HAVE ONE BIG GENERAL Story From Toronto Is Confirmed by Local License

Official—Sir James Is Credited With a Desire to Reform the Liquor Administration and Remove It From the Field of Politics-What the Proposed Change Means,

The Toronto News says: "A referendum on the license policy of the province will be taken by the members of the Legislature during the ten months before the opening of the session of 1911, and on their reports, tempered by the opinion of the cabinet, will be decided the fate of over one hundred license inspectors in Ontario, three hundred license commissioners, and the present local system.

"At a recent meeting of the Conservative members the plan for a change of system in Ontario, it is understood, was unfolded to them by the Premier. This consisted in a central board of well-paid commissioners and a number of inspectors who would devote their whole time to the work, keepng in close touch with the commission. A suggestion was made of a "tryof the commission in Northern Ontario, but, so far as can be learned, most of the northern members objected to being singled out for an experi-

"The new system as explained to the members would mean the abolition of all local boards, and a considerable decrease in the number of inspectors.'

KNOWN IN LONDON.

The above plan has been known to the local license commissioners and nspector for some time, and from what can be learned, they are in hearty sympathy with it.

If the suggestion becomes law, it will mean the abolition of the license poard of London. Of course, the inspector would have to be employed, but ne would form part of a large system, under the direction of a central board in Toronto, and not under local commissioners as at present. DO AWAY WITH COMMISSIONERS.

That has been done in many places, but the ideal system will be to make it independent of every possible influence.

curacy of these figures, but they do not prove the contention of the American commissioners. They are useless as a basis of comparison. Take the dutiable goods alone. The American tariff is so high that it absolutely excludes many ly farm products and manufactures. Consequently these play no part in the figures of American imports cited by Messrs. Pepper and Emery. A simple illustration will suffice. Suppose the American duty on Canadian barley were only 5 cents a bushel, and that ten million bushels were imported. Suppose the duty were raised to 30 cents a bushel (the rate actually fixed in 1897), and the importation was totally stopped thereby. Messrs. Pepper and Emery could point to the trade returns and say truthfully that no duty was collected by the United States upon Canadian barley.

It is just because our tariff is low enough to enable us to buy many pronearly exclude many of our products, duties on British goods. that the average rate of duty appears to be higher in Canada than in the United States. WHAT IT COSTS TO RUN LONDON

Comparative Figures Regarding Many Important Branches of Expenditure.

COST OF STREET WATER

Many Other Places Lose Money, But London Makes a Profit-Many Figures of Interest.

Ald, Richter, in his pursuit for information on civic matters, has gathered together a lot of valuable information, and when the members of the committee listened to it Monday night, they were somewhat amazed at the amount of work the gathering of such statistics must have necessitated. The comparative assessment per

capita of the several cities is of considerable interest. London's assessment, on the per capita basis, is \$491 89, Toronto \$719 19, Ottawa \$552 04 Hamilton \$555 04, Brantford \$536 82. St. Thomas is low, with \$418 18. The average is \$518 25, so that London is considerably below the average.

The amount of taxes paid by the individual in the cities averages \$952. London pays per capita \$8.63 Toronto \$11 59, Ottawa \$9 68, Hamilton \$8 60, Brantford \$9 64, Kingston \$7 42, Windsor \$10 15. Port Arthur \$13 10. Chatham \$1445. London does not make a bad showing here.

Exemptions.

In exemptions from taxation London is less than the average, which \$120 81 per capita. London is \$102 38, Toronto \$101 23, Ottawa \$229 21, Ham-llton \$62 52. Kingston \$175 73, Port Arthur \$351 76.

Every city with the exception of London, and, perhaps, one other, loses money on street watering. In 1908, London made 1 cent per capita. Toronto lost 16 cents, Ottawa gained 8 cents, Hamilton lost 27 cents, Brantford lost 34 cents, and Peterboro lost 15 cents. The cost of street lighting in London is above the average per capita. This city pays 58 cents per capita, Toronto 42 cents, Ottawa 35 cents, Hamilton 61 cents, Brantford 70 cents, Windsor 62 cents. The average is 55 cents.

Cost of Salaries. London does not pay an excessive amount to manage its affairs. The cost per capita for salaries, etc., is 45 cents Toronto 63, Ottawa, 28, Hamilton 50, Brantford 49, Kingston 65, and Peterboro 46 cents per capita-a good

ICITY HAS BEEN GENEROUS IN LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS!

Ald. Richter Thinks London Goes Too Far Regarding Curbs, Gutters, Etc.

The city of London has been generous to the citizens on the question of local improvements so Ald. Richter claims, and he has a bundle of statis-

tics to back him up. In the matter of pavements, the city has taken the proper course, he considers, and pays only for the intersections, not making any direct contribution to the cost of the pavement itself.

It is somewhat different with sidewalks and curbs and gutters. In this, the city pays for all intersections, and also one-half the cost of all the work, and exempts one-third the depth of corner lots. This works out to something like 60 per cent of the cost. In Other Cities.

The majority of the cities pay nothing whatever towards the cost of this sort of work. Toronto contributes nothing, St. Thomas nothing, and the same holds true of Chatham, Berlin, Sarnia, Woodstock, Windsor and St.

Hamilton pays two-fifths, while Belleville pays three-fifths. London is paying quite a bit more than other cities, according to this. The flankage allowance is practically the same in all cases.

"We have paid too much of a share of this work," said Ald. Richter. "Our debenture debt has risen greatly owing to this, inordinate quantities being laid in some years. We can well stop this, and make the ratepayer pay for the improvements."

Stand by the Act. Ex-Mayor Judd, Ald. Saunders and a score of the old-timers stand by the act and declare that the action taken was the only course open to them. "It was board sidewalks, or a proportion of the cost," said ex-Mayor Judd. "We chose the latter course, and it has worked out satisfactorily. We would never have had the city improved had we not done that." The others took the same view.
