LCNDON, ENG., Nov. 11, 1879. The Home Secretary Mr. Cross has delivered an oration at Leigh, in which he defends the domestic and foreign policy of the Cabinet. His remarks with reference to Afghanistan were nothing but a repetition of Sir Stafford Northcotes recent declaration, while he simply reiterates that the Government has always sought to assure itself an understanding with the Con-tinential Powers, and to believe that for the time being England has received from every European Government all the assurances which it is possible to obtain. The object to be attained is the execution of the Treaty of Berlin, and this end. As regards Turkey, he expressed his detestation of her administration, his desire for the introduction of reforms, and the disinclination of the party, which hopes to place the banner of the Cross on the dome of St. Sophia. and the military party, whose influence was unfortunately preponderant, and which is directly responsible for the
