estate in the city of Halifax, which had been recently paid off.

The financial position of affairs, as will be seen by the report of the Building Committee, stands thus:—

Mr. Lang, the Contractor, has been paid the sum of £2,000, and there will be due him when the work is handed over, the sum of £405 12s. 0d., to meet which there is a balance in hand of £10 10s. 5½d. It will be perceived, therefore, that at this meeting it is absolutely necessary to adopt urgent measures not only to meet this deficiency, but also to repay to this Association the sum of £375, which was only advanced by way of loan, and the loss of the interest of which seriously cripples the annual income of your Society.

Before leaving this subject your Committee would fail in their duty if they omitted to record their appreciation of the continued

munificent liberality of one of their most esteemed members, Edw. Binney, Esq., who, on a previous occasion, generously offered to give £500 towards the deficiency that then existed, and who is now building the tower (which formed part of the original plan) at his own expense. Acts of generosity such as these are most encouraging, and your committee trust that they may prove as incentives to others to go and do likewise.

The resolution introduced by the Rev. Geo. Hill, and passed at the last annual meeting, empowering your Committee to elect new members of the Association at their monthly meetings, has been found of great practical use, and has had the effect of adding several new members to the subscription list. Your Committee, however, would again urge upon every member of the Association the necessity for personal exertion to increase the annual income of the Incorporation, especially when it is remembered that to meet their obligations they have been obliged to discontinue the annual prizes.

The Treasurer's account exhibits a balance on the 30th April last of \$199.31.

It now becomes necessary, in conformity with the bye-laws, to proceed to the election of two Governors in the place of Rev. Dr. Gray and J. C. Cogswell, Esq., D. C. L., who retire by rotation, but who are eligible for re-election; and also of a President and three Members of the Executive Committee, in the place of C. W. Harris, Esq., T. B. Akins, Esq., and Dr. Moren, all of whom may also be re-elected.

REPORT OF THE BUILDING COMMITTEE,

SUBMITTED AT THE ANNUAL MEETING, JUNE 24, 1863, AND PUBLISHED BY ORDER,
AS AN APPENDIX TO THE ANNUAL REPORT.

THE Committee appointed at the general meeting of the "Associate Alumni" held at the College Hall, in June, 1861, for the purpose of building a Hall and Library on the grounds of the Governors of King's College, Windsor, selecting a site on which to erect it, determining on a plan, and devising ways and means towards defraying the expense of the same, beg leave to report to the Alumni:

That in the autumn of the same year they proceeded to Windsor, and selected a site in the field fronting the President's residence. The spot chosen may not meet completely the views of all the friends of the College, but the committee feel assured that, on the whole, no more appropriate site could be found, when all the circumstances connected with the building are taken into consideration. Containing, as it hereafter will, a most valuable library, and a large number of expensive instruments, it was necessary to place it at a distance from the large wooden buildings at present standing, as a precaution against the contingency of fire. The rear of the College and the Professors' houses, which presented some advantages, was deemed, after mature consideration, equally unsuitable with any site close to them, because of the unseemly access through the stables, sheds, and outhouses belonging to the establishment, and which could not be removed nor altered except at enormous expense. It was, moreover, thought needful that the building should be in such a position as to be always under observation, which it would not be on the ground behind the College, inasmuch as the rooms chiefly inhabited through the day are those looking eastward and southward, *i. e.*, towards the site selected. The committee, moreover, hoped that at some future day the corresponding site in the opposite field would be selected on which to erect a chapel, and thus give the appearance of a unity of design in the placing of the various buildings connected with the Institution. If this were kept in mind, the false view—that the Hall was built on a site without any prospective purpose—would be removed; and the committee are satisfied that those who live to see an equally handsome structure on the ground at the other end of the College, and at the same distance from the front, will pronounce their judgment, which resolved on the site now chosen, as sound.

The committee, after a good deal of thought, determined on a plan drawn by Mr. Stirling, of the firm of Hay & Stirling, Architects. The foundation was completed and covered in during the autumn of 1861, and in the following spring the work of building commenced. It was not so vigorously prosecuted as the committee wished, but various reasons were assigned by the contractor, Mr. George Lang, which were accepted as sufficiently solid for excuse. The difficulties named by Mr. Lang, which were chiefly the irregular arrivals of stone, caused it to be very late in the autumn, indeed running into the winter season before the building was shut up—in some respects still incomplete, according to the terms of specification. During the winter it was reported formally to the committee by one of their number resident at College, that signs of settling were showing themselves, and that two seams had opened in one of the walls. The committee immediately engaged the services of a civil engineer, Mr. W. Tremaine, authorizing him to employ a master mason accustomed to practical masonry, who should accompany him and repair to Windsor, examine the building and report fully thereon. The committee received Mr. Tremaine's report, which fully described the nature of the injury sustained by the settling of the building, and stating the cause thereof, also advising the building of a tower as a support to the wall, and stating as his opinion, that if this were done no further injury would accrue, and that the present seams could readily be repaired.

On the frost leaving the ground the committee again sent Mr. Tremaine to make a further survey of the building and report thereon. This he did, and this report as well as the first were both sent to Mr. Lang, with a letter requiring him to attend to the faults and failures therein mentioned. These are still being attended to, and though not yet all satisfactory, the committee have no doubt they will soon be so.

The committee have the great pleasure of announcing to the Alumni that Mr. Edward Binney, with his usual munificence, offered to build a tower to the Hall, at his own expense. This most liberal gift, proffered by that constant benefactor to the College, was thankfully received, and the committee felt that they would be acting in accordance with the judgment and feelings of every Alumnus of the College, in requesting the generous donor to allow them to call it "The Binney Tower," and to have his "Coat of Arms" sculptured, and placed over the door.

The committee wish to let the Alumni know that they also are indebted to the valuable counsel of Mr. James Tremain, who at his own expense repaired to Windsor, in the autumn, to look at the work which was then done, and reported to them his opinion of the same. They set so much value on Mr. Tremain's practical knowledge and business habits, that they have since invited him to become a member of the committee—an office which they are happy to say he has been kind enough to accept.

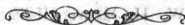
In reference to finance, the committee report that the subscription list

was opened, and the sum of £1807 7s. 6d. subscribed. Many of the sums are liberal in the extreme, and all of them most pleasantly and cheerfully given. Of this sum £1629 17s. 6d. has already been paid. A balance of £177 10s. is therefore still due. Of this balance it is doubtful when £125 will be paid, as the subscriber represents it as being contingent on his tenure of office in British North America. The remaining £61 7s. 6d. can be obtained at any time. The Associate Alumni, in accordance with their pledge to save the committee from loss, paid the committee on March 12th of this year, the sum of £375 towards the expenses. The committee have paid Mr. Lang the sum of £2000, owing him when the building is finished £405 12s., exclusive of the sum to be paid for the tower by Mr. Binney, viz., £334 10s. To meet the sum of £405 12s. the Treasurer has a balance of £10 10s. 5½d. The committee, in conclusion, beg leave to say, that, to the subscribers generally, they feel indebted for the manner in which their appeal was responded to, and hope that the Alumni will feel satisfied with the manner in which they, on their part, have attempted to discharge their duty.

Any information required will be most cheerfully given by the members of the committee who now hand in their report, for any action which the Associate Alumni may think fit to take thereon.
