FRENCH MAY USE

POISON GAS IN WAR

Turpinite is a More Deadly Gas Than What the Germans Are Now Using

(Popular Science Magazine.)
The rumor in circulation since the eginning of the war to the effect that the French were in possession of a secret explosive capable of destroying life on a scale not heretofore dreamed life on a scale not beretofore dreamed of, by the production of deadly asphyxiating gases, has been confirmed by the French military authorities. This explosive is called turpinite, and is the discovery of M. Eugene Turpin, the inventor of melinite. It has already been used in a limited way and the statement is now made that preparations have been completed for using it on a large scale in the com-

When the shell explodes the gases caused by the explosion spread over the ground in a circle having a diameter of about 100 yards. The gases produce paralysis of some of the vital organs of the body, with the result that every living thing within this circle is killed instantly and painlessly and so far as is known there is no defense against nor antidote for the action of these gases. If the turpinite does all that is claimed for it, trenches will furnish practically no defence against it. The gases from a shell exagainst it. The gases from a shell ex-ploding within fifty yards of the trench will simply settle into the trench and kill the men sheltered in it. Shrapnel-proof and bomb-proof covers will be of little use, for the gases in their deadly work will find their way through the smallest opening.







As an old Shigawake, P. Q., boy and a keen reader of your valuable paper, it is with great pleasure I enclose this leaflet containing the official version of the Canadians great fight. Our company of about 100 men, (3rd Grenade Co.) and No. 3 Company Canadian Engineers, were the first to be attacked by the Germans on that memorable Thursday afternoon, and we in all about 250 men by over an hours rapid fire from behind a ledge, forced the Germans to halt and dig themselves in, and held them there till reinforcements in the shape of the Royal Montreal Regt. (14th Batt.) arrived. Our orders were "hold the ledge at all costs" and I don't think a single man ever expected to get out alive. I shall never forget the charge at night and the awful nightmare of the following week, we lost all count of days and nights. I'll drop you a line later on if you like, with a few personal experiences which may be of interest to you. But I can tell you candidly Hell was a pink test to that. With all good wishes. One who was through it.




