AN APPALLING RECORD. The First Half of 1892 Has Been a Most Disastrous One.

The First Half of 1892 Has Been a Most Disastrous One.

[From the Chicago Tribune.]

Since Jan. 1 there have been four destructive wind storms, killing nearly 200 persons, viz.: April 1, Missouriand Kansas, 75; May 16, Texas, 15; May 27, Wellington, Kan., 53; June 16, Southern Minnesota, 50. In the same period there have been four great floods, viz.: April 11, Tombigbee River, 250; May 18, Sloux City, Ia., 35; May 20, Lower Mississippi, 37; June 5, fire and flood, oil Creek, Pa., 196. There also have been four mining disasters, viz.: Jan. 7, McAllister, I.T., 65; April 20, Minersville, Pa., 12; May 10, Roslyn, Wash., 44; May 14, Butte, Mont., 11. Three fires have been unusually disastrous to life, viz.: Jan. 21, Indianapolis Surgical Institute, 19; Feb. 7, Hotel Royal, New York, 30; April 28, theater, Philadelphia, 12.

Besides these there was on March 21 an explosion at Jordan, Mich., by which ten lives were lost; June 13, an explosion at the Marc Island Navy Yard, which killed thirteen, and June 15, the fall of the bridge over the Licking River, by which 82 lives were sacrificed. These are the principal disaster of the year thus far, and they involve an aggregate loss of 960 lives. Adding to this total the sum of losses by minor accidents, as reported to the Tribune, we have the following sad and unusual record: By fire, 876; by drowning, 1,364; by explosions, 318; by falling structures of various kinds, 267; by mine disasters, 308; by wind storms, 340, and by lightning, 120. Grand total, 3,588. The total loss of life by these causes during the whole of last year—and 1891 was one of the most destructive years on record—was 5,762. So it is evident that 1892 will surpass its

CHICAGO, Sept. 19.—She is a woman with a strong face and a commanding figure. Her raven black hair is combed smooth from over her white, broad forehead, her eyes are bright and intelligent, and she speaks English fluently, as it is her native tongue, and French with a soft, euphonous intonation that is rarely found in those who acquire that language. She reached Chicago last Monday, and is at the home of Mrs. James Hewitt, Washington avenue, Hyde Park. Her name is Mme. Hyacinthe Loyson, and she is the wife of Pere Hyacinthe, the famous French priest. In 1869 the religious world was startled by the letter of Pere Hyacinthe, which renounced the infallibility of the Pope, repudiated the compulsory celibacy of the priesthood, and called for the abolition of forced auricular confession, and services in the exercise. orced auricular confession, and services in

the vernacular.

The religious world stood aghast at these demands, and seers prophesied an other reformation, the disintregration of the Roman Catholic Church and a new sec the Roman Canonic Church and a new sect supplanting it. And the surprise was in-creased when the Carmelite monk, the now famous Pere Hyacinthe, not only an-nounced his renunciation of papal author-ity, but sealed his determination by marry-

nounced his renunciation of papal authority, but sealed his determination by marrying an American woman.

Since then Pere Hyacinthe and his most zealous helper, his wife, have toiled night and day for the success of their new church, the idea of which is, in fine, that the church shall be Catholic, but not Roman Catholic, It is meant by this that all the sects and churches shall be united in the universal religion of Christ.

THE GALLIC CHURCH.

The Gallic Church, as it is called, claims not to be schismatic or sectarian, not a reformation even, but a restoration. For Pere Hyacinthe's church has as its chief tenet the purpose of returning to and reviving the forms practiced by the first Christians in the first centuries after Christians in the first centuries atter Christians in the first centuries atter Christians in the first centuries atter Christians in the primitive religion of the Ope of Rome. The idea is to do away with all sects and divisions and bring back the primitive religion of the Gauls in the Catholic but non-Roman faith. FROM THE ENDS OF THE EARTH.

The meeting is of significant interest-first, because it embraces representatives of the faith from every civilized nation, and from the "islands and ends of the earth," and econdly, because the Alliance has chosen a country in which to hold its gathering which has already demonstrated what a really United Presbyterian Church and a really United Methodist body can do. The Alliance is made up of 500 delegates, 20 of whom are representatives of the Presbyterian Churches of Section, 25 from England, Ireland and Canada; 30 from Australia and New Zealand; 30 from the European continent; 25 from Wales, and the remainder from the Wales, and the remainder from the different branches of Presbyterian and Reformed Churches of the world, such as the German Reformed Church, the Dutch Reformed Church and so on. This will be the fifth quadriennial meeting. THE DEAD PAST REVEALED.

At the recent International Orientalist Congress in the British metropolis a most interesting document was submitted by the Rev. Prof. Hechter, chaplain of the Congress in the British metropolis a most interesting document was submitted by the Rev. Prof. Hechter, chaplain of the British Embassy at Vienna, a distinguished Orientalist. The document referred to is a papyrus manuscript discovered a few months ago in Egypt and is supposed by some authorities to be the oldest copy extant of portions of the Old Testament books of Zachariah and Malachi. These pages of papyrus when intact were about ten inches high and seven inches wide, each containing 28 lines of writing, both sides of the sheet being used. The complete line contains from fourteen to seventeen letters. The sheets are bound together in the form of a book in a primitive though careful manner with cord and strips of old parchment. The Greek of this document is written without intervals between the words, a custom observed both in old Greek and Hebrew manuscripts. The papyras is in fair preservation, and it is believed to date from the third or fourth century. It thus ranks in age with the oldest Greek manuscripts of the septuagint version of the Old Testament in London, Rome and St. Petersburg. The differences in this papyrus tend to the conclusion that it was copied from some excellent original of the septuagint, which was first translated about the year 280 B.C. for the use of the Hellenistic Jews in Egypt, who, having gradually forgotten the Hebrew tongue, had learned to speak Greek. The first summary examination has shown that it has several new readings which surpass some of the other septuagint texts in clearness of expression and simplicity of grammar. The Educational Juggernaut.
To the Editor of the ADTERTISEN:
Allow me to plead for the exercise of a little more reason and humanity in the allotment of home tasks to the Collegiate Institute pupils. If the principal of that institution will test the force of my complaint by making a memorandum of the home studies allotted in any form for any night of the week, I am certain the result will satisfy him of the cruelty and impossibility of accomplishing such tasks. Each of the seven or eight teachers for the day seems bent upon imposing such tasks as will force the major part of the pupil's work upon his or her subject. And doubtless this struggle for supremacy among teachers is due to the system new in vogue by which teachers are judged by examination results; and the consequence is that the unfortunate pupil who struggles to cope with the work in time becomes a physical wreck. Children cannot stand the strain of working closely all day and studying till midnight month in and month out without undermining their health, more especially the younger pupils. Besides, much of their study is mere drudgery and void of value as a mental training or as to utility. What, for example, is the sense of requiring pupils to memorize nightly 50 to 100 lines of poetry, or to commit verbatim a jumble of notes disjointly culled from their text books, and which have already cost much valuable time in the mechanical writing of them in class. I have before me a list of my girl's studies for the night, comprising a lesson in French, history, geography, arithmetic, algebra, composition and geometry, together with the memorizing of sundry notes and a page of poetry. Any one of these subjects would require one hour for thorough preparation. In the mass of work the pupil's only chance is in superficiality and cram.

Surely this state of things ought to be remedied, and calls for the exercise of restraint and supervision by the principal. I hope these observations, written with the most friendly intent, will receive the voice.
