MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

Assessments for the Current Year
Will be \$90,000.

The Council met on Tuesday evening, His Worship Mayor McDonald presiding. Members of Council present were, Cops, Lunan, Pinault, McKenzie, White, Alexander, Miller and Moores.

The minutes of the previous meeting were held over till next meeting. Communication from Isabel Fyfe re employment in Town Clerk's office was referred to Town Clerk.

Communication from the Building Inspector regarding Planing Mill on Landsdowne Street was referred to Town Solicitors to take action if necessary.

Letter from Board of School Trustees requesting the town to assess the sum of \$820 for school purposes was placed on file.

Petition from Miss E. B. Underhill for a permit to conduct a restaurant on O'Leary Street was referred to Police and License Committee.

Comm. Lunan submitted report of the Police and License Com. recommending that a trucking license be granted to Mrs. Jellitt in accordance with the by-laws. That a Junk dealer's license be granted to Wm. Ross on payment of \$25.00 and that rain capes be provided for the Police officers.

Report received and adopted. Comm. Alexander submitted report of the Water and Sewerage Com. recommending payment of accounts totalling \$195.82, and Comm. Pinault from the Public Property and Streets Com., recommending payment of accounts totalling \$250.50, both of which were received and adopted.

Comm. Lunan from the Electric Light Com. introduced a report of the new Electric Power Commission, who gave his expert opinion on the site for the building. His opinion was that the original location should be retained, as to move the site further would entail a larger expenditure than was at first estimated, and further the plans which were now on the way from the old country were drawn for the original site, viz. that abutting on Shives wharf.

After listening to the remarks of this gentleman it was felt that the proposed change could not be done under present circumstances, and it was moved, seconded and carried, "That the Power House be erected on the east side of Shives' wharf and abutting thereto."

The Council then went into Committee of the whole regarding assessments. The finding of the committee was as follows:

Street Lighting 1250
Schools 6200
Fire Protection 4000
Relief of Poor 1000
Board of Health 500
Police Force 8800
Salaries and Contingencies 6200
Sinking Fund 1000

Total \$30,000
It was pointed out that this amount was really the lowest figure that could be taken, in fact, perhaps too low, and the assessment was really small, as the sum of \$10,000 was taken up at one step to pay back overdrafts in the bank, which makes the assessment for the current year only \$14,000.
Council then adjourned.

FIELD CROPS IN CANADA

Ottawa, June 10.—A bulletin of the census and statistics office today states that the season this year has been favorable for field crops in all parts of Canada, and excellent reports have been received from all the provinces. The lowest percentage of condition is made for fall wheat, which suffered from inadequate protection in the winter months, and also to some extent from spring frosts. The areas of fall wheat are greater than last year by 4.50 per cent and of spring wheat by 13.70 per cent. The total area in wheat is 10,503,400 acres, as compared with 9,294,800 in 1910 and 7,750,400 acres in 1909. The per cent condition of fall wheat at the end of May was 80.63, and of spring wheat 96.69. The area in oats is 10,279,800 acres and its condition 94.76, as compared with 9,864,100 acres and 93.95 per cent condition last year. Barley and rye each show a small decrease in area, but the condition is higher than at the same period last year. Slight decreases are also reported for areas of peas, mixed grains, and hay and clover, with per cent condition of over 90. Hay and clover have a reported condition of 91.45 for the Dominion, being practically 100 in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. The area of the field crops named is 32,051,500 acres for 1911, compared with 30,554,200 acres for 1910 and 28,194,900 acres for 1909. In the provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta the area in wheat, oats and barley was 3,491,413 acres in 1900, 6,009,389 acres in 1905, 11,952,000 acres in 1909, and 13,809,300 acres in 1910, and it is 15,355,500 acres this year. The increase of these crops from 1900 to 1911 was 2,663,699 acres in Manitoba, 7,364,315 acres in Saskatchewan and 1,835,073 acres in Alberta.—Archibald Blue, Chief Officer.

CORONATION DAY AT CAMPBELLTON

Big Church Function the Main Feature.—Baseball and Sports.

To take part in the Coronation festivities here next Thursday, a large number of visitors are expected to be in town. An excursion train will leave St. Leonard's at 7.30 a. m. on Thursday morning and it is expected that between 1200, and 1500 will take advantage of the ride over the International Railway. View our town arising from the ruins of last summer, and get a glimpse of the magnificent scenery of the Bay of Chaleur.

After the baseball game which takes place in the afternoon, a very interesting and impressive ceremony will take place on the Catholic church grounds, that of blessing their new bell. Bishop Barry of Chatham will perform the ceremony assisted by some 30 or 40 of the clergy from Madawaska Co. and neighbouring parishes and appropriate addresses will be delivered in both languages.

On the new Catholic church grounds (lately known as Patterson's property) meals will be served to the excursionists and other visitors from 11 a. m. Supper will be served at 4 p. m.

Meal tickets may be procured on the excursion train or at the grounds and the visitors will embark on their homeward journey somewhere near eight o'clock.

BELL-RINGER TO MILLIONAIRE

Quebec Man Left an Estate Valued at Two Million Dollars.

Cranby, Que., June 10—From bell-ringer to millionaire might be a suitable title for a romance written around the career of S. H. C. Miner, who died here yesterday, for it is estimated that the estate of the man who started life as a church caretaker at a few pennies a week, is valued at \$2,000,000. He was founder of the Consolidated Rubber Company, interested in western mines, founder of the Granby Smelter Company, vice-president of the Eastern Townships Bank, director of the Brophy Parsons and Rodden Company, a pioneer in many fields of industry and a unique figure in the eastern townships. As an instance of many interests, while discussing with a Granby business man, he showed him a list of small things in which he was interested, from \$1,000 to \$7,000 or \$8,000. There must have been forty items on this list, which he alluded to as "hen feed."

MAKING SAWDUST VALUABLE

The processes for making use of sawdust that have been worked out in France and Norway in the past few years have proved of immense value to these countries. The making of money out of sawdust not only produces wealth from the material, but keeps it out of the streams and thus adds nearly one hundred per cent to the chances for fish doing well in the fresh waters and furnishing more economical food for the people.

The French have perfected a process that extracts 27 gallons of high grade alcohol from a ton of sawdust, 42 pounds of acetic acid and leaves enough wood to make briquets that are sold for about \$10 a ton because they are extra fine for making fires. All that pays a large profit for handling the sawdust, and there is no waste material to throw into streams.

In Norway they wood flour of the sawdust and sell it for \$12 a ton to be used in various industries, but not for mixing up bread. These are economies that work both ways for the benefit of the population, and they mean something besides theories to talk about.

The caisson for the Quebec bridge, which was damaged last year while being placed in position, and has been subsequently repaired in the graving dock, was floated on Saturday and taken to the bridge site to be again placed in position.







LAUNCH OF NEW STEAMER SAGUENAY ON THE CLYDE



Thirty years ago a little bit of a steamer built up at Chicoutima was considered good enough for the traffic that then offered on the far-famed scenic Saguenay route, as it has come to be known. To-day, the best that the noted shipyards of the Clyde can turn out is none too good for the class of travel that has been attracted by the beauties of the scenery and historic interest that attaches to a trip in that direction.

Travellers from all parts of the world now flock during the summer season to view the beauties of the scenery down the Lower St. Lawrence and up the Saguenay, and it has been found necessary by the Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Company to put on that route the finest steamer obtainable. The new steamer, Saguenay, which was recently launched on the Clyde, and will cross the Atlantic in June under her own

steam, attracted considerable attention at Glasgow. It has been arranged that the new steamer will ply between Montreal and the Saguenay. Heretofore all the Saguenay boats ended their trips at Quebec, and passengers from up the river were required to transfer from the Montreal boat in order to continue the journey. This will be obviated by running the new boat through from Montreal, making two round trips a week.

THE FUN OF FISHING

Fishing Instinct Born in a Man; Cannot be Acquired.

"What fun do you find in fishing?" The question is one which is frequently asked of the fisherman, says an exchange. No fisherman can answer it to the satisfaction of any person who asks it. The man who asks it places himself without the pale of those who fish. He cannot understand the promptings of the fisherman's heart, and he probably never will learn.

There is a question whether or not the fishing habit may be acquired—it seems more likely that every man who fishes with keen enjoyment has the fishing instinct born within him.

Those who do not belong to the great Brotherhood of Gentle Anglers cannot understand why a man should sit patiently along the shore with his line dangling in the water, cannot understand why he will tire himself out following the windings of a trout brook through the woods.

To the man who loves to fish there is nothing remarkable about this. To the man who loves to fish, every minute spent on lake or stream is golden. Possibly he may catch no fish—possibly he may not even get a nibble, yet the true fisherman will tell you that all the time his line is in the water joy sings in his heart.

The true fisherman will tell you that not all the fun in fishing is to catch fish. Your fisherman is an apostle of patience and perseverance! The breeze which ripples the water gives him pleasure, the swallows skimming over the surface pleases him, the blue sky, the white clouds, the evergreen and butterflies, and the eddies made by the canoe paddle, all contribute to his day of pleasure.

To the fisherman the question, What fun do you find in fishing? must be just as ridiculous as the

fisherman seems to be to the man who asks the question. Neither one understands the other, nor can either one explain. The man who loves to fish and the man who cares nothing about it belong to different breeds of cats—that's all.

MEXICO CITY SHAKEN

Mexico City, June 7—51 men, mostly soldiers and including one chinese, and 12 women were killed, 75 persons wounded and property worth \$100,000 destroyed today by an earthquake here.

Two of the capital's old churches and the national palace snow effects of the shock. Long cracks appeared in all of them. In the palace a keystone in one of the arches was thrown almost out. The two churches are Santo Domingo and La Profesa, the latter in San Francisco street. This church had been cracked by other earthquakes. This morning the cracks were widened and the building was ordered closed.

The disturbance was vacillating and almost free from trepidatory motion. More than half the dead accounted for were soldiers. They were caught beneath the falling walls of the artillery barracks in San Cosma, near the Mexican central station.

Mexico City, June 9—Greatly alarmed over the reports filtering into the city from various sources that more than a thousand persons were killed, twice that number injured and scores of villages destroyed by Wednesday's earthquake, the government officials today took steps to investigate and aid the sufferers.

The centre of the disturbance is said to be the volcano Colima, near the Pacific coast. Extinct for years it is now reported in violent eruption. In Zapotlan, a large portion of the city was destroyed and many reported killed and injured. Tonila, Platanar, San Andres and the surrounding country are reported practically wiped out, with many deaths.

The area of destruction, according to the best advices available is rectangular, with the northern boundary less than fifty miles from this city and the southern part taking in the lower part of Guerrero.

A strange feature of the activity of the earthquake was that its greatest severity seemed to be felt in rings around the Colima volcano between which were belts that that were almost immune from damage. The immediate vicinity of the volcano suffered heavily after which there was a zone fifty miles wide which was unharmed. Then came another damaged section.

TW J GOVERNMENTS TO CONFER

In Regard to Buildin' of St. John Val Ra road.

Ottawa June 9—Dr. Pugsley writes today to acting Premier Fleming of N. B. that as Mr. Fleming expresses the willingness of his government to conform to the plan, which has been approved by parliament, of building the line from St. John to Grand Falls, to be operated as part of the Intercolonial system, he should be glad to arrange for a conference between a committee of the provincial government, the minister of railways and himself at as early a date as possible.
