Sad Calamity — The Fire Kings Swift Work

 Wilbert E. Lantz is a thrifty young man just starting in life industrious and prudent, bought a nice little home a little over a year ago on which was a neat house and store. He was preparing to build a barn, was away earning when yesterday the fire king laid his home and the contents of the upper floor consisting of beds, bedding, clothing and other valuables were all destroyed. Neighbors were quickly on the scene and with might and main even one or two risking their lives in their endeavor to save all they could. The property on the ground floor was saved, the young wife and babe left to the hospitality of her neighbors for food and shelter. The houses of Isaac Lantz and that of Mrs. Hutchinson were in great danger but owing to the watch kept and the wind dying down the burning shingles did not ignite though they flew far and

While the men put their hands in their pockets and provided sufficient material to make tight his cooper's shop and stored their things save what their nearest neighbor stored on their premises. A sad celebration for New Ross on Dominion Day. The fire burnt till dawn (Sunday) then spent itself. No idea how it caught neighbors raised the alarm to the inmates when flames were seen issuing from the roof, telephones were in motion and men, women and pails were quickly on the scene. Sad, very sad for a struggler.

Fortunately but few things were in the shop, the heaviest being oil and sugar which with all other things around the shelves were got out safely, also his tools in their porch was a store of firewood, fine hardwood, which all had to burn, a great loss, and kept the fire longer. The well curb was burned, the well which had been dried was left full of burnt cinders and ashes but all the small buildings were saved. It being two holidays it was impossible to reach Mr. Lantz who was in Kentville, by telephone though it was repeatedly tried.

 Following is an interesting extract from a letter recently received by Dr. and Mrs. A. H. Chute from their son, Lieut. A. H. Chute:

June 15th, 1916
 I have come out of the recent big battle unscathed. Last night I returned to our wagon lines. Tomorrow I go to one of the towns situated well back for two weeks in Artillery work in Field, so you need not worry about me in that scrap. I have had a very exciting time lately. I was in the thick of it when we made our counter attack. The German bombardment for a few days was the worst that we yet had on our Front. I was in the trenches as Forward Observation Officer for the last three days of the week, on Sunday I returned to the Battery.

On Sunday morning before the dawn when we were out preparing for our attack, one of the officers of the Battery was killed on the Forward Observing Post, so that we were short one officer, one substitute was forwarded and another chap and I remained to fire the guns, while the Major kept in touch with the situation over the phone and mapped out the lines of fire. I was informed at 5 a. m. that an all-day bombardment by the British was to begin at 7 a. m. on Monday. From 7 a. m. (Monday) until 1.30 a. m. of the day following, our guns were firing continually, with one hour at 11 a. m., 4 p. m., and 8 p. m. for the purpose of allowing the guns to cool. Our Battery of four guns fired over 3000 2 rounds. I commanded the gun crews for over half the time. I was on the first shift at 7 a. m. As I gave the first orders and the guns opened up, I said to myself: "You're in for the toughest day of your life." And it certainly was. Sometimes the German shells were raining around us. Some other Batteries had their guns put out of business, but we did not have a single casualty to men or gun. The continuous roar was terrific, but I had a patent device for my ears. At 1.30 a. m. on Tuesday morning we fired our last shot of the bombardment. The infantry immediately began their attack. We had to stand to our guns until 8 p. m., then I got the first sleep that I had since the three hours nap of Sunday evening. I slept without a break from 8 a. m. Tuesday morning until 12 that night then I turned out and rode down to our wagon lines.

Today I am feeling in the best of condition. I have had a bath, and change of clothes, a good feed and lots of sleep. The Russians are doing splendidly just now. I am more than ever in favor of the idea that the war will end this fall. I have not heard from home for some time. It is awful having to wait so long for letters. Lieut. A. H. Chute, B. 

German Counter Attacks Repulsed

London, July 10—The British official announcement follows:

"In the past 48 hours particularly severe fighting has centred around Thones wood which is triangular in shape and measures some 400 yards from north to south, with a southern base of 400 yards, and has been strongly defended by the Germans with trenches and wire entanglements.

"On the morning of July 8th after a heavy bombardment we succeeded in capturing the southern end of the woods. Subsequently we extended our position towards the north and drove back a determined counter attack with heavy loss to the enemy.

"Yesterday afternoon, as already reported, two more German counter attacks in mass against our positions in the woods were crushed by our artillery. Again last evening the enemy bombarded the wood with all natures of armament and launched two strong attacks against it from the east and southeast. The first of these was completely repulsed. The second succeeded in penetrating the southern end of the wood, but the Germans were at once ejected with heavy loss. Later in the night a fifth desperate attempt was made to drive us from our positions, but this also was completely crushed by our fire. The enemy's casualties in these five battle-attacks have been severe.

"At other paces on the battlefield progress has been made. Northwest of Contalmaison we captured a small corpse and three more guns and this morning we have taken several hundred more prisoners.

"On the Flanders front the enemy's artillery was active and heavily bombarded our trenches near Hooze for three hours. In this neighborhood we had successful raids into the German front line."

Twenty Two Villages Taken by Allies on Somme Front

(By Henry Wood, United Press Staff Correspondent)

Paris, July 11—Twenty-two villages all fortified to the highest degree of which the Germans are capable, have been captured by the Anglo-French armies, since the great offensive of the Somme began, ten days ago.

Peronne, lying a bare mile across the Somme from the French advanced lines, and the next important prize toward which the French are advancing, lies almost within the grasp of General Foch's army.

Despatches from headquarters today showed that the villages of Biaches, one mile from Peronne, was captured by the French in the same dashing spirit that drove the enemy out of Dompierre, Hardecourt and other strongly fortified positions.

Dompierre, with its entire first line German positions, was taken in fifty minutes and Hardecourt in only thirty-five.

The Germans resisted more stubbornly at Biaches, but within less than two hours the village and all its strong defensive fortifications were in the hands of the French.

Everyone returned much invigorated, and the organization meeting was taken up and put through in record time. Digby, Middleton and Annapolis had a strong delegation, and Secretary Porter reported that nearly all the Boards in Western Nova Scotia had approved of the matter.

President Blair stated the purpose of the meeting and after some discussion the following officers were elected on ballot:

- Treas — H. B. Short, Digby
- Auditors — Messrs. P. R. Bentley & W. R. Romans

A pleasing surprise was the fact that the busy Town of Bear River had a Board of Trade and three hustling delegates present, and affiliated in the Western Nova Scotia Board.

Excellent addresses were given by President Corbett, Vice Pres. Graham and other officers. The text was energetic and united effort to serve the district represented in the organization.

Resolved on motion, that the Board express its appreciation of the efforts of President Blair and Secy Porter in their able efforts in organization.

In the evening a good assemblage gathered in the Court House and listened to addresses as follows: Prof. W. S. Blair who took the place of Deputy C. F. Bailey, of Ontario, who could not attend. He dealt with the providing for our soldiers on the finish of the war. Mr. G. O. O'Brien followed on the Sheep Industry, Wm. A. Bacon, Pres. of the Digby Farmers Assoc., on Town and County Co-operation, and an address by President Corbett.

At 10.15 p. m., the Digby

Board took the visitors to the famous Pines Hotel and there gave them a magnificent banquet. About 55 sat down to the prettily arranged and well-laden tables. President Holdsworth, of the Digby Board was toastmaster, and he presided in a manner worthy of the occasion and the place. The usual toasts were given and responses made, bringing forth eloquent and witty remarks from representatives of all the Boards. All voted it the most elaborate and pleasing banquet ever attended. The Digby people left nothing undone to make the visitors stay a profitable one and in the beautiful Pines Hotel and its efficient manager they had able assistance. This is one of the largest and best appointed summer hotels in the Province, and the situation among the Pines on a beautiful slope toward the Basin is an ideal one.

The Western N. S. Board of Trade may be depended upon to work in a co-operative way for the advancement of our fair and prosperous country.

Porter and Mr. McWilliams all bearing testimony to the young man's noble sacrifice for his country. The choir and members rendered most appropriate music, solos, etc., and the whole ceremony was very impressive. In the evening at the same church Rev. Sergt. Herman of the 219th gave an excellent sermon and the music was furnished entirely by men from Camp Aldershot with Private Frogitt officiating at the organ. Two good solos were given but the full chorus singing was an inspiration. The church was crowded for this service.

CHANGES AT MT. ALLISON.

Sackville, N. B., July 8.—A number of changes are to take place in the teaching staff of Mount Allison Ladies' College in the coming year, owing to the departure of some members of last year's staff. The resignation of Miss Elva Machum has necessitated the appointment of a new instructor in French and English essays which position has been filled by Miss Ella Stanley, M.A., Miss Stanley graduated from that institution. She also holds an M.A., from Columbia University and studied for a time abroad. She has a wide teaching experience and comes to Mount Allison highly spoken of by her former associates.

The vacancy made by Miss Winifred Thomas, B.A., who, for the past few years has taught Bible and History, has been filled by Miss Leah Borden, B.A., Kings Co., Miss Borden graduated from the University in 1910 since which time she had valuable and successful experience in the public schools of Nova Scotia. As a student she made exceptionally good record, and her return to Mount Allison on the teaching staff of the Ladies College is highly endorsed by the authorities.

In addition to the changes mentioned, an instructor has been secured for gymnasium work of the girls. Marion Ferguson will assume control of this department and will supervise the physical development of the students during the year. This branch of the college is receiving more and more attention from the larger Ladies' Colleges of the continent every year, and Mount Allison will be prepared to offer advantages equal to any. Miss Ferguson is a graduate of the Posse School of Physical Education and has a record of successful teaching along her chosen line.

Following out the progress which has been made by Mount Allison in the past few years in the matter of increase in staff and teaching facilities, an arrangement has been made to strengthen the Theological staff during the ensuing year by the appointment of an additional professor. The Rev. John Line, M. A., B. D., has been engaged to take up the work of teaching Homiletics, Church Policy, Didactics, Public Speaking, Philosophy of Theism, and other subjects. Mr. Line is a graduate of the University of Toronto, and holds both degrees from that institution. During the past year he has had successful teaching experience in that University, which giving lectures in Philosophy. He is recognized as a profound thinker, with a thorough knowledge of his subjects and a keen sense of the growth and development of philosophic ideas.

Chancellor Bowles of Victoria College and Dr. Abbott, the head of the Philosophy department in Toronto University are very outspoken in their recommendation of Mr. Line as a constructive thinker, and a theologian of the advanced though not radical type. His appointment will add materially to the advantages which Mount Allison offers her theological students.



PRIZE ESSAY

The value of the Observance of the Christian Sabbath in the life of the individual and the Community:

The Sabbath was established in the old testament in memory of the repose of God after the six days of creation. God has commanded man to keep holy the Sabbath Day, and Almighty God, in giving Moses the commandment, explained in exact words the manner in which the Sabbath was to be sanctified to His service, "six days shalt thou labor," He said, "and do all thy work, but on the seventh day is the Sabbath of the Lord thy God, thou shalt do no work on it, thou nor thy son, nor thy daughter, nor thy man-servant, nor thy maid-servant, nor thy beast, nor the stranger that is within thy gates, thou shalt remember to keep the day holy."

The law of the Sabbath seems to have existed before the time back to the origin of the human race.

This third commandment of God ordains that we should sanctify the Sunday or the day of the Lord and forbids us to profane it, and it is only just and right that we should give one day of the week to the services of God after giving six to the world.

Work is prohibited on Sunday because it would hinder the religious exercises which God exacts on that day, and work, if continued without interruption, would injure the bodily well-being of man. Continued activity seems to be against the law of nature. The law of physics that all movement ends in rest. The first great lesson in the Bible story of creation is the need of rest and the Creator set aside one day in seven for rest. In order to have renewed energy man must rest, for rest is as necessary to his nature as food.

The institution of a special day dedicated to the honor and service of God and destined to give man rest from his labor is an invention of the Divine wisdom.

The dangers that would beset man if he did not obey God's command to observe the Sabbath, are many. He would think only of the world and its pleasures, and would soon lose regard for authority. Hence we see how many evils would exist in society as a result of the individual disobeying the command of God.

Just as Almighty God often bestows his special blessings on families and nations who are faithful to the observance of Sunday; so does He threaten with the most severe chastisements all those who profane the Sabbath. It is a great crime in the eyes of God, a disgrace to religion and a scandal to one's neighbors. Its results are serious for it makes me forget God and duty.

If God Himself had not set aside a certain day, of the week to be sanctified, many men would forget the existence and rights of God altogether, and forgetting God, would soon forget also their obligations to their fellow-men.

The great importance of observing the Christian Sabbath is that it keeps man mindful of his God and makes him obedient to the laws of church and state, and therefore a good citizen in the community in which he lives.

IMPRESSIVE MEMORIAL SERVICE AT ST. JAMES' CHURCH

Thursday afternoon, July 13th, a Memorial Service was held in the Church of England parish church, Kentville, in honor of the late Lieut. Frederick Courtney Mellor, Newfoundland Regiment, First Canadian Contingent, who was killed in action on July 1st.

The service was in charge of Capt. J. F. Tupper, Chaplain of the 193rd Battalion. Addresses were delivered by Rev. J. D. Hull of Church Street, Cornwallis, N. S., and Rev. Rural Dean Dixon, Wolfville. Captain Suckling, Anglican Chaplain to the 85th Battalion, also took part. Mr. A. H. Morash presided at the organ and the 85th Band played the Dead March at the conclusion of the service. The sacred edifice was crowded with people of all denominations. A detachment of soldiers from the 193rd Battalion was also in attendance and was in charge of Lieut. Cunningham, a personal friend of the deceased hero.

Lieut.-Colonel Borden, commanding the Nova Scotia Highland Brigade, was present, as well as other friends of the deceased from the various Battalions.

The late Lieut. Fredrick Courtney Miller was the eldest son of Reverend and Mrs. T. C. Mellor of Kentville. He was born at South East Passage, N. S. in 1888 and was baptised by Bishop Frederick Courtney, being the first child baptised by the distinguished Bishop after his consecration. Lieut. Mellor attended Kings College School for a number of years after which he entered the staff of the Commercial Cable Co. at Hazel Hill, N. S. About six years ago he was transferred to St. John's in Newfoundland where they established a new station. At the time of the outbreak of hostilities he enlisted as a private with the Newfoundland regiment. That regiment garrisoned Inverness and Edinburgh Castle, Scotland. While at the latter place he was given his Lieutenancy, and was sent back to Newfoundland to recruit. On his return to Scotland with the men enlisted by him they garrisoned Newton-on-Ayr. From there he proceeded to France, where he took part in many engagements and was killed in action on July 1st. Thus while performing the highest duties on earth he was called to still higher duties in Paradise.

His parents have the sympathy of all in their bereavement. Their only other son is serving in the trenches as a private at this moment and the Revd. Mr. Mellor has also himself offered for overseas service.

MAJ. STANLEY JONES DIES IN GERMAN PRISON CAMP

AMHERST, July 10—Mrs. B. J. Lawson received word this evening of the death in a Hun prison of her brother, Major Stanley Jones, of Calgary. The late Major Jones was a son of Rev. Joseph and Mrs. Jones, formerly of Wolfville, N.S. He was educated at Acadia College, taught school in Manitoba, and saw his first active fighting in the Boer War, being a member of the first Nova Scotia contingent to go to South Africa. He was at Paardeberg, and was in the squad to which Cronje surrendered. After returning to Canada he studied law at Calgary where up to the time of the declaration of war with Germany he carried on a successful law business.

A Calgary paper states: "Mr. Jones was probably the first man to enlist for overseas service in Calgary, and perhaps the first in Canada, as he wired in his application for services to Ottawa as soon as war was declared, and before Canada had definitely decided to send troops to the war."

Mr. Jones went overseas as lieutenant, was promoted to captain, and was major when he died. He was twice wounded, and after recovering, returned to the front. He was in the celebrated battle of the 4th of June, was seriously wounded and taken prisoner, dying, on June 8th. He was accompanied abroad by his faithful wife, who at present is doing Red Cross service in France, having lately received distinguished honors for her excellent services.

Thus another gallant Nova Scotian has laid down his life for the Empire.
