



Craig for a new calculating device, which will supplement that part of geometri-cal designing known as plan and elevation drawing as applied to heet metal work. The tool is eally a combination of square protractors, rule and a flexible gauge, and it is believed its use will practically do away with the customary methods of obtaining measurements from drawings.



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

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
