THE RACE TO MUKDEN

Japanese Armies Converging to Head Off Russian Rout.

Mukden, Sept. 6, 1:40 p.m. - The retreat of General Kuropatkin's army is being carried out in good order, despite the terrible condition of the roads, rendered sodden by the rains which fell yesterday and today, which mire the lumbering guns and heavy transport trains. Long lines of wagons, drawn by steaming mules, horses and even bullocks are straining their way north over the soaking, cut-up main road from Yantai, Behind them come; long trains of artillery, and back of them still, Kuropatkin's army. The Japanese are hanging on Kuropatkin's flanks, keeping the Russians engaged in a continuous rear-guard action. The progress of the retreating army has been slow owing to the necessity of first getting through the baggage and guns; but, the heads of commissariat trains have afready passed through Mukden and are continuing their way

Aug. 23-The Japanese began outpost skirmishes about Lia Yang.

Aug. 24—The Japanese began a general attack on the southern defenses of Liao Yang.

Aug. 25-26-The Russians were forced to give up An Shan Shan and An Ping, and draw back on Aug 27-28-The Russian south front was routed and a full retreat was made. The Japs captured

the right bank of the Lan River.

Aug. 29-The Japanese won continued victories along the southern front.

Aug. 30-Generals Oku and Nodzu attacked the Russian line to the south and southeast of Liao Yang. The fighting lasted sixteen hours, but the Russians held their ground. Kuroki failed to cross the Taitse River at San Kan Kan Ku Tuan and marched west towards Liao Yang,

Aug. 31-Oku and Nodzu renewed their attack and Kuroki crossed the Taitse and turned the Russian left. Kuropatkin withdrew all his forces to the inner defenses of Liao Yang, with the Japanese fol-

Sept. 1-Kuropatkin, finding his rear threatened, after his left had been pushed back, abandoned Liao Yang and moved his entire army across the Taitse and the Japanese occupied Liao Yang. Kuroki, with the Japanese right, moved swiftly to the west, and part of Nodzu's army crossed the river. Sept. 2-Kuroki reported in battle at the Yen Tai Mines, northeast of Liao Yang. Mr. John Dearness and Mr. Frank Lawson have edited the verse of the late Robert Elliott, of Westminster. whose recent death at an early age re- crop is in stook and the average yield moved one of the sweetest singers in the choir of Canadian poetry. The another good year for the Dominion, collection embraces about 50 poems, the majority of which appear in print for the first time. It is prefaced by tributes in verse and prose from Mr. Dearness, Mr. Warman, Mr. Lawson and other local admirers. Mr. W. E. Saunders describes Robert Elliott as "the one man in the London district who seemed to take such an intelligent and inquiring interest in each branch of natural history that every specialist took profit as well as pleasure out of intercourse with him." From Mr. Dearness we learn something of his uneventful but beautiful and serviceable life. The youngest of four brothers, and of delicate constitution, he was not tied by the regular routine of farm duties. He studied for the teaching profession and entered the Normal Training School at Toronto, but illness compelled him to relinquish his ambition. He fought against his invalidism with infinite cheerfulness, and found his chief delight in the companionship of books and nature, to which his poetical temperament inclined him. "Not even Gilbert White knew his parish of Selborne better than Robert Elliott knew the beautiful and winding Thames in the neighborhood of the valley that he named Plover Mills." He wished to be useful to his fellow-citizens, and served at one time or another in every local organization-of school, church, or municipality.

His verse gives the impression that he wrote poetry because he lived and felt it. The habits of birds, of plants, of flowers, and all the sights and sounds of the country appealed to the poet in him, as well as the trained stuure.
