We are not aware that the News entered any fervent protest against the wholesale dismissals in the provincial service, beginning with the license department, until the Government stepped on the corns of the owner of that newspaper, in the case of the chief license inspector of To ronto. The clean sweep made of the license inspectors of the Province was an abuse of power unexampled in this country, and a cynical violation of the Premiers' promise to keep the license department out of politics. The guillotine has not been allowed to rust since. Registrars, division court clerks and sheriffs have been singled out here and there at apparently calculated intervals, as though the Government hoped the protests following one dismissal would die out before the next one. In no case has a dismissed official been given an opportunity to defend himself, excepting Mr. Bastedo, the chief fishery inspector, who was tried by a partisan commissioner and whose expulsion was not justified by the evidence.

The appointment of partisan commissioners to "investigate" public officials has become the fixed practice of the Whitney Government. It is probably intended to cover the nakedness of the risy, but it serves the ends of the spoilsmen just as well. The Liberal press cannot be too vehement in its denunciation of these wrongs. If it has been too forbearing, something must be allowed for the feeling that it was useless to hope to stay the hand of the Government so long as it had its present majority in the Legislature at its back. 

MEDICAL SUPERVISION NEEDED TO PREVENT THE SPREAD OF CONSUMPTION IN SCHOOLS

+++++

Medical supervision of the schools is badly needed, and steps should be taken to provide such, according to Dr. W. E. Fairfield, house surgeon at St. Mary's Hospital, Green Bay, Wis. Tuberculosis, the disease which takes the lives of hundreds where others claim one. Dr. Fairfield believes should be grappled with and overcome in its very earliest stages when manifested among school children. Other contagious diseases, such as diphtheria and smallpox, are placarded and guarded against, but there is practically no attempt made to prevent tubercular infection. Children afflicted with this dread disease are allowed to mingle with healthy children, as though there was not the slightest danger.

Teachers could do much to aid in eliminating consumptive children from the ranks of the healthy. The first manifestation of tuberculosis is an afternoon rise of temperature. Teachers could be taught to take the temperature of the children and report suspicious cases. These could be sent to the health officer and reported to the parents. Children shown to be infected could then be kept apart. Fresh air with proper treatment would result in restoring health, while confinement in the schoolroom would only give the disease an opportunity to build and grow. It is among the apparently superficial coughs and colds that the disease is most often found in its incipiency.


