
## THE EDITOR PASSED AWAY ON WEDNESDAY, JUNE 18

The Death of Fred. H. Stevens, Editor and President of The Observer, Comes as a Great Shock ---Interesting Details of His Life, Death and Burial

That this outside recognition was not mere fulsome flattery is proved by the known but unadvertised fact that at different times he had rejected Jucrative offers to assume charge of larger newspaper enterprises in larger centres of population.

His interest in all things relating to the advancement and well-being of his own town had become proverbial in a locality where home talent probably ranks lower than in any other town on the continent. 





## Here and There

Although it is only 18 years ago that Alberta became a province, its population has increased fourfold, while the grain yield has increased twentyfold. Even at the present low prices, the total agricultural products of Alberta in 1923 were worth \$223,000,000.

The railways of Canada up to the end of last April earned \$6,000,000 more than they did for the corresponding period in 1923. This favorable result is due entirely to the fact that the people have been doing more business. All authorities are agreed that such a condition means growing trade.

Nearly 68,000 bushels of high class seed were handled at the Alberta government seed-cleaning plant during the past season. A total of 22,823 bushels of Marquis wheat seed was handled, 3,160 bushels of ruby wheat, 23,073 bushels of Victory oats, 17,862 bushels of Banner oats, and 684 bushels of Bark's Barley.

Three prizes for anglers at the bungalow camps on French River, Nipigon River, and the Lake of the Woods, have been offered to Canadian fishermen by the Canadian Pacific Railway. The trophies are silver replicas of the bass and the trout, and a wonderful reproduction of the head of a fighting muscalonge.

Among the speakers to address the great convention of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World at London, England, to be held July 14-17, will be E. W. Beatty, K.C., Chairman and President of the Canadian Pacific Railway, Mr. Beatty will speak on July 17, and has chosen as his theme "Building an Empire with Advertising."

Canada's national wealth in 1921
was \$22,195,000,000, according to
a report just issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. In
the tabulation, agricultural wealth
comes first with \$7,982,871,126,
nearly 36 per cent of the total and
about \$908 per head of population. The Western provinces lead,
the Yukon topping the list with
\$4,058. The first in absolute
wealth was Ontario, to which is
credited the sum of \$7,358,000,000,
or thirty-three per cent of the Dominion total.

Shipping in and out of the port of Vancouver, B.C., for the calendar year 1923, showed an increase in all departments, according to the annual report of the Board of Harbor Commissioners. Over \$133,000,000 worth of goods were exported, an increase of \$30,000,000 over the value of the 1922 exports, while the imports totalled \$224,000,000, an increase of \$13,000,000 over the 1922 figures. Vessels numbering 19,608, representing a total of 8,427,683 net tons, entered and left the port in 1923, an increase over 1922 of 2,959 ships and 792,289 tons.

The party will visit the battle-fields of France and Beigium, seeing most important points in those countries, including Brussels and Paris and will be received by King Albert. Later, they will tour England and Scotland and are to be presented to the King and Queen at Buckingham Palace on Dominion Day. Returning op the Canadian Pacific steamship "Montlaurier," they will visit Belfast, where Sir Robert Baird, head of the Belfast Telegraph, will entertain them. They dock at Quebec on August 4th.

The Minister of Lands has announced that a Dutch organization has offered to purchase 200,000 acres of land in the Stuart Lake district, British Columbia, for the purpose of colonization by Dutch agriculturists.

The Canadian Pacific is now perfecting plans to aid in the development of the mining industry of Ontario, by placing car ferries on Lake Temiskaming. These ferries will ply between South Lorrain and Ville Marie, and between New Liskeard, Haileybury and other Ontario points, and the Quebec port.

Major-General MacBrien, chief of staff of the Department of National Defence, Ottawa, addressing the members of the Canadian Club at London recently, announced that it is probable that the Canadian Permanent Force of Militia will be established by Order-in-Council on April 1.

### Here and There

A steady increase in the volume of wheat exports from Canada is noted in the monthly statement just issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. In April, 1924, 6,085,465 bushels in all were exported, as against 5,143,304 in April, 1922.

It is anticipated that hundreds and thousands of visitors to the beautiful Annapolis Valley, Nova Scotta, will help to celebrate the famous fruit-district's "Apple Blossom Suaday," which falls on June 8th this year. The entire orchard belt, extending from Annapolis Royal to Windsor, a distance of about 80 miles, is always white and pink with blossom in the first part of June.

Hon. Honore Mercier, Minister of Lands and Forests, speaking of arrangements made in the province for forest protection this year, stated: "I really believe that the way the service is organized and with the good-will manifested by all classes of the community, who realize the importance of protecting your national domain, the year will be a good one and the losses reduced to a minimum."

The report of the statistician to the board of grain commissioners for April, recently issued, records the heaviest spring great lakes shipping season on record. The report says that there are indications that all the surplus of the western crops will be moved as fast as transportation facilities permit, as export purchases are to be heavier than usual and all occan tonnage out of Montreal for May and June has already been engaged, as well as part for the July loading.

Something new in the way of railway equipment is the new storage battery car now operating over Canadian Pacific lines between Galt and Hamilton. The car attains a speed of 35 miles per hour and makes two trips a day in each direction. It has three compartments. general, passenger, smoking and baggage, is of all-steel construction and will accommodate 50 passengers. 
