VICTORY IN GALICIA

Germans and Austrians Lose Over 33,000 Men, Heavy Artilery Battery and 40 Machine Guns-Their Operations Complete Failures.

(Canadian Press.)

Lemberg, Galicia, Nov. 28.—Via Petrograd and London, 2:20 p.m.—In operations lasting three days in the vicinity of Strykow, 15 miles northeast of Lodz, and Tushin, an equal distance to the south of this city, the Germans lost upwards of 17,000 men, a heavy battery of artillery, and 28 machine guns, according to authoritative information made available in Lemberg today.

In the same fighting the Austrians lost 16,000 in addition

to 20 machine guns. The German operations in this locality are declared by Russian military observers in Lemberg to have been absolute failures, and the chances of their escaping further disaster is regarded here as slight.

Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse Reported As Lost By Petrograd, But No Official Confirmation of the Rumor Has Been Received.

Paris, Nov. 28.—A dispatch to the Matin from Petrograd states that it s reported there that the German battleship Wilhelm Der Grosse struck a mine and sank in the Baltic, but adds that there is no official confirmation of the rumor.

The battleship Kaiser Wilhelm Der Grosse, evidently referred to in the



Winston Churchill Points Out That Britain is Still the Mistress.

LONDON, Nov. 27 .- Through Reuer's Ottawa Agency.—In the House of Commons this afternoon Right Hon. Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, delivered a powerful and stimulating speech in review of the naval situation. He said that it was impossible at present for the public to form any judgment on the vari-ous incidents which had taken place, but as soon as possible the facts connected with the past operations and administrations of the navy would be published in a form which could be studied and weighed. He looked forward hopefully to that day.







enemies of Great Britain would not constitute a violation of the doctrine, but an effort to establish a new form of government in case of victory would. "There is little likelihood of the policy being pressed in Argentina, Brazil and Chile. These countries were able to protect themselves and they are so remote from the United States that violation of the doctrine in respect to them would not be harmful to this country's interests and safety.

"The doctrine has not been applied in Mexico, because there is nothing in it which requires the United States to bring about peace in that country. Position of Canada.

In taking up the proposition of Great Britain's enemies landing troops in Canada, Mr. Taft cited the stand of Secretary Seward taken when Spain declared war on Chile. He announced this country would not interfere as long as one country did not seek to inflict its government on the conquered people nor compel a permanent transfer of their territory, nor resort to any other un-

justly oppressive measures.
"It seems to me clear," Mr. Taft said, "from the history which I have given of the Monroe Doctrine, and from Secof the war between Chile and Spain that a consistent pursuit of the policy would pic. not oblige us to resort to any warlike measures under the rules of lawful warfare, which England's enemies might take against Canada.

Germany Could Retallate.
"Canada is already furnishing substantial military aid to Great Britain and the Allies. She has sent a body of 30,000 men of well equipped soldiers and is preparing more and intending to send them. On what theory therefore could we justly object to Germany's taking counter measures and carrying the war into a country, which is waging war upon her? All that the Monroe Doctrine would consistently require of us would be to insist that when the war is over, if Germany were successful, she could not take over the territory of Canada and overthrow her Governmen and establish her own there, or take any oppressive measures, which would have a similar effect. But we could not object to her exacting an indemnity if

she were the victor."
