## SUMMARY OF NEWS

The British Navy, according to the Register, embraces 499 mounted war vessels, besides 302 steamships. These vessels carry 16,842 guns, and thus a number may be indefinitely increased according to exigencies. The Royal service has 186 Admirals, 1,631 Lieutenants, and 30,000 sailors. The marine corps numbers 40,000.

This is the naval arm of that power which the "unfettered democracy" of this country is so uncomfortably anxious to annihilate. Even Dr. Duncan, one of the loudest and most conspicuous of these empty-headed brawlers, confesses that in comparison with it, our naval force is quite inconsiderable. "It is so little," he says, "that it could be hid in the British Navy, in all the stillness and secrecy of the heart of a dense and boundless forest. It is so little that you might dispatch its size from one wing of the Royal Navy of Great Britain, and Queen Victoria would not know that she had lost a vessel."

War with Mexico.—Gen. Almonte, says the Journal of Commerce of last evening has received orders from his Government since the overthrow of his particular friend Santa Anna. The Ambassador has been recognized by the new Government, but will, nevertheless, return home on the first of April. He expresses the opinion that as the Regulations for the annexation of Texas were passed by so very small a majority, that the Mexican Government will not think it necessary to disturb the friendly relations now existing between the two nations.—Boston paper.

Seizure.—A conduct arrived at Tampico on the 23d ult. with \$2,600,000 in specie. The British brig Inconstant was off the bar waiting for it.

The Court House at Carlisle, Pa., with several other buildings, including all the fire engines, were destroyed by fire a few days since.—Loss \$40,000.

An ENRAGED ELEPHANT.—We learn by a gentleman who came passenger last evening on the steamer ship Zenobia, Capt. Beckman, arrived at New York, that he left Hong Kong on the 17th of December. Previous to the arrival of the ship, the 12th. The Register of the 10th mentions the arrival at Hong Kong of a camel, the driver of which was killed. The camel was supposed to have been drowned. After leaving the harbor, the pirates attacked the vessel, but the latter, being well armed, beat them off.

The Marquis de Ferreira, secretary of the French legation, left Macao on the 15th of December, for Paris via Bombay, with the treaty negotiated by M. Lagrenée, for ratification. The Ambassador himself was to embark soon for Manila.

The Royal Senate of Macao has given notice that the tariff of 1843 will cease on the 1st of April, 1845, when a new tariff will go into operation. Also that vessels entering the harbor will hereafter pay five maces per ton anchorage.

There was much sickness at Koolong-sai. There was a furious tempest at Manila on the night of November 11, in which several vessels were lost, the town of Nueva Caceres sustained much damage, most of the houses being destroyed including that of the Governor, who had a narrow escape for his life. In the town of Tayabas more than 800 houses were destroyed and the rice crops were ruined.

At fearful accident occurred at Indore on the 14th inst. Several thousands of Brahmins had been assembled at the Palace to receive gifts at the festival of Ganiguitie. They were simultaneously descending a staircase in crowds, when the structure gave way, and in the rush or crash which ensued 194 lives were lost.

On the 24 ult., Tankerwall, a small town on the river Cambia, was stormed by a column of about 200 baboons, who assailed the natives with great ferocity, biting and pelting with sticks and stones in their attempt to carry off what provisions they could find in the village. The inhabitants made a stout counter assault with cutlery and muskets, more deadly weapons than the monkeys could command. In a running contest nearly 100 were captured, and since sold; several are here; and seem by their antics to have already forgot the old cause of their captivity.

Canada.—The University question is settled for the present session. The Government party, after hearing counsel against the Bill at the bar of the House, pushed it on to a second reading, which was carried by a vote of 45 to 43. It was then understood that the measure would not be pushed forward to its subsequent stages during the present session—thus giving time for further consideration of the important question, and thereby complying with the reiterated wishes of the great body of Churchmen throughout the Province.

This question has produced some discord in the conservative party, and even in the colonial cabinet itself. Mr. Sherwood, the Solicitor-General of Canada West, and Mr. Robinson, the Inspector-General, lost no time in placing their resignation in the hands of their colleagues, when they found that the University Bill was to be made a cabinet question. Fortunately these resignations were not accepted, and the two gentlemen were permitted to retain their respective offices, notwithstanding their both spoke and voted against the measure.

The vote on this question is held to be a great triumph for the Governor's party. It divided the forces of the opposition for the first time, and anarchy is said to reign in their ranks. The session will be shortly prorogued.—Albion.

Halifax Citadel.—The expenses of the charge of the Ordnance Department, for the years 1845-46, have been passed by order of the House of Commons. Among the items £10,000 is proposed to be taken for the works at the Citadel at Halifax, and £2605 will be required to be voted in future years for finishing the work, the original estimate for which was £175,863.—Halifax Recorder.

New Brunswick Provincial Parliament. HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY. 28th March.

On motion of Mr. Boyd, Resolved, That the Bill to reduce the Duties imposed upon Ships or Vessels arriving at Ports in the County of Charlotte, for the support of sick and disabled Seamen, not being Paupers, belonging to this Province, be committed to a Committee of the whole House this day three months.

To Robert Watson the sum of £25, additional compensation for his services as a Deputy Treasurer in St. Stephen, for the year 1844.

To Margaret Grant, a licensed Teacher, the sum of £20 for teaching a School in Saint Stephen one year ending March 1844.

Extracts from the Report of the Agricultural Societies of Charlotte, Carleton, and Restigouche, which present very favorable accounts of the operations of those Institutions during the past year.

We have examined a very statistical return of the Agricultural produce of the County of Gloucester, for the last year, made up with great ability by Henry W. Baldwin, Esquire, Sheriff of that County.

The same paper contains a comparative statement of the Imports of Bread Stuffs and other Agricultural products into the Port of Bathurst, for the three years ending 1836, and for the three years ending 1844.

We would strongly recommend that an effort should be made to obtain similar information as to the Agricultural products of every County; but although few persons can be found who would gratuitously collect such valuable and highly interesting information as Sheriff Baldwin has done, we conceive a portion of the Public Money would be well expended for such purpose, and we would recommend the Form of Return made out by Mr. Baldwin, as admirably adapted for the purpose of presenting the information in a clear and intelligible light.

As we are of opinion that the Breed of our Provincial Horses is fast degenerating, we have agreed to recommend a small sum of money towards the purchasing of Four Stallions of an approved breed, for labour and general purposes; we therefore propose that the sum of £500 should be appropriated for this purpose in four sums of £125 each, in aid of individual subscription for obtaining Horses for the following Districts:

One for Carleton, York, Sunbury and Queens;

One for Charlotte and St. John;

One for Westmorland and King's;

One for Northumberland, Kent, Gloucester and Restigouche.

In conclusion, we recommend that the conditional Grant of the last year be continued for the encouragement of Agricultural Societies.

Important.—Just as our paper is going to press we learn from undoubted authority that, notwithstanding Lord Glenelg's Despatch at the time the Civil List Bill was under consideration, stating that salaries of future officers should be subject to negotiate, and subsequent Despatches fixing the amount at £600 per annum, His Excellency has authorized the draft of £400 for Mr. Read's first quarter's salary, and the same has been paid him from the Treasury!!! We presume it was in consequence of this that the House (on motion of Mr. Partelow) passed a Resolution this morning for an Address to His Excellency, praying a return of all monies drawn from the Civil List Fund during the last quarter; which return is to be laid before them to-morrow.—Loyalist.

To-morrow, in Committee of Supply, a motion comes up (entered on the Supply Book by Mr. J. Earle) for a grant of £300 to His Excellency, for Postage. This no doubt is the Contingencies in another form and the very same amount might have been carried before, if the Members of Government had ever accepted it. We have never entertained but one opinion on this subject: there cannot be a doubt but the sum is necessary; and members of the Opposition will best consult their own dignity by not opposing it.—Lbid.

On Tuesday the House passed a Bill introduced by Mr. Boyd, to provide for the Inspection of Fish. It was opposed by the Members from the City and County of Saint John, who finally proposed to except the charter rights of the City, which failed.—Reporter.

COUNTY OF CHARLOTTE.—We copy the following from the Loyalist:

"Our attention has recently been called to this County by a gentleman who resides there, and who complains of neglect on the part of the Executive Government, as well as the House of Assembly. We are aware that this is the second County in the Province in

point of population, that it is an agricultural and manufacturing County, and that it was formerly a place of much trade, before the recent alteration of the Imperial Tariff, which destroyed her West India Trade, and the operation of the Timber Export Duty Bill, which has driven a great part of her remaining shipping west of the St. Croix. We are also aware that her four Representatives have protested against these measures in the House of Assembly, but are not aware that any great effort has been made by that body to restore her fallen trade. But our attention is now called to Executive neglect. Although it has been laid down in this Province as a general rule that the different sections of the Province shall be represented in the Executive Council, Charlotte—the second County in the Province—has never had the honor of possessing an Executive Councillor since New Brunswick has been a Colony! Another cause of complaint is that among her loyal and intelligent population not one has been thought worthy to act as Supervisor of Roads and Bridges, but of the two appointed to act for Charlotte, one resides in St. John, and the other in York! We throw out these hints to prove that the complaint that "Charlotte is neglected" has not been made without cause.

FOUR DAYS LATER FROM EUROPE. By the packet ship Louis Philippe, from Havre, dated on the 5th ult., have been received. The news is not important.

In the British House of Commons, on the 5th, Sir Robert Peel, declared that United States Sugar would be admitted under the same advantages of the reciprocity treaties as the sugars of Java and Manila.

The London Times of March 4th gives an account of a destructive fire on the premises of Enderby and Brother, rope makers and South Sea merchants, near Greenwich. The manufactory, a large building overlooking the Thames, was destroyed, with the exception of the bare walls, which fell down during the day by the force of the wind. In this building was a large deposit of manufactured goods. The origin of the fire is unknown. The total loss is supposed to be from £40,000 to £50,000, while the insurance does not exceed £6,000. Two hundred and fifty workmen are thrown out of employment by the calamity.

LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY.—The business of the Legislature is fast drawing to a close. It is reported that the House will rise this week. The grant of £50 each to the Reporters—Hill, Grigor and Hogg, has been rejected by the Council. The Post Office Committee have reported. The expense of conducting the office on the new system, commenced in July last, has more than doubled the sum being for the last year £2580. The Committee recommend £545 for grants for the support of Couriers and Postmen. The subject is to be brought before the Imperial Government. The Light House Committee have recommended £200 for a fog bell, at White Head Island, Grand Manan. The address to His Excellency, praying him to cause all the fees collected at the Secretary's Office, since Mr. Odell's death, to be paid to the Receiver General, was presented—and His Excellency has replied by Message, stating that he has no authority to cause the fees to be paid over as requested.

NOT SO FAST.—The annexationists may get cheated out of their pay after all. By late arrivals it would seem that the people of the "Valley of Rensselaer," consider themselves too good to unite with the people of the United States.

The dates are to the 11th ult. Several of the leading journals hold language opposed to annexation, or at least unfriendly to the measure.

MAYOR OF ST. JOHN.—Lauchlan Donaldson, Esq., has been reappointed Mayor of the City of St. John.

There is so much competition already among the steamboats on the Hudson River, that passengers have been conveyed from New York to Albany for 12 1/2 cents.

When some of the "galled jades" who took offence at the new play, before the curtain rose, kicked up such a row in the Theatre and outside, that they succeeded in stopping it. Not satisfied with this, they broke the door pulled down stove pipes, and injured the adjoining buildings.

St. John.—Upwards of twenty square rigged vessels arrived at St. John, during the past week.

## SUMMARY OF NEWS.

**THE BRITISH NAVY.**—According to the Register, embraces 499 mounted war vessels, besides 202 steamships. These vessels carry 16,849 guns, to say nothing of masts, sails, rigging, &c. and this number may be indefinitely increased according to exigencies. The Royal service has 156 Admirals, 1,631 Lieutenants, and 30,000 sailors. The marine corps numbers 40,000.

This is the naval arm of that power which the "unfettered democracy" of this country is so uncomfortably anxious to annihilate. Even Dr. Duncan, one of the loudest and most conspicuous of these empty-headed brawlers, confesses that, in comparison with our naval force is quite inconsiderable. "It is so little," he says, "that it could be hid in the British Navy, in all the stillness and secrecy of the heart of a dense and boundless forest. It is so little that you might dispatch its size from one wing of the Royal Navy of Great Britain, and Queen Victoria would not know that she had lost a vessel."

**WAR WITH MEXICO.**—Gen. Almonte, says the Journal of Commerce of last evening, has received advice from his Government since the overthrow of his particular friend Santa Anna. The Ambassador has been recognized by the new Government, but will, nevertheless, return home on the first of April. He expresses the opinion that as the Resolution for the annexation of Texas was passed by so very small a majority, that the Mexican Government will not think it necessary to disturb the friendly relations now existing between the two nations.—*Boston paper.*

**SPECTER.**—A condemned arrived at Tampico on the 23d ult., with \$2,000,000 in specie. The British brig *Infant* was off the bar waiting for it.

The Court House at Carlisle, Pa., with several other buildings, including all the fire engines, were destroyed by fire a few days since.—*Loss \$40,000.*

**AN ENRAGED ELEPHANT.**—We learn by a gentleman who came passenger last evening in the steamer *Princesa*, from Baton Rouge, that the large male elephant of Messrs. Hopkins & Co's menagerie, on Saturday morning killed the person who had been for some length of time employed to take charge of it. It appears that the two elephants and a camel had been sent in advance of the other animals, en route for Clinton, the female elephant and the camel chained together together. When about four miles from Baton Rouge, the male elephant refusing to cross a small bridge, the keeper who was on foot, procured a horse, (one which the elephant was not accustomed to) for the purpose of driving it over, and in attempting to mount, the horse shied, and threw the man in the road. The elephant immediately rushed upon him, caught him upon its tusks, and threw him forty or fifty feet in the air, which was repeated a great number of times the tusks frequently passing through his body it then carried the body from the road to the woods, tossing it in the air at intervals, until it fell between two fallen trees, which saved it from further violence. The infuriated animal then returned to the road, where the female elephant and camel had been chained to a tree by another keeper, and rushed upon them, his tusks passing through the camel, knocking down the female and breaking the chain in two. The other portion of the caravan, now coming to the bridge, the elephant returned and made demonstrations of an attack upon it, when firecrackers were brought into requisition. A number of shots were fired upon it, but without any effect. Word was then sent to the United States garrison, and some thirty or forty of the soldiers were sent to dispatch it with muskets. The neighbors also turned out with their rifles and shot guns, and some fifty or sixty shots were fired into or rather upon him, for the balls were frequently flattened up upon striking and fell to the ground. At length it was determined upon to send to the garrison for a field piece to dispatch him, when one of the keepers procuring a spear, mounted a horse and succeeded in wounding the elephant until he caused it to scream with pain, and finally to yield to subjection, when it was driven off with the balance of the animals.—[N. O. Bee, March 10.]

**REMOVED CHANGE IN THE U. S. CABINET.**—We hear from Washington that Mr. Mason, of Virginia, is to be reinstated in the Navy Department, and that Mr. Bismarck will go to England as the successor of Mr. Everett.

The latest news from Texas excites a good deal of comment in the Southern press. It is admitted on all sides that the Texas administration is opposed to both the proposed plans of annexation.

**A RUNNING BUSINESS.**—The Times newspaper, of Monday week, containing no fewer than one thousand one hundred and forty advertisements, bringing in one day, to the Government, a duty of eighty-five pounds ten shillings, and on a moderate computation, about seven hundred pounds to the proprietors! All the advertisements, in all the Scotch newspapers in any day of the year, put together, will come considerably short of that number! It would be no wonder although the Times should have its name changed from the "leading" to the "winning" journal of Europe! Some people are born under more lucky stars than others.

**English and Continental Railways.**—Great Britain counts at present 1984 miles of railway at work, and nearly 1240 in course of construction. Germany possesses 1320 miles, decreed and in progress. Belgium has finished 152 miles of railway, is now making 86 more. Taken in reference to the population of each country, the lengths of

railway, finished or in progress, give—in England, 11.78 miles to 100 inhabitants; in Belgium, 10.74 miles to 100 inhabitants; in France, 9.59 miles to 100 inhabitants. France, therefore, holds the last rank, and of all the great nations of the continent makes, individually, the least exertion in favour of railways.

A very interesting state of religious feeling seems to prevail most of the churches of this city at the present time. Mr. Caven's church we understand, has had several additions of late. The Methodists have held week-day meetings for some time; and the Baptists commenced a series of these meetings in the early part of the week, each one being more fully attended than its predecessor.—[Bangor Gaz.]

The wife of N. P. Willis died in New York, at the Astor House, on the evening of the 25th ult., after but a short illness. She was the daughter of Mr. Stacey, Governor of the Royal Arsenal, at Woolwich England. During his peregrinations in the mother country, Mr. W. became acquainted with, and married her; since which they have resided for the most part of the time in this country. Her father died in England some three years since.

The Galveston Weekly News of the 1st inst., says—We have already furnished incontestable evidence that British policy has so far prevailed in Texas, that Her Britannic Majesty's Charge has obtained a pledge from Ex President Houston, to use his utmost endeavours against annexation. The same paper hints at the opposition of the present Administration in Texas to the Measure.

The bill of annexation as it passed the U. S. House of Representatives, and Mr. Benton's bill in the Senate, formed the chief topics of discussion by the press. Neither project separately seemed to suit our Texan contemporaries; by the next arrival we shall learn whether the two together are related any better.

## LATER FROM CHINA.

The Swedish ship *Zenobia*, Capt. Bekman, arrived at New York. She left Hong Kong on the 17th of December. Previous dates by the Moutaux were to the 12th.

The Register of the 10th mentions the arrival at Macao of three men, part of the crew of the brig *Hannah*. The chief mate was supposed to have been drowned. After leaving the *Hannah* the pirates attacked another vessel, but the latter, being well armed, beat them off.

The Marquis de Ferriere, secretary of the French legation, left Macao on the 15th of December, for Paris via Bombay, with the treaty negotiated by M. Lagrange, for ratification. The Ambassador himself was to embark soon for Manila.

The Royal Senate of Macao has given notice that the tariff of 1843 will cease on the 1st of April, 1845, when a new tariff will go into operation. Also that vessels entering the harbor will hereafter pay five maces per ton anchorage.

There was much sickness at Koolongson. There was a furious tempest at Manila on the night of November 11, in which several vessels were lost, the town of Nueva Caceres sustained much damage most of the houses being destroyed including that of the Governor, who had a narrow escape for his life. In the town of Taybas more than 800 houses were destroyed and the rice crops were ruined.

At fearful accident occurred at Indore on the 14th inst. Several thousands of Brahmins had been assembled at the Palace to receive gifts at the festival of Ganga. They were simultaneously descending a staircase in crowds, when the structure gave way, and in the rush or crash which ensued 104 lives were lost.

On the 21 ult., Tankeewall, a small town on the river Cambia was stormed by a column of about 200 baboons, who assailed the natives with great ferocity, biting and pelting with sticks and stones in their attempt to carry off what provisions they could find in the village. The inhabitants made a stout counter assault with cutlery and muskets, more deadly weapons than the monkeys could command. In a running contest nearly 100 were captured, and since sold; several are here; and seem by their antics to have already forgotten the old cause of their captivity.

**Canada.**—The University question is settled for the present session. The Government party, after hearing counsel against the Bill, at the bar of the House, pushed it on to a second reading, which was carried by a vote of 45 to 43. It was then understood that the measure would not be pushed forward to its subsequent stages during the present session—thus giving time for further consideration of the important question, and thereby complying with the reiterated wishes of the great body of Churchmen throughout the Province.

This question has produced some discord in the conservative party, and even in the colonial cabinet itself. Mr. Sherwood, the Solicitor-General of Canada West, and Mr. Robinson, the Inspector-General, lost no time in placing their resignation in the hands of their colleagues, when they found that the University Bill was to be made a cabinet question. Fortunately these resignations were not accepted, and the two gentlemen were permitted to retain their respective offices, notwithstanding they both spoke and voted against the measure.

The vote on this question is held to be a great triumph for the Governor's party. It divided the forces of the opposition for the first time, and anarchy is said to reign in

their ranks. The session will be shortly prolonged.—*Albion.*

**Halifax Citadel.**—The estimates of the charge of the Ordnance Department, for the years 1845-46, have been printed by order of the House of Commons. Among the items £10,000 is proposed to be taken for the works at the Citadel at Halifax, and £2605 will be required to be voted in future years for finishing the work, the original estimate for which was £175,863.—*Halifax Recorder.*

## New Brunswick Provincial Parliament.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

25th March.

On motion of Mr. Boyd, Resolved, That the Bill to reduce the Duties imposed upon Ships or Vessels arriving at Ports in the County of Charlotte, for the support of sick and disabled Seamen, not being Paupers, belonging to this Province, be committed to a Committee of the whole House this day three months.

To Robert Watson the sum of £25, additional compensation for his services as a Deputy Treasurer in St. Stephen, for the year 1844.

To Margaret Grant, a licenced Teacher, the sum of £20 for teaching a School in Saint Stephen one year ending March 1844.

Extracts from the Report of the Agricultural Committee.

"We have had before us Reports of the Agricultural Societies of Charlotte, Carleton, and Restigouche, which present very favorable accounts of the operations of those Institutions during the past year.

"We have examined a very statistical return of the Agricultural produce of the County of Gloucester, for the last year, made up with great ability by Henry W. Baldwin, Esquire, Sheriff of that County.

"The same paper contains a comparative statement of the Imports of Bread Stuffs and other Agricultural products into the Port of Bathurst, for the three years ending 1836, and for the three years ending 1844.

"We would strongly recommend that an effort should be made to obtain similar information as to the Agricultural products of every County; but although few persons can be found who would gratuitously collect such valuable and highly interesting information as Sheriff Baldwin has done, we conceive a portion of the Public Money would be well expended for such purpose, and we would recommend the Form of Return made out by Mr. Baldwin, as admirably adapted for the purpose of presenting the information in a clear and intelligible light.

"As we are of opinion that the Breed of our Provincial Horses is fast degenerating, we have agreed to recommend a small sum of Money towards the purchasing of Four Stallions of an approved breed, for labour and general purposes; we therefore proposed that the sum of £500 should be appropriated for this purpose in four sums of £125 each, in aid of individual subscription for obtaining Horses for the following Districts:

One for Carleton, York, Sunbury and Queens.  
One for Charlotte and St. John.  
One for Westmorland and King's.  
One for Northumberland, Kent, Gloucester and Restigouche.

"In conclusion, we recommend that the conditional Grant of the last year be continued for the encouragement of Agricultural Societies.

**Important.**—Just as our paper is going to press we learn from undoubted authority that, notwithstanding Lord Glenelg's Despatch at the time the Civil List Bill was under consideration, stating that salaries of future officers should be subject to negotiate, and subsequent Despatches fixing the amount at £600 per annum, His Excellency has authorized the draft of £400 for Mr. Read's first quarter's salary, and the same has been paid him from the Treasury!!! We presume it was in consequence of this that the House (on motion of Mr. Partelow) passed a Resolution this morning for an Address to His Excellency, praying a return of all monies drawn from the Civil List Fund during the last quarter; which return is to be laid before them to-morrow.—*Loyalist.*

To-morrow, in Committee of Supply, a motion comes up (entered on the Supply Book by Mr. J. Earle) for a grant of £300 to His Excellency, for Postage. This no doubt is the Contingencies in another form and the very same amount might have been carried before, if the Members of Government would have accepted it. We have never entertained but one opinion on this subject: there cannot be a doubt but the sum is necessary, and members of the Opposition will best consult their own dignity by not opposing it.—*Ibid.*

On Tuesday the House passed a Bill introduced by Mr. Boyd, to provide for the Inspection of Fish. It was opposed by the Members from the City and County of Saint John, who finally proposed to except the charter rights of the City, which failed.—*Reporter.*

**COUNTY OF CHARLOTTE.**—We copy the following from the *Loyalist*:—"Our attention has recently been called to this County by a gentleman who resides there, and who complains of neglect on the part of the Executive Government, as well as the House of Assembly. We are aware that this is the second County in the Province in

point of population, that it is an agricultural and manufacturing County, and that it was formerly a place of much trade, before the recent alteration of the Imperial Tariff, which destroyed her West India Trade, and the operation of the Timber Export Duty Bill, which has driven a great part of her remaining shipping west of the St. Croix. We are also aware that her four Representatives have protested against these measures in the House of Assembly, but are not aware that any great effort has been made by that body to restore her fallen trade. But our attention is now called to Executive neglect. Although it has been laid down in this Province as a general rule that the different sections of the Province shall be represented in the Executive Council, Charlotte—the second County in the Province—has never had the honour of possessing an Executive Councillor since New Brunswick has been a Colony! Another cause of complaint is that among her loyal and intelligent population not one has been thought worthy to act as Supervisor of Roads and Bridges, but of the two appointed to act for Charlotte, one resides in St. John, and the other in York! We throw out these hints to prove that the complaint that "Charlotte is neglected" has not been made without cause.

**FOUR DAYS LATER FROM EUROPE.**  
By the packet Ship *Louis Philippe*, from Havre, dates to the 25th ult., have been received. The news is not important.

In the British House of Commons, on the 5th, Sir Robert Peel, declared that United States Sugar would be admitted under the same advantages of the reciprocity treaties as the sugars of Java and Manila.

The London Times of March 4th gives an account of a destructive fire on the premises of Enderby and Brother, rope makers and South Sea merchants, near Greenwich. The manufactory, a large building overlooking the Thames, was destroyed, with the exception of the bare walls, which fell down during the day by the force of the wind. In this building was a large deposit of manufactured goods. The origin of the fire is unknown. The total loss is supposed to be £40,000 to £50,000, while the insurance does not exceed £20,000. Two hundred and fifty workmen are thrown out of employment by the calamity.

**LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY.**—The business of the Legislature is fast drawing to a close. It is reported that the House will rise this week. The grant of £50 each to the Representatives—Hill, Grigor and Hogg, has been rejected by the Council. The Post Office Committee have reported. The expense of conducting the office on the new system, commenced in July last, has more than double the sum being for the last year £2580. The Committee recommend £545 for grants for the support of Couriers and Packets. The subject is to be brought before the Imperial Government. The Light House Committee have recommended £200 for a fog bell, at White Head Island, Grand Manan. The address to His Excellency, praying him to cause all the fees collected at the Secretary's Office, since Mr. Odell's death, to be paid to the Receiver General, was presented—and His Excellency has replied by Message, stating that he has no authority to cause the fees to be collected, to be paid over as requested.

**NOT SO FAST.**—The annexationists may get cheated out of their pay after all. By late arrivals it would seem that the people of the "Valley of Resaals," consider themselves too good to unite with the people of the United States.

The dates are to the 11th ult.  
Several of the leading journals hold language opposed to annexation, or at least unfriendly to the measure.

**MAYOR OF ST. JOHN.**—Lauchlan Donaldson, Esq., has been reappointed Mayor of the City of St. John.

There is so much competition already among the steamboats on the Hudson River, that passengers have been conveyed from New York to Albany for 12-1-2 cents.

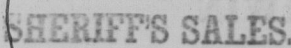
