

STEADILY GROWING

Is the Deficit of Public Librarian Lancefield, of Hamilton. Hamilton, Ont., Feb. 12-Accountant

Scott has not completed his work on ex-Librarian Lancefield's books yet, but the deficit gradually grows larger, and judging from present indications the total loss of the library board through Lancefield's stealing will be in the neighborhood of \$5,000. The board's methods of doing business was decidedly loose, and it is probable the decidedly loose, and it is probable the Guarantee Company will make a fight before paying the \$2,000 bond for Lancefield's good behavior. Lawyer Burton, who was chairman of the finance committee of the library board, who is practically responsible. finance committee of the library board, who is practically responsible for the signing of the duplicate pay cheques, was notified by the bank a week before Lancefield's departure that the board's overdraft was \$10,000, and still he took no action. It has been discovered that Lancefield neglected to pay accounts against the library by New York and other large business houses for the past three business houses for the past three years, and had bundles of dunning letters in his drawers. It also looks as ters in his drawers. It also looks as though he had pocketed the Government grant, as well as fines, etc., of which no account can be discovered. His whereabouts are not yet known, but if his friends do not make good to the board the loss of the amount of the bond within a short time every effort will be made to locate and prosecute him.

PREMIER ROSS INTRODUCES HIS PROHIBITION MEASURE | Special

Manitoba Act Goes to Electors on Oct. 14th and Into Force, if Passed, on May 1st. 1904.

Measure Must Have Majority Equivalent to More Than One-Half of the Number of Votes Cast at Provincial Elections-Question of Compensation Left Open--The Premier Has Committed Himself to it.

Toronto, February 12 .- On the second Tuesday in October next the profincial electors of Ontario will be asked to say whether a prohibitory liquor set, exactly on the lines of the Manitoba Act, shall go into force in Ontario. To make the measure effective the affirmative must be carried by a majority equivalent to more than one-half of the number of votes cast at the proial general election, which will take place in the meantime. The act is to go into force, if carried by the electorate, on May 1, 1904.

The bill does not ontain any claus of the Prohibition Bill which Premier Ross this afternoon introduced into the Legislature.

The sill does not contain any clause providing for compensation for the sor men, but the Premier said he had committed himself to compensation on some basis, and this would be a subject for discussion after the neasure had been carried by the electors.

A significant remark of Col. Matheson, when the Premier made this last announcement, was:-"I suppose you will take another referendum on that question?"

The leaving open of such an important question provides the wily Prenier with all sorts of opportunities for again dodging the prohibitionists.

The greater portion of the speech was very wearisome, consisting, as it did, of the reading of long extracts from speeches of tem-perance men and resolutions adopted by them, which were adroitly used to justify the Government in shriking re-sponsibility for the proposed measure by adopting the referendum.

The Premier opened with a history of the temperance movement, which led him to a discussion of the point whether license legislation should for the present be abandoned and whether we should embark upon a measure of partial prohibition. The Government had decided to bring in a bill in



the terms of the Manitoba Act. the provisions of which were well known. This measure, it was proposed, after being passed by the House, to refer to the electors for an expression of opinion, and if that expression was favorable, the act would go into operation on the terms stated therein. Having made this statement the Premier entered into a long defence of the proposal to

ADOPT THE REFERENDUM. It was sumptuary legislation, and had never been made a party question. They did, not propose to ask the electors to divide upon it as Liberals or Conservative, but to give an opinion on a measure of vast importance to the people. They hoped in this way to get a more judicial opinion than in any other way. It had been contended that the referer dum was unconstitutional. In reply to this he quoted a memorandum of Sir John Bourinot, prepared in response to the Premier's request, in which he says:—"High authorities do not consider such references as inconsistent with sound principles." Bourinot quotes several authorities. Mr. Ross also pointed out that the referendum had been adopted in the constitution of the Australian Commonwealth in the event of a dead-Commonwealth in the event of a dead-lock between the upper and lower houses. QUESTION OF WHAT 'MAJORITY of the electors should pronounce in favor of such a measure in order to get the calm and conclusive judgment of the people. This he went into with, much detail. In the United States, prohibition, when first submitted, became operative by a majority in its favor, and when embodied in the constitution and made permanent, two thirds majority was required. McCarthy Act, introduced in House of Commons in 1883, and which was declared ultra vires, required three-fifths vote. They had also the opinion of such men as Alexander Mackenzie, Senator Vidal, Sir Leon-ard, Tilley, T. Dixon Craig and other temperance men regardless of political party that unless there was a large majority in its favor it would be unwise to enforce prohibition. They had the Dunkin Act since 1864, and to-day it was enforced in only 22 municipalities. The Scott Act was carried in 26 counties and in two cities, and was repealed in all. They saw a very decided change in public opinion. The Scott Act campaigns were educational and may have done a great deal of good, but as an effic ent means for repressing the liquor traffic it was found to be ineffective. This was an additional reason why they should proceed with some deliberation and care. They found the same thing in the United States. Sixteen states had carried prohibition, but it

Gentlemen, what have you to say

about this? You have been accused lately of ing it too freely. We don't believe there is anything in the charge. The citizens have put it down as ridicu-

But how about the other side of it? Have you spent enough? Have you seen to the proper maintenance and conduct of your department? 'Or have you leaned towards an economy, rigid and unrighteous?

Over-economy is a unique charge to have control of a portion of the publie purse-but is a serious one, just the same.

That the sanitation at the Police Station is in such a wretched condition-and has been for months - and that no steps have been taken to remedy it, is not commendable. And the responsibility rests upon you and purse strings.

However, "let the dead past bury its past. Prompt action now may partially atone. The whole sanitary system at the Police Station should be overhauled and made perfect-and the work should be done at once.

The matter is an important one. No delay should be indulged in. The Planet sincerely advises the calling of a special meeting at which immediate and thorough attention shall be given to the work of establishing a system of sanitation in accord with the best health interests.

A FORECAST.

His forecast stands for all that is necessary and conductive to permanent progress, not only in his native city, but throughout our province. In it he atrikes cords of political independence that should be nurtured by members of both parties who have at stake the future of a country, that now augurs to be one of the greatest producing nations of the world. Politicians in both ranks should face the great indus trial problem of to-day in the atmosphere of Canadian prosperity, and not along the petty paths of party jeal-

His Imperialistic utterances were harmonious with his present position. As the British Empire is to-day, so she should ever stand; one grand confederation of liberty, progress and justice, permeating the farthest corners of the earth. Canada as a component of that mighty empire, must cast aside all selfish considerations and act only along those lines which will promote advancement and unanimity

in every part. She must not hope by impoverishing Australia or India to build herself up. All are part of one stupendous whole, and Canadian statesmen must apply those national and industrial principles which will ultimately place crown of success every division of the Empire. The time will soon come when Canada, Australia and India will not be conered colonies ruled by the Mother-

land, but all will stand as equal parts of one co-existent whole. A compre nsive system of government should be drafted which, will admit of the local internal concerns of each being managed within themselves, and all Imperial concerns be directed by a representative body chosen from all parts of the empire, which, right and capacity and common interest indicate should be represented. Arranged on a table in the lower regions of this place of detention were 57 chickens, undressed. The array made quite a spectacle. Above in the cells two sad prisoners regretted that they had been caught with those chickens in their possess.

Two farmers, Johnson Orr and An-thony Edwards did some sharp detec-tive work and were responsible for the

chicken thieves.
Last week, Jounson Orr had 50 find
The birds disappeared in the night. Man tracks pointed instrument in this vanishing act on the part of the chickens. Mr. Orr felt hurt he also hoped to

catch the thief. He watched the market on Saturday and saw that one man who lived in this city had a large number of chickens for sale. He enquired and learned that this man did not raise chickens. He also learned that the same man sold chickens every Saturday for a long time. Tuesday night Mr. Orr and Mr. Edwards sent two men to watch the house of the man who sold so many chickens on the market. Last night, the two farmers watched the house themselves. About 12.30 the vigilance committee of two saw a sleigh leave the house. The two sentinels then left their post of of duty and reported the matter to the

city police.

The rest of the story is best told P. C. Groves' own words.
"When this little incident was ported to us about 12.30," said the officer, "Mr. Dodson and I at once de cided to go over and watch the house until the sleigh came back. Leaving P. C. Durr to look after our beats, we went over. Concealing ourselves in a little lean-to attached to the stable, waited and the chicken speculators certainly kept us waiting. Half the boards were off the building, and we

four watchers nearly froze in the lithe 6x4 shed. "We certainly had reason to rejoice when the sleigh returned at 4,40 a, m. to the house on the sorner of Brock street, and the town line, where four men had been patiently waiting for four hours. They told Judge Houston that they had secured 17 of the chickens from Gus Joseph on the second concession, some from the first house on the right hand side of the Prince Albert Road, and some from a farmer on the 5th concession, Chatham township, next to James Waugh's place.





Given to British Prestige in the Far East by Treaty With Japan. While not Directed Specially Against Russia it Undoubtediy Includes Manchuria. London, Feb. 12 .- The Liberal after-

noon newspapers view the new "dual alliance" between Great Britain and Japan with mixed feelings. The Conservative organs generally applaud it, but the St. James' Gazette, Conservative, expresses modified rapture at this wide departure from British traditional policy." This paper, however, finds solace in the thought that the policy and interests of the United States are identical with those of Great Britain and Japan, and concludes-"Perhaps we shall find when the policy of Great Britain is definitely known that the United States is formally or informally a party to the league of peace in the far east. At any rate, no effort should be spared to secure its adhes-ion." The Westminster Gazette thinks the alliance can be fairly termed offensive and defensive, says that it therefore has a dangerously wide ex-tension, and concludes that it looks like a rather hasty answer to European hostility.

NOT AGAINST RUSSIA. Baron Hayashi, the Japanese miniser here, who signed the treaty on behalf of Japan, in an interview published to-day, declared that the Anglo-Japanese treaty was not directed spe-ially against Russia, but undoubtedly was solely meant to maintain the status quo. The Manchurian question, status quo. The Manchurian question, however, was at present the subject of negotiations between Russia and the United States, representing the present treaty has no collaterals in the shape of treaties between Japan other powers, but it does not exclude the possibility of a similar treaty betweed Japan and Russia, of course, with the full knowledge of Great Britain.

IN THE COMMONS. In the House of Commons to-day the Opposition leader, Sir Henry Cam, bell-Bannerman, invited the gov-ernment leader, Mr. A. J. Baltour, to make a statement relative to the Anglo-Japanese treaty. The Journal des Debats remarks: "We think England gets the best of the bargain. She merely assumes theoretical obligations towards Japan, whereas the latter's obligations toward England take much more practical character. does not seem as if Japan has much reason to congratulate herself on the treaty, while the other powers can remain indifferent to an alliance which will leave England much less accommodating in the far east." The Francais says: "The most important result will be to give England greater free dome in the remainder of the world.
