FIRES RAGING AROUND CALAIS.

Calais, Me., June 9.—Several hundred fire fighters combatted tonight four distinct forest fires in this cuy, Baring, Robbinston and Charlotte.

Within several miles of Calais the fires had devastated 10,000 acres at a loss of \$50,000, and were still on their fiaming rampage at a late hour tonight. While the wind was carrying the flames in the direction of the city and of settlements, no buildings had been reported burned up to that time. The fires are not of today's beginning. Without exception all have been burning for two or three days and have spread constantly despite the efforts of several hundred men who have been working in relays during that time. Unless rain comes soon, it is believed that the flames must reach some of the buildings in outlying sections of the towns.

WELL DISPOSED TOWARD UNION.

The resolution adopted by a majority of nearly four to one in the Presbyterian General Assembly is as near a declaration in favor of church union as the church is now in a position to make. It refers the question with the doctrinal statement and the plan of church government doctrinal statement and the plan of church government to the presbyteries and sessions for consideration. Next year the Methodists of Canada will meet in general conference. While the Presbyterians meet annually in their court for the whole Dominion, the Methodists assemble once in four years. Some declaration will be made at the next gathering. Meanwhile both Methodists and Presbyterians will have become more familiar with the basis of union in respect to doctrine, form of worship and church government, and after the Methodist deliverance, if it be favorable, the Presbyterians may continue their deliberations until two years from now, when a prodeliberations until two years from now, when a pro-nouncement may perhaps be made.

While it is not likely that Presbyterian leaders stand four to one for union, it is evident that a large majority are in favor of proceeding with the movement. Those who wished to bring the negotiations to an end voted for the amendment to bring forward a federation enterprise. The adoption of this resolution would have confused the whole issue and removed the union movement outside the sphere of practical operations. Promoters of the amendnent have since shown their hostility to union by direct protest.


