## INDUCTION SERVICE ON FRIDAY EVENING

Rev. Hugh Miller of Glace Bay Becomes Pastor of St. Andrew's Church Here

Last Friday evening a large congregation assembled in St. Andrew's Church on the occasion of the induction of Rev. Hugh Miller to the vacant pastorate. Rev. J. R. Miller of Matapedia, Interim Moderator of Session presided. Rev. W. McN. Matthews of Bathurst preached. Rev. W. G. Firth of Tide Head addressed the minister and Rev. J. S. McArthur of Newcastle addressed the people. At the close of the service a reception was held in the hall of the church, where the new minister was introduced to his people. A short program was carried out and ice cream and cake served by the ladies.

St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church has been vacant nearly a year, following the removal to Moncton of the Rev. T. P. Drumm, and much satisfaction is expressed by the congregation at having a minister of their own. Notwithstanding the difficulties of procuring supply, the church has been open every Sunday with but few exceptions.

Rev. Hugh Miller, who has been four years in Glace Bay, comes to Campbellton with a high recommendation of his scholarly attainments, his power as a preacher, and his faithfulness as a pastor, and it is confidently felt that the work in St. Andrew's, which has been slightly interrupted, will now go on with increased vigour.

The new minister preached on Sunday morning and evening to large congregations and made a splendid impression on the people.

Mr. Miller will not occupy the manse yet for a few weeks, until the return of Mrs. Miller, who is visiting at her home, and has taken rooms at Mrs. J. C. Ferguson.

## MONTHLY MEETING OF WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

Fifty Dollars is Voted for Another Cot in the Canadian Hospital at Le Touquet

The regular monthly meeting of the Women's Institute was held on Tuesday evening, Mrs. A. A. Andrew, president in the chair. Among other matters dealt with, the sum of fifty dollars was voted for the support of another cot in the hospital at Le Touquet, France, and twenty-five dollars for hospital supplies. This makes the fourth cot that the ladies of Campbellton have established in this hospital.

Dear Miss DeCorrevont:—

In a letter received yesterday from Mrs. E. Atherton Smith of St. John, I received one hundred dollars (\$100.00) to provide two beds in New Brunswick ward and I am placing a card over the beds stating they are furnished by the Women's Institute of Campbellton.

I wish to thank all the women of your Institute for this donation, which will be appreciated by every Canadian who comes to our Hospital as well as those who visit our institution and see that you are helping us.

We have a splendid hospital on the coast of France, now fully equipped with 600 beds. We will likely have to enlarge it still further if this terrible war still continues. Two weeks ago we had over 700 patients at one time and if we have to enlarge, it will be by adding more tents.

I am sure every Canadian was horrified at the terrible casualties in our First Canadian Contingent at Ypres on April 22nd to 25th. We all felt very blue here. In fact we never realized how terrible the war was until we had those we knew so well coming into our wards.

During the winter we took of thousands of British soldiers and wondered at their bravery, but I can assure you that the Canadian boys were equally as brave as their British comrades. They received great praise, but not greater than they deserved.

## BOARD OF TRADE REGULAR MEETING

Steamer and Grist Mill Matters Up and Referred to Committees

A meeting of the Board of Trade was held Wednesday evening, President Blackhall presiding. A large amount of routine business was transacted.

The freight tariff of the Campbellton & Gaspe S. S. Co. was up for discussion. It was shown that the rate was adverse to Campbellton, it being the same from Campbellton to Gaspe as from Montreal to Gaspe, and in some cases further up the bay. In one instance, cement, the rate is 15 cents from Montreal to Campbellton, while from Campbellton to Gaspe the rate is 25 cents.

This greatly interferes with business between this port and Gaspe points. The company last year complained that they could get little business from this port, and the cause is apparent, if the discrimination as shown above exists in all lines.

It was the general opinion that the service this year is a great improvement over last season.

The matter of excessive charges for landing freight at points where there are no wharves, and of storage was also taken up.

The entire matter was left with a committee composed of President Blackhall, and Messrs. Harquail and Comeau.

The matter of a grist mill was discussed and this matter was also referred to a committee composed of D. A. Stewart, M. P. P., Dr. Murray and E. A. LeGallais, who were asked to report at an early date. It was stated that a very large quantity of wheat had been sown this year in Restigouche, and a mill was necessary to care for this product.

Montreal, Que., June 23.—The Steamer Caledonia, which sailed from St. John, N. B., with 26th Battalion and other Maritime Province units on board, arrived in Plymouth to-day.

## CANADIANS AGAIN SAVE SITUATION

Tackled the German Forces on Their Flank and Rescued the British

Northern France.—Terrific fighting continues in the Arras-Pestubert sector, and the Germans are putting up an amazing defence, using such large bodies of troops that in some sections of the line they outnumber the Allies.

Along the British front the Canadians are still taking their full share in the fighting, which in many places has been hand-to-hand. Over all there is a never-ceasing day and night artillery duel.

The last few days of the conflict have been the fiercest as regards the British forces since Ypres.

A splendid tale of heroism of the First Brigade comes to us today. After the initial charge, which appeared to be a complete success and carried part of the British line into the reserve trenches of the enemy and through two fields of barbed wire which had been completely smashed by our heavy guns, the earth in our rear seemed to open up and hundreds of German engineers with coils of a new type of barbed wire which scarcely needed fixing, backed by hundreds of the enemy with machine guns, appeared as if by magic.

They had been concealed in mammoth caves dug under the brick fields in which the fighting was taking place. Two British regiments found themselves caught under a terrific fire from front and rear, and commenced what appeared to be the hopeless task of fighting their way back against an enfilading fire and through the new entanglements.

The First Canadian Brigade, consisting of the Strathcona, the Royal Canadian Dragoons, and the King Edward Horse found themselves where the new wire ended. Some commanding officer, quick to seize the position, faced the men round a right angle, charged from behind the wire and caught the German in turn on their flank, keeping them busy until British reinforcements came up and the remnants of the regiments were rescued.

The First Brigade and the Strathconas lost heavily in this engagement, the casualty list of officers particularly being large, including two or three men of high rank, but, as at Ypres, according to my informant, they "saved the situation."

London, June 24th.—British cruiser Roxburgh torpedoed in North Sea Sunday. Damage not serious.

French at Dardanelles took first line of trenches at once bound.

Robert Muller, German spy was shot at tower of London, Wednesday.

London, June 24th.—Times military correspondent declares that neither Great Britain nor Russia has yet been able to put their full strength into field for identical reason, the shortage of ammunition. Owing to this it may be necessary to postpone till spring the final settlement with Teutonic power.

Rome, June 24th.—Official—Along the entire front has been artillery duel of heavy and medium calibre. These desperate attacks against positions repulsed.

## RECRUITING STILL UP TO THE MARK

Fifty Six Men Have so Far Joined for the 55th Battalion Here Now in Sussex Camp

Recruiting for the 55th Battalion still keeps up in good shape here. During the past week Lieut. O. J. Larzen has signed up twelve men, six of whom are now in Sussex. Two were sent down on Saturday and four on Tuesday.

Tomorrow morning other four will entrain for the organization centre, and two men S. Petrie and F. Durand will remain over the week end to assist Lt. Larzen in recruiting. So far 56 men have enrolled for this battalion and the honor of Campbellton as a recruiting centre is being well maintained.

## COMPULSION WILL NOT BE NECESSARY

Regulation of Strikes and Lockouts Prejudicial to National Interests

London, June 21st.—The Government appears to have abandoned, at least for the present, any idea of resorting to compulsion in the organization of industries for the production of munitions of war. David Lloyd George, the Minister of Munitions, when he first broached the idea of compulsion in public, was vigorously attacked by Radicals and Laborites, inside and outside of Parliament, who are strongly opposed to compulsion either in recruiting for the army or for industrial purposes, urging that such methods would produce in Great Britain the alleged evils seen in the German military system.

Mr. Lloyd George's conferences with the trade union leaders has resulted in an agreement upon a bill which will be introduced in the House of Commons next week and passed with all possible speed. This bill will give the Government power to prohibit strikes or lockouts prejudicial to the national interest in controlled factories, and provide that all questions of wages and conditions of employment be settled by a specially appointed tribunal.

The bill contains no provisions for compulsion or even compulsory registration by the male population, but will enable the opening of rolls of volunteers who are prepared to work in any factory controlled by the Government for a period of six months. In all such controlled establishments producing munitions all restrictive rules and the practices of the trades unions will be suspended, and the profits of the employers limited.

He announced in Parliament, on behalf of the Government, that it was intended to impose a special tax on war profits, and that a measure with this object in view was being considered. Such a measure has long been expected, as it has been realized that the Government could not demand sacrifices from the workers without making similar demands on firms producing war materials. As far as is known the employers generally are not offering open resistance to this plan, which probably will form part of the first budget of the new Chancellor of the Exchequer, Reginald McKenna.

SECTION MAN KILLED ON I. C. R. TUESDAY

William Young of Newcastle Struck by Train and Killed Near Passmore, N. B.

Newcastle, N. B., June 22.—A shocking fatality occurred this morning near Passmore on the main line of the Intercolonial, when William Young, aged fifty, of Newcastle lost his life.

Young was employed as a section-man, and in company with Frank Hare was proceeding along the line on a hand car, when a north bound train came around the curve behind them. Both jumped from the car and endeavored to get the car from the track, but Hare, seeing the task was impossible, scrambled by the side of the bank and called Young to do the same. Evidently he did not hear his companion, for he made no attempt to save himself until too late, and was struck by the on-coming train and instantly killed. The deceased was married and had a family.

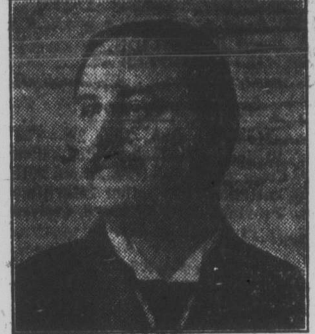

MR. J. R. BRUCE HAS PASSED AWAY

Former Well-known I.C.R. Official Died at His Home in Shediac Cape

Moncton, June 21st.—Mr. Joseph Robert Bruce, formerly Chief Auditor of the I.C.R., and one of the best known and most popular citizens of Moncton passed away at his home, at Shediac Cape at 5.30 o'clock this (Monday) morning. The deceased had been in failing health for the past three months, following a severe attack of la grippe. His case has been considered serious for the past ten days.

Mr. Bruce is survived by his wife, who was formerly Miss Margaret S. Wilson, daughter of Mr. Wm. Alex. Wilson, of Derby, one daughter Jean, now Mrs. Fred Condon, of Campbellton, and three sons, William W. of the Bank of Montreal staff, St. John, Dr. James of Sydney, N. S., and Joseph R. of the Royal Bank, New York. He also leaves one sister, Mrs. Barclay, of Ancaster, Ont. All his family were at his bedside when Mr. Bruce passed away.

The funeral will take place on Wednesday. The body will come to Moncton and be transferred to the Ocean Limited, northbound. Interment will be at Derby.

FRENCH MAY USE POISON GAS IN WAR

Turpentine is a More Deadly Gas Than What the Germans Are Now Using

(Popular Science Magazine.)

The rumor in circulation since the beginning of the war to the effect that the French were in possession of a secret explosive capable of destroying life on a scale not heretofore dreamed of, by the production of deadly asphyxiating gases, has been confirmed by the French military authorities. This explosive is called turpentine, and is the discovery of M. Eugene Turpin, the inventor of melinite. It has already been used in a limited way and the statement is now made that preparations have been completed for using it on a large scale in the coming operations against the Germans.

At the opening of the war the effects of exploding turpentine were familiar to the experimenters working with it in the laboratory. It could only be exploded by vibration and at that time there seemed no safe way of firing it from a gun, for the reason that the vibration caused by the discharge of the projectile was likely to explode it before it had got clear of the gun. With a new fieldpiece invented in December it is possible to fire shells charged with turpentine without danger to the firing party, and it is reported that the French and British arsenals have been busy day and night since then making the shells and the guns for firing them.

When the shell explodes the gases caused by the explosion spread over the ground in a circle having a diameter of about 100 yards. The gases produce paralysis of some of the vital organs of the body, with the result that every living thing within this circle is killed instantly and painlessly and so far as is known there is no defense against nor antidote for the action of these gases. If the turpentine does all that is claimed for it, trenches will furnish practically no defence against it. The gases from a shell exploding within fifty yards of the trench will simply settle into the trench and kill the men sheltered in it. Shrapnel-proof and bomb-proof covers will be of little use, for the gases in their deadly work will find their way through the smallest opening.

GOVERNOR GENERAL INSPECTS 55TH BATT.

Sussex Donned Holiday Attire in Honor of Distinguished Visitor

His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught arrived in Sussex at 10 o'clock Saturday morning in a special train in charge of conductor Trueman. Assistant Superintendent W. A. Fitch was on board to supervise the moving of the train.

The special, which was composed of four C. P. R. cars arrived at Petitcodiac Friday night at midnight, and was sidetracked there until next morning. The special did not pull into Sussex depot, much to the disappointment of the large crowd which had assembled to greet the distinguished visitor, but deposited its passengers at the military camp siding.

The Governor General was accompanied by Lt. Col. E. A. Stanton, military secretary, and Major A. A. Duff, Gordon Highlanders, A. D. C., and General Rutherford of Halifax, officer commanding the Sixth Division. The party at once proceeded to the parade ground of the military camp where His Royal Highness was received by a royal salute by the 55th Battalion.

The Governor General spent considerable time inspecting the 55th, at the conclusion of which he heartily complimented the officers and men on their efficiency.

After lunch at the officers' mess the royal party made a tour of the town and vicinity in autos. The weather was beautiful and Sussex presented a gay holiday appearance, the stores and dwellings all being decorated with flags and bunting. Many strangers were in town during the day.

## INTERESTING LETTERS FROM THE FRONT

Campbellton Boy Crawls Along  
Ground and Gets the Range  
of German Guns

We have been requested to publish the following letter from Oliver Dewar, which will be found most interesting to Campbellton people.

Ten miles from Nowhere,  
June 3rd, 1915.

My Dear Mother:  
I still receive letters from you and father and I love to hear from home, I have only received one Graphic since I left England, hope to get the others later, I miss them very much. I see that a good number from Campbellton are coming with the Third Contingent. I have never heard, but I expect the 26th Battalion has left long ago. The C'ton. boys of the 12th are badly scattered, Jim Fraser, Louis Gagne and Ernest Gynand are the only ones with me. I see the others sometimes. Leslie has been quite near me all the time, but I have not seen him for two weeks, we never seem to be out of the trenches at the same time.

We got back from the trenches this morning, had a long march, got here both tired and hungry. They had four or five big cans of hot tea waiting for us and all the bread, butter and cold bacon we could eat, think you can guess how much of it I did eat. I had not shaved, washed my face or had my boots off for ten days, glad you did not see what I looked like. Talk about shaving and cleaning up today, we all had a shower bath and a change of clothes from the skin out. I guess it feels some better.

Jim Fraser has turned out to be a very brave boy. If he had been killed or badly wounded there would have been very much about it, but as he is well and feeling fine, so very few will hear what he has done. But I would like you to tell some of his friends in Campbellton that I am proud of him, and I know they would be if they knew that he went with another fellow a few feet from the German trench and found out where they were and what they were doing. We were in our front line, the Germans were in a low place and although we heard them putting up barb wire entanglement we could not tell just where they were, our officer asked for two volunteers, and J. B. Fraser was the first to say he would go and find out. The German big guns were shelling all the time, besides there were lots of them with rifles watching for us to make a move, but it was dark, so Jim and his chum got very near to them, they pulled themselves along the ground and the grass was long and there was lots of old buildings to get the range by, and when they had found out just where they were they came back and told the officer, he sent word to our artillery and in a few minutes there were no Germans there, think some of them were in a warmer place than France, and that is warm enough just now.

We may be here for a few days, and if the other battalions come out I hope to see Leslie and the other Campbellton boys. We are not having a bad time here, but I don't care how soon this war is over and we get back home again. They are feeding us and using as much better in every way than they did on Salisbury Plain last fall.

Apart from the War I don't like France or Belgium so well as England, don't think you would like it, it is good farming country but the ground is low and the air close.

While I was in England I saw some nice cities and I got acquainted with some nice people, but I still say as I said before that there is no place that I have seen better than Canada, that Canadian girls are second to none and there is no place like home, would like to shove my legs under our table to-night and holler, Mother bring me more tea. With best love to all, I am,

We have also received an interesting letter and enclosure giving full details of the work of the Canadian troops. This letter from Q. M. Sergeant R. S. Young of Shigawake now serving with the 3rd Brigade Grenade Coy.

Somewhere in France,  
June 5th, 1915.

Dear Sir:  
As an old Shigawake, P. Q., boy and a keen reader of your valuable paper, it is with great pleasure I enclose this leaflet containing the official version of the Canadians great fight. Our company of about 100 men, (3rd Grenade Coy.) and No. 3 Company Canadian Engineers, were the first to be attacked by the Germans on that memorable Thursday afternoon, and we in all about 250 men by over an hour's rapid fire from behind a ledge, forced the Germans to halt and dig themselves in, and held them there till reinforcements in the shape of the Royal Montreal Regt. (14th Batt.) arrived. Our orders were "hold the ledge at all costs" and I don't think a single man ever expected to get out alive. I shall never forget the charge at night and the awful nightmare of the following week, we lost all count of days and nights. I'll drop you a line later on if you like, with a few personal experiences which may be of interest to you. But I can tell you candidly Hell was a pink tea to that. With all good wishes. One who was through it.

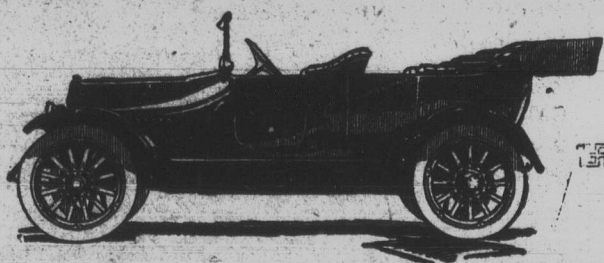

# MR. RICHARD, THE FOUNDER OF ROGERSVILLE, DEAD

Friend and Pioneer Will be Greatly  
Mourned on North Shore.—Held  
Rank of Domestic Prelate

(From the Gloucester Northern Light)  
After an illness lasting more than a  
year, the death of a noted priest, Mon-  
signor Marcel S. Richard, domestic  
prelate, occurred Friday at his home in  
Rogersville, Northumberland county  
(N. B.), and the tidings brought regret  
to a great many friends. The rever-  
end clergyman returned only about a  
week ago from Quebec, where he had  
undergone treatment. His death has  
been expected for some time past,  
though he held up bravely and patient-  
ly to the last.

Enjoying the esteem and respect of  
his parishioners, having the distinc-  
tion and successful labors in the wel-  
fare of the church, Mr. Richard will  
be long remembered in the Chatham  
diocese. To him belongs the credit of  
founding the thriving village of Rog-  
ersville. When he left St. Louis, Kent  
county, about 1855, after fifteen years  
of progress and success as parish  
priest, he took with him a band of  
pioneers and out of the wilder-  
ness they established a community.  
His little settlement of Rogersville  
enjoyed a rapid growth. There he has  
spent the last thirty years of his life,  
promoting the spiritual and education-  
al welfare of his people, and striving  
win souls to God in his parsonage in  
pretty little church he built, St.  
de Sales. He was particularly  
interested in colonization and educa-  
tion. While at St. Louis, where he  
was sixty-five years ago, he es-  
tablished a college and convent. Those  
former are not now in use, the  
latter is still flourishing.

Rogersville he was instrumental  
in founding four religious communities  
there, including the Trappist  
nuns, who have helped greatly in  
the development not only of the relig-  
ious phase of life there, but also in the  
study of agriculture among the peo-  
ple. Mr. Richard was educated in  
France, and was ordained to the  
priesthood in 1860. He soon came to  
be a leader of men, and

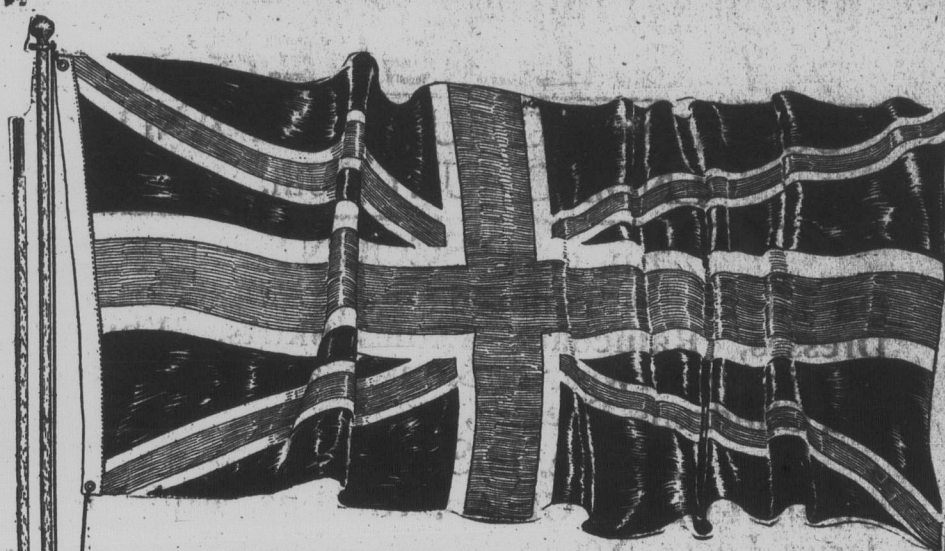

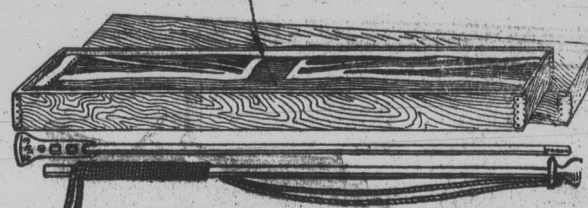

## IN MEMORY OF OUR CANADIANS

The Great St. Paul's Cathedral Ser-

vice in London

By ARTHUR MACHEN

"Are ye here? ... Are ye here? ...

Are ye here?"

Thus the bugle cried last night through

the hollow spaces of the holy

house. It rang, clamant, against the

vast vault of the dome, it went pierc-

ing and shrilling down all the shadowy

aisles; its voice went up to the altar

and to the image of the Crucified. And

I can well imagine that echoes of that

summons went down into the dark

places of the crypt and sang there

among the graves to noble ears.

"Are ye here?" That clear, reiterated

voice that shrilled up even to the

cross above the dome must surely have

descended and descended the ears of

the glorious dead. Nelson heard those

notes, and Wellington also, and Rob-

erts. And the Canadians whose bod-

ies lie in Flanders heard the bugles

calling to them. For it was at St.

Paul's Cathedral; and the bugles were

playing the Last Post at the

memorial service for the Canadian

soldiers who have fallen in the war.

Early in the evening a vast

mass of people filled the church from

the choir gates to the western doors.

The dusk and the twilight gathered

slowly, mournfully; the piers and

arches glimmered in the growing

shadows. But high in the hollow of

the dome the last glory of the setting

sun shone on the statue of a white,

triumphant saint. So a dying sun

may have shone of the waste levels of

Flanders when the smoke of the battle

and the poison-clouds had passed

away; and the Canadians looked on one

another; and looked on their dead.

Cardinal Mercier, uttering an authen-

tic message, has nobly said that they

who die on the battlefield fighting

against hell's legions, thereby

blot out all his sins and receive the

joys of paradise. And so the sun

shone on the Flanders field and on the

dead heroes who lay there as it shone

on the white victorious saint who looks

down from the dome of St. Paul's

Cathedral.

I say 'the Canadians more than six

months ago on Salisbury Plain. There

were thirty thousand of them, a great

army that the British force which

fought at Waterloo, and yet on that

vast wild place one had to search for

their camps. The billows of the Plain

roll far and wide; Stonehenge, which

is still on the plain, was beyond the

horizon; the tents of the thirty

thousand were but a few white dots

here and there. The Canadians, I

think, were amazed by many things,

and yet they felt at home on the Plain.

One of them told me that he could

not find in the city of Calgary was "Just

beyond, over there."
