A pocketbook lay near by, In it was a printed statement of the Anarchist creed, together with a card bearing the announcement that "unprecedented horrors will be committed and many deputies will be slain if Vaillant's precious head be touched by the executioner."

Preferred Death to Capture.

London, Dec. 16 .- A dispatch from St. Petersburg states that a force of Moscow police, assisted by a detachment of Cospolice, assisted by a detachment of Cossacks, surprised a large number of Nihilists who were holding a meeting in an isolated house outside of Moscow. The Nihilists made a vigorous resistance. Fifteen policemen were wounded. Five of the Nihilists, when they saw that their capture was inevitable, turned their weapons against themselves and blew out their brains. Twenty-two of the men escaped from the building, but 50 others were wounded.

The Pope in Apparent Good Health. Rome, Dec. 17.-The Pope celebrated mass this morning at St. Peter's in presence of 15,000 people, mostly delegates and other members of Catholic societies of other members of Catholic societies of Rome. THE LOTTERIES MUST GO.

THE LOTTERIES MUST GO.

Imper ant Ruing of Kentucky's High Court—No Vested Right to Violate Law.

Louisville, Ky., Dec. 17.—The Court of Appeals of Kentucky yesterday handed down an opinion which deals the death blow to lotteries in this State. The decision was rendered by Chief Justice Benefit without dissent. Two cases were decided—one, that of the Henry College lottery, was of comparatively little importance. The second case was that of the Frankfort lottery, the big concern which has been doing a land office business in Kentucky for years.

The defense was that the present owners of the franchise acquired ownership by purchase from the original grantees and thereby became possessed of a vested right, which could not be interfered with.

The lower court sustained this view, but the Court of Appeals, in its decision, holds that no vested right exists in contravention of the constitutional provisions upon the subject. The local managers of the company are dozed. Their charter does not expire until 1916. The decision means a big loss to them and an end of lotteries in Kentucky.

Two Hundred Buff, lo Families Home less.

Ferente's Electric Wires Prostrated by an Ice Storm-The Street Railway Company Suffer Heavily-Big Snow Fall at Ottawa.

Buffalo, N. Y., Dec. 17.—The heavy rains, melting snow and furious winds of Friday and Saturday caused Bufalo River and Cazenovia Crock to overflow their banks and inundate a large portion of South Bufalo. People have been driven from their honses, getting away in boats and on rafts. It is estimated that 200 houses have been thus hastily vacated and about 1,000 people homeless, to Toronto, Dec. 17.—The damage done by the storm on Friday night is tremendous. All over the city telephone and other electric wires and trees of all descriptions are down. The damage to trees is mainly by reason of their breaking down from the great weight of ice that accumulated on them as the rain fell and was frezen into icicles on the twigs. Many of the trees as they fell bore down the wires in the neighborhood, and telephonic communication in the northern part of the city was entirely destroyed. The street railway company estimate the damage to their system at from \$10,000 to \$20,000.

CANADIAN FAST OCEAN SERVICE.

The Premier Feys It Is Not a Fact, Yet Probably Will Be.

Ottawa, Dec. 16.—Sir Join Thempson was asked in what position the negotiations for a fast Atlantic steamship service actually stand. The Premier, in reply, stated that his observations on the subject at Halifax had been misrepresented. While there he had received a deputation of the Board of Trade, which premeted a memorial on the subject of railway and harbor facilities. No reporters were present. After discussing the points mentioned in the memorial No reporters were present. After discussing the points mentioned in the memorial Sir Join remarked that the Government took an interest in the development of Halifax harbor, as it was hoped that a fast Atlantic service would be an accomplished fact at no distant date. This had failed of accomplishment in the past for reasons they were all familiar with. He (Sir Join) had, however, reason to believe that by the time he returned to Ottawa, a gentleman would be there to take up the negotiations on behalf of an English firm or company, but that he would forbear to say much about it now because Canada had sustained disappointments on previous occasions.

CANADIAN CHILDREN OUR FIRST CARE.

According to a cablegram, Dr. Barnardo has again rushed into print in the British papers, defending his professional philanthropy in shipping the waifs and strays of the old world slums to Canada. He protests that the boys he sends out are not likely to turn out bad, as other children of knows that they have not misbehaved to any extent. How can Dr. Barnardo know what comes of his proteges after they leave his hands? He has sworn in a court of justice, in the only case where official investigation was forced, that he gave away the boy to a man unknown to him, whose place of residence in Canada he had been unable to discover, and he had to acknowledge, after a long search, that no trace of the boy could be found. Whether or not these children of the slums make good citizens is always an open question. Their early environments are ever against them. What Canadian taxpayers, many of them with boys who cannot find remunerative employment, object to is the paying of their good money to encourage the importation of this at least doubtful class of newcomers. This is the reason for the protest of the Brandon, Man., grand jury, set forth in a part of the country where one would have thought the boys and girls from the old world slums would have been welcomed, if anywhere. Public money should not be paid to bring in any class of workers to compete with those already here in these dull times. But it may be urged that we have no waifs here, and that it is easy to provide for "the submerged tenth" of old world rich cities. Never was there a greater mistake. In every place of any importance in Canada we have our very poor and neglected population. We have orphan boys and girls in need of homes, and many who are not erphans unable to get a reasonable start in life. Why, then, should we encourage any class of workers to come to us unless they have sufficient energy and sufficient means to come at their own expense and to go to that part of the country where they can provide homes for themselves?

When the Thames Was Used to Float Logs to Erie.

Codfish Aristocracy in Days When London Was a Great Military Center.

(Contributed by George Railton, of Bothwell.

As many of your readers may not be aware of the vast extent of the London dis trict as it existed for years prior to the earliest time referred to in the first installment (1840-50), let me say that it contained the area of what now omprises seven separate counties, each of them having its own county towns, judges and all the paraphernalia of office, which in 1840 were centered in London, where all and all the paraphernalia of office, which in 1840 were centered in London, where all the courts were held excepting only the courts of requests, which were then held by magistrates or commissioners, who had a jurisdiction in the settlement of disputed claims, of 22 68 8d or something less than \$10\$. Henry C. R. Eccher, then an unfledged lawyer, was clerk of that court in London with his office on King street, facing the south end of the court house. The grammar school, of which T. H. Wright, M.A., an honor man of Trinity College, Dublin, was the head master, was the classical school for the entire district. Gec. Napleton, E.A., of Oxford, was the assistant, and a Mr. Routledge was English master, Later on Mr. Bayly, father of Richard Bayly, Q.C., became head master and Mr. James Thompson, of Adelaide, assistant. The latter was famous for grinding students for call to the bar. The present Justice Ferguson, of the Chancery Court, is one of his class. The old grammar school building, which at one time in the thirties was the only jail and court house of the district (so I am told), was removed from where the present court house now stands, down to the south side of the square, where I believe it still remains.

During the first few years of my residence in London, North Dorchester was the pine

During the first few years of myresidence n London, North Dorchester was the pine or lumber section of the surrounding country; and there were numerous saw mills on the creeks north of the Thames. The names of Wm. Niles, Joshua and Thos. Putnam, and Capt. David Doty were in those days familiar to everybody in London, and to everybody far and near identified with lumbering operations. At high water, in the spring freshets, wast quantities of lumber was floated down the river in large raits and sold at Derroit. It was not uncommon to see several rafts at the Forks (as London was long called), foot of Dundas street. The names of Wm. Niles, Joshua and Thos.

The resident lawyers of London in my time were James Givens, afterwards judge of the county of Middlesex; John Wilson, M.P., afterwards judge of the High Court, Toronto; William Horton, afterwards recorder, until that office was abolished, and he was mercilessly left in the lurch by the Government. They were the only barristers, but there were Fred Cleverly, Thomas Keir and Thos. D. Warren attorneys. Becher, Shaniy and Hughes were then students of law with Jonn Wilson; and many others who were then schoolboys, but afterwards rose to professional distinction, are mostly all numbered with the dead. In connection with the court house officials and Sheriff Hamilton's office, Robert C. Warren was his deputy, and George Fraser chief clerk. Philo Bennett, Cyrus Sumner, Mark Dyer and Silas E. Curtis were baillffs. About the time of my advent to London, Judge Williams, whom I did now know personally, died, and he was replaced by his Honor Henry Allen, who was at the his Honor Henry Allen, who was at the time or shortly afterwards superannuated —no, I believe he was asked to resign. Judge Givens succeeded him, then Judge Small, and Judge Elliot, the present incumbent of the Middlesex bench, notwithstanding of opinions to the contrary, is probably the most upright man of the lot. Politics ran high in those days; the lingering remains of the old Family Compact had ceased to exist; everybody who was anybody began to think for himself, and to think aloud too, without fear, favor or affection, and realized that his manhood must not be trampled upon. Nemo me impune lacessit seemed to be the universal motto. George Brown and his father who had started the Globe, in Toronto, issued a weekly edition in London in '43-4, which gave fresh impetus to the keenness with which social, political and ecclesiastical questions were discussed. The grocery of an ardent debater who, after some years got shelved in St. Thomas, was the arena for fierce argument, where ale and red herring were also discussed ad libitum; perhaps I should have said ad nauseam. The Browns through their press accomplished a great work in hastening "Repley Pop," secularization of the clergy reserves, common school education, and kindred reforms, the work of that period. Politics ran high in those days; the work of that period.

The disturbances of 1837-8 had all quieted down; but the sending out from England of British troops to keep down the disturbing element was the immediate cause for making London a military station, where costly barracks were built at an expense of ing London a military station, where costly barracks were built at an expense of not less than \$150,000. Many persons living in London, who never saw the barracks, which have been completely removed of late years, may wonder when told that the Government Reserve where the troops were garrisoned comprised all the land bounded between Lake Horn on the north and Duke street, now called Dufferin avenue, on the south; and bounded by Waterloo street on the cast and Sarnia street, or what is now called Richmond street; on the west. London would probably have been a large city if a soldier had never set foot in it, because of its magnificentagricultural surroundings; but there is no question about it, that the placing of troops there was the main cause for its immediate growth and prosperity. Out of evil, much good has arisen, and the people too long oppressed by an arrogant compact had begun in those days to breathe a purified social and political atmosphere. The disruption of the Auld Kirk in Scotland at that period put new life into some of the dry bones, while many of the old grandsires too long habituated to Church and State, clung with tenacity to the flesh pots of Egypt! Restrictions, too, which seriously hampered the franchise and greatly weak-ned the growing independence of the rising generation had been removed.

Just at this very instant I recall, to memory that the Gazette office was on Ridout street, right opposite the court house, over 50 years ago; and the Enquirer was also on Ridout street, near the Bank of Upper Canada. These minutes are not of consequence, perhaps; but as they present themselves to my mind while I write, they go towards the general make-up of my reminiscences.

There used to be a graveyard in rear of the church containing many handsome monuments. The Roman Catholic Church, when first I saw it, stood about where the Western Hotel now is, with a graveyard around it. That building was also destroyed by fire, but I do not remember the year. I recollect well, however, of the neat brick church which was put up in place of it on the opposite side of Richmond street, and that, too, was razed to make way for St. Peter's Cathedral. I have a distinct recollection of several church edifices, such as the Universalists', on King street, on the new survey, near ohurch edifices, such as the Universalists', on King street, on the new survey, near Wellington; of the Baptist and the U. Ps.; but there was no Presbyterian Church in sympathy with the Free Church in Scotland until '44, I think, because my recollection is vivid upon this point, that the Presbyterians of that class woreshiped in the court house, where Rev. McKilligan, of St. Themas, baptized our firstborn, G. W. Railton (late freight agent, G. T. R., London), along with a child of Mr. Dimond, a brewer, on North street. That service took place in January, '43. Mr. McKilligan preached for a long time every afternate Sunday at the jail and court house. Dimond's brewery and Mr. Carling's were very small affairs then as compared with the immense establishment of late years. I caunot remember that Labatt's place was caunot remember that Labatt's place was built shen, but have a perfect recollection of Boyle Travers and old Mr. Dalton being severally engaged in soap manufactories down on the flats. That circumstance reminds me of an old landmark during the stay of the First Royals in London, when Col. Wetherall, the commanding officer of that regiment, occupied that old frame building at the foot of York street next to the bridge as his residence with his family. Donald Fraser, was cashier. Mr. Hamilton was then agent for the Bank of Upper Canada, and Mr. Rivers was teller. Dr. Anderson, Dr. George Moore (no relation of Dr. Charles), Dr. Mackenzie and Dr. Lee were then the physicians. I do not include Dr. Brown, because he was then in the army, and belonged, I think, to the Twenty-third, who relieved the Royals. prohibitory enactments? People were not allowed to erect certain buildings for commercial purposes—a slaughter house, for example—within the city limits, because they were inimical to the general health. A countryman—he had noticed such a case a short time ago—might come to the city, and, if he drove his horse at a rate faster than was regulated by one of the innumerable municipal bylaws, he would be immediately fined. If a man wanted to do just as he liked he would have to estracise himself from society; he would have to go into solitary fretirement. When anything was found detrimental to the general good it had to be prohibited; and this was true with regard to the liquor traffic.

The liquor traffic was to a certain extent prohibited at present. In England, for instance, there were more than 400 legislative enactments dealing with the traffic. The present movement was only an extension of existing regulations. Instead of prohibiting the traffic partially the present proposition was one to prohibit it entirely.

Dr. Antliff then referred to the prohibition that existed in the London Asylum. In one year after the discarding of liquor as a remedial agency by Dr. Bucke, the expenditure in this particular item had been reduced from \$6,000 to \$600. And more then this, the death rate had been materially reduced, and the prevailing health greatly improved.

The concluding portion of Dr. Antliff'ediscourse was devoted to meeting the fallacy that prohibition did not prohibit.

Butter was a trifle higher, selling at 25 cents a pound, in pound rolls; 23 and 24 cents in baskets and \$25 cours in cropes. Eggs were steady pound rolls; 23 and 24 cents in baskets and 22 to 23 cents in crocks. Eggs were steady and unchanged, single dezens costing almost as much as a pound of butter. Twenty-two to 24 cents was the ruling price, with 20 to 22 cents by the basket, or 17 cents in store lots. The meat market was slow. Beef went from 4 to 6 cents, dressed hogs from 5½ to 6½ cents a pound.

That the customs tariff of the Dominion should be based, not as it now is, upon the protective principle, but upon the requirements of the public service.
That the existing tariff, founded upon an unsound principle and used as it has been by the Government as a corrupting agency, wherewith to keep themselves in office, has developed monopolies, trusts and combinations;

other landed property;
It has oppressed the masses to the enrichment of the few;
It has checked immigration;
It has caused great loss of population;
It has discriminated against Great
Britain.

Britain.

In these, and in many other ways, it has occasioned great public and private injury, all of which evils must continue to grow in intensity solong as the present tariff system remains in force.

That the highest interests of Canada demand a removal of this obstacle to our

mand a removal of this obstacle to our country's progress, by the adoption of a sound fiscal policy, which, while not doing

country's progress, by the adoption of a sound fiscal policy, which, while not doing injustice to any class, will promote domestic and foreign trade and hasten the return of prosperity to cur people.

That to that end, the tariff should be reduced to the needs of honest, economical and efficient government.

That it should be so adjusted as to make free, or to bear as lightly as possible upon the necessaries of life and should be so arranged as to promote freer trade with the whole world, more particularly Great Britain and the United States.

We believe that the results of the protective system have grievously disappointed thousands of persons who honestly supported it, and that the country in the light of experience is now prepared to declare for a sound fiscal policy.

The issue between the two political parties on this great question is now clearly defined.

The Government themselves admit the failure of their fiscal policy, and now profess their willingness to make some changes, but they say that such changes must be based only on the principle of protection.
