

Regular Monthly Meeting Last Night

Board of School Trustees Appointed a Committee to Secure Sites for New Schools—Reports Received—Other Business Transacted.

The regular monthly meeting of the St. John School Board was held last evening at the Board of Trustees office, Haasen Avenue. The chairman, Dr. A. F. Emery, presided, and the other trustees present included Mrs. Richard O'Brien, Mrs. E. R. Taylor, George E. Day, Thomas Nagle, Dr. H. S. Bridges, E. Coby Smith, E. R. Leavitt, M. O. J. P. D. Lewis, Dr. H. S. Bridges and Gordon Leavitt were also present.

The appointment of a stenographer to assist the Secretary and Miss Reid in the work of the Board was brought to the attention of the Board by the Finance Committee. The matter of the choice of new school sites in the North End and West Side caused considerable discussion. Trustee Nagle was of the opinion that the Board should substitute talk by action, and moved that the committee appointed to secure a site for a school on New main Street be asked to bring in a report within two weeks, and that a special meeting of the Board be called to hear the report. The motion was carried after considerable discussion.

Applications for vacancies on the teaching staff of the city schools were read from Edna D. Shaw at present teaching at the Manwaggonia Road School, J. B. Carr, E. Gertrude Pederson, Stanley S. Mason and Miss Gertrude Shea, who applied for a position as assistant on the staff of the St. Peter's school. It was moved that the applications be placed on file.

A communication was read from William Harris, a member of the Board, with applying for the position of janitor in one of the schools. His application was placed on file.

The resignation of M. Constance Ooster, and Cora Bisset of the Albert Street School, and Luella B. Chapman of the Victoria Annex, from the teaching staff of the city schools were read and accepted. The resignation of George O. Mowry janitor of the Dufferin Street School, because of prolonged illness, was also accepted.

The Board was notified by the D. S. C. R. that J. E. Bond, a returned soldier, and janitor of the King Edward school was being treated in the hospital. Dr. Bridges stated that a young man had been employed by the visitor's committee to attend to the fire during the janitor's absence, and that the janitor's wife performed the other duties.

The Finance Committee reported that they could not meet with Miss Muller's request that she be granted the bonus given the other teachers during the year she was granted absence. They recommended that an increase of a dollar a month be granted the teachers of the evening classes. W. L. McDermid and Rex Cormier.

E. Coby Smith stated that it was the opinion of the Finance Committee that the work required of the secretary, Mr. Leavitt, and his assistant, Miss Reid, was becoming too great for them, and that a stenographer should be appointed to assist them.

Mr. Day said he agreed with Mr. Smith, and asked if the matter of finance had been considered by the committee. Mr. Ingraham drew the attention of the Board to the fact that in addition to other causes, the Vocational Schools had put a great deal of extra work on the secretary and his assistant. ELECTRICAL PLANT WORKERS IN PARIS

Ordered to Join in General Walkout Today—Strike Spreads in the Northern Mining Fields. Paris, May 10.—The French General Federation of Labor announced today that the electrical plant workers would be ordered to go on strike to strengthen the walkout on transportation lines, intended to force Nationalization of Public Utilities. Employees of the Metropolitan Subways have been ordered to strike tomorrow.

The government's forecast that all railway workers on strike would be back at work today, was not realized, and neither were the somewhat extravagant claims of the Federation of the railroads. All were reported operating trains on more or less normal schedules.

Little importance is attached to the strike in the Paris region where workers in the Paris region are reported idle, and there have been strikes of male workers here and there in the provinces, but no general stoppage of work anywhere has been reported.

The strike movement among the miners appears to be spreading, especially in the northern fields, where, according to the Federation, the men have declined to keep pumps going or to do any upkeep work unless the government consents to negotiate with the Federation.

The importance is attached to the strike in the building trades, where unemployment is chronic. While nothing like a general strike movement among the building trades workers in any section has been reported, the isolated walkouts are seriously hampering building construction, and the consequences may be felt for many months. The strike of the seamen and dockers remains unchanged.



Government Offer Has Been Rejected

As Result Steamer "Maggie Miller" is Idle at Milligville and a Motor Boat Service to Ferry Passengers Was Put on the Route Yesterday.

The Fortinancial Department of Public Works has been informed by Captain White of the steamer "Maggie Miller" on behalf of the shareholders that the offer of the provincial government at its last meeting to increase the passenger fares and the lease terms between Milligville and Baywater has been rejected, because, in the opinion of the shareholders the increase offered is not enough.

Government officials claim that the offer made would mean in round figures the payment to the "Maggie Miller" for subsidy and free fares of more than \$5,000 a year. In consequence of the refusal of Captain White and his associates to accept the proposition of the government for increased fares, arrangements were made yesterday morning with Lewis Keith to carry on a motor boat service, between Baywater, Somerville and Milligville by which the bona fide residents of the Kingston peninsula will be carried free, as usual, and the usual fares charged for those non-residents leaving the various wharves.

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REPRESENTATION AT WASHINGTON BEFORE HOUSE

Official Statement Relative to Appointment of Canadian Minister to U. S. Read by Acting Premier.

HAVE CHARGE OF CANADIAN AFFAIRS

And Act for Imperial Government During Absence of British Ambassador Accredited to President.

Ottawa, May 10.—(Canadian Press)—Sir Geo. Foster, in the House this afternoon read an official statement with regard to the appointment of a Canadian Minister at Washington. The statement was as follows:

"As a result of recent discussions, an arrangement has been concluded between the British and Canadian governments to provide more complete representation of Canadian interests at Washington than have hitherto existed."

"Accordingly, it has been agreed that His Majesty, on the advice of his Canadian Ministers, shall appoint a minister plenipotentiary, who will have charge of Canadian affairs and will at all times be the ordinary channel of communication with the United States government in matters of purely Canadian concern, acting upon instructions from and reporting direct to the Canadian government."

"In the absence of the ambassador the Canadian Minister will take charge of the whole embassy and of the representation of Imperial as well as Canadian interests. He will be accredited by His Majesty to the President the necessary powers for the purpose. This new arrangement will not denote any departure either on the part of the British Government or of the Canadian Government from the principle of the diplomatic unity of the British Empire."

"The need for this important step has been fully realized by both governments for some time. For a good many years there has been direct communication between Ottawa and Washington, but the constantly increasing importance of Canadian interests in the United States has made it appear that in addition, Canada should be represented there in some distinctive manner, for this would doubtless tend to expedite negotiations and naturally first hand acquaintance with Canadian conditions would promote good understanding. In view of the peculiarly close relations that have always existed between the people of Canada and those of the United States it is confidently expected as well that this new step will have the very desirable effect of maintaining and strengthening the friendly relations and co-operation between the British Empire and the United States."

Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King: "I just wish to ask if the Government will undertake to see that the correspondence is tabulated at the earliest possible moment. My purpose in speaking is not to refer to this far-reaching and important step the Government is taking, but rather to express some surprise that Parliament has not been acquainted with the correspondence in



ago, the name of Sir George Foster was prominently mentioned, as later has that of Hon. N. W. Howell. Mr. Howell, however, intimated that he would not accept the appointment, and it is considered doubtful if Sir George would accept. Other names mentioned were those of Sir Charles Gordon, who headed the Canadian War Mission in Washington, and C. A. Meach, former Post Controller.

The Canadian Minister will be appointed by the King on the advice of the Cabinet at Ottawa. He will be directly accredited to the President of the United States and, therefore, will be not subordinate in his functions to the British Ambassador.

On questions purely affecting the relations between the United States and Canada, he will directly represent Canada, on questions of Imperial concern, he will act in conjunction with the British Ambassador. Exactly what the precise rank of the Canadian Minister will be has still to be determined. A Minister plenipotentiary ranks one degree lower in the diplomatic service than a full fledged ambassador. But how the Canadian Minister will rank with ministers accredited to Washington from such countries as Chile, for instance, is a point now for consideration by the State Department at Washington.

Reports that the appointment of a Canadian Minister at Washington involves the appointment of a United States Minister at Ottawa are not confirmed here. There has so far been no intimation that the United States intends to take any such course for the time being at any rate.

Japs For Mexico.

Tokio, May 10.—Indications of an increased Japanese population in Mexico are pointed out by the newspapers here as a result of the proposed re-establishment, on April 3 of the postal money order system between Japan and that country. The American designation of dollars and cents will be used and the amount of a single order will be limited to not more than \$100.

POSSIBILITIES OF ITALIAN COLONY IN

East Africa Being Investigated by the Duke of the Abruzzi.

WILL ESTABLISH EXPERIMENTAL FARMS

And Hope Eventually to Raise Enough Cotton and Cereals to Supply Italy.

Rome, May 10.—Ardent exploration and shooting the savage pole bear, have no allurement at present for the Duke of the Abruzzi, who is now engaged in the equally scientific task of investigating the commercial and agricultural possibilities of the Benadir Colony, East Africa, with a view to making it a source of income for Italy, and soon eventually rendering that country independent of other nations for her supplies of cotton and cereals.

The Duke, in addition, intends to explore the sources of the Uebi Sobel River, which, rising in the high plateau of "Hannar" toward Abyssinia, passed through the Italian colonies to the sea, and it is believed, can easily be rendered navigable for small boats, besides being invaluable as a source of irrigation for the extensive agricultural enterprises which the Duke hopes to initiate in Benadir.

The first news has just arrived of the expedition which started last December from Mogadiscio. An exhaustive study has already been made of the winds, the climate and the rainfall of the country. Engineer Agostinelli, who is accompanying the expedition and who has done considerable work on the rivers and canals of the Lower Nile, considers that it will be comparatively easy to utilize the waters of the Uebi Sobel for a system of canals, to irrigate that part of the colony which now suffers from drought which will more than quadruple its productive power.

The Duke of the Abruzzi, with the experts who have accompanied him, are setting up two big experimental farms where it will be demonstrated what immense harvests of cotton, dourra, sugar and coffee can be obtained in this country through irrigation, a system of intensive culture and the use of modern agricultural machines.

The expedition cargo boat, now called the Carlo Pisacane, which brought news of the expedition, also carried a large shipment of dourra from the colony, a grain which resembles maize and can be used, together with ordinary flour, for bread. It has also been proved that the breeding of cattle in Benadir can be greatly increased so that supplies can be sent to Italy of meat and hides.

All this work is being done, it is announced, entirely at the expense of the Duke, who desires that Italy's colonies should be developed and hopes that similar work may be started in Libya and Cyrenaica.

THE Motor Boating In Europe

Wonderful Record of Engine Built in British Factory.
The new motor boat built by M. Desbouis at Paris, which succeeded in attaining a speed of 75 miles per hour recently, is fitted with a single Sunbeam-Costain engine of the "Matabele" type, suitably modified for use in motor boats. This engine consists of 13 cylinders, with a bore and stroke respectively of 132 mm. by 160 mm. and is capable of a horse-power output of 435 at the normal speed of the engine, viz. 2,000 r.p.m. The engine is of "V" formation, the cylinders being disposed on the crank ends at an angle of 60 degrees, and the articulating form of connecting rod design is adopted. The pistons are of aluminium, and the overhead valves, four in number, are actuated by overhead camshafts driven by trains of gears. The crankshaft is hollow and is curved by eight bearings. Lubrication is on the dry base principle, the main pressure pump and two auxiliary pumps being employed. Two Claudel-Hobson carburetors are set in the centre of the "V" and arranged for gravity feed, whilst the ignition is effected by four magnetos. The exhaust manifold is of special design and comprises an efficient water cooling arrangement. The engine is mounted in the boat on special resilient mountings, and the drive is through a flexible coupling to the gear box by means of which the speed of the propeller is geared up to 3,000 r.p.m. The starting of the engine is effected by means of compressed air. New records have been gained by the Sunbeam company, and as the boat in question, together with other similar boats, has been entered for some of the forthcoming motor boat races, it may be confidently expected that the above-mentioned speed will be still further improved upon. It is a tribute to British engineering that the large majority of the boats in all classes entered for the Monaco races are fitted with engines of British design and manufacture, a remarkable fact, considering that most of the boats are built in France, which may be regarded as the home of internal combustion engines.

JACK DEMPSEY HAS WICKED BLOW; WILLARD'S FACE SWOLLEN BY PUNCH

Present Champion Has a Most Healthy Wallop — Patsy Kline Also Has a Hard Blow for a "Youngster."

A veteran ring follower recently told Fred Peata, the sporting writer, that the hardest blow he ever saw was the one with which Jack Dempsey scored the first knockdown over Willard at Toledo. It was delivered with so much force that Willard's face was black and swollen before Dempsey's glove bounced off. One of the hardest blows delivered in a local ring during the life of the Frawley law came from Willard's fist. It was a straight right and it landed on the jaw of the husky soldier, Kearns. Kearns, who was built along the lines of a professional strong man, was not much of a fighter, but he was extremely rugged and he could take all kinds of punishment until Willard landed on his chin. The blow made a glass jawed fighter out of one of the toughest men in the ring. Landing that punch ruined Kearns and made Willard. In previous bouts the big fellow had stalled along with a grin on his face and the fans concluded he was too good natured to be a success in the ring. Until Willard got sore about something he was slow and lazy in his actions, but when he lost his temper he could display a brand of speed that was astonishing. Patsy Kline, the Newark featherweight, landed the hardest left delivered by a little man when he put Joe Coster to sleep in a bout that took place in a Bowery club several years ago. Kline's left was his better hand. He could hit harder with it than his right, although he stood with it extended unlike most left-handers. Coster was a fast, clever little fellow and he was having the better of it on points when he grew reckless and was drawn into a mix-up. Kline hit by his left hook and it landed squarely on the angle of the jaw. Coster was knocked so cold that he fell flat on his face without breaking the fall in any way and the contest with the canvas almost broke his nose. It was several minutes before the seconds could restore him to life. As soon as he came to, he began to swing his arms, thinking that he was still mixing it up with Kline, who had long since left the ring. The upward springing left with which Al McCoy knocked out George Chip and won the middleweight championship was a terrible wallop. McCoy was a noted hitter by any means, but this time he happened to time the blow just right. It caught Chip under the chin as he was coming in, and it spun him around in the air until the first thing that bit the canvas was the back of his head. This was the most unexpected knock out that ever ended a championship bout. A moment before he landed the winning blow, McCoy was running for his life, his face pale from fright. Chip was the picture of confidence, and was so sure of himself that he never took the slightest trouble to protect himself. McCoy let the wallop fly in sheer desperation. He had no idea that the result would be so startling. In fact, McCoy was the most surprised man in the house when he saw his opponent on the floor taking the count. John Dillon, the "great killer," landed a mighty wallop in the same ring where McCoy won the middleweight title. Big Tom Crowder had an advantage of a foot on him in height and many pounds of weight in his favor. Tom had a fairly good straight left, and he was leading it with marked success when Dillon suddenly crossed him with a right. Crowder collapsed like a load of snow falling off a roof.

At the Olympia in London Last Night Joe Beckett Put the Bombardier to Sleep in the Third Round.



London, May 10.—Harry Vardon, famous professional golfer and today, he intends going to the States with Edward Ray to compete in American open championship in August.



THE PRIME MINISTER'S RETURN.

It is reported that Sir Robert Borden will be back in his place in the House tomorrow, but what his plans for the future may be, does not appear to be definitely known as yet. One thing at any rate is certain. The Premier must either resume active command of his party and let the country see that he is once again the responsible leader, or he must make way for someone else. There is no statesman in Canada in whom the great mass of the people have so much faith and confidence as the present Prime Minister; and while there is no lack of faith and confidence in the colleagues whom he left behind to carry on the government of the country during his absence, there is also a very general feeling that the Leader of the Government should be in control and actively discharging the duties of the office.

Until it is known whether Sir Robert's health is sufficiently restored to permit him to resume, with the intention of continuing, the duties of Leader of the Government, it is idle to speculate on possible future happenings. Many momentous questions will have to be dealt with, not the least of which is the future of the present Governmental party itself. Even now a movement is on foot to bring about a return to a government on strict party lines, a meeting of Conservatives from every province in the Dominion having been held yesterday in an effort to bring about this result. That many of the old school of Liberals will cast in their lot with the Conservatives, and thus ensure the formation of a party which will carry on a government upon sound Liberal-Conservative principles, is pretty generally conceded. A party so committed could readily command the support of the whole Dominion, for whatever their claims and assertions to the contrary may be, the fact remains that the country has no confidence in the Hon. Mackenzie King and the party led by him, or in the policies that they stand for. This is the time when Canada has to be built up, when constructive policies are needed; and so far the only policies that the Opposition party and its leader seem to have any knowledge of, are such as would bring the country to utter ruin in the course of a year or two at the most.

FRANCE AND GERMANY.

France cannot altogether be blamed for the course she is taking regarding Germany's attitude towards her obligations under the Peace Treaty, which she is showing no inclination to carry out. Indeed, Von Hindenburg's own statement a few days ago trying to carry out the conditions of the treaty, "Would not it be possible," were his words, Germany's excuse that she cannot at present determine the amount of the indemnity she can pay, still next year's tax levy has been decided upon, is one that will scarcely carry much weight with her creditors, who do not unreasonably expect that she should adjust her taxes to her liabilities, and not her liabilities to her taxes. France is naturally getting irritated on account of the non-fulfillment of the obligation imposed upon Germany to pay the cost of reconstruction of the former's devastated areas, and this will be one of the principal matters to be taken up when the Allied Conference meets at Spa in a few days time. Nothing but a firm stand on the part of the Allied statesmen will make it clear to Germany that no fooling on her part will be tolerated.

There can be no doubt that Germany is being encouraged in the attitude she is taking by the fact that the United States refused to ratify the Treaty. The present action of France is one of the effects of that refusal. France never had very much faith in the efficacy of the League of Nations, and is under no delusions as to what course Germany will take if ever she again is allowed to become a powerful nation. Clemenceau, whose wrong will impose itself, to a great degree, upon the Allies in conference, preferred the old system of political balances, but so strengthened as to give reasonable guarantees of protection against any possible attack by Germany in the future—a disposition which Clemenceau believed would be carried into effect the moment Germany felt she was strong enough. That is why Clemenceau asked for the special treaty with England and the United States, which guaranteed France against this possible danger.

France has always been an idealist, but she does not believe in the million on the instant. The child like faith of President Wilson was no doubt splendid; but force is the only thing the Germans understand, and force will be necessary to keep the Germans in order in the future as, assuredly, that power will seek to be re-asserted. Therefore, although Clemenceau agreed to the League of Nations, he had no illusions. He did not think greatly of it. He understood the human heart. He dreaded jealousy and self-interest and the failure of all

the members of the League to function in a great crisis, such as might at any time disclose itself. Resolutions accomplished nothing of themselves. All the "whereases" in the world could have no efficacy unless the spirit of the League was one and absolutely disinterested.

Seeing, then, that, before the League of Nations had even begun its work, the United States, whose President was its author and instigator, refused to endorse its action and declined to accept any part in the agreement for keeping the world's peace, France has been compelled to take the initiative with respect to these matters in which she is particularly interested, and she cannot be blamed if she becomes somewhat insistent with regard to them. British statesmen must be presumed to know what they are doing; but any sign of weakening on their part, or any expression of a willingness to lighten Germany's load, will be eagerly seized upon by the people of that country and exploited to the limit. And France knows it.

THE "MAGGIE MILLER."

A few days ago we referred in these columns to some complaints which had reached us of the delay in getting the ferryboat "Maggie Miller" on her route, which we were informed was a consequence of failure on the part of the owners to come to terms with the Provincial Government regarding the subsidy usually paid to the boat. For this we were taken to task by Mr. E. S. Carter, the Premier's Secretary, who thought it a pity that The Standard's editorial writer did not take more pains to acquaint himself with the facts before launching his criticisms. Mr. Carter announced that not only had the subsidy been agreed upon, but the fares also, and that an increase in the latter had been arranged for with the owners of the boat were quite satisfied. From the somewhat lengthy article which appeared in the afternoon papers yesterday, sent by Mr. Carter, it would appear that The Standard's editorial writer was not so very far wrong after all, for on Mr. Carter's own admission the owners of the "Maggie Miller" are so far from satisfied with the terms proposed by the Government that they are refusing to put her on the route, and the Government has actually been compelled to make arrangements with another boat to undertake the service.

THE FOSTER GOVERNMENT AND RETURNED SOLDIERS.

We have received a communication from a returned soldier in which he complains of the studied manner in which the claims of men of his class are ignored by the Foster Government when appointments have to be made to public positions. We are not altogether sure that our correspondent is not taking a rather too exaggerated view of the matter; it may be that the Government has not been any too generous in this respect, but there are several instances in which ex-soldiers have been given positions, and not always on account of any special qualification they might have had. The Foster Government is very much to blame, however, for the course they have taken regarding the closing of employment agencies. Several of these agencies had been established in this province by the Dominion Government, which, according to agreement, should have been taken over by the Provincial Government a few weeks ago. The Dominion authorities still continuing, however, to pay one-half of the cost of operating them. Owing to the failure of the Foster Government to make the necessary arrangements to carry on the work of these agencies, they have now been closed, with the result that the facilities that they afforded returned men to find employment are now denied them. This action on the part of the Government may have been dictated on the plea of so-called economy; but we have it on the authority of both the Premier himself, and of Hon. A. Veale, that economy does not count for anything so long as the convenience of the public is being served. And we have practical demonstrations, too, that even this qualification is not always kept in view.

THE WORLD'S PAPER MONEY.

Some interesting and very significant figures bearing on the present condition of world finances were given at a meeting of New York business men the other day by the statistician of the New York National City Bank. At the beginning of the war the paper money of the world amounted to \$7,000,000,000; at the date of armistice it had increased to \$40,000,000,000, and at the present time it amounts to \$50,000,000,000—the two last sums not including paper issues of the Russian Bolshevik Government. From 1913 to 1920 the national debts of the world have grown from \$40,000,000,000 to \$265,000,000,000, while world credits, another form of inflation, have also enormously increased. In 1913 the ratio of gold to paper currency for the world was about 70 per cent.; at the

close of the war it had dropped to 14 per cent., and now it is approximately 12 per cent. World budgets are now about five times as great as before the war, while annual interest charges on national debts are about \$9,000,000,000, as against \$1,750,000,000 before the war in 1914. It is especially worthy of note that in the 18 months of peace the increase in the world's paper currency has been almost half that of the 51 months of war.

The cost of living in Japan being now as high as it is in Europe, she is losing her advantage of cheap labor without any compensatory advantage in skill, while the progress of her domestic industries has been seriously hampered. In the meantime the boom in industry and finance continues, and although warnings are heard from time to time of the possibility of a crash, such warnings are unheeded.

Cases In Police

Common Council
Met In Committee

Commissioner Thornton Re-
ported on Sunday Closing
—City Employees Half-
Holiday—Teamsters Want
More Money—Other Mat-
ters Dealt With.

At a committee meeting of the Com-
mon Council, yesterday morning, Com-
missioner Thornton reported regarding
Sunday closing. The solicitor, in a
letter to the commissioner, stated that
the cases would have first to be report-
ed to the attorney-general within six-
ty days after the date of the alleged
offence and await orders for prosecu-
tion. On motion, it was decided to
send all correspondence in the matter
to the Retail Merchants' Association
for their information.

On motion of Commissioner Thor-
nton, permission was granted to the D.
S. C. R. to install a 250-gallon gaso-
line tank at their garage, 66 Charlotte
street.

Commissioner Thornton moved that
Jas. Kennedy be appointed assessor
and measurer of lumber for the city
of St. John for the current year. Car-
ried.

On motion of Commissioner Bullock
the usual half holiday for city em-
ployees was agreed to.

On motion of Commissioner Bullock
a lot in King street east between Pitt
and Crown streets was recommended
sold to James Skerling for \$600.

The Mayor advised that a large
delegation of West Indian merchants
was to pass through the city about
May 25, and suggested the city co-
operating with the Board of Trade to
entertain the visitors on their way to
Ottawa.

On motion of Commissioner Jones
the Mayor was appointed to deal with
the Board of Trade and report back.
The Mayor suggested that a dinner
might be given the delegation here to
impress on them the fact that "this is
St. John."

A letter was read from J. A. Grant
& Co., Ltd., asking for return of
cheques accompanying paving tend-
ers. The common clerk was asked to
bring in a report on the matter at the
next meeting.

The matter of plans for use of the
board of assessors was brought up
again, but it was decided to leave the
matter over to the next meeting.

A petition signed by several city
teamsters was read. On account of the
increased cost of feed, shoeing,
etc., they said that \$3 for a double
team now paid by the city was insuffi-
cient, and, whereas most of the city
contractors were paying \$10 a day,
they asked that the city raise the pay-
ment to \$14. The matter was referred
to the commissioner of public works
for a report.

F. A. Dykeman and W. C. Cross ap-
peared regarding the Alexander
Heights matter. Mr. Dykeman said
that he had carried out his part of
the agreement as to grading a street
between Connaught and Chesley
streets and also Connaught street.

Commissioner Jones reported that
the contract had not been completed,
as he said the street had not been
graded nor were the owners willing to
pay 10 per cent. a year of the cost of
installing water and sewerage, con-
tained in the agreement.

Mr. Dykeman said Connaught street
had been graded and the other street
was not completed, as the road engi-
neer had considered it impracticable.
It was finally decided to leave the
matter over until the owners had an
interview with the Town Planning
Commission regarding the size of lots
and refer the matter back to the Coun-
cil.

The Mayor said he was quite sure
the Council would assist in the work if
the owners would guarantee sufficient
to cover the cost of the installation
of water and sewerage.

A letter was read from Furness,
Wilby & Co., asking drawing attention
to unsatisfactory conditions about the
docks. Three sheds are filled with
goods, and there is considerable steal-
ing going on about the harbor front.
The company thought there should be
waterfront protection.

Large Audiences Delighted With Performance in Queen Square Theatre Last Night—Show is Refined, Clean Cut, Bright and Snappy.

Despite the rather serious handicap of the illness of the director, which quite naturally had a depressing effect on the rest of the company, the Musical Comedy Company brought to a very fair start at the Queen Square Theatre last evening. 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UNITED STATES BUSINESS MEN BELIEVE MOVE

To Curtail Buying from Them on Account of Exchange Only Temporary.

CANADA SECOND BEST CUSTOMER

Latest Returns Show Big Falling off in Imports from States.

New York, May 10.—(By Canadian Press.)—Since Canada is the second best customer of the United States, the best being Great Britain, American business men have been paying close attention to the movement recently inaugurated in the Dominion to increase trade with the Mother Country with a view of negotiating exchange conditions between Canada and the United States. The movement has been in the direction of limiting Canadian purchases from American business houses so that the adverse balance of trade reflected in the depreciation of the Canadian dollar in exchange may be corrected.

Observers on this side of the international boundary line admit that American business has already felt the effects of the Canadian campaign, although probably not to the extent its promoters anticipated. In many lines Canadian imports of American goods have declined, but this is believed to be due, at least in part, to the adverse exchange rate itself, and not to the movement to correct that rate.

American business men who have given their views on the subject to the Canadian Press express the opinion that the campaign in Canada, like the adverse exchange rate itself, will be a purely temporary affair. When the excess that have operated to bring about the exchange conditions are removed, Canadian-American trade will, they say, flow back into its normal channels, which are too well established, and geographically inevitable to be abandoned.

The possibility of a restoration of the former business relations between Canada and Great Britain, to the detriment of American manufacturers, does not appear to be seriously considered here. It is argued, for one thing, that Great Britain will be unable to supply the Canadian demand for goods, as her factories are unable to take care of the domestic needs. The increase in Canadian imports from Great Britain is regarded here as normal trade readjustment following war conditions.

The result of the adverse exchange rate against Canada in the American market is seen in statistics of Canadian-American trade for the seven months ending at the close of January, which reveal a decline in purchases from the United States. As an indication of the present trend it may be expected that a substantial decrease will be reflected in the next report with a corresponding increase in Canadian importations from Great Britain.

According to the Monthly Summary of Foreign Commerce (Washington), Canada bought goods to the value of \$682,109,230 from the United States during the seven months ending January of this year, as against \$512,472,867 for the corresponding period ending January, 1919. Canada's sales to the United States for these periods were \$389,016,730 and \$292,490,855 respectively. Thus the excess of imports representing Canadian adverse balance of trade with the United States in the seven months ending January, 1920, was \$162,142,563 as against \$248,982,119 for the same period ending January, 1919, a reduction of about \$90,000,000.

In spite, however, of the shifting balance, Canadian goods are held still the second greatest buyer in the United States markets. Great Britain is an easy first, and France a close third. In the seven months ending January, 1920, Canada bought twice as much goods from the United States as the whole of South America.

Thirteen Years Chief of Moncton

George Rideout's Force Takes Second Place to None in the Maritime Provinces.

(Moncton Times) On May 3rd Chief Rideout rounded out his 13th successive year as head of the city force. On May 3rd, 1907, he arrived in the city from Fredericton and assumed control of the force of seven officers, who comprised the strength of the active end of the police department at that time. During his thirteen years as Chief of Police in Moncton he has seen a good many of his fellow chief constables in other Maritime Province cities and towns come and go. St. John had had in the last dozen years three or four chiefs, Halifax as many. Fredericton has experienced a number of changes, as well as Amherst and Sydney. While his attention was called to this fact Chief Rideout said that it was not because of any degree of worthiness of his own, but chiefly owing to the fact that the citizenship of Moncton were ever and at all times ready to come forward with such a large measure of assistance and co-operation toward the forces of law and order, that the path of duty was made much more easy to follow. Moncton today is not much like the Moncton of 13 years ago. The city's population has doubled in that time, and as for general appearance, it is only a fact to state that a visitor to the city at the present time, after a dozen years' absence would scarcely know the place. Moncton's police department is keeping pace with the growth and development of the city. The force of seven, which did duty thirteen years ago has now practically doubled and is the very near future, it is to be further increased to eighteen men. Further evidence that the force is keeping up with the spirit of the times, is furnished by the recent adoption of the eight hour day system of patrol duty. In the matter of efficiency and strict adherence to duty, Moncton's police force, takes second place to none, a position which, as long as the present Chief of Police remains in charge will not be relinquished.

NEW YORK MARKET MODERATELY ACTIVE

Early Improvement Was Ascribed to the Stronger Bank Position.

New York, May 10.—The stock market was moderately active and strong at the onset of today's dealings, scoring additional gains before noon, but lapsed into a dull and heavy tone long before the close.

Early improvement was generally ascribed to the stronger bank position disclosed by last Saturday's statement of the Clearing House Association and local Federal Reserve Bank.

As the session progressed, it became evident that trading again lacked the element of leadership, save for the operations of pools.

Traders were not in accord regarding latest aspects of the Mexican situation, this conflict of opinion finding reflection in the heaviness of Mexican oils, as against the relative strength of European issues, notably Royal Dutch, which made a new high record.

Oil dominated the day as a group, however, their activity being based upon favorable trade conditions. An advance of 1 1/2 cents per gallon was announced by one of the largest refiners, while producers in the Middle West ordered another upward revision of prices for crude and refined products.

The April tonnage report of the United States Steel Corporation, bringing the total of unfilled orders to the highest figure since August of 1917, failed to stimulate a demand for steel shares.

Bonds were irregular and featureless, aside from their earlier trend, due not so much to the strike, it was declared, as to a reaction in the trade.

Call money was freely offered at 7 1/2 cent, going to 8 on an unexpected large demand in the last hour, but selling at the lower quotation.
